#### **General Assembly Of North Carolina** Session 2011 The State Board of Elections shall make available to covered voters information 1 (b) 2 regarding voter registration procedures for covered voters and procedures for casting 3 military-overseas ballots. The State Board of Elections may delegate the responsibility under 4 this subsection only to the State office designated in compliance with the Uniformed and 5 Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, section 102(b)(1), 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff-1(b)(1). The State Board of Elections shall establish an electronic transmission system 6 (c) 7 through which covered voters may apply for and receive voter registration materials, 8 military-overseas ballots, and other information under this Article. 9 The State Board of Elections shall develop standardized absentee-voting materials, (d)10 including privacy and transmission envelopes and their electronic equivalents, authentication materials, and voting instructions, to be used with the military-overseas ballot of a voter 11 authorized to vote in any jurisdiction in this State, and, to the extent reasonably possible, shall 12 13 do so in coordination with other states. 14 (e) The State Board of Elections shall prescribe the form and content of a declaration for use by a covered voter to swear or affirm specific representations pertaining to the voter's 15 identity, eligibility to vote, status as a covered voter, and timely and proper completion of an 16 17 overseas-military ballot. The declaration shall be based on the declaration prescribed to 18 accompany a federal write-in absentee ballot under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens 19 Absentee Voting Act, section 103, 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff-2, as modified to be consistent with this 20 Article. The State Board of Elections shall ensure that a form for the execution of the 21 declaration, including an indication of the date of execution of the declaration, is a prominent part of all balloting materials for which the declaration is required. 22 23 "§ 163-258.5. Overseas voter's registration address. 24 In registering to vote, an overseas voter who is eligible to vote in this State shall use and 25 shall be assigned to the precinct of the address of the last place of residence of the voter in this 26 State, or, in the case of a voter described by G.S. 163-258.2(1)e., the address of the last place of 27 residence in this State of the parent or legal guardian of the voter. If that address is no longer a 28 recognized residential address, the voter shall be assigned an address for voting purposes. 29 "§ 163-258.6. Methods of registering to vote. 30 (a) In addition to any other approved method for registering to vote, a covered voter 31 may use a federal postcard application, as prescribed under the Uniformed and Overseas 32 Citizens Absentee Voting Act, section 101(b)(2), 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff(b)(2), or the application's 33 electronic equivalent, to apply to register to vote. 34 (b) A covered voter may use the declaration accompanying the federal write-in absentee 35 ballot, as prescribed under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, section 36 103, 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff-2, to apply to register to vote simultaneously with the submission of 37 the federal write-in absentee ballot. 38 The State Board of Elections shall ensure that the electronic transmission system (c) 39 described in G.S. 163-258.4(c) is capable of accepting both a federal postcard application and 40 any other approved electronic registration application sent to the appropriate election official. 41 The voter may use the electronic transmission system or any other approved method to register 42 to vote. 43 (d) A covered voter's registration to vote by any method authorized by this section may 44 be received at any time prior to the primary or election, but no later than 5:00 P.M. on the day 45 before the primary or election. 46 "§ 163-258.7. Methods of applying for military-overseas ballot. 47 A covered voter who is registered to vote in this State may apply for a (a) 48 military-overseas ballot using either the regular application provided by Article 20 of this 49 Chapter or the federal postcard application, as prescribed under the Uniformed and Overseas 50 Citizens Absentee Voting Act, section 101(b)(2), 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff(b)(2), or the application's electronic equivalent. 51

#### **General Assembly Of North Carolina** Session 2011 A covered voter who is not registered to vote in this State may use the federal 1 (b) 2 postcard application or the application's electronic equivalent simultaneously to apply to 3 register to vote under G.S. 163-258.6 and to apply for a military-overseas ballot. 4 The State Board of Elections shall ensure that the electronic transmission system (c) 5 described in G.S. 163-258.4(c) is capable of accepting the submission of both a federal postcard application and any other approved electronic military-overseas ballot application sent 6 7 to the appropriate election official. The voter may use the electronic transmission system or any 8 other approved method to apply for a military-overseas ballot. 9 A covered voter may use the declaration accompanying the federal write-in absentee (d) 10 ballot, as prescribed under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, section 103, 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff-2, as an application for a military-overseas ballot simultaneously with 11 the submission of the federal write-in absentee ballot, if the declaration is received by the 12 13 appropriate election official no later than 5:00 P.M. on the day before the election. 14 To receive the benefits of this Article, a covered voter shall inform the appropriate (e) 15 election official that the voter is a covered voter. Methods of informing the appropriate election official that a voter is a covered voter include any of the following: 16 17 The use of a federal postcard application or federal write-in absentee ballot. (1)18 (2) The use of an overseas address on an approved voter registration application 19 or ballot application. 20 <u>(3)</u> The inclusion on an approved voter registration application or ballot 21 application of other information sufficient to identify the voter as a covered 22 voter. 23 This Article does not preclude a covered voter from voting an absentee ballot under (f) 24 Article 20 of this Chapter. 25 "§ 163-258.8. Timeliness and scope of application for military-overseas ballot. 26 An application for a military-overseas ballot is timely if received by the appropriate 27 election official by 5:00 P.M. of the day before the election or primary. An application from a 28 covered voter for a military-overseas ballot shall be considered a valid absentee ballot request 29 for any election covered under G.S. 163-258.3 held during the calendar year in which the 30 application was received. 31 § 163-258.9. Transmission of unvoted ballots. 32 Not later than 60 days before the statewide general election in even-numbered years (a) 33 and not later than 50 days before any other election, the county board of elections shall transmit 34 a ballot and balloting materials to all covered voters who by that date submit a valid 35 military-overseas ballot application, except for a second primary. However, in the case of 36 municipal elections, absentee ballots shall be made available no later than 30 days before an election. For a second primary which includes a candidate for federal office, the county board 37 38 of elections shall transmit a ballot and balloting material to all covered voters who by that date 39 submit a valid military-overseas ballot application no later than 45 days before the second 40 primary. For a second primary which does not include a candidate for federal office, the 41 transmission of the ballot and ballot materials shall be as soon as practicable, and shall be 42 transmitted electronically no later than three business days and by mail no later than 15 days 43 from the date the appropriate board of elections orders that the second primary be held pursuant 44 to G.S. 163-111. If additional offices are added to the ballot to fill a vacancy occurring after the deadline provided by this subsection, those ballots shall be transmitted as soon as practicable. 45 46 (b) A covered voter who requests that a ballot and balloting materials be sent to the 47 voter by electronic transmission may choose facsimile transmission or electronic mail delivery, 48 or, if offered by the voter's jurisdiction, Internet delivery. The election official in each 49 jurisdiction charged with distributing a ballot and balloting materials shall transmit the ballot 50 and balloting materials to the voter using the means of transmission chosen by the voter.

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1	(c) If a ballot application from a covered voter arrives after the jurisdiction begins
2	transmitting ballots and balloting materials to voters, the official charged with distributing a
3	ballot and balloting materials shall transmit them to the voter not later than two business days
4	after the application arrives.
5	" <u>§ 163-258.10. Timely casting of ballot.</u>
6	To be valid, a military-overseas ballot shall either be received by the appropriate county
7	board of elections no later than the close of the polls or the covered voter shall submit the ballot
8	for mailing, electronic transmission, or other authorized means of delivery not later than 12:01
9	A.M., at the place where the voter completes the ballot, on the date of the election.
10	"§ 163-258.11. Federal write-in absentee ballot.
11	A covered voter may use the federal write-in absentee ballot, in accordance with the
12	Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, section 103, 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff-2, to
13	vote for all offices and ballot measures in a covered election.
14	"§ 163-258.12. Receipt of voted ballot.
15	(a) A valid military-overseas ballot cast in accordance with G.S. 163-258.10 shall be
16	counted if it is delivered to the address that the appropriate State or local election office has
17	specified by the end of business on the business day before the canvass conducted by the
18	county board of elections held pursuant to G.S. 163-182.5 to determine the final official results.
19	(b) If the ballot is timely received, it may not be rejected on the basis that it has a late
20	postmark, an unreadable postmark, or no postmark.
21	"§ 163-258.13. Declaration.
22	Each military-overseas ballot shall include or be accompanied by a declaration signed by
23	the voter declaring that a material misstatement of fact in completing the document may be
24	grounds for a conviction of perjury under the laws of the United States or this State.
25	"§ 163-258.14. Confirmation of receipt of application and voted ballot.
26	The State Board of Elections, in coordination with local election officials, shall implement
27	an electronic free-access system by which a covered voter may determine by telephone,
28	electronic mail, or Internet whether:
29	(1) The voter's federal postcard application or other registration or
30	military-overseas ballot application has been received and accepted; and
31	(2) The voter's military-overseas ballot has been received and the current status
32	of the ballot.
33	" <u>§ 163-258.15. Use of voter's electronic mail address.</u>
34	(a) The county board of elections shall request an electronic-mail address from each
35	covered voter who registers to vote after January 1, 2012. An electronic-mail address provided
36	by a covered voter is not a public record under Chapter 132 of the General Statutes. The
37	address may be used only for official communication with the voter about the voting process,
38	including transmitting military-overseas ballots and election materials if the voter has requested
39	electronic transmission, and verifying the voter's mailing address and physical location, as
40	needed. The request for an electronic-mail address shall describe the purposes for which the
41	electronic-mail address may be used and include a statement that any other use or disclosure of
42	the electronic-mail address is prohibited.
43	(b) <u>A covered voter who provides an electronic-mail address may request that the</u>
44	voter's application for a military-overseas ballot be considered a standing request for electronic
45	delivery of a ballot for all elections held through December 31 of the year following the
46	calendar year of the date of the application or another shorter period the voter specifies,
47 49	including for any runoff elections that occur as a result of such elections. An election official
48 40	shall provide a military-overseas ballot to a voter who makes a request for each election to which the request is applicable. A covered voter entitled to receive a military overseas ballot
49 50	which the request is applicable. A covered voter entitled to receive a military overseas ballot
50 51	for a primary election under this subsection is also entitled to receive a military-overseas ballot for the general election
51	for the general election.

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1	"§ 163-258.16. Publication of election notice.
2	(a) Not later than 100 days before a regularly scheduled election to which this Article
3	applies, and as soon as practicable in the case of an election or vacancy election not regularly
4	scheduled, each county board of elections shall prepare an election notice for that jurisdiction
5	to be used in conjunction with the federal write-in absentee ballot described in
6	G.S. 163-258.11. For a second primary required by G.S 163-111, the county board of elections
7	shall prepare, no later than the day following the date the appropriate board of elections orders
8	that a second primary be held, an election notice for that jurisdiction to be used in conjunction
9	with the federal write-in absentee ballot. The election notice shall contain a list of all of the
10	ballot measures and federal, State, and local offices that as of that date the official expects to be
11	on the ballot on the date of the election. The notice also shall contain specific instructions for
12	how a voter is to indicate on the federal write-in absentee ballot the voter's choice for each
13	office to be filled and for each ballot measure to be contested.
14	(b) A covered voter may request a copy of an election notice. The official charged with
15	preparing the election notice shall send the notice to the voter by facsimile, electronic mail, or
16	regular mail, as the voter requests.
17	(c) As soon as ballot styles are printed, the county board of elections shall update the
18	notice with the certified candidates for each office and ballot measure questions and make the
19	updated notice publicly available.
20	(d) <u>A county board of elections that maintains an Internet Web site shall make updated</u>
21	versions of its election notices regularly available on the Web site.
22	" <u>§ 163-258.17. Prohibition of nonessential requirements.</u>
23	(a) If a voter's mistake or omission in the completion of a document under this Article
24 25	does not prevent determining whether a covered voter is eligible to vote, the mistake or
25 26	omission does not invalidate the document. Failure to satisfy a nonessential requirement, such
26 27	as using paper or envelopes of a specified size or weight, does not invalidate a document submitted under this Article. In any write-in ballot authorized by this Article or in any vote for
27	a write-in candidate on a regular ballot, if the intention of the voter is discernable under this
28 29	State's uniform definition of what constitutes a vote, as required by the Help America Vote Act,
30	42 U.S.C. § 15481(a)(6), an abbreviation, misspelling, or other minor variation in the form of
31	the name of a candidate or a political party shall be accepted as a valid vote.
32	(b) An authentication, other than the declaration specified in G.S. 163-278.13 or the
33	declaration on the federal postcard application and federal write-in absentee ballot, is not
34	required for execution of a document under this Article. The declaration and any information in
35	the declaration may be compared against information on file to ascertain the validity of the
36	document.
37	<u>\$ 163-258.18. Issuance of injunction or other equitable relief.</u>
38	A court may issue an injunction or grant other equitable relief appropriate to ensure
39	substantial compliance with, or enforce, this Article on application by:
40	(1) A covered voter alleging a grievance under this Article; or
41	(2) An election official in this State.
42	" <u>§ 163-258.19. Uniformity of application and construction.</u>
43	In applying and construing this uniform act, consideration shall be given to the need to
44	promote uniformity of the law with respect to its subject matter among states that enact it.
45	" <u>§ 163-258.20. Relation to Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act.</u>
46	This Article modifies, limits, and supersedes the federal Electronic Signatures in Global and
47	National Commerce Act, 15 U.S.C. § 7001, et seq., but does not modify, limit, or supersede
48	section 101(c) of that act, 15 U.S.C. § 7001(c), or authorize electronic delivery of any of the
49	notices described in section 103(b) of that act, 15 U.S.C. § 7003(b)."

7	(a) Preparation of List. – The <u>chairman chair</u> of the county board of elections shall
8	prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list in quadruplicate of all <u>military absentee</u> <u>military-overseas</u>
9	ballots returned to the county board of elections under this Article to be counted which have
10	been approved by the county board of elections. At the end of the list the chairman chair shall
11	execute the following certificate under oath:

35	(b) Distribution of List. – No earlier than 3:00 P.M. on the day before the election and
36	no later than 10:00 A.M. on election day, the chairman-chair shall cause one copy of the list of
37	executed military absenteemilitary-overseas ballots, which may be a continuing countywide list
38	or a separate list for each precinct, to be immediately deposited as first-class mail to the State
39	Board of Elections. The chairman chair shall retain one copy in the board office for public
40	inspection and he-shall cause two copies of the appropriate precinct list to be delivered to the
41	chief judge of each precinct in the county. The chief judge shall post one copy in the voting
42	place and retain one copy until all challenges of absentee ballots have been heard by the county
43	board of elections. Challenges shall be made as provided in G.S. 163-89.
44	After receipt of the list of absentee voters required by this section the chief judge shall call
45	the name of each person recorded on the list and enter an "A" in the appropriate voting square
46	on the voter's permanent registration record, if any any, or a similar entry on the computer list
47	used at the polls. If such person is already recorded as having voted in that election, the chief
48	judge shall enter a challenge which shall be presented to the chairman chair of the county board
49	of elections for resolution by the board of elections prior to certification of results by the board.
50	(c) List Constitutes Registration. – The "List of Applicants for Military
51	Absentee Military-Overseas Ballots to Whom Ballots Have Been Issued" prescribed by this

section, when delivered to the chief judges of the various precincts, shall constitute the only 1 2 precinct registration of the military absentee covered voters listed thereon whose names are not 3 already entered in the registration records of the appropriate precinct. Chief judges shall not 4 add the names of persons listed on the military absentee covered voters list to the regular 5 registration books of their precincts. 6 (d) Counting Ballots, Hearing Challenges. - The county board of elections shall count 7 military-military-overseas ballots as provided for civilian absentee ballots in G.S. 163-234, and 8 shall hear challenges as provided in G.S. 163-89. 9 "§ 163-258.22. Article inapplicable to persons after change of status; reregistration not 10 required. Upon discharge from the armed forces of the United States or termination of any other 11 12 status qualifying the voter to register and vote by absentee ballotAn individual who no longer 13 qualifies as a covered voter under the provisions of this Article, the voterArticle shall not be 14 entitled subsequently to vote by military absentee ballot, military-overseas ballot under this Article, but if the covered voter was registered under the provisions of this Article that voter's 15 registration shall remain valid for the remainder of the calendar year that voter registered, and 16 17 that voter shall be entitled to vote in any primary or election for the remainder of the calendar 18 year without having to reregister. If requested by election officials, the voter shall present proof 19 of military status at the time of registration. This section does not entitle a person to vote in 20 North Carolina if that person has become disqualified because of change of permanent 21 residence to another State or because of conviction of a felony.

### 22 "§ 163-258.23. Registration and voting on primary or election day.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes, this Chapter, an individual shall be permitted to register in person at any time the office of the board of elections or the voting place is open, including the day of a primary or election if that individual was absent on the day the registration records close for an election, but returns to that individual's county of residence in North Carolina thereafter, and if the absence is due to <u>uniformed service as defined by G.S. 163-258.2</u>. an occupation or status of that individual listed below:

- 30(1)Individuals serving in the armed forces of the United States, including (but<br/>not limited to) the Army, the Navy, the Air Force, the Marine Corps, the<br/>Coast Guard, the Merchant Marine, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric<br/>Administration, the commissioned corps of the Public Health Service, and<br/>members of the National Guard and military reserve.35(2)
  - (2) Spouses of individuals serving in the armed forces of the United States residing outside the counties of their spouses' voting residence.
    - (3) Disabled war veterans in United States government hospitals.
- 38 (4) Civilians attached to and serving outside the United States with the armed
  39 forces of the United States.
  - (5) Members of the Peace Corps.

If an individual so absent on the day registration closes shall appear in person at the voting place on election day and is otherwise eligible to vote, that individual shall be entitled to register and vote at the voting place that day, regardless of whether the person's occupation or status as outlined in subdivisions (1) through (5) of this section\_uniformed service status has changed since the close of registration.

### 46 "§ 163-258.24. Absentee voting at office of board of elections.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes, this Chapter,
 any person eligible to vote an absentee ballot pursuant to G.S. 163-245 covered voter under this
 <u>Article</u> shall be permitted to vote an absentee ballot pursuant to G.S. 163-227.2 if the person
 <u>covered voter</u> has not already voted an absentee ballot which has been returned to the board of

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elections, and if <u>he-the covered voter</u> will not be in the county on the day of the primary or
 election.

In the event an absentee application or ballot has already been mailed to such personthe covered voter applying to vote pursuant to G.S. 163-227.2, the board of elections shall void the application and ballot unless the voted absentee ballot has been received by the board of elections. Such personThe covered voter shall be eligible to vote pursuant to G.S. 163-227.2 no later than 5:00 P.M. on the day next preceding the primary, second primary or election.

8 "§ 163-258.25. Regulations of State Board of Elections.

9 (a) The State Board of Elections shall adopt rules and regulations to carry out the intent 10 and purpose of G.S. <u>163-254 and 163-255</u>, <u>163-278.23 and G.S. 163-278.24</u> and to ensure that 11 a proper list of persons voting under said sections shall be maintained by the boards of 12 elections, and to ensure proper registration records, and such rules and regulations shall not be 13 subject to the provisions of Article 2A of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes.

14 (b) The State Board of Elections shall be the single office responsible for providing 15 information concerning voter registration and absentee voting procedures to be used by absent uniformed services voters and overseas covered voters as to all elections and procedures relating 16 17 to the use of federal write-in absentee ballots. Unless otherwise required by law, the State 18 Board of Elections shall be responsible for maintaining contact and cooperation with the 19 Federal Voting Assistance Program, the United States Department of Defense, and other 20 federal entities that deal with military and overseas voting. The State Board of Elections shall, 21 as needed, make recommendations concerning military and overseas citizen voting to the 22 General Assembly, the Governor, and other State officials.

#### 23 "§ 163-258.26. Emergency powers.

If an international, national, or local emergency or other situation arises that makes substantial compliance with this Article or the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act impossible or unreasonable, the State Board of Elections may prescribe, by emergency rule, such special procedures or requirements as may be necessary to facilitate absentee voting by those absent uniformed services voters or overseas voters directly affected who are eligible to vote in this State. The rule shall become effective when filed with the Codifier of Rules."

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### **SECTION 3.** G.S. 163-22(k) reads as rewritten:

32 Notwithstanding the provisions contained in Article 20 or Article 21 21A of Chapter "(k) 33 163 the State Board of Elections shall be authorized, by resolution adopted prior to the printing 34 of the primary ballots, to reduce the time by which absentee ballots are required to be printed 35 and distributed for the primary election from 50 days to 45 days. This authority shall not be 36 authorized for absentee ballots to be voted in the general election, except if the law requires ballots to be available for mailing 60 days before the general election, and they are not ready by 37 38 that date, the State Board of Elections shall allow the counties to mail them out as soon as they 39 are available."

- **SECTION 4.** G.S. 163-111(e) reads as rewritten:

41 "(e) Date of Second Primary; Procedures. – If a second primary is required under the 42 provisions of this section, the appropriate board of elections, State or county, shall order that it 43 be held seven weeks after the first primary.10 weeks after the first primary if any of the offices 44 for which a second primary is required are for a candidate for the office of United States Senate 45 or member of the United State House of Representatives. Otherwise, the second primary shall 46 be held seven weeks after the first primary.

There shall be no registration of voters between the dates of the first and second primaries. Persons whose qualifications to register and vote mature after the day of the first primary and before the day of the second primary may register on the day of the second primary and, when thus registered, shall be entitled to vote in the second primary. The second primary is a continuation of the first primary and any voter who files a proper and timely written affirmation

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of change of address within the county under the provisions of G.S. 163-82.15, in the first primary may vote in the second primary without having to refile that written affirmation if he the voter is otherwise qualified to vote in the second primary. Subject to this provision for registration, the second primary shall be held under the laws, rules, and regulations provided for the first primary."

#### **SECTION 5.** G.S. 163-231(b) reads as rewritten:

7 Transmitting Executed Absentee Ballots to County Board of Elections. - The sealed "(b) 8 container-return envelope in which executed absentee ballots have been placed shall be 9 transmitted to the county board of elections who issued them as follows: All ballots issued 10 under the provisions of Articles 20 and 21 21A of this Chapter shall be transmitted by mail or by commercial courier service, at the voter's expense, or delivered in person, or by the voter's 11 12 near relative or verifiable legal guardian not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day before the statewide 13 primary or general election or county bond election. Ballots issued under the provisions of Article 21A may also be electronically transmitted. If ballots are received later than that hour, 14 they shall not be accepted unless (i) federal law so requires, (ii) if ballots issued under Article 15 16 20 of this Chapter are postmarked by the day of the statewide primary or general election or 17 county bond election and are received by the county board of elections not later than three days 18 after the election by 5:00 p.m., or (iii) if ballots issued under Article 21-21A of this Chapter are 19 received by the county board of elections not later than the end of business on the business day 20 before the canvass conducted by the county board of elections held pursuant to G.S. 163-182.5. 21 three days after the election by 5:00 p.m. Ballots issued under Article 20 of this Chapter not 22 postmarked by the day of the election shall not be accepted by the county board of elections."

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SECTION 6. G.S. 163-232.1(b) reads as rewritten:

24 "(b) The county board of elections shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list in at least 25 triplicate, of all military absenteemilitary-overseas ballots issued under Article-21-21A of this 26 Chapter and returned to the county board of elections to be counted, which have been approved 27 by the county board of elections, have not been included on the certified list prepared pursuant 28 to G.S. 163-232, and which have been received by the county board of elections not later than 29 three days after the election by 5:00 p.m. The list shall be supplemented with new information 30 each business day following the day of the election until the deadline for receipt of such 31 absentee ballots. At the end of the list, the chairman chair shall execute the following certificate 32 under oath:
