1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED  
2 AN ACT TO IMPLEMENT CERTAIN RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE JUSTICE  
3 REINVESTMENT PROJECT AND TO PROVIDE THAT THE ACT SHALL BE  
4 ENTITLED "THE JUSTICE REINVESTMENT ACT OF 2011."

5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

7 **PART I. STRENGTHEN PROBATION SUPERVISION**

8 **SECTION 1.(a)** G.S. 15A-1340.11(2) reads as rewritten:

9 "(2) Community punishment. – A sentence in a criminal case that does not  
10 include an active punishment or assignment to a drug treatment court.  
11 punishment, an intermediate punishment, or any of the conditions of  
12 probation listed in subdivision (6) of this section.It may include any one or  
13 more of the conditions set forth in G.S. 15A-1343(a1)."

14 **SECTION 1.(b)** G.S. 15A-1340.11(6) reads as rewritten:

15 "(6) Intermediate punishment. – A sentence in a criminal case that places an  
16 offender on supervised probation. ~~probation and includes at least one~~ It may  
17 include drug treatment court, in addition to one or more of the following  
18 conditions:conditions set forth in G.S. 15A-1343(a1).

19 a. ~~Special probation as defined in G.S. 15A-1351(a).~~

20 b. ~~Assignment to a residential program.~~

21 e. ~~House arrest with electronic monitoring.~~

22 d. ~~Intensive supervision.~~

23 e. ~~Assignment to a day reporting center.~~

24 f. ~~Assignment to a drug treatment court program."~~

25 **SECTION 1.(c)** G.S. 15A-1343 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

26 "(a1) Community and Intermediate Probation Conditions. – In addition to any conditions  
27 a court may be authorized to impose pursuant to G.S. 15A-1343(b1), the court may include any  
28 one or more of the following conditions as part of a community or intermediate punishment:

29 (1) House arrest with electronic monitoring.

30 (2) Special probation as defined in G.S. 15A-1351(a).

31 (3) Perform community service.

32 (4) Submission to a period or periods of confinement in a local confinement  
33 facility for a total of no more than six days per month during any three



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1 separate months during the period of probation. The six days per month  
2 confinement provided for in this subdivision may only be imposed as  
3 two-day or three-day consecutive periods.

4 (5) Substance abuse assessment, monitoring, or treatment.

5 (6) Participation in an educational or vocational skills development program,  
6 including an evidence-based program.

7 (7) Submission to satellite-based monitoring, pursuant to Part 5 of Article 27A  
8 of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes, if the defendant is described by  
9 G.S. 14-208.40(a)(2)."

10 **SECTION 1.(d)** G.S. 15A-1343.2(e) reads as rewritten:

11 "(e) Delegation to Probation Officer in Community Punishment. – Unless the presiding  
12 judge specifically finds in the judgment of the court that delegation is not appropriate, the  
13 Division of Community Corrections in the Department of Correction may require an offender  
14 sentenced to community punishment ~~to~~to do any of the following:

15 (1) Perform up to 20 hours of community service, and pay the fee prescribed by  
16 law for this ~~supervision;~~supervision.

17 (2) Report to the offender's probation officer on a frequency to be determined by  
18 the ~~officer;~~ officer.

19 (3) Submit to substance abuse assessment, monitoring or treatment.

20 (4) Submit to house arrest with electronic monitoring.

21 (5) Submit to a period or periods of confinement in a local confinement facility  
22 for a total of no more than six days per month during any three separate  
23 months during the period of probation. The six days per month confinement  
24 provided for in this subdivision may only be imposed as two-day or  
25 three-day consecutive periods.

26 (6) Submit to a curfew which requires the offender to remain in a specified  
27 place for a specified period each day and wear a device that permits the  
28 offender's compliance with the condition to be monitored electronically.

29 (7) Participate in an educational or vocational skills development program,  
30 including an evidence-based program.

31 If the Division imposes any of the above requirements, then it may subsequently reduce or  
32 remove those same requirements.

33 The probation officer may exercise authority delegated to him or her by the court pursuant  
34 to subsection (e) of this section after administrative review and approval by a Chief Probation  
35 Officer. The offender may file a motion with the court to review the action taken by the  
36 probation officer. The offender shall be given notice of the right to seek such a court review.  
37 However, the offender shall have no right of review if he or she has signed a written waiver of  
38 rights as required by this subsection. The Division may exercise any authority delegated to it  
39 under this subsection only if it first determines that the offender has failed to comply with one  
40 or more of the conditions of probation imposed by the court or the offender is determined to be  
41 high risk based on the results of the risk assessment in G.S. 15A-1343.2, except that the  
42 condition at subdivision (5) of this subsection may not be imposed unless the Division  
43 determines that the offender failed to comply with one or more of the conditions imposed by  
44 the court. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the availability of the procedures  
45 authorized under G.S. 15A-1345.

46 ~~If the probation officer exercises authority delegated to him or her by the court pursuant to~~  
47 ~~this subsection, the offender may file a motion with the court to review the action taken by the~~  
48 ~~probation officer. The offender shall be given notice of the right to seek such a court review.~~  
49 ~~The Division may exercise any authority delegated to it under this subsection only if it first~~  
50 ~~determines that the offender has failed to comply with one or more of the conditions of~~  
51 ~~probation imposed by the court.~~

1        The Department shall adopt guidelines and procedures to implement the requirements of  
2 this section, which shall include a supervisor's approval prior to exercise of the delegation of  
3 authority authorized by this section. Prior to imposing confinement pursuant to subdivision (5)  
4 of this subsection, the probationer must first be presented with a violation report, with the  
5 alleged violations noted and advised of the right (i) to a hearing before the court on the alleged  
6 violation, with the right to present relevant oral and written evidence; (ii) to have counsel at the  
7 hearing, and that one will be appointed if the probationer is indigent; (iii) to request witnesses  
8 who have relevant information concerning the alleged violations; and (iv) to examine any  
9 witnesses or evidence. Upon the signing of a waiver of rights by the probationer, with both the  
10 probation officer and a supervisor signing as witnesses, the probationer may be confined for the  
11 period designated on the violation report."

12        **SECTION 1.(e)** G.S. 15A-1343.2(f) reads as rewritten:

13        "(f) Delegation to Probation Officer in Intermediate Punishments. – Unless the presiding  
14 judge specifically finds in the judgment of the court that delegation is not appropriate, the  
15 Division of Community Corrections in the Department of Correction may require an offender  
16 sentenced to intermediate punishment ~~to~~ to do any of the following:

- 17        (1) Perform up to 50 hours of community service, and pay the fee prescribed by  
18 law for this ~~supervision;~~ supervision.
- 19        (2) Submit to a curfew which requires the offender to remain in a specified  
20 place for a specified period each day and wear a device that permits the  
21 offender's compliance with the condition to be monitored ~~electronically;~~  
22 electronically.
- 23        (3) Submit to substance abuse assessment, monitoring or ~~treatment;~~ treatment.
- 24        (4) Participate in an educational or vocational skills development  
25 ~~program.~~ program, including an evidence-based program.
- 26        (5) Submit to satellite-based monitoring pursuant to Part 5 of Article 27A of  
27 Chapter 14 of the General Statutes, if the defendant is described by  
28 G.S. 14-208.40(a)(2).
- 29        (6) Submit to a period or periods of confinement in a local confinement facility  
30 for a total of no more than six days per month during any three separate  
31 months during the period of probation. The six days per month confinement

- 35        (8) Report to the offender's probation officer on a frequency to be determined by  
36 the officer.

39        The probation officer may exercise authority delegated to him or her by the court pursuant  
40 to subsection (f) of this section after administrative review and approval by a Chief Probation  
41 Officer. The offender may file a motion with the court to review the action taken by the  
42 probation officer. The offender shall be given notice of the right to seek such a court review.  
43 However, the offender shall have no right of review if he or she has signed a written waiver of  
44 rights as required by this subsection. The Division may exercise any authority delegated to it  
45 under this subsection only if it first determines that the offender has failed to comply with one  
46 or more of the conditions of probation imposed by the court or the offender is determined to be  
47 high risk based on the results of the risk assessment in G.S. 15A-1343.2, except that the  
48 condition at subdivision (6) of this subsection may not be imposed unless the Division  
49 determines that the offender failed to comply with one or more of the conditions imposed by  
50 the court. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the availability of the procedures  
51 authorized under G.S. 15A-1345.

1 If the probation officer exercises authority delegated to him or her by the court pursuant to  
2 this subsection, the offender may file a motion with the court to review the action taken by the  
3 probation officer. The offender shall be given notice of the right to seek such a court review.  
4 The Division may exercise any authority delegated to it under this subsection only if it first

18 **SECTION 1.(f)** G.S. 15A-1343.2 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

19 "(b1) Departmental Risk Assessment by Validated Instrument Required. – As part of the  
20 probation program developed by the Department of Correction pursuant to subsection (b) of  
21 this section, the Department of Correction shall use a validated instrument to assess each  
22 probationer for risk of reoffending and shall place a probationer in a supervision level based on  
23 the probationer's risk of reoffending and criminogenic needs."

24 **SECTION 1.(g)** G.S. 15A-1343(b1)(3b) is repealed.

25 **SECTION 1.(h)** G.S. 15A-1340.11(3) is repealed.

26 **SECTION 1.(i)** G.S. 15A-1340.11(5) is repealed.

27 **SECTION 1.(j)** G.S. 15A-1340.11(8) is repealed.

28 **SECTION 1.(k)** G.S. 15A-1343.2(c) reads as rewritten:

29 "(c) Probation Caseload Goals. – It is the goal of the General Assembly that, subject to  
30 the availability of funds, caseloads for probation officers supervising persons who are  
31 determined to be high or moderate risk of rearrest as determined by the Department's validated  
32 risk assessment should not exceed an average of 60 offenders per officer, sentenced to  
33 community punishment should not exceed an average of 90 offenders per officer, and caseloads  
34 for offenders sentenced to intermediate punishments should not exceed an average of 60  
35 offenders per officer by July 1, 1998."

36 **SECTION 1.(l)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2011, and applies to  
37 persons placed on probation based on offenses which occur on or after December 1, 2011;  
38 however, this section and the provisions of this act requiring the Department of Correction to  
39 adopt guidelines and procedures are effective when this act becomes law.

## 40 **PART II. POST-RELEASE SUPERVISION CHANGES**

41 **SECTION 2.(a)** G.S. 15A-1368.1 reads as rewritten:

42 **"§ 15A-1368.1. Applicability of Article 84A.**

43 This Article applies to all felons ~~in Class B1 through Class E~~ sentenced to an active  
44 punishment under Article 81B of this Chapter, but does not apply to felons in Class A and  
45 Class B1 sentenced to life imprisonment without parole. Prisoners subject to Articles 85 and  
46 85A of this Chapter are excluded from this Article's coverage."  
47

48 **SECTION 2.(b)** G.S. 15A-1368.2 reads as rewritten:

49 **"§ 15A-1368.2. Post-release supervision eligibility and procedure.**

50 (a) A prisoner to whom this Article applies shall be released from prison for  
51 post-release supervision on the date equivalent to his maximum imposed prison term less ~~nine~~

1 ~~months,~~ 12 months in the case of Class B1 through E felons and less nine months in the case of  
2 Class F through I felons, less any earned time awarded by the Department of Correction or the  
3 custodian of a local confinement facility under G.S. 15A-1340.13(d). If a prisoner has not been  
4 awarded any earned time, the prisoner shall be released for post-release supervision on the date  
5 equivalent to his maximum prison term less nine months.

6 (b) A prisoner shall not refuse post-release supervision.

7 (c) A supervisee's period of post-release supervision shall be for a period of ~~nine~~  
8 months, 12 months in the case of Class B1 through E felons and nine months in the case of  
9 Class F through I felons, unless the offense is an offense for which registration is required  
10 pursuant to Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes. For offenses subject to the  
11 registration requirement of Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes, the period of  
12 post-release supervision is five years. The conditions of post-release supervision are as  
13 authorized in G.S. 15A-1368.5.

14 ...."

15 **SECTION 2.(c)** G.S. 15A-1368.4(e) is amended by adding a new subdivision to  
16 read:

17 "(7a) Not to abscond, by willfully avoiding supervision or by willfully making the  
18 supervisee's whereabouts unknown to the supervising probation officer."

19 **SECTION 2.(d)** G.S. 15A-1368.3(c) reads as rewritten:

20 "(c) Effect of Violation. – If the supervisee violates a condition, described in  
21 G.S. 15A-1368.4, at any time before the termination of the supervision period, the Commission  
22 may continue the supervisee on the existing supervision, with or without modifying the  
23 conditions, or if continuation or modification is not appropriate, may revoke post-release  
24 supervision as provided in G.S. 15A-1368.6 and reimprison the supervisee for a term consistent  
25 with the following requirements:

26 (1) ~~The supervisee~~ Supervisees who were convicted of an offense for which  
27 registration is required under Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General  
28 Statutes and supervisees whose supervision is revoked for a violation of the  
29 required controlling condition under G.S. 15A-1368.4(b) or for absconding  
30 in violation of G.S. 15A-1368.4(e)(7a) will be returned to prison up to the  
31 time remaining on his~~their~~ maximum imposed term-terms. All other  
32 supervisees will be returned to prison for three months and may be returned  
33 for three months on each of two subsequent violations, after which  
34 supervisees who were Class B1 through E felons may be returned to prison  
35 up to the time remaining on their maximum imposed terms.

36 (2) The supervisee shall not receive any credit for days on post-release  
37 supervision against the maximum term of imprisonment imposed by the  
38 court under G.S. 15A-1340.13.

39 (3) Pursuant to Article 19A of Chapter 15, the Department of Correction shall  
40 award a prisoner credit against any term of reimprisonment for all time spent  
41 in custody as a result of revocation proceedings under G.S. 15A-1368.6.

42 (4) The prisoner is eligible to receive earned time credit against the maximum  
43 prison term as provided in G.S. 15A-1340.13(d) for time served in prison  
44 after the revocation."

45 **SECTION 2.(e)** G.S. 15A-1340.17(d) reads as rewritten:

46 "(d) Maximum Sentences Specified for Class F through Class I Felonies. – Unless  
47 provided otherwise in a statute establishing a punishment for a specific crime, for each  
48 minimum term of imprisonment in the chart in subsection (c) of this section, expressed in  
49 months, the corresponding maximum term of imprisonment, also expressed in months, is as  
50 specified in the table below for Class F through Class I felonies. The first figure in each cell in  
51 the table is the minimum term and the second is the maximum term.

The first figure in each cell of the table is the minimum term and the second is the maximum term.

12           **SECTION 3.(a)** Chapter 14 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new  
13 Article to read:

14   "Article 2D.

15   "Habitual Breaking and Entering Status Offense.

#### 16 **"§ 14-7.25. Definitions.**

17           The following definitions apply in this Article:

18           (1) "Breaking and entering." – The term means any of the following felony  
19 offenses:

20           a. First degree burglary (G.S. 14-51).

21           b. Second degree burglary (G.S. 14-51).

22           c. Breaking out of dwelling house burglary (G.S. 14-53).

23           d. Breaking or entering buildings generally (G.S. 14-54(a)).

24           e. Breaking or entering a building that is a place of religious worship  
25 (G.S. 14-54.1).

26           f. Any repealed or superseded offense substantially equivalent to any of  
27 the offenses in sub-subdivision a., b., c., d., or e. of this subdivision.

28           g. Any offense committed in another jurisdiction substantially similar to  
29 any of the offenses in sub-subdivision a., b., c., d., or e. of this  
30 subdivision.

31           (2) "Convicted." – The person has been adjudged guilty of or has entered a plea  
32 of guilty or no contest to the offense of breaking and entering.

33           (3) "Status offender." – A person who is a habitual breaking and entering status  
34 offender as described in G.S. 14-7.26.

#### 35 **"§ 14-7.26. Habitual breaking and entering status offender.**

36           Any person who has been convicted of or pled guilty to one or more prior felony offenses  
37 of breaking and entering in any federal court or state court in the United States, or combination  
38 thereof, is guilty of the status offense of habitual breaking and entering and may be charged  
39 with that status offense pursuant to this Article.

40           This Article does not apply to a second felony offense of breaking and entering unless it is  
41 committed after the conviction of the first felony offense of breaking and entering. For  
42 purposes of this Article, felony offenses of breaking and entering committed before the person  
43 is 18 years of age shall not constitute more than one felony of breaking and entering. Any  
44 felony to which a pardon has been extended shall not, for the purposes of this Article, constitute  
45 a felony offense of breaking and entering.

#### 46 **"§ 14-7.27. Punishment.**

47           When any person is charged with a felony offense of breaking and entering and is also  
48 charged with being a status offender as defined in G.S. 14-7.26, the person must, upon  
49 conviction, be sentenced and punished as a status offender as provided by this Article.

#### 50 **"§ 14-7.28. Charge of habitual breaking and entering status offender.**



1       (a) The district attorney, in his or her discretion, may charge a person with the status  
2 offense of habitual breaking and entering pursuant to this Article. To sustain a conviction of a  
3 person as a status offender, the person must be charged separately for the felony offense of  
4 breaking and entering and for the habitual breaking and entering status offense. The indictment  
5 charging the defendant as a status offender shall be separate from the indictment charging the  
6 person with the principal felony offense of breaking and entering.

7       (b) An indictment that charges a person with being a status offender must set forth the  
8 date that the prior felony offense of breaking and entering was committed, the name of the state  
9 or other sovereign against whom the felony offense of breaking and entering was committed,  
10 the dates that the plea of guilty was entered into or conviction returned in the felony offense of  
11 breaking and entering, and the identity of the court in which the plea or conviction took place.  
12 No defendant charged with being a status offender in a bill of indictment shall be required to go  
13 to trial on the charge within 20 days of the finding of a true bill by the grand jury; provided, the  
14 defendant may waive this 20-day period.

15 **"§ 14-7.29. Evidence of prior convictions of breaking and entering.**

16       In all cases in which a person is charged under the provisions of this Article with being a  
17 status offender, the record of prior conviction of the felony offense of breaking and entering  
18 shall be admissible in evidence, but only for the purpose of proving that the person has been  
19 convicted of a former felony offense of breaking and entering. A prior conviction may be  
20 proved by stipulation of the parties or by the original or a certified copy of the court record of  
21 the prior conviction. The original or certified copy of the court record, bearing the same name  
22 as that by which the defendant is charged, shall be prima facie evidence that the defendant  
23 named therein is the same as the defendant before the court and shall be prima facie evidence of  
24 the facts set out therein.

25 **"§ 14-7.30. Verdict and judgment.**

26       (a) When an indictment charges a person with a felony offense of breaking and entering  
27 as provided by this Article and an indictment also charges that the person is a status offender,  
28 the defendant shall be tried for the principal offense of breaking and entering as provided by  
29 law. The indictment that the person is a status offender shall not be revealed to the jury unless  
30 the jury shall find that the defendant is guilty of the principal felony offense of breaking and  
31 entering with which the defendant is charged.

32       (b) If the jury finds the defendant guilty of the felony offense of breaking and entering,  
33 the bill of indictment charging the defendant as a status offender may be presented to the same  
34 jury. Except that the same jury may be used, the proceedings shall be as if the issue of status  
35 offender were a principal charge.

36       (c) If the jury finds that the defendant is a status offender, the trial judge shall enter  
37 judgment according to the provisions of this Article. If the jury finds that the defendant is not a  
38 status offender, the trial judge shall pronounce judgment on the principal felony offense of  
39 breaking and entering as provided by law.

40 **"§ 14-7.31. Sentencing of status offenders.**

41       (a) When a status offender as defined in this Article commits a felony offense of  
42 breaking and entering under the laws of the State of North Carolina, the status offender must,  
43 upon conviction or plea of guilty under indictment as provided in this Article, be sentenced as a  
44 Class E felon.

45       (b) In determining the prior record level, any conviction used to establish a person's  
46 status as a status offender shall not be used. Sentences imposed under this Article shall run  
47 consecutively with and shall commence at the expiration of any sentence being served by the  
48 person sentenced under this section.

49       (c) A conviction as a status offender under this Article shall not constitute commission  
50 of a felony for the purpose of either Article 2A or Article 2B of Chapter 14 of the General  
51 Statutes."

1           **SECTION 3.(b)** G.S. 14-7.1 reads as rewritten:

2   "**§ 14-7.1. Persons defined as habitual felons.**

3       Any person who has been convicted of or pled guilty to three felony offenses in any federal  
4   court or state court in the United States or combination thereof is declared to be an habitual  
5   ~~felon.~~ felon and may be charged as a status offender pursuant to this Article. For the purpose of  
6   this Article, a felony offense is defined as an offense which is a felony under the laws of the  
7   State or other sovereign wherein a plea of guilty was entered or a conviction was returned  
8   regardless of the sentence actually imposed. Provided, however, that federal offenses relating to  
9   the manufacture, possession, sale and kindred offenses involving intoxicating liquors shall not  
10  be considered felonies for the purposes of this Article. For the purposes of this Article, felonies  
11  committed before a person attains the age of 18 years shall not constitute more than one felony.  
12  The commission of a second felony shall not fall within the purview of this Article unless it is  
13  committed after the conviction of or plea of guilty to the first felony. The commission of a third  
14  felony shall not fall within the purview of this Article unless it is committed after the  
15  conviction of or plea of guilty to the second felony. Pleas of guilty to or convictions of felony  
16  offenses prior to July 6, 1967, shall not be felony offenses within the meaning of this Article.  
17  Any felony offense to which a pardon has been extended shall not for the purpose of this  
18  Article constitute a felony. The burden of proving such pardon shall rest with the defendant and  
19  the State shall not be required to disprove a pardon."

20           **SECTION 3.(c)** G.S. 14-7.3 reads as rewritten:

21   "**§ 14-7.3. Charge of habitual felon.**

22       The district attorney, in his or her discretion, may charge a person as an habitual felon  
23   pursuant to this Article. An indictment which charges a person who is an habitual felon within  
24   the meaning of G.S. 14-7.1 with the commission of any felony under the laws of the State of  
25   North Carolina must, in order to sustain a conviction of habitual felon, also charge that said  
26   person is an habitual felon. The indictment charging the defendant as an habitual felon shall be  
27   separate from the indictment charging him with the principal felony. An indictment which  
28   charges a person with being an habitual felon must set forth the date that prior felony offenses  
29   were committed, the name of the state or other sovereign against whom said felony offenses  
30   were committed, the dates that pleas of guilty were entered to or convictions returned in said  
31   felony offenses, and the identity of the court wherein said pleas or convictions took place. No  
32   defendant charged with being an habitual felon in a bill of indictment shall be required to go to  
33   trial on said charge within 20 days of the finding of a true bill by the grand jury; provided, the  
34   defendant may waive this 20-day period."

35           **SECTION 3.(d)** G.S. 14-7.6 reads as rewritten:

36   "**§ 14-7.6. Sentencing of habitual felons.**

37       When an habitual felon as defined in this Article commits any felony under the laws of the  
38   State of North Carolina, the felon must, upon conviction or plea of guilty under indictment as  
39   provided in this Article (except where the felon has been sentenced as a Class A, B1, or B2  
40   felon) be sentenced as a Class C felon, at a felony class level that is four classes higher than the  
41   principal felony for which the person was convicted; but under no circumstances shall an  
42   habitual felon be sentenced at a level higher than a Class C felony. In determining the prior  
43   record level, convictions used to establish a person's status as an habitual felon shall not be  
44   used. Sentences imposed under this Article shall run consecutively with and shall commence at  
45   the expiration of any sentence being served by the person sentenced under this section."

46           **SECTION 3.(e)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2011, and applies to  
47   any offense that occurs on or after that date and that is the principal felony offense for a charge  
48   of either the status offenses of habitual breaking and entering or habitual felon. Prosecutions  
49   for offenses committed before the effective date of this act are not abated or affected by this  
50   act, and the statutes that would be applicable but for this act remain applicable to those  
51   prosecutions.

**PART IV. LIMIT TIME/CERTAIN VIOLATIONS OF PROBATION**

**SECTION 4.(a)** G.S. 15A-1343(b) is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"(3a) Not to abscond, by willfully avoiding supervision or by willfully making the defendant's whereabouts unknown to the supervising probation officer."

**SECTION 4.(b)** G.S. 15A-1344(a) reads as rewritten:

"(a) Authority to Alter or Revoke. – Except as provided in subsection (a1) or (b), probation may be reduced, terminated, continued, extended, modified, or revoked by any judge entitled to sit in the court which imposed probation and who is resident or presiding in the district court district as defined in G.S. 7A-133 or superior court district or set of districts as defined in G.S. 7A-41.1, as the case may be, where the sentence of probation was imposed, where the probationer violates probation, or where the probationer resides. Upon a finding that an offender sentenced to community punishment under Article 81B has violated one or more conditions of probation, the court's authority to modify the probation judgment includes the authority to require the offender to comply with conditions of probation that would otherwise make the sentence an intermediate punishment. The court may only revoke probation for a violation of a condition of probation under G.S. 15A-1343(b)(1) or G.S. 15A-1343(b)(3a), except as provided in G.S. 15A-1344(d2). Imprisonment may be imposed pursuant to G.S. 15A-1344(d2) for a violation of a requirement other than G.S. 15A-1343(b)(1) or G.S. 15A-1343(b)(3a). The district attorney of the prosecutorial district as defined in G.S. 7A-60 in which probation was imposed must be given reasonable notice of any hearing to affect probation substantially."

**SECTION 4.(c)** G.S. 15A-1344 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(d2) Confinement in Response to Violation. – When a defendant has violated a condition of probation other than G.S. 15A-1343(b)(1) or G.S. 15A-1343(b)(3a), the court may impose a 90-day period of confinement, but may not revoke probation unless the defendant has previously received a total of two 90-day periods of confinement under this subsection. A defendant may receive only two 90-day periods of confinement under this subsection. If the time remaining on the defendant's maximum imposed sentence is less than 90 days, then the term of confinement is for the remaining period of the sentence. Confinement under this section shall be credited pursuant to G.S. 15-196.1."

**SECTION 4.(d)** This section is effective December 1, 2011, and applies to probation violations occurring on or after that date.

**PART V. DIVERSION PROGRAM/FELONY DRUG POSSESSION**

**SECTION 5.(a)** G.S. 90-96 reads as rewritten:

**"§ 90-96. Conditional discharge for first offense.**

(a) Whenever any person who has not previously been convicted of (i) any felony offense under any state or federal laws; (ii) any offense under this Article–Article; or (iii) an offense under any statute of the United States or any state relating to those substances included in Article 5 or 5A of Chapter 90 or to that paraphernalia included in Article 5B of Chapter 9090 of the General Statutes pleads guilty to or is found guilty of (i) a misdemeanor under this Article by possessing a controlled substance included within Schedules ~~H–I~~ through VI of this Article or by possessing drug paraphernalia as prohibited by G.S. 90 113.22, or (ii) a felony under ~~G.S. 90-95(a)(3), G.S. 90-95(a)(3) by possessing less than one gram of cocaine,~~ the court ~~may, shall,~~ without entering a judgment of guilt and with the consent of such person, defer further proceedings and place him on probation upon such reasonable terms and conditions as it may require. Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 15A 1342(c) or any other statute or law, probation may be imposed under this section for an offense under this Article for which the prescribed punishment includes only a fine. To fulfill the terms and conditions of probation the

1 court may allow the defendant to participate in a drug education program approved for this  
2 purpose by the Department of Health and Human ~~Services~~. ~~Services~~ or in the Treatment for  
3 Effective Community Supervision Program under Article 6B of Chapter 143B of the General  
4 Statutes. Upon violation of a term or condition, the court may enter an adjudication of guilt and  
5 proceed as otherwise provided. Upon fulfillment of the terms and conditions, the court shall

21 place defendant on probation under this section for an offense under this Article including an  
22 offense for which the prescribed punishment includes only a fine. The probation, if imposed,  
23 shall be for not less than one year and shall contain a minimum condition that the defendant  
24 who was found guilty or pleads guilty enroll in and successfully complete, within 150 days of  
25 the date of the imposition of said probation, the program of instruction at the drug education

4 shall revoke probation, shall not discharge such person, shall not dismiss the proceedings  
5 against the person, and shall deny application for expunction of all recordation of defendant's  
6 arrest, indictment, or information, trial, finding of guilty, and dismissal and discharge pursuant  
7 to G.S. 15A-145.2. A person may obtain a hearing before the court of original jurisdiction prior  
8 to revocation of probation or denial of application for expunction.

9 This subsection is supplemental and in addition to existing law and shall not be construed  
10 so as to repeal any existing provision contained in the General Statutes of North Carolina.

11 (b) Upon the discharge of such person, and dismissal of the proceedings against the  
12 person under subsection (a) or (a1) of this section, such person, if he or she was not over 21  
13 years of age at the time of the offense, may be eligible to apply for expunction of certain  
14 records relating to the offense pursuant to G.S. 15A-145.2(a).

47 question, it shall enter an order of expunction of the petitioner's court record. The effect of such  
48 order shall be to restore the petitioner in the contemplation of the law to the status the petitioner  
49 occupied before arrest or indictment or information or conviction. No person as to whom such  
50 order was entered shall be held thereafter under any provision of any law to be guilty of perjury  
51 or otherwise giving a false statement by reason of the person's failures to recite or acknowledge

1 such arrest, or indictment or information, or conviction, or trial in response to any inquiry made  
2 of him or her for any purpose. The judge may waive the condition that the petitioner attend the  
3 drug education school if the judge makes a specific finding that there was no drug education  
4 school within a reasonable distance of the defendant's residence or that there were specific  
5 extenuating circumstances which made it likely that the petitioner would not benefit from the  
6 program of instruction.

7 The court shall also order all law enforcement agencies, the Department of Correction, the  
8 Division of Motor Vehicles, and any other State or local agencies identified by the petitioner as  
9 bearing records of the conviction and records relating thereto to expunge their records of the  
10 conviction. The clerk shall notify State and local agencies of the court's order as provided in  
11 G.S. 15A-150."

12 **SECTION 5.(c)** Article 81B of Chapter 15A of the General Statutes is amended by  
13 adding a new section to read:

14 **"§ 15A-1340.18. Advanced supervised release.**

15 (a) Definitions. – For the purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:

16 (1) "Advanced supervised release" or "ASR" means release from prison and  
17 placement on post-release supervision under this section if an eligible  
18 defendant is sentenced to active time.

19 (2) "Eligible defendant" means a defendant convicted and sentenced based upon  
20 any of the following felony classes and prior record levels:

21 a. Class D, Prior Record Level I-III.

22 b. Class E, Prior Record Level I-IV.

23 c. Class F, Prior Record Level I-V.

24 d. Class G, Prior Record Level I-VI.

25 e. Class H, Prior Record Level I-VI.

26 (3) "Risk reduction incentive" is a sentencing condition which, upon successful  
27 completion during incarceration, results in a prisoner being placed on ASR.

28 (b) The Department of Correction is authorized to create risk reduction incentives  
29 consisting of treatment, education, and rehabilitative programs. The incentives shall be  
30 designed to reduce the likelihood that the prisoner who receives the incentive will reoffend.

31 (c) The court, in its discretion and without objection from the prosecutor, may include a  
32 risk reduction incentive or incentives in sentencing an eligible defendant to an active sentence.

33 (d) The court shall impose a sentence calculated pursuant to Article 81B of the General  
34 Statutes. The ASR date shall be the shortest mitigated sentence for the offense at the offender's  
35 prior record level. If the court utilizes the mitigated range in sentencing the defendant, then the  
36 ASR date shall be eighty percent (80%) of the minimum sentence imposed.

37 (e) The defendant shall be notified at sentencing that if the defendant completes the risk  
38 reduction incentives as identified by the Department, then he or she will be released on the  
39 ASR date. If the Department determines that the defendant is unable to complete the incentives  
40 by the ASR date, through no fault of the defendant, then the defendant shall be released at the  
41 ASR date.

42 (f) Termination from the risk reduction incentive program shall result in the  
43 nullification of the ASR date, and the defendant's release date shall be calculated based upon  
44 the adjudged sentence. A prisoner who has completed the risk reduction incentives prior to the  
45 ASR date may have the ASR date nullified due to noncompliance with Department rules or  
46 regulations.

47 (g) A defendant released on the ASR date is subject to post-release supervision under  
48 this Article. Notwithstanding the provisions in G.S. 15A-1368.3(c), if the defendant has been  
49 returned to prison for three, three-month periods of confinement, a subsequent violation shall  
50 result in the defendant returning to prison to serve the time remaining on the maximum

1 imposed term, and is ineligible for further post-release supervision regardless of the amount of  
2 time remaining to be served.

3 (h) The Department shall adopt policies and procedures for the assessment to occur at  
4 diagnostic processing, for documentation of the inmate's progress, and for termination from the  
5 incentive program due to a lack of progress or a pattern of noncompliance in the program or  
6 with other Department rules or regulations."

7 **SECTION 5.(d)** G.S. 15A-1340.13(d) reads as rewritten:

8 "(d) Service of Minimum Required; Earned Time Authorization. – An offender  
9 sentenced to an active punishment shall serve the minimum term ~~imposed~~–imposed, except as  
10 provided in G.S. 15A-1340.18. The maximum term may be reduced to, but not below, the  
11 minimum term by earned time credits awarded to an offender by the Department of Correction  
12 or the custodian of the local confinement facility, pursuant to rules adopted in accordance with  
13 law."

14 **SECTION 5.(e)** This section becomes effective January 1, 2012, and applies to  
15 persons entering a plea or who are found guilty of an offense on or after that date.

18 **SECTION 6.(a)** Article 6A of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes is repealed.

19 **SECTION 6.(b)** Chapter 143B of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new  
20 Article to read:

22 "Treatment for Effective Community Supervision Program.

### 23 **"§ 143B-274.1. Short title.**

24 This Article is the "Treatment for Effective Community Supervision Act of 2011" and may  
25 be cited by that name.

### 26 **"§ 143B-274.2. Legislative policy.**

27 The policy of the General Assembly with respect to the Treatment for Effective Community  
28 Supervision Program is to support the use of evidence-based practices to reduce recidivism and  
29 to promote coordination between State and community-based corrections programs.

### 30 **"§ 143B-274.3. Definitions.**

31 The following definitions apply in this Article:

32 (1) Certified and licensed. – North Carolina Substance Abuse Professional  
33 Practice Board certified or licensed substance abuse professionals or  
34 Department of Health and Human Services licensed agencies.

35 (2) Department. – The Department of Correction.

36 (3) Division. – The Department of Correction, Division of Community  
37 Corrections.

38 (4) Eligible entity. – A local or regional government, a nongovernmental entity,  
39 or collaborative partnership that demonstrates capacity to provide services  
40 that address the criminogenic needs of offenders.

41 (5) Program. – A community-based corrections program.

42 (6) Secretary. – The Secretary of the Department of Correction.

43 (7) State Board. – The State Community Corrections Advisory Board.

### 44 **"§ 143B-274.4. Goals of community-based corrections programs funded under this** 45 **Article.**

46 The goals of community-based programs funded under this Article are to reduce recidivism  
47 and to reduce the rate of probation and post-release supervision revocations from the rate in the  
48 2009-2010 fiscal year.

### 49 **"§ 143B-274.5. Eligible population.**



1       (a) An eligible offender is an adult offender who was convicted of a misdemeanor or a  
2 felony offense or is sentenced under the conditional discharge program as defined in G.S. 90-96  
3 and meets any one of the following criteria:

- 4           (1) Received a nonincarcerative sentence of a community punishment.
- 5           (2) Received a nonincarcerative sentence of an intermediate punishment.
- 6           (3) Is serving a term of parole or post-release supervision after serving an active  
7 sentence of imprisonment.

8       (b) The priority populations for programs funded under this Article shall be as follows:

- 9           (1) Offenders convicted of a felony or offenders sentenced under G.S. 90-96  
10 conditional discharge for a felony offense.
- 11           (2) Offenders identified by the Department of Correction using a validated risk  
12 assessment instrument to have a high likelihood of reoffending and a  
13 moderate to high need for substance abuse treatment.

14 **"§ 143B-274.6. Duties of Department of Correction.**

15       (a) In addition to those otherwise provided by law, the Department of Correction shall  
16 have the following duties:

- 17           (1) To enter into contractual agreements with eligible entities for the operation  
18 of community-based corrections programs and monitor compliance with  
19 those agreements.
- 20           (2) To develop the minimum program standards, policies, and rules for  
21 community-based corrections programs and to consult with the Department  
22 of Health and Human Services on those standards, policies, and rules that are  
23 applicable to licensed and credentialed substance abuse services.
- 24           (3) To monitor, oversee, and evaluate contracted service providers.
- 25           (4) To act as an information clearinghouse regarding community-based  
26 corrections programs.
- 27           (5) To collaborate with the Department of Health and Human Services on  
28 focusing treatment resources on high-risk and moderate to high need  
29 offenders on probation, parole, and post-release supervision.

30       (b) The Department of Correction, Division of Community Corrections, shall develop  
31 and publish a recidivism reduction plan for the State that accomplishes the following:

- 32           (1) Articulates a goal of reducing revocations among people on probation and  
33 post-release supervision by twenty percent (20%) from the rate in the  
34 2009-2010 fiscal year.
- 35           (2) Identifies the number of people on probation and post-release supervision in  
36 each county that are in the priority population and have a likely need for  
37 substance abuse and/or mental health treatment, employment, education,  
38 and/or housing.
- 39           (3) Identifies the program models that research has shown to be effective at  
40 reducing recidivism for the target population and ranks those programs  
41 based on their cost-effectiveness.
- 42           (4) Propose a plan to fund the provision of the most cost-effective programs and  
43 services across the State. The plan shall describe the number and types of  
44 programs and/or services to be funded in each region of the State and how  
45 that program capacity compares with the needs of the target population in  
46 that region.

47       (c) The Department of Correction shall report by March 1 of each year to the Chairs of  
48 the Senate and House of Representatives Appropriations Committees, the Senate and House of  
49 Representatives Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety, and the Joint  
50 Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee on the status

1 of the Treatment for Effective Community Supervision Program. The report shall include the  
2 following information:

- 3 (1) The dollar amount and purpose of funds provided on a contractual basis to  
4 service providers for the previous fiscal year.
- 5 (2) An analysis of offender participation data received, including the following:
  - 6 a. The number of people on probation and post-release supervision that  
7 are in the priority population that received services.
  - 8 b. The number of people on probation and post-release supervision that  
9 are in the priority population that did not receive services.
  - 10 c. The number of people on probation and post-release supervision  
11 outside of the priority population that received services.
  - 12 d. The type of services provided to these populations.
  - 13 e. The rate of revocations and successful completions for people who  
14 received services.
  - 15 f. Other measures as determined appropriate.
- 16 (3) The dollar amount needed to provide additional services to meet the needs of  
17 the priority population in the upcoming budget year.
- 18 (4) Details of personnel, travel, contractual, operating, and equipment  
19 expenditures for each program type.

20 **"§ 143B-274.7. Contract for services.**

21 (a) The Department of Correction shall contract with service providers through a  
22 competitive procurement process to provide community-based services to offenders on  
23 probation, parole, or post-release supervision.

24 (b) Contracts for substance abuse treatment services shall be awarded to certified or  
25 licensed substance abuse professionals and appropriately licensed agencies to provide services  
26 and use practices that have a demonstrated evidence base.

27 (c) The Department of Correction, in partnership with the Department of Health and  
28 Human Services, shall develop standard service definitions and performance measures for  
29 substance abuse and aftercare support services for inclusion in the contracts.

30 (d) The percentage of funds received by a service provider that may be used for  
31 administrative purposes is up to fifteen percent (15%).

32 **"§ 143B-274.8. State Community Corrections Advisory Board.**

33 (a) The State Board shall act as an advisory body to the Secretary with regard to this  
34 Article. The State Board shall consist of 23 members as follows, to be appointed as provided in  
35 subsection (b) of this section:

- 36 (1) A member of the Senate.
- 37 (2) A member of the House of Representatives.
- 38 (3) A judge of the superior court.
- 39 (4) A judge of the district court.
- 40 (5) A district attorney.
- 41 (6) A criminal defense attorney.
- 42 (7) A county sheriff.
- 43 (8) A chief of a city police department.
- 44 (9) Two county commissioners, one from a predominantly urban county and one  
45 from a predominantly rural county.
- 46 (10) A representative of an existing community-based corrections program.
- 47 (11) A member of the public who has been the victim of a crime.
- 48 (12) Two rehabilitated ex-offenders.
- 49 (13) A member of the business community.

1           (14) Three members of the general public, one of whom is a person recovering  
2           from chemical dependency or who is a previous consumer of substance  
3           abuse treatment services.

4           (15) A victim service provider.

5           (16) A member selected from each of the following service areas: mental health,  
6           substance abuse, and employment and training.

7           (17) A clerk of superior court.

8       (b) The membership of the State Board shall be selected as follows:

9           (1) The Governor shall appoint the following members: the county sheriff, the  
10           chief of a city police department, the member of the public who has been the  
11           victim of a crime, a rehabilitated ex-offender, and the members selected  
12           from each of the service areas.

13           (2) The Lieutenant Governor shall appoint the following members: the member  
14           of the business community, one member of the general public who is a  
15           person recovering from chemical dependency or who is a previous consumer  
16           of substance abuse treatment services, and the victim service provider.

17           (3) The Chief Justice of the North Carolina Supreme Court shall appoint the  
18           following members: the superior court judge, the district court judge, the  
19           district attorney, the clerk of superior court, the criminal defense attorney,  
20           and the representative of an existing community-based corrections program.

21           (4) The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint the following  
22           members: the member of the Senate, the county commissioner from a  
23           predominantly urban county, and one member of the general public.

24           (5) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint the following  
25           members: the member of the House of Representatives, the county  
26           commissioner from a predominantly rural county, and one member of the  
27           general public.

28       In appointing the members of the State Board, the appointing authorities shall make every  
29       effort to ensure fair geographic representation of the State Board membership and to ensure that  
30       minority persons and women are fairly represented.

31       (c) The initial members shall serve staggered terms; one-third shall be appointed for a  
32       term of one year, one-third shall be appointed for a term of two years, and one-third shall be  
33       appointed for a term of three years. The members identified in subdivisions (1) through (7) of  
34       subsection (a) of this section shall be appointed initially for a term of one year. The members  
35       identified in subdivisions (8) through (13) in subsection (a) of this section shall be appointed  
36       initially for a term of two years. The members identified in subdivisions (14) through (16) of  
37       subsection (a) of this section shall each be appointed for a term of three years. The additional  
38       member identified in subdivision (17) in subsection (a) of this section shall be appointed  
39       initially for a term of three years.

40       At the end of their respective terms of office their successors shall be appointed for terms of  
41       three years. A vacancy occurring before the expiration of the term of office shall be filled in the  
42       same manner as original appointments for the remainder of the term. Members may be  
43       reappointed without limitation.

44       (d) Each appointing authority shall have the power to remove a member it appointed  
45       from the State Board for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance.

46       (e) The members of the State Board shall, within 30 days after the last initial  
47       appointment is made, meet and elect one member as Chair and one member as Vice-Chair.

48       (f) The State Board shall meet at least quarterly and may also hold special meetings at  
49       the call of the Chair. For purposes of transacting business, a majority of the membership shall  
50       constitute a quorum.

1       (g) Any member who has an interest in a governmental agency or unit or private  
2 nonprofit agency which is applying for a Treatment for Effective Community Supervision  
3 Program contract or which has received a contract and which is the subject of an inquiry or  
4 vote by a contract oversight committee, shall publicly disclose that interest on the record and  
5 shall take no part in discussion or have any vote in regard to any matter directly affecting that  
6 particular grant applicant or grantee. "Interest" in a grant applicant or grantee means a formal  
7 and direct connection to the entity, including, but not limited to, employment, partnership,  
8 -serving as an elected official, board member, director, officer, or trustee, or being an immediate  
9 family member of someone who has such a connection to the grant applicant or grantee.

10       (h) The members of the State Board shall serve without compensation but shall be  
11 reimbursed for necessary travel and subsistence expenses.

12 **"§ 143B-274.9. State Community Corrections Advisory Board; powers and duties.**

13       (a) The State Community Corrections Advisory Board, as defined under this Article,  
14 has the following duties and responsibilities:

15           (1) To review the criteria for monitoring and evaluating community-based  
16 corrections programs.

17           (2) To recommend community-based corrections program priorities.

18           (3) To review the minimum program standards, policies, and rules for  
19 community-based corrections programs.

20           (4) To review the evaluation of programs funded by this Article.

21 **"§ 143B-274.10. North Carolina Sentencing and Policy Advisory Commission report.**

22       The North Carolina Sentencing and Policy Advisory Commission shall report by April 30  
23 of each even-numbered year to the General Assembly and the Governor on recidivism rates for  
24 offenders on probation, parole, and post-release supervision participating in programming  
25 funded through this Article according to risk level.

26 **"§ 143B-274.11. Program types eligible for funding; community-based corrections**  
27 **programs.**

28       Based on the prioritized populations in G.S. 143B-274.5(b), program types eligible for  
29 funding may include, but are not limited to, the following:

30           (1) Substance abuse treatment services, to include co-occurring substance abuse  
31 and mental health disorder services, residential, intensive outpatient,  
32 outpatient, peer support, and relapse prevention.

33           (2) Cognitive behavioral programming and other evidence-based programming  
34 deemed to be the most cost-effective method to reduce criminogenic needs  
35 identified by the risk/needs assessment."

36       **SECTION 6.(c)** This section becomes effective July 1, 2011. The Department of  
37 Correction may enter into contracts under this section with current program providers in the  
38 Criminal Justice Partnership Program on a sole-source basis during the 2011-2012 fiscal year.  
39

40 **PART VII. MOST MISDEMEANANTS TO SERVE SENTENCES IN JAIL**

41       **SECTION 7.(a)** It is the intent of the General Assembly to authorize the  
42 Department of Correction to enter into voluntary agreements with counties to provide housing  
43 for misdemeanants serving periods of confinement of more than 90 days and up to 180 days,  
44 except for those serving a sentence for an impaired driving offense. It is further the intent of the  
45 General Assembly, that the Department of Correction in conjunction with the North Carolina  
46 Sheriffs' Association establish a program for housing misdemeanants serving periods of  
47 confinement of more than 90 days and up to 180 days, except for those serving sentences for an  
48 impaired driving offense. It is also the intent of the General Assembly that the Department of  
49 Correction contract with the North Carolina Sheriffs' Association to provide a service that  
50 identifies space in local confinement facilities that is available for housing these  
51 misdemeanants.

1 The General Assembly intends that the cost of housing and caring for these misdemeanants,  
2 including, but not limited to, care, supervision, transportation, medical, and any other related  
3 costs be covered by State funds and not be imposed as a local cost. Therefore, the General  
4 Assembly intends that the funds in the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Fund be used to  
5 provide funding to cover the costs of managing a system for providing that housing of  
6 misdemeanants in local confinement facilities as well as reimbursing the counties for housing  
7 and related expenses for those misdemeanants.

8 **SECTION 7.(b)** G.S. 15A-1352(b) reads as rewritten:

9 "(b) A person sentenced to imprisonment for a felony under this Article shall be  
10 committed for the term designated by the court to the custody of the Department of ~~Correction;~~  
11 ~~except that, upon request of the sheriff or the board of commissioners of a county, the presiding~~  
12 ~~judge may, in his discretion, sentence the person to a local confinement facility in that~~  
13 ~~county.~~Correction."

14 **SECTION 7.(c)** G.S. 15A-1352 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

15 "(c) A person sentenced for a misdemeanor who has a sentence imposed that requires  
16 confinement for a period of more than 90 days and up to 180 days, except for those serving  
17 sentences for an impaired driving offense under G.S. 20-138.1 under this Article or for  
18 nonpayment of a fine under Article 84 of this Chapter, shall be committed for the term  
19 designated by the court to confinement pursuant to the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement  
20 Program established by G.S. 148-32.1."

21 **SECTION 7.(d)** G.S. 148-32.1(b) reads as rewritten:

22 "(b) In the event that the custodian of the local confinement facility certifies in writing to  
23 the clerk of the superior court in the county in which ~~said~~the local confinement facility is  
24 located that the local confinement facility is filled to capacity, or that the facility cannot  
25 reasonably accommodate any more prisoners due to segregation requirements for particular  
26 prisoners, or that the custodian anticipates, in light of local experiences, an influx of temporary  
27 prisoners at that time, or if the local confinement facility does not meet the minimum standards  
28 published pursuant to G.S. 153A-221, any judge of the district court in the district court district  
29 as defined in G.S. 7A-133 where the facility is located, or any superior court judge who has  
30 jurisdiction pursuant to G.S. 7A-47.1 or G.S. 7A-48 in a district or set of districts as defined in  
31 G.S. 7A-41.1 where the facility is located may order that ~~the~~a prisoner not housed pursuant to  
32 the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Program established in subsection (b1) of this section  
33 be transferred to any other qualified local confinement facility within that district or within  
34 another such district where space is available, including a satellite jail unit operated pursuant to  
35 G.S. 153A-230.3 if the prisoner is a non-violent misdemeanor, which local facility shall accept  
36 the transferred prisoner, if the prison population has exceeded a manageable level as provided  
37 for in G.S. 148 4.1(a). If no such local confinement facility is available, then any such judge  
38 may order the prisoner transferred to such camp or facility as the proper authorities of the  
39 Department of Correction shall designate, notwithstanding that the term of imprisonment of the  
40 prisoner is 90 days or less. In no event, however, shall a prisoner whose term of imprisonment  
41 is less than 30 days be assigned or ordered transferred to any such camp or facility.prisoner.

42 If no other local confinement facility is available and the reason for the requested transfer  
43 is that the local confinement facility that would be required to house the prisoner cannot  
44 reasonably accommodate any more prisoners due to segregation requirements for particular  
45 prisoners or the local facility does not meet the minimum standards published pursuant to  
46 G.S. 153A-221, then the judge may order that a prisoner not housed pursuant to the Statewide  
47 Misdemeanor Confinement Program established in subsection (b1) of this section be  
48 transferred to a facility operated by the Department of Correction as designated by the  
49 Department of Correction. In no event, however, shall a prisoner whose term of imprisonment  
50 is less than 30 days be assigned or ordered transferred to a facility operated by the Department  
51 of Correction."

1           **SECTION 7.(e)** G.S. 148-32.1 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

2           "(b1) The Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Program is established. The Program  
3 shall provide for the housing of misdemeanants from all counties serving sentences imposed for  
4 a period of more than 90 days and up to 180 days, except for those serving sentences for an  
5 impaired driving offense under G.S. 20-138.1. Those misdemeanants shall be confined in local  
6 confinement facilities except as provided in subsections (b2) and (b3) of this section. The  
7 Program shall address methods for the placement and transportation of inmates and  
8 reimbursement to counties for the housing of those inmates. Any county that voluntarily agrees  
9 to house misdemeanants from that county or from other counties pursuant to the Program may  
10 enter into a written agreement with the Department of Correction to do so.

11           This Program shall only operate as long as sufficient State funds are available through the  
12 Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Fund established in G.S. 148-10.4(c). "

13           **SECTION 7.(f)** The North Carolina Sheriffs' Association in consultation with  
14 the Department of Correction shall develop the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Program  
15 established in G.S. 148-32.1, as enacted in subsection (e) of this section, by September 1, 2011.

16           Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no later than November 1, 2011, the Secretary  
17 of Correction shall contract with the North Carolina Sheriffs' Association to implement the  
18 Program. The contract terms shall include all of the following:

- 19           (1) A provision that the Program shall be operated on a statewide basis no later  
20 than January 1, 2012, but may be phased in beginning at an earlier date.  
21           (2) A provision addressing the method of payment to the North Carolina  
22 Sheriffs' Association for the costs of administering the Program.  
23           (3) A provision authorizing reimbursement by the North Carolina Sheriffs'  
24 Association to counties or to the Department of Correction, as appropriate,  
25 for all expenses incurred on behalf of those misdemeanants.

26           **SECTION 7.(g)** G.S. 148-32.1 is amended by adding new subsections to read:

27           "(b2) The custodian of a local confinement facility may request a judicial order to transfer  
28 a misdemeanant housed pursuant to the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Program to a  
29 facility operated by the Department of Correction by certifying in writing to the clerk of the  
30 superior court in the county in which the local confinement facility is located that:

- 31           (1) The misdemeanant poses a security risk because the misdemeanant:  
32           a. Poses a serious escape risk;  
33           b. Exhibits violently aggressive behavior that cannot be contained and  
34 warrants a higher level of supervision;  
35           c. Needs to be protected from other inmates, and the county jail facility  
36 cannot provide such protection;  
37           d. Is a female or a person 18 years of age or younger, and the county  
38 jail facility does not have adequate housing for such prisoners;  
39           e. Is in custody at a time when a fire or other catastrophic event has  
40 caused the county jail facility to cease or curtail operations; or  
41           f. Otherwise poses an imminent danger to the staff of the county jail  
42 facility or to other prisoners in the facility.  
43           (2) The misdemeanant requires medical or mental health treatment that the  
44 county decides can best be provided by the Department of Correction.  
45           (3) The local confinement facility that would be required to house the prisoner  
46 (i) cannot reasonably accommodate any more prisoners due to segregation  
47 requirements for particular prisoners, or the local facility does not meet the  
48 minimum standards published pursuant to G.S. 153A-221; and (ii) no other  
49 local confinement facility is available.

50           Upon receiving such request and certification in writing, any superior or district court judge  
51 for the district in which the local confinement facility is located may, after ascertaining that the

1 request meets the criteria set forth in subdivision (1), (2), or (3) of this subsection, order the  
2 misdemeanant transferred to a unit of the State prison system designated by the Secretary of  
3 Correction or the Secretary's authorized representative. The Department of Correction shall be  
4 reimbursed from the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Fund for the costs of housing the  
5 misdemeanant, including the care, supervision, and transportation of the misdemeanant.

6 (b3) A misdemeanant housed under the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Program  
7 established pursuant to subsection (b1) of this section may be transferred by the North Carolina  
8 Sheriffs' Association to a facility operated by the Department of Correction if the North  
9 Carolina Sheriffs' Association determines that the local confinement facilities available for  
10 housing misdemeanants under the Program are filled to capacity. The Department of Correction  
11 shall be reimbursed from the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Fund for the costs of  
12 housing the misdemeanant, including the care, supervision, and transportation of the  
13 misdemeanant."

14 **SECTION 7.(h)** Article 1 of Chapter 148 of the General Statutes is amended by  
15 adding a new section to read:

16 **"§ 148-10.4. Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Fund.**

17 (a) Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section:

18 (1) Department. – Department of Correction.

19 (2) Fund. – The Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Fund established by this  
20 section.

21 (3) Program. – Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Program established under  
22 G.S. 148-32.1(b2).

23 (4) Sheriffs' Association. – North Carolina Sheriffs' Association, Inc.

24 (b) Intent and Purpose. – It is the intent of the General Assembly that the funds in the  
25 Fund established by this section be used to reimburse local governments for expenses incurred  
26 for housing misdemeanants under the Program, and other related expenses; and to cover  
27 administrative costs incurred by the North Carolina Sheriffs' Association for services provided  
28 by it regarding the housing of these misdemeanants.

29 (c) Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Fund established. – There is created within  
30 the Department of Correction a special nonreverting fund called the Statewide Misdemeanor  
31 Confinement Fund.

32 (d) Fund Uses. – Moneys in the Fund may be used for the following:

33 (1) Reimbursements by the Sheriffs' Association to counties for the costs of  
34 housing misdemeanants under the Program, including the care, supervision,  
35 and transportation of those misdemeanants.

36 (2) Reimbursements to the Department of Correction for the cost of housing  
37 misdemeanants transferred to the Department pursuant to G.S. 148-32.1(b2),  
38 including the care, supervision, and transportation of those misdemeanants.

39 (3) To pay the Sheriffs' Association for administrative and operating expenses  
40 pursuant to subsection (e) of this section.

41 (4) To pay the Department of Correction for administrative and operating  
42 expenses pursuant to subsection (e) of this section.

43 (e) Operating and Administrative Expenses. – Ten percent (10%) of the monthly  
44 receipts collected and credited to the Statewide Misdemeanor Confinement Fund shall be  
45 transferred on a monthly basis to the Sheriffs' Association to be used to support the Program  
46 and for administrative and operating expenses of the Association and its staff. One percent  
47 (1%) of the monthly receipts collected and credited to the Statewide Misdemeanor  
48 Confinement Fund shall be transferred on a monthly basis to the General Fund to be allocated  
49 to the Department of Correction for its administrative and operating expenses for the Program."

50 **SECTION 7.(i)** The North Carolina Sheriffs' Association shall report to the Joint  
51 Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee by October

1 1, 2011, on the implementation of this Part, and shall report thereafter as requested by the  
2 Committee. The report shall include relevant information collected monthly by the Sheriffs'  
3 Association regarding the jail capacity and population in each county.

4 **SECTION 7.(j)** The General Assembly finds that while the Program developed  
5 pursuant to G.S. 148-32.1(b1) as enacted by subsection (e) of this section shall be available  
6 statewide on January 1, 2012, it may be available to some counties at an earlier date.  
7 Therefore, notwithstanding any other provision of law, a misdemeanor, who has a sentence  
8 imposed of more than 90 days and up to 180 days prior to January 1, 2012, excluding those  
9 serving sentences for an impaired driving offense under G.S. 20-138.1, may be transferred or  
10 reassigned to a local confinement facility designated by the Sheriffs' Association as provided  
11 by the Program developed pursuant to G.S. 148-32.1(b1).

12 **SECTION 7.(k)** Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Correction for  
13 the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the Department shall transfer the sum of three hundred thousand  
14 dollars (\$300,000) to the North Carolina Sheriffs' Association for expenses related to initiating  
15 the provisions of this Part.

16 **SECTION 7.(l)** G.S. 148-32.1(b1), as enacted by subsection (e) of this section,  
17 and subsections (a), (h), (i), (j), (k), and (l) of this section become effective July 1, 2011. The  
18 remainder of this section becomes effective January 1, 2012, and applies to sentences imposed  
19 on or after that date.

## 20 21 **PART VIII. ANNUAL REPORT**

22 **SECTION 8.** Article 4 of Chapter 164 of the General Statutes is amended by  
23 adding a new section to read:

### 24 **"§ 164-50. Annual report on implementation of Justice Reinvestment Project.**

25 The Judicial Department, through the North Carolina Sentencing and Policy Advisory  
26 Commission, and the Department of Correction shall jointly conduct ongoing evaluations  
27 regarding the implementation of the Justice Reinvestment Act of 2011. The Commission shall  
28 present the first evaluation report to the Joint Legislative Correction, Crime Control, and  
29 Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee and to the Chairs of the Senate and House of  
30 Representatives Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety by April 15, 2012,  
31 and future reports shall be made annually by April 15 of each year."  
32

## 33 **PART IX. TITLE**

34 **SECTION 9.** This act shall be known as "The Justice Reinvestment Act of 2011."  
35

## 36 **PART X. EFFECTIVE DATE**

37 **SECTION 10.** Except as otherwise provided in this act, this act is effective when it  
38 becomes law. Prosecutions for offenses committed before the effective date of this act are not  
39 abated or affected by this act, and the statutes that would be applicable but for this act remain  
40 applicable to those prosecutions.
