**H 843. ORANGE/CHAPEL HILL LOCAL ACT (=S 724).** *TO CLARIFY THE AUTHORITY OF ORANGE COUNTY TO REQUIRE BY ORDINANCE CERTAIN NOTICE OF PESTICIDE APPLICATION, TO AUTHORIZE ORANGE COUNTY TO REGULATE BY ORDINANCE THE EMISSION OF POLLUTANTS OR CONTAMINANTS, AND TO AUTHORIZE THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL TO REGULATE THE TIMING, NUMBER, AND SIZE OF PRIVATE DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS UNDER CONSTRUCTION WITHIN A SPECIFIED WATERSHED.*

(1) Adds a new GS 153A-143, as it applies to Orange County only, permitting Orange County by ordinance to require that notice of a proposed application of a pesticide be given to landowners adjoining the property to be treated or in the immediate vicinity. (2) Amends GS 153A-445(a), as it applies to Orange County only, to give Orange County the authority that cities have under GS 160A-185 to regulate the emission of pollutants or contaminants. (3) Amends GS 113A-60(a), as it applies to the town of Chapel Hill only, to allow Chapel Hill to regulate the timing, number, and size in acres of private development projects that may be permitted and under construction within a specified watershed.

**H 843. CHAPEL HILL LOCAL ACT.** Intro. 3/31/99. House committee substitute makes the following changes to 1st edition. Deletes Orange County provisions on regulation of pesticides. Changes authorization for enhanced sedimentation control to allow increased sedimentation protection in the event of concurrent construction of two or more projects in the same watershed.

**H 843. MOORE COMMISSIONERS DISTRICTS.** Intro. 4/1/99. Senate committee substitute makes the following changes to 2nd edition. Replaces bill with act entitled "AN ACT CONCERNING ELECTORAL DISTRICTS FOR THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF MOORE COUNTY." Amends SL 1965, Ch. 153, Sec. 4, and SL 1995, Ch. 215, as amended by SL 1998-175, to require Moore County Commissioners, no later than September 15, 1999 by resolution to redefine the districts so that all five fall within an overall range of population deviation of 10%. Applies to elections for Board beginning in 2000.
