EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR THE PRESIDENT IN HIS EFFORTS TO FIND AND PUNISH THE TERRORISTS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF THE WORLD TRADE CENTER, THE CRASHING OF ONE PLANE INTO THE PENTAGON AND THE CRASHING OF ANOTHER PLANE NEAR PITTSBURGH, PENNSYLVANIA, AND HONORING ALL AMERICANS WHO HAVE LOST THEIR LIVES DUE TO THIS TRAGEDY. H 1466. SUPPORT TROOPS/CIVIL RELIEF. Intro. 9/17/01. Senate committee substitute makes the following changes to 1st edition. Replaces joint resolution with *AN ACT TO SUPPORT TROOPS PARTICIPATING IN OPERATIONS ENDURING FREEDOM AND NOBLE EAGLE, AND TO PERMIT LEAVE FOR DISASTER SERVICE VOLUNTEERS*. Expresses the General Assembly's support for the President in his efforts to find and punish those responsible for the September 11 terrorist attacks and the General Assembly's desire to assure that military personnel involved in responding to the attacks can serve without undue concern for obligations imposed by the state. Authorizes Governor to extend deadlines and waive penalties or fees as necessary to alleviate hardships to military personnel. Grants deployed military personnel a grace period of 90 days after the end of their deployment in which to list property for taxation and pay any property taxes that became due or delinquent during their deployment. Amends GS 166A-32 to provide for leave for state employees who provide disaster relief within the United States (current law limits leave to disaster relief efforts within North Carolina). Community colleges, upon request of the student and during the 2001-2002 academic year only, must refund tuition and fees to military reserve and national guard personnel called to active duty or to active personnel who have received temporary or permanent reassignments that make it impossible to complete their courses, must refund their extension registration fees, and must buy back their textbooks to the extent possible. University of North Carolina constituent institutions, for the 2001-2002 academic year only, may refund tuition or fees if students request them because of involuntary or voluntary military service or because of circumstances related to national emergencies.
