3	"§ 143B-344.36. North Carolina Sustainable Communities Task Force – membership;
4	staffing.
5	(a) <u>Membership and Advice. – The Task Force shall consist of 11 members who reflect</u>
6	the diversity of the State. The Secretaries of Commerce, Environment and Natural Resources,
7	and Transportation and the Director of the North Carolina Housing Finance Agency shall each
8	designate a representative to the Task Force from their agencies. The Secretary of
9	Administration shall designate a representative from that Department who is familiar with the
10	management and development of State-owned lands and buildings. The Secretary of Health and
11	Human Services shall designate a representative from the Division of Public Health of the
12	Department of Health and Human Services who is familiar with the impact of the built
13	environment on human health. The Governor shall appoint one member who is a representative
14	of a nonprofit organization involved in the planning, advocacy, or creation of sustainable
15	development. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint two members: one
16	member who is a representative of a county government and one member who is a
17	representative of a council of government or other regional collaborative organization. The
18	Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint two members: one member who is a
19 20	representative of a city government and one member with professional training in planning who
20	is a member of the North Carolina Chapter of the American Planning Association. The Secretaries of Commerce, Environment and Natural Resources, Transportation,
21	Administration, and Health and Human Services, or their designees, shall advise the Task Force
22	on sustainable development activities within the responsibility of their respective departments
23 24	and shall cooperate with the Task Force in jointly seeking funds from federal, public, or private
25	initiatives, grant programs, or donors.
26	(b) Terms, Vacancies. – The members of the Task Force appointed by the Governor
27	shall have a term of office of four years and shall serve until their successors are appointed and
28	qualified. An appointment to fill a vacancy shall be for the unexpired balance of the term. The
29	remaining members of the Task Force shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority.
30	(c) <u>Staff. – The Departments of Commerce, Environment and Natural Resources</u> ,
31	Transportation, Administration, and Health and Human Services shall provide clerical and
32	professional staff support to the Task Force.

34	necessary travel and subsistence expenses payable to members of State boards and agencies as

6	Entrepreneurship Committee and the Senate Commerce Committee, and the Joint Legislative		
7	Commission on Governmental Operations:		
8	(1) Population, employment, building permit, and related socioeconomic data		
9	for each metro region of the State, including 25-year projections of		
10	population and employment and any other demographic trends the Task		
11	Force finds relevant, with commentary on any changing trends in the data		
12	that might affect planning for sustainable development and infrastructure.		
13	Where possible, the Task Force shall use data already collected by the State

30 37	<b>SECTION 2.</b> G.S. 120-123 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:		
38	"(79) The North Carolina Sustainable Communities Task Force, as established in		
39	Article 7 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes."		
40	<b>SECTION 3.</b> Reports. – The Departments of Commerce, Transportation,		
41	Environment and Natural Resources, Administration, and Health and Human Services shall		
42	report by October 1 each year, beginning in 2010, to the chairs of the House Commerce, Small		
43	Business, and Entrepreneurship Committee and the Senate Commerce Committee, and the Joint		
44	Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations. The report shall provide information		
45	regarding each Department's progress in fostering the sustainable development principles set		
46	forth in G.S. 143B-344.34 as enacted by Section 1 of this act.		
47	<b>SECTION 4.</b> Staffing. – The Department of Environment and Natural Resources		
48	shall transfer the vacant District Planner position in the Division of Coastal Management to the		
49	North Carolina Sustainable Communities Task Force and shall fill the position in a timely		
50	manner in order to provide support for the operations and activities of the Task Force. For		

50 manner in order to provide support for the operations and activities of the Task Force. For 51 administrative purposes, the Task Force shall be located in the Department's Division of

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1 Environmental Assistance and Outreach, and the Division shall also provide appropriate 2 administrative and clerical support for the activities of the Task Force.

SECTION 5. Appropriation. – There is appropriated from the General Fund to the
 North Carolina Sustainable Communities Task Force, as created by Section 1 of this act, the
 sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the 2010-2011 fiscal year to be used to
 support the operation of the North Carolina Sustainable Communities Task Force and the
 grants program set forth in Section 1 of this act.
 SECTION 6. This act becomes effective July 1, 2010, and expires June 30, 2021.
