A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO MAKE BASE BUDGET APPROPRIATIONS FOR CURRENT OPERATIONS
OF STATE DEPARTMENTS, INSTITUTIONS, AND AGENCIES, AND FOR OTHER
PURPOSES.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

PART I. INTRODUCTION AND TITLE OF ACT

TITLE OF ACT

SECTION 1.1. This act shall be known as "The Current Operations and Capital
Improvements Appropriations Act of 2014."

INTRODUCTION

SECTION 1.2. The appropriations made in this act are for maximum amounts
necessary to provide the services and accomplish the purposes described in the budget. Savings
shall be effected where the total amounts appropriated are not required to perform these
services and accomplish these purposes and, except as allowed by the State Budget Act, or this
act, the savings shall revert to the appropriate fund at the end of each fiscal year as provided in
G.S. 143C-1-2(b).

SECTION 2.1. Appropriations from the General Fund of the State for the

30 **SECTION 2.2.(b)** Section 2.2(c) of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:
31 **"SECTION 2.2.(c)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 143C-4-3, the State Controller
32 shall transfer a total of one hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000) from the unreserved
33 fund balance to the Repairs and Renovations Reserve on ~~June 30, 2013, and a total of twelve~~

9 **SECTION 2.2.(e)** Notwithstanding G.S. 20-183.7(c), fees collected for electronic
 10 inspection authorizations during the 2014-2015 fiscal year that would have been credited to the
 11 I & M Air Pollution Control Account established under G.S. 143-215.3A(b1) shall be credited
 12 to the State's General Fund.

13 **SECTION 2.2.(f)** Notwithstanding G.S. 105-449.125, one million dollars
 14 (\$1,000,000) of the revenue collected by the Secretary of Revenue from the motor fuel excise
 15 tax levied under Part 7 of Article 36C of Chapter 105 of the General Statutes that would
 16 otherwise be credited to the Water and Air Quality Account shall be credited to the State's
 17 General Fund.

18 **SECTION 2.2.(g)** Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary,
 19 effective July 1, 2014, the following amounts shall be transferred to the State Controller to be
 20 deposited in the appropriate budget code as determined by the State Controller. These funds
 21 shall be used to support the General Fund appropriations as specified in this act for the
 22 2014-2015 fiscal year.

32 **SECTION 2.2.(h)** Notwithstanding the use requirements provided in Section 2 of
 33 S.L. 2003-404, the State Controller shall transfer the sum of five million four hundred fifty-six
 34 thousand seven hundred eighty-seven dollars (\$5,456,787) from the special trust fund created
 35 by S.L. 2003-404 to the General Fund to be used for the purposes expressed and allocated by
 36 this act, and the State Controller shall close the fund.

37 **SECTION 2.2.(i)** On July 1, 2014, six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) of the
 38 unallotted and unexpended balance of the Bedding Law Account shall be transferred to the
 39 General Fund. On March 1, 2015, an additional five hundred ninety-six thousand seven
 40 hundred eighty-five dollars (\$596,785) of the unallotted and unexpended balance of the
 41 Bedding Law Account shall be transferred to the General Fund.

42 **SECTION 2.2.(j)** Effective July 1, 2014, G.S. 106-435 and G.S. 106-451.27 are

45 **SECTION 2.2.(k)** Funds reserved in the Medicaid Contingency Reserve
 46 established in Section 12H.38 of this act do not constitute an "appropriation made by law," as
 47 that phrase is used in Section 7(1) of Article V of the North Carolina Constitution.

48 **SECTION 2.2.(l)** Subsections (b) and (c) of this section become effective June 30,

(a) The Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on the North Carolina State Lottery shall examine, on a continuing basis, the operations of the North Carolina State Lottery. The Committee shall make ongoing recommendations to the General Assembly on ways to improve the operations and success of the lottery. The Committee shall do all of the following in conducting its examination of the North Carolina State Lottery:

- (1) Examine the administration, budgeting, and policies of the lottery.
- (2) Assess the lottery's efficiency and effectiveness.
- (3) Review other state lottery policies and procedures to identify improvements and options for maximizing the transfer of lottery funds to the Education Lottery Fund.
- (4) Study any other matters that the Committee considers necessary to fulfill its mandate.

"§ 120-297. Organization of Committee.

(a) The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each designate a cochair of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on the North Carolina State Lottery. The Committee shall meet upon the joint call of the cochairs.

(b) A quorum of the Committee is five members. No action may be taken except by a majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present. While in the discharge of its official duties, the Committee has the powers of a joint committee under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4.

(c) Members of the Committee shall receive subsistence and travel expenses as provided in G.S. 120-3.1. The Committee may contract for consultants or hire employees in accordance with G.S. 120-32.02. The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist the Committee in its work. Upon the direction of the Legislative Services Commission, the Directors of Legislative Assistants of the Senate and of the House of Representatives shall assign clerical staff to the Committee. The expenses for clerical employees shall be borne by the Committee.

"§ 120-298. Reports to Committee.

Whenever the North Carolina State Lottery is required by law to report to the General Assembly or to any of its permanent committees or subcommittees on matters affecting the lottery, it shall transmit a copy of the report to the cochairs of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on the North Carolina State Lottery."

SECTION 5.2.(i) Subsection (d) of this section becomes effective June 30, 2014. Subsection (e) of this section is effective the date this act becomes law and applies to debt authorized on or after that date.

SECTION 5.3.(a) Section 5.3(a) of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 5.3.(a) Appropriations are made from the Civil Penalty and Forfeiture Fund for the fiscal biennium ending June 30, 2015, as follows:

APPROPRIATE ENCUMBERED GRANT FUNDS THAT ARE RETURNED TO THE STATE

SECTION 6.1. Section 5.1 of S.L. 2013-360 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"SECTION 5.1.(f) Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b) of this section, there is appropriated from the General Fund for the 2014-2015 fiscal year an amount equal to the amount of encumbered funds required to be spent in order to honor encumbrances of grant funds in accordance with G.S. 143C-6-23(f2)."

ESTABLISHING OR INCREASING FEES UNDER THIS ACT

1 **SECTION 6.2.(a)** Notwithstanding G.S. 12-3.1, an agency is not required to
 2 consult with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations prior to
 3 establishing or increasing a fee to the level authorized or anticipated in this act.

4 **SECTION 6.2.(b)** Notwithstanding G.S. 150B-21.1A(a), an agency may adopt an
 5 emergency rule in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.1A to establish or increase a fee as authorized
 6 by this act if the adoption of a rule would otherwise be required under Article 2A of Chapter
 7 150B of the General Statutes.

 9 **EXPENDITURES OF FUNDS IN RESERVES LIMITED**

10 **SECTION 6.3.** All funds appropriated by this act into reserves may be expended
 11 only for the purposes for which the reserves were established.

32 f. Adjustments to receipt projections, made in accordance with
 33 G.S. 143C-3-5(b)(2)c.

34 g. Reconciliation of intragovernmental and intergovernmental transfers.

36 **SECTION 6.4.(c)** G.S. 143C-3-5 reads as rewritten:
 37 **"§ 143C-3-5. Budget recommendations and budget message.**

38 ...
 39 (b) Odd-Numbered Years. – In odd-numbered years the budget recommendations shall
 40 include the following components:

41 (1) A Recommended State Budget setting forth goals for improving the State
 42 with recommended expenditure requirements, funding sources, and
 43 performance information for each State government program and for each
 44 proposed capital improvement. The Recommended State Budget may be
 45 presented in a format chosen by the Director, except that the Recommended
 46 State Budget shall clearly distinguish program ~~continuation~~ base budget
 47 requirements, program reductions, program eliminations, program
 48 expansions, and new programs, and shall explain all proposed capital
 49 improvements in the context of the Six-Year Capital Improvements Plan and
 50 as required by G.S. 143C-8-6.

51 (1a) The Governor's Recommended State Budget shall include a ~~continuation~~
 52 base budget, which shall be presented in the budget support document
 53 pursuant to subdivision (2) of this subsection.

54 (2) A Budget Support Document showing, for each budget code and purpose or

 56 Recommended State Budget.

 58 Accounting System Uniform Chart of Accounts adopted by the State
 59 Controller to show both uses and sources of funds and shall display

in separate parallel columns all of the following: (i) actual expenditures and receipts for the most recent fiscal year for which actual information is available, (ii) the certified budget for the preceding fiscal year, (iii) the currently authorized budget for the preceding fiscal year, (iv) program ~~continuation~~base budget requirements for each fiscal year of the biennium, (v) proposed expenditures and receipts for each fiscal year of the biennium, and (vi) proposed increases and decreases.

- (5) A list of budget adjustments made during the prior fiscal year pursuant to G.S. 143C-6-4 that are included in the proposed ~~continuation~~base budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

...."

SECTION 6.4.(d) G.S. 58-2-215(c) reads as rewritten:

"(c) Moneys appropriated by the General Assembly shall be deposited in the Fund and shall become a part of the ~~continuation~~base budget of the Department of Insurance. Such ~~continuation~~base budget amount shall equal the actual expenditures drawn from the Fund during the prior fiscal year plus the official inflation rate designated by the Director of the Budget in the preparation of the State Budget for each ensuing fiscal year; provided that if interest income on the Fund exceeds the amount yielded by the application of the official inflation rate, such ~~continuation~~base budget amount shall be the actual expenditures drawn from the Fund. In the event the amount in the Fund exceeds two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) at the end of any fiscal year, such excess shall revert to the General Fund."

SECTION 6.4.(e) G.S. 116-30.3B(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) It is the intent of the General Assembly that appropriations to the Board of Governors on behalf of a constituent institution not be reduced as a result of the institution's realization of energy savings. Instead, the General Assembly intends that the amount of appropriations be determined as if no energy savings had been realized. The Director of the Budget shall not decrease the recommended ~~continuation~~base budget requirements for utilities for constituent institutions by the amount of energy savings realized from implementing energy conservation measures, including savings achieved through a guaranteed energy savings contract."

SECTION 6.4.(f) G.S. 116-30.7 reads as rewritten:

"§ 116-30.7. Biennial projection of enrollment growth for The University of North Carolina.

By October 15 of each even-numbered year, the General Administration of The University of North Carolina shall provide to the Joint Education Legislative Oversight Committee and to the Office of State Budget and Management a projection of the total student enrollment in The University of North Carolina that is anticipated for the next biennium. The enrollment projection shall be divided into the following categories and shall include the projected growth for each year of the biennium in each category at each of the constituent institutions: undergraduate students, graduate students (students earning master's and doctoral degrees), first professional students, and any other categories deemed appropriate by General Administration. The projection shall also distinguish between on-campus and distance education students. The projections shall be considered by the Director of the Budget when determining the amount the Director proposes to fund as the ~~continuation~~base requirement for the enrollment increase in the university system pursuant to ~~G.S. 143C-3-5(b)~~appropriate to The University of North Carolina in the Recommended State Budget submitted pursuant to G.S. 143C-3-5(b)."

SECTION 6.4.(g) G.S. 121-6(c) reads as rewritten:

"(c) It shall be the duty and the responsibility for the Department of Cultural Resources to edit and publish a second or new series of the most significant records of colonial North Carolina. From records which have been compiled in the North Carolina State Archives concerning the colonial period of North Carolina, a selection of the most significant documents shall be made therefrom by a skilled and competent editor. The editor shall edit, according to acceptable scholarly standards, the selected materials which shall be published in documentary volumes not to exceed approximately 700 pages each in length until full and representative published colonial records of North Carolina shall have been achieved. The number of copies of each volume to be so printed shall be determined by the Department of Cultural Resources, and such determination shall be based on the number of copies the Department can reasonably

1 expect to sell in a period of 10 years from the date of publication. In any year during which the
 2 Department of Cultural Resources has completed a volume and has it ready for publication, the
 3 Department may include in its ~~continuation~~base budget for that year sufficient funds to pay the

15 (1) ~~"Grant" and "grant funds" means~~Grant or grant funds. – State funds
 16 disbursed as a grant by a State agency; however, the terms do not include
 17 any payment made by the Medicaid program, the State Health Plan for
 18 Teachers and State Employees, or other similar medical programs.

19 (2) ~~"Grantee" means a~~Grantee. – A non-State entity that receives State funds as
 20 a grant from a State agency but does not include any non-State entity subject
 21 to the audit and other reporting requirements of the Local Government
 22 Commission.

23 (3) ~~"Subgrantee" means a~~Subgrantee. – A non-State entity that receives State
 24 funds as a grant from a grantee or from another subgrantee but does not
 25 include any non-State entity subject to the audit and other reporting
 26 requirements of the Local Government Commission.

27 (4) Encumbrance. – A financial obligation created by a purchase order, contract,
 28 salary commitment, unearned or prepaid collections for services provided, or
 29 other legally binding agreement. A financial obligation is not an
 30 encumbrance for purposes of this section unless it (i) is in writing and has
 31 been signed by a person or entity who has authority to legally bind the
 32 grantee or subgrantee to spend the funds or (ii) was created by the provision
 33 of goods or services to the grantee or subgrantee by a third party under
 34 circumstances that create a legally binding obligation to pay for the goods or
 35 services.

36 ...
 37 (d) Office of State Budget Rules Must Require Uniform Administration of State Grants.
 38 – The Office of State Budget and Management shall adopt rules to ensure the uniform
 39 administration of State grants by all grantor State agencies and grantees or subgrantees. The
 40 Office of State Budget and Management shall consult with the Office of the State Auditor and
 41 the Attorney General in establishing the rules required by this subsection. The rules shall
 42 establish policies and procedures for disbursements of State grants and for State agency
 43 oversight, monitoring, and evaluation of grantees and subgrantees. The policies and procedures
 44 shall:

45 ...
 46 (5) Provide for adequate oversight and monitoring to prevent the misuse of grant
 47 funds. These policies shall require each grantee and subgrantee to ensure
 48 that, for accounting purposes, State funds and interest earned on those funds
 49 remain separate and apart from other funds in the possession or control of
 50 the grantee or subgrantee.

51 ...
 52 (12) Provide procedures for the recovery and return to the grantor State agency of
 53 unexpended grant funds from a grantee or subgrantee ~~if~~(i) in accordance
 54 with subsection (f1) of this section or (ii) in the event that the grantee or
 55 subgrantee is unable to fulfill the purposes of the grant.~~grant for a reason not~~
 56 set forth in that subsection.

57 (d1) Required Grant Terms. – The terms of each grant shall include all of the following,
 58 which shall be deemed a part of the grant:

- 1 (1) The limitation contained in G.S. 143C-6-8 concerning the availability of
 2 appropriated funds.
 3 (2) The relevant provisions of any legislation authorizing or governing the
 4 administration of the grant.
 5 (3) The terms of this section.

6 ...
 7 (f1) Return of Grant Funds. – Except as otherwise required by federal law, a grantee or
 8 subgrantee shall return to the State all affected grant funds and interest earned on those funds if
 9 any of the following occurs:

- 10 (1) The funds are in the possession or control of a grantee and are not expended,
 11 made subject to an encumbrance, or disbursed to a subgrantee by August 31
 12 immediately following the fiscal year in which the funds are appropriated by
 13 the General Assembly, or a different period set forth in the terms of the
 14 applicable appropriation or federal grant.
 15 (2) The funds remain unexpended at the time that the grantee or subgrantee
 16 dissolves, ceases operations, or otherwise indicates that it does not intend to
 17 spend the funds.
 18 (3) The Office of State Budget and Management seeks to recover the funds
 19 pursuant to subsection (f) of this act.

20 (f2) Use of Returned Grant Funds. – Encumbered funds returned to the State pursuant to
 21 subsection (f1) of this section by a grantee or subgrantee shall upon appropriation by the
 22 General Assembly be spent in accordance with the terms of the encumbrance. All other funds
 23 returned to the State by a grantee or subgrantee pursuant to subsection (f1) of this section shall
 24 be credited to the fund from which they were appropriated and shall remain unexpended and
 25 unencumbered until appropriated by the General Assembly. Nothing in this section shall be
 26 construed to authorize an expenditure pursuant to an unlawful encumbrance or in a manner that
 27 would violate the terms of the appropriation of the grant funds at issue.

28 ...
 29 (j) Use of Interest Earned on Grant Funds. – Except as otherwise required by federal
 30 law or the terms of a federal grant, interest earned on grant funds after receipt of the funds by a
 31 grantee or subgrantee shall be credited to the grantee or subgrantee and shall be used for the
 32 same purposes for which the grant or subgrant was made.

33 (k) Reporting by Grantees and Subgrantees That Cease Operations. – A grantee or
 34 subgrantee that intends to dissolve or cease operations shall report that decision in writing to
 35 the Office of State Budget and Management and to the Fiscal Research Division at least 30
 36 days prior to taking that action."

37 **SECTION 6.5.(b)** This section becomes effective July 1, 2014, and applies to
 38 grants appropriated on or after that date.

40 **STATUTORY CHANGES RELATED TO THE DISPOSITION OF SETTLEMENT** 41 **FUNDS**

42 **SECTION 6.6.(a)** Article 1 of Chapter 114 of the General Statutes is amended by
 43 adding a new section to read:

44 **"§ 114-2.4A. Disposition of funds received by the State or a State agency from a**
 45 **settlement or other final order or judgment of the court.**

46 (a) Definition. – For purposes of this section, the term "settlement" means an agreement
 47 entered into by the State or a State agency, with or without a court's participation, that ends (i) a
 48 dispute, lawsuit, or part of the dispute or lawsuit or (ii) the involvement of the State or State
 49 agency in the dispute, lawsuit, or part of the dispute or lawsuit. This term includes settlement
 50 agreements, stipulation agreements, consent judgments, and consent decrees.

51 (b) Prohibition. – The following restrictions shall apply:

- 52 (1) Funds received by the State or a State agency from a settlement or other final
 53 order or judgment of the court shall not be transferred or expended pursuant
 54 to G.S. 143C-6-4 and shall remain unexpended until the funds are
 55 appropriated by the General Assembly. Nothing in this subdivision shall be
 56 construed to prohibit the expenditure of funds to any of the following:
 57 a. A party, other than the State or a State agency, to the dispute or
 58 lawsuit.
 59 b. A consumer entitled to a refund or the recovery of damages.

1 c. An attorney awarded attorneys' fees for representing (i) a party under
2 sub-subdivision a. of this subdivision or (ii) a consumer under
3 sub-subdivision b. of this subdivision.

4 (2) The Attorney General, any subordinate who has been delegated the authority
5 to negotiate or approve a settlement, and any private counsel retained to
6 represent a State agency shall have no authority to include or agree to terms
7 or conditions in any settlement that authorizes the expenditure, transfer, or
8 award of funds to any person or entity other than any of the following:

9 a. A party, other than the State or a State agency, to the dispute or
10 lawsuit.

11 b. A consumer entitled to a refund or the recovery of damages.

12 c. An attorney awarded attorneys' fees for representing (i) a party under
13 sub-subdivision a. of this subdivision or (ii) a consumer under
14 sub-subdivision b. of this subdivision.

15 (c) Exception. – Subsections (b) and (e) of this section shall not apply to funds received
16 by the Department of Health and Human Services to the extent those funds represent the
17 recovery of previously expended Medicaid funds.

18 (d) Recommendation. – The Attorney General may provide a nonbinding written
19 recommendation to the chairs of the Senate and House Appropriations Committees for their
20 consideration as to what purpose the funds subject to the prohibition in subsection (b) of this
21 section should be appropriated for.

22 (e) Overrealized Receipts. – Any provision of law authorizing the expenditure of
23 overrealized receipts shall not apply to the funds referred to in subdivision (1) of subsection (b)
24 of this section unless the language of the law specifically references this section or specifically
25 references funds received by the State or a State agency from a settlement or other final order
26 or judgment of the court.

27 (f) Required Disposition. – If the terms of a federal grant, another provision of State or
28 federal law, or the State Constitution require a specific disposition of funds received from a
29 settlement or other final order or judgment of the court, nothing in this section shall be
30 construed to supersede, or authorize a deviation from, that specific disposition. Furthermore,
31 nothing in this subsection shall be construed to abrogate the requirement that funds drawn from
32 the State treasury be in consequence of appropriations made by law.

33 (g) Required Submission. – In addition to any other report or filing that may be required
34 by law, and unless the settlement is sealed pursuant to a written order of the court in accordance
35 with G.S. 132-1.3 or federal law, the Attorney General's Office shall submit a copy to the
36 Legislative Library of any settlement or other final order or judgment of the court in which the
37 State or a State agency receives funds in excess of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000). The
38 submission required by this subsection shall be made within 60 days of the date (i) the
39 settlement is entered into or (ii) the final order or judgment of the court is entered. Any
40 information deemed confidential by State or federal law shall be redacted from the copy of the
41 settlement or other final order or judgment of the court prior to submitting it to the Legislative
42 Library."

43 **SECTION 6.6.(b)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2014, and applies
44 to settlements entered into on or after that date and other final orders or judgments of the court
45 entered on or after that date.

47 **PILOT PROGRAM TO IMPROVE BUDGETING OF THE GENERAL FUND**

48 **SECTION 6.7.(a)** Finding. – The General Assembly finds that State budgeting is
49 more transparent when the enacted budget for any given fiscal year appropriates all State funds
50 intended for expenditure during that fiscal year, including funds encumbered in prior fiscal
51 years, funds carried forward from prior fiscal years pursuant to statutory authority, and
52 unearned revenue earned in a prior fiscal year.

53 **SECTION 6.7.(b)** Review of Current Practices. – The Office of State Budget and
54 Management and the Office of the State Controller, in consultation with the Fiscal Research
55 Division, shall examine all of the following:

56 (1) How funds in the General Fund are currently accounted for, including
57 practices relating to (i) the reversion of appropriated funds to the General
58 Fund, (ii) the appropriation of funds to pay obligations incurred in prior

1 fiscal years, (iii) the movement of funds into and out of special funds, and
2 (iv) related matters.

- 3 (2) How the practices examined pursuant to subdivision (1) of this section
4 compare with those of other states.
5 (3) Whether any statutory or administrative changes would improve the
6 transparency and accounting accuracy of the General Fund.
7 (4) Whether the practices examined pursuant to subdivision (1) of this section
8 comply with applicable standards of the Governmental Accounting
9 Standards Board.

10 **SECTION 6.7.(c) Pilot Program.** – The Office of State Budget and Management
11 and the Office of the State Controller, in consultation with the Fiscal Research Division, may
12 establish and operate a pilot program to test measures for improving the extent to which funds
13 that are to be spent in a given fiscal year are properly budgeted in that fiscal year. The pilot
14 program may be subject to the following:

- 15 (1) The pilot program may include the following programs and funds:
16 a. Some or all of the grant programs and special funds within the
17 Department of Environment and Natural Resources.
18 b. Some or all of the unexpended appropriations carried forward by The
19 University of North Carolina pursuant to G.S. 116-30.3.
20 c. Any other programs and funds that are deemed to be suitable for
21 inclusion in the pilot program.
22 (2) Funds and programs that are included in the pilot program may be subject to
23 the following requirements:
24 a. An alternative liquidation period for encumbered funds that do not
25 revert at the end of the 2014-2015 fiscal year under
26 G.S. 143C-1-2(b).
27 b. A requirement (i) that The University of North Carolina prepare an
28 estimate of the amount of funds it anticipates will be carried forward
29 into the 2015-2016 fiscal year pursuant to G.S. 116-30.3 and (ii) that
30 this estimate be submitted to the Office of State Budget and
31 Management and to the Fiscal Research Division no later than March
32 1, 2015.

33 **SECTION 6.7.(d) Report.** – No later than October 1, 2015, the Office of State
34 Budget and Management and the Office of the State Controller, in consultation with the Fiscal
35 Research Division, shall report the results of the review and pilot program required by this
36 section to the chairs of the Senate Appropriations/Base Budget Committee, to the chairs of the
37 House Appropriations Committee, and to the Director of the Budget. The report may include a
38 recommendation to extend the pilot program for an additional fiscal year, if this is deemed
39 desirable.

40 **SECTION 6.7.(e) Recommendations for an Alternative Pilot Program.** – If the
41 Office of State Budget and Management and the Office of the State Controller, in consultation
42 with the General Assembly's Fiscal Research Division, determine that the pilot program
43 required by this section cannot be implemented, they shall report the reasons for reaching this
44 conclusion, along with any other findings and recommendations for future action, to the chairs
45 of the Senate Appropriations/Base Budget Committee, to the chairs of the House
46 Appropriations Committee, and to the Director of the Budget no later than February 1, 2015. If
47 a report is submitted pursuant to this subsection, then the pilot program required by subsection
48 (c) of this section shall not be implemented, but the review required by subsection (b) of this
49 section shall nonetheless be performed.

50 **SECTION 6.7.(f) Expiration of Pilot Program.** – The pilot program required by
51 this section shall expire upon the submission of the report required by subsection (d) of this
52 section or the submission pursuant to subsection (e) of this section stating that the pilot
53 program cannot be implemented.

54 **SECTION 6.7.(g) Effective Date.** – This section is effective when it becomes law
55 and applies to funds appropriated for the 2014-2015 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years.

58 **SECTION 6.8.** G.S. 143C-5-2 reads as rewritten:

2 Operations Appropriations Act on third reading and order it sent to the other chamber before
3 placing any other appropriations bill on the calendar for second reading. This section does not

- 5 (1) An appropriations bill to respond to an emergency as defined by
6 G.S. 166A-19.3.
- 7 (2) An appropriations bill making adjustments to the current year budget.
- 8 (3) An appropriations bill authorizing continued operations at current funding
9 levels.
- 10 (4) In even-numbered years, an appropriations bill that contains a statement that
11 the General Assembly does not intend to enact a Current Operations
12 Appropriations Act that year."

13 (b) The provisions of subsection (a) of this section shall apply to each fiscal year of the
14 biennium."

16 REPORTING ON AGENCY REORGANIZATIONS AND MOVEMENTS OF 17 POSITIONS

18 SECTION 6.10. Article 6 of Chapter 143C of the General Statutes is amended by
19 adding a new section to read:

20 "§ 143C-6-12. Quarterly report on State agency reorganizations and movements of 21 positions.

22 The Office of State Budget and Management shall report quarterly to the Joint Legislative
23 Commission on Governmental Operations and the appropriate Joint Legislative Oversight
24 Committee on reorganizations of State agencies and movements of State agency positions.
25 Each report submitted pursuant to this section shall include all of the following information for
26 the previous quarter:

- 27 (1) A list of all reorganizations within State agencies or between State agencies.
- 28 (2) A list of all positions moved within a State agency or between State
29 agencies.
- 30 (3) A statement of the purpose of each reorganization and position movement
31 undertaken and of the legal authority under which each reorganization and
32 position movement was made."

34 CONTINGENCY AND EMERGENCY FUND

35 SECTION 6.12. Section 6.1 of S.L. 2013-360, as amended by Section 1.4 of S.L.
36 2013-363, reads as rewritten:

37 "**SECTION 6.1.** For the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium and notwithstanding the provisions of
38 G.S. 143C-4-4(b), funds appropriated to the Contingency and Emergency Fund may be used
39 only for expenditures required (i) by a court or Industrial Commission order, (ii) to respond to
40 events as authorized under G.S. 166A-19.40(a) of the North Carolina Emergency Management
41 Act, (iii) by the State Treasurer to pay death benefits as authorized under Article 12A of
42 Chapter 143 of the General Statutes, (iv) by the Office of the Governor for crime rewards in
43 accordance with G.S. 15-53 and G.S. 15-53.1, (v) by the Industrial Commission for
44 supplemental awards of compensation, ~~or~~ (vi) by the Department of Justice for legal ~~fees-fees,~~
45 or (vii) for litigation expenses incurred by State agencies in defense of the State during the
46 2014-2015 fiscal year, in an amount not to exceed seven hundred fifty thousand dollars
47 (\$750,000), as approved by the Office of State Budget and Management.

48 These funds shall not be used for other statutorily authorized purposes or for any other
49 contingencies and emergencies."

51 DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION/EUGENICS PROGRAM AMENDMENTS

52 SECTION 6.13.(a) G.S. 143B-426.51 reads as rewritten:

53 "§ 143B-426.51. Compensation payments.

54 (a) A claimant determined to be a qualified recipient under this Part shall receive
55 ~~lump-sum~~ compensation in the amount determined by this subsection from funds appropriated
56 ~~to the Department of State Treasurer for these purposes. Except as provided by the succeeding~~
57 ~~sentence, the amount of compensation for each qualified recipient is the sum of ten million~~
58 ~~dollars (\$10,000,000) divided by the total number of qualified recipients, and all such payments~~
59 ~~shall be made on June 30, 2015. The State Treasurer shall reduce the ten million dollars~~

1 (~~\$10,000,000~~) by holding out a pro-rata amount per claimant for any cases in which there has
2 not been a final determination of the claim on June 30, 2015. Payments made to persons
3 determined to be qualified claimants after that date shall be made upon such determination, and
4 if after final adjudication of all claims there remains a balance from the funds held out, they
5 shall be paid pro-rata to all qualified claimants. A qualified recipient shall receive compensation
6 in the form of two payments. By October 31, 2014, claimants determined by the Commission to
7 be qualified recipients shall receive an initial payment as provided by this section. Claimants
8 determined to be qualified recipients after that date shall receive an initial payment within 60
9 days of the Commission's determination. A second and final payment shall be made after the
10 exhaustion of all appeals arising from the denial of eligibility for compensation under this Part.

11 The initial payment to each qualified recipient will be calculated by adding together the
12 number of qualified recipients as of October 1, 2014, and the number of claims outstanding that

18 payment checks shall be remitted within 90 days of the exhaustion of the last appeal. Any
19 qualified claimant who was successful on appeal and who did not receive an initial payment
20 shall be paid an amount equal to the initial payment amount, plus the amount from the final
21 payment calculation.

22 The Office and the State Controller shall collaborate to facilitate the administration of this
23 section so as to effectuate the compensation of qualified recipients as soon as practicable.

24 (b) If any claimant shall die during the pendency of a claim, or after being determined
25 to be a qualified recipient, any payment shall be made to the estate of the decedent.

26 (c) A qualified recipient may assign compensation received pursuant to subsection (a)
27 of this section to a trust established for the benefit of the qualified recipient.

28 (d) It is the public policy of this State that funds awarded for the compensation of
29 sterilization victims under this Part may be used only for the purpose of benefiting victims and
30 shall not be used to pay attorneys' fees arising from representation at the Office, before the
31 Commission, or on appeal. The General Assembly finds that qualified recipients have suffered
32 a unique harm that calls for a unique remedy and that there are sufficient sources of assistance
33 and pro bono legal representation available to protect their interests. Therefore, any agreement
34 for the acceptance of attorneys' fees is null and void unless counsel has sought and received an
35 opinion from the North Carolina State Bar that the fee arrangement is reasonable under the
36 Rules of Professional Conduct.

37 (e) All missing claim information must be postmarked to, or received by, the Office by

Unless a change is approved by the State Chief Information Officer after consultation with the Office of State Budget and Management, funds appropriated to the Information Technology Fund shall be spent only as specified in this section. Changes shall not result in any degradation to the information technology operations or projects listed in this section for which the funds were originally appropriated.

Any changes to the specified uses shall be reported immediately in writing to the Chairs of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology, the Chair and Cochair of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research Division."

SECTION 7.1.(b) Funds appropriated to the Information Technology Fund for enterprise resource planning (ERP) shall be used by the State Chief Information Officer, in conjunction with the North Carolina Government Efficiency and Reform Initiative (NC GEAR) and the State Controller, to develop a strategic implementation plan for a statewide ERP. SECTION 7.2. Section 7.2 of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

SECTION 7.2.(b) IT Internal Service Fund. – For each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, the 2014-2015 fiscal year, receipts for the IT Internal Service Fund shall not exceed ~~one hundred ninety million dollars (\$190,000,000), one hundred ninety-five million dollars (\$195,000,000),~~ excluding a 60-day balance for contingencies. A detailed written report explaining the rate structure shall be submitted to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Chairs of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology, the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research Division. An interim written report shall be submitted by July 30, 2013, September 1, 2014. Overhead charges to agencies shall be consistently applied and shall reflect industry standards for the particular service. Rate increases shall require the approval of

OSBM and consultation with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations. Rate reductions may be implemented following notification of OSBM.

"SECTION 7.2.(c1) By October 31, 2014, the State Chief Information Officer shall establish rates for use of the Criminal Justice Law Enforcement Automated Data System (CJLEADS) by federal and private entities and users outside the State. These rates shall be reported to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology.

"SECTION 7.2.(c2) For the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the sum of one hundred sixty-five million dollars (\$165,000,000) of the funds in the IT Internal Service Fund are nonrecurring funds. Future appropriations to the IT Internal Service Fund will be dependent on the development of a fully transparent, consistent, and easy-to-understand rate structure. The proposed rate structure must be presented annually, with justifications, to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology and the Fiscal Research Division. The Committee shall make funding recommendations to the chairs of the Senate and House of Representatives Committees on Appropriations.

- (4) A funding model that limits the costs to the State.
- (4a) Costs to State agencies for the portal as a whole and for each service.
- (4b) Costs to access services for citizens of the State.
- (5) ~~If outsourced, a detailed, fully executable plan to return portal operations to the State, with associated costs and a detailed analysis that demonstrates that it is more cost effective to use a vendor than to develop an application internally.~~
costs.
- (6) A provision requiring that any fees to support the operation of the portal must be authorized by the State Chief Information Officer and reported to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology."

9 tool. By December 15, 2014, the State Chief Information Officer shall report to the Joint
10 Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology and the Fiscal Research Division
11 on the implementation of the BRITE tool. The report shall include the following:

- 18 (5) Initial and current budgets for the project.
- 19 (6) Initial and current total cost for the project, to include all associated
20 contracts, as well as internal costs.
- 21 (7) Sources of funding for the implementation by fund code.
- 22 (8) Number of projected and actual hours to complete the effort, by phase, with
23 the reasons for any overage.
- 24 (9) A list of system capabilities.
- 25 (10) Any capabilities required for budget development and management that are
26 not currently available in BRITE, with an explanation of why the capability
27 is not available, how the capability will be achieved, cost associated with
28 adding the capability, and whether or not the capability was included in the
29 initial contract with the BRITE vendor.
- 30 (11) Issues associated with implementation, with the cause and identified solution
31 for each issue, as well as any additional costs resulting from the identified
32 solution.
- 33 (12) Performance of each vendor during the project, with a list of actions taken in
34 the event any vendor did not perform based on the terms specified in their
35 contract.
- 36 (13) Potential for expansion of the BRITE tool to other agencies, with an
37 explanation of why agencies would require the tool, what the associated
38 costs would be, and any alternatives to the BRITE tool that are currently
39 available within State agencies.

40 By December 15, 2014, the State Chief Information Officer shall report to the Joint
41 Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology and the Fiscal Research Division
42 on the status of the implementation within the Office of Information Technology Services and
43 the potential for expansion of the BRITE tool to other State agencies.

46 **FUNDS FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES**

47 **SECTION 8.1.** The State Board of Education shall allocate additional funds for
48 children with disabilities on the basis of three thousand seven hundred sixty-eight dollars and
49 eleven cents (\$3,768.11) per child for the 2014-2015 fiscal year. Each local school
50 administrative unit shall receive funds for the lesser of (i) all children who are identified as
51 children with disabilities or (ii) twelve and five-tenths percent (12.5%) of its 2014-2015
52 allocated average daily membership in the local school administrative unit. The dollar amounts
53 allocated under this section for children with disabilities shall also adjust in accordance with
54 legislative salary increments, retirement rate adjustments, and health benefit adjustments for
55 personnel who serve children with disabilities.
56

57 **FUNDS FOR ACADEMICALLY GIFTED CHILDREN**

58

SECTION 8.2. The State Board of Education shall allocate additional funds for academically or intellectually gifted children on the basis of one thousand two hundred thirty-nine dollars and sixty-five cents (\$1,239.65) per child for the 2014-2015 fiscal year. A local school administrative unit shall receive funds for a maximum of four percent (4%) of its 2014-2015 allocated average daily membership, regardless of the number of children identified as academically or intellectually gifted in the unit. The dollar amounts allocated under this section for academically or intellectually gifted children shall also adjust in accordance with legislative salary increments, retirement rate adjustments, and health benefit adjustments for personnel who serve academically or intellectually gifted children.

EXTEND THE DATE FOR SCHOOL EMPLOYEES TO QUALIFY FOR CERTAIN EDUCATION-BASED SALARY SUPPLEMENTS/JLEOC STUDY

SECTION 8.3.(a) Section 8.22 of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 8.22. Notwithstanding Section 35.11 of this act, ~~no~~ only the following teachers ~~and instructional support personnel, except for certified school nurses and instructional support personnel in positions for which a master's degree is required for licensure,~~ personnel shall be paid on the "M" salary schedule or receive a salary supplement for academic preparation at the six-year degree level or at the doctoral degree level for the 2014-2015 school year, ~~unless they were paid on that salary schedule or received that salary supplement prior to the 2014-2015 school year.~~ year and subsequent school years:

- (1) Certified school nurses and instructional support personnel in positions for which a master's degree is required for licensure.
- (2) Teachers and instructional support personnel who were paid on that salary schedule or received that salary supplement prior to the 2014-2015 school year.
- (3) Teachers and instructional support personnel who (i) complete a degree at the master's, six-year, or doctoral degree level for which they completed at least one course prior to August 1, 2013, and (ii) would have qualified for the salary supplement pursuant to State Board of Education policy TCP-A-006, as it was in effect on June 30, 2013."

SECTION 8.3.(b) The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee shall study (i) the payment of salary supplements for teachers and instructional support personnel who complete a degree at the master's, six-year, or doctoral degree level and (ii) the use of State funds to provide for, in addition to base salary and other applicable local supplements, differentiated pay for classroom teachers based on a teacher's demonstrated effectiveness and additional responsibilities in advanced roles.

SECTION 8.3.(c) The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee shall report the results of the study required by subsection (b) of this section, including recommendations for any proposed legislative changes, to the General Assembly prior to the convening of the 2015 General Assembly.

FUNDS FOR SMALL COUNTY SCHOOL ADMINISTRATIVE UNITS

SECTION 8.4. Section 8.4 of S.L. 2013-360, as amended by Section 3.11 of S.L. 2013-363, reads as rewritten:

Funding for such local administrative units shall be reduced in equal increments in each of the five years after the local administrative unit becomes ineligible. Funding shall be eliminated in the fifth fiscal year after the local administrative unit becomes ineligible.

Allotments for eligible local school administrative units shall not be reduced by more than twenty percent (20%) of the amount received in fiscal year 2013-2014 in any fiscal year.

SECTION 8.6. Section 8.6 of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 8.6.(a) Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-6-4, the ~~Department of Public Instruction~~State Board of Education may, after consultation with the Office of State Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division, ~~reorganize,~~reorganize the Department of Public Instruction, if necessary, to implement the budget reductions ~~set out in this act. for the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium.~~ Consultation shall occur prior to requesting budgetary and personnel changes through the budget revision process. The ~~Department~~State Board shall provide a current organization chart for the Department of Public Instruction in the consultation process and shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on any reorganization.

"SECTION 8.6.(b) In implementing budget reductions for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the State Board of Education shall make no reduction to funding or positions for (i) the North Carolina Center for Advancement of Teaching and (ii) the Eastern North Carolina School for the Deaf, the North Carolina School for the Deaf, and the Governor Morehead School, except that the State Board may, in its discretion, reduce positions that have been vacant for more than 16 months.

The State Board shall also make no reduction in funding to any of the following entities:

- (1) Communities in Schools of North Carolina, Inc.
- (2) Teach for America, Inc.
- (3) Beginnings For Parents of Children Who Are Deaf or Hard of Hearing, Inc."

13 thousand one hundred eighty-four dollars (\$10,831,184) for the 2014-2015 fiscal year shall be
14 used to fund fees for testing in advanced courses and one million five hundred thousand dollars
15 (\$1,500,000) for each fiscal year shall be used by the North Carolina Advanced Placement
16 Partnership to carry out its responsibilities as set forth in this section. Funding appropriated for
17 professional development may be used by the State Board of Education to contract with an
18 independent evaluator to assess the implementation and impact of advanced course programs in
19 North Carolina. For the purposes of this section, the term "advanced courses" means an

31 JLEOC STUDY OF NCVPS REVENUE

32 **SECTION 8.18.(a)** The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee shall

49 **SECTION 8.19.(a)** Of the funds appropriated by this act for the At-Risk Student
50 Services Alternative School Allotment for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the State Board of
51 Education shall use five million dollars (\$5,000,000) for the After-School Quality Improvement
52 Grant Program administered by the Department of Public Instruction. It is the intent of the
53 General Assembly to appropriate five million dollars (\$5,000,000) for this purpose in each year
54 of the 2015-2017 fiscal biennium. Of the funds appropriated for the program, the Department
55 of Public Instruction may use up to two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for each fiscal
56 year to administer the program.

57 **SECTION 8.19.(b)** The purpose of the After-School Quality Improvement Grant
58 Program is to pilot after-school learning programs for at-risk students that raise standards for
59 student academic outcomes by focusing on the following:

- 1 (1) Use of an evidence-based model with a proven track record of success.
- 2 (2) Inclusion of rigorous, quantitative performance measures to confirm their
- 3 effectiveness during the grant cycle and at the end-of-grant cycle.
- 4 (3) Alignment with State performance measures, student academic goals, and
- 5 the North Carolina Standard Course of Study.
- 6 (4) Prioritization in programs to integrate clear academic content, in particular,
- 7 science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) learning
- 8 opportunities or reading development and proficiency instruction.
- 9 (5) Emphasis on minimizing student class size when providing instruction.
- 10 (6) Expansion of student access to learning activities and academic support that
- 11 strengthen student engagement and leverage community-based resources,
- 12 which may include organizations that provide mentoring services and
- 13 private-sector employer involvement.

14 **SECTION 8.19.(c)** Local school administrative units and nonprofits working in
15 collaboration with local school administrative units may participate in the program, as set forth
16 in this section, and are eligible to receive two-year grants of up to five hundred thousand
17 dollars (\$500,000) a year, based on the proposed number of students served, with an option for
18 a third year of funding. At least seventy percent (70%) of students served by the program must
19 qualify for free or reduced-price meals.

20 Grants shall be matched on the basis of three dollars (\$3.00) in grant funds for every

24 Instruction after the first year of funding on the progress of the grant, including alignment with
25 State academic standards, data collection for reporting student progress, and other measures,
26 before receiving funding for the next fiscal year. Grant recipients shall report after the second
27 year of funding on key performance data, including statewide test results, attendance rates, and
28 promotion rates. Grant allocations for the third year shall be based on student performance data.

29 **SECTION 8.19.(e)** The Department of Public Instruction shall provide interim
30 reports on the grant program to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by
31 September 15, 2015, and September 15, 2016, with a final report on the program by September
32 15, 2017. The final report shall include the final results of the program and recommendations
33 regarding effective after-school program models, standards, and performance measures based
34 on student performance, leveraging of community-based resources to expand student access to
35 learning activities and academic support, and the experience of the grant recipients.

41 **law enforcement agencies.**

42 (a) Each local school administrative unit shall provide the following to local law
43 enforcement agencies: (i) schematic diagrams, including digital schematic diagrams, and (ii)
44 emergency access to key storage devices such as KNOX[®] boxes for all school buildings. Local
45 school administrative units shall provide updates of the schematic diagrams to local law
46 enforcement agencies when substantial modifications such as new facilities or modifications to
47 doors and windows are made to school buildings. Local school administrative units shall also
48 be responsible for providing local law enforcement agencies with updated access to school
49 building key storage devices such as KNOX[®] boxes when changes are made to these boxes or
50 devices.

51 (b) The Department of Public Instruction, in consultation with the Department of Public
52 Safety, shall develop standards and guidelines for the preparation and content of schematic
53 diagrams and necessary updates. Local school administrative units may use these standards and
54 guidelines to assist in the preparation of their schematic diagrams.

55 (c) Schematic diagrams are not considered a public record as the term "public record" is
56 defined under G.S. 132-1 and shall not be subject to inspection and examination under
57 G.S. 132-6.

"§ 115C-105.54. Schematic diagrams and emergency response information provided to Division of Emergency Management.

(a) Each local school administrative unit shall provide the following to the Division of Emergency Management (Division) at the Department of Public Safety: (i) schematic diagrams, including digital schematic diagrams, and (ii) emergency response information requested by the Division for the School Risk Management Plan (SRMP) and the School Emergency Response Plan (SERP). Local school administrative units shall also provide updated schematic diagrams and emergency response information to the Division when such updates are made. The Division shall ensure that the diagrams and emergency response information are securely stored and distributed as provided in the SRMP and SERP to first responders, emergency personnel, and school personnel and approved by the Department of Public Instruction.

(b) The schematic diagrams and emergency response information are not considered a public record as the term "public record" is defined under G.S. 132-1 and shall not be subject to inspection and examination under G.S. 132-6."

SECTION 8.20.(c) The schematic diagrams referenced in subsection (b) of this section shall be provided to local law enforcement agencies and the Division of Emergency Management at the Department of Public Safety by June 1, 2015.

NBPTS SUPPLEMENT FOR INSTRUCTIONAL COACHES IN TITLE I SCHOOLS

SECTION 8.21. G.S. 115C-296.2(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) Definitions. – As used in this subsection:

- (1) A "North Carolina public school" is a school operated by a local board of education, the Department of Health and Human Services, the Division of Adult Correction of the Department of Public Safety, the Division of Juvenile Justice of the Department of Public Safety or The University of North Carolina; a school affiliated with The University of North Carolina; or a charter school approved by the State Board of Education.
- (2) A "teacher" is a person who:
 - a. Either:
 1. Is certified to teach in North Carolina; or
 2. Holds a certificate or license issued by the State Board of Education that meets the professional license requirement for ~~NBPTS certification;~~certification.
 - b. Is a State-paid employee of a North Carolina public ~~school;~~school.
 - c. Is paid on the teacher salary ~~schedule; and~~schedule.
 - d. Spends at least seventy percent (70%) of his or her work time:
 1. In classroom instruction, if the employee is employed as a teacher. Most of the teacher's remaining time shall be spent in one or more of the following: mentoring teachers, doing demonstration lessons for teachers, writing curricula, developing and leading staff development programs for teachers; ~~or~~
 2. In work within the employee's area of certification or licensure, if the employee is employed in an area of NBPTS certification other than direct classroom ~~instruction;~~instruction; or
 3. As an instructional coach, as classified by the Department of Public Instruction, in a Title I school. As used in this sub-sub-subdivision, a Title I school is a school identified under Part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended."

JLEOC STUDY DIAGNOSTIC READING ASSESSMENTS FOR READ TO ACHIEVE

SECTION 8.22.(a) The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee shall study the formative and diagnostic reading assessments required by the Department of Public Instruction to meet the provisions of the Read to Achieve Program. The study shall examine whether there are additional options for formative and diagnostic reading assessments that would provide local school administrative units with additional flexibility in meeting the requirements of Read to Achieve, and if fewer assessment instruments or data-gathering

1 activities could be used. When considering additional assessments, the Committee shall review
2 the assessments to see if they could be used with the Education Value-Added Assessment
3 System (EVAAS) in analyzing student growth for the purposes of the teacher evaluation
4 instrument for kindergarten through second grade teachers. The Committee shall also identify
5 other assessments that may be used in analyzing student growth for the purposes of the teacher
6 evaluation instrument for kindergarten through second grade teachers. In identifying additional
7 options for both formative and diagnostic reading assessments, and other assessments for
8 analyzing student growth for the purposes of the teacher evaluation, the Committee shall
9 consider at least the following factors:

- 10 (1) The time required for conducting assessments.
- 11 (2) The level of integration of assessment results with instructional support for
12 teachers and students.
- 13 (3) The timeliness in reporting assessment results to teachers and administrators.
- 14 (4) The ability to provide timely and useful assessment results to parents and
15 guardians.

16 **SECTION 8.22.(b)** The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee shall
17 report the results of the study required by subsection (a) of this section to the General Assembly
18 prior to the convening of the 2015 General Assembly.

20 **SUPPLY OF EMERGENCY EPINEPHRINE AUTO-INJECTORS ON SCHOOL** 21 **PROPERTY**

22 **SECTION 8.23.(a)** Article 25A of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is
23 amended by adding a new section to read:

24 **"§ 115C-375.2A. School supply of epinephrine auto-injectors.**

25 (a) A local board of education shall provide for a supply of emergency epinephrine
26 auto-injectors on school property for use by trained school personnel to provide emergency
27 medical aid to persons suffering from an anaphylactic reaction during the school day and at
28 school-sponsored events on school property. Each school shall store in a secure but unlocked
29 and easily accessible location a minimum of two epinephrine auto-injectors. For purposes of
30 this section, "school property" does not include transportation to or from school.

31 (b) For the purposes of this section and G.S. 115C-375.2, "epinephrine auto-injector"
32 means a disposable drug delivery system with a spring-activated, concealed needle that is
33 designed for emergency administration of epinephrine to provide rapid, convenient first aid for
34 persons suffering a potentially fatal reaction to anaphylaxis.

35 (c) The principal shall designate one or more school personnel, as part of the medical

38 emergency use of an epinephrine auto-injector. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to
39 the contrary, the school nurse or other designated school personnel who has received training
40 under this subsection shall obtain a non-patient specific prescription for epinephrine
41 auto-injectors from a physician, physician assistant, or nurse practitioner of the local health
42 department serving the area in which the local school administrative unit is located.

43 (d) The principal shall collaborate with appropriate school personnel to develop an
44 emergency action plan for the use of epinephrine auto-injectors in an emergency. The plan shall
45 include at least the following components:

- 46 (1) Standards and procedures for the storage and emergency use of epinephrine
47 auto-injectors by trained school personnel.
- 48 (2) Training of school personnel in recognizing symptoms of anaphylaxis.
- 49 (3) Emergency follow-up procedures, including calling emergency services and
50 contacting a student's parent and physician.
- 51 (4) Instruction and certification in cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

52 (e) A supply of emergency epinephrine auto-injectors provided in accordance with this
53 section shall not be used as the sole medication supply for students known to have a medical
54 condition requiring the availability or use of an epinephrine auto-injector. Those students may
55 be authorized to possess and self-administer their medication on school property under
56 G.S. 115C-375.2.

57 (f) A local board of education, its members, employees, designees, agents, or
58 volunteers, and a physician, physician assistant, or nurse practitioner of the local health
59 department shall not be liable in civil damages to any party for any act authorized by this

1 section or for any omission relating to that act unless that act or omission amounts to gross
2 negligence, wanton conduct, or intentional wrongdoing."

3 **SECTION 8.23.(b)** G.S. 115C-238.29F(a) reads as rewritten:

4 "(a) Health and Safety Standards. – A charter school shall meet the same health and
5 safety requirements required of a local school administrative unit. The Department of Public
6 Instruction shall ensure that charter schools provide parents and guardians with information
7 about meningococcal meningitis and influenza and their vaccines at the beginning of every
8 school year. This information shall include the causes, symptoms, and how meningococcal
9 meningitis and influenza are spread and the places where parents and guardians may obtain
10 additional information and vaccinations for their children.

11 The Department of Public Instruction shall also ensure that charter schools provide parents
12 and guardians with information about cervical cancer, cervical dysplasia, human
13 papillomavirus, and the vaccines available to prevent these diseases. This information shall be
14 provided at the beginning of the school year to parents of children entering grades five through
15 12. This information shall include the causes and symptoms of these diseases, how they are
16 transmitted, how they may be prevented by vaccination, including the benefits and possible
17 side effects of vaccination, and the places where parents and guardians may obtain additional
18 information and vaccinations for their children.

19 The Department of Public Instruction shall also ensure that charter schools provide students
20 in grades seven through 12 with information annually on the preventable risks for preterm birth
21 in subsequent pregnancies, including induced abortion, smoking, alcohol consumption, the use
22 of illicit drugs, and inadequate prenatal care.

23 The Department of Public Instruction shall also ensure that charter schools provide students
24 in grades nine through 12 with information annually on the manner in which a parent may
25 lawfully abandon a newborn baby with a responsible person, in accordance with G.S. 7B-500.

26 The Department of Public Instruction shall also ensure that the guidelines for individual
27 diabetes care plans adopted by the State Board of Education under G.S. 115C-12(31) are
28 implemented in charter schools in which students with diabetes are enrolled and that charter
29 schools otherwise comply with the provisions of G.S. 115C-375.3.

30 The Department of Public Instruction shall ensure that charter schools comply with
31 G.S. 115C-375.2A. The board of directors of a charter school shall provide the school with a
32 supply of emergency epinephrine auto-injectors necessary to carry out the provisions of
33 G.S. 115C-375.2A."

34 **SECTION 8.23.(c)** G.S. 115C-238.66(7) reads as rewritten:

35 "(7) Health and safety. – The board of directors shall require that the regional
36 school meet the same health and safety standards required of a local school
37 administrative unit.

38 The Department of Public Instruction shall ensure that regional schools
39 comply with G.S. 115C-375.2A. The board of directors of a regional school
40 shall provide the school with a supply of emergency epinephrine
41 auto-injectors necessary to carry out the provisions of G.S. 115C-375.2A."

42 **SECTION 8.23.(d)** Within 60 days of the date this act becomes law, the North
43 Carolina Board of Pharmacy, in consultation with the State Board of Education, shall adopt
44 rules addressing the authorization for school personnel to obtain a prescription for epinephrine
45 for emergency health circumstances in public schools in accordance with G.S. 115C-375.2A, as
46 enacted by this section.

47 **SECTION 8.23.(e)** Subsections (a) through (c) of this section become effective
48 November 1, 2014.

50 OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIP GRANT CLARIFICATIONS

53 eligible students for the award of scholarship grants to attend any nonpublic school.
54 Information about scholarship grants and the application process shall be made available on the
55 Authority's Web site. Beginning ~~March 1~~, March 15, the Authority shall begin awarding
56 scholarship grants according to the following criteria:

57 (1) First priority shall be given to eligible students who received a scholarship
58 grant during the previous school year if those students have applied by

SECTION 8.25.(f) G.S. 115C-562.7(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) The Authority shall report annually, no later than ~~March~~ April 1, to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the following:

SECTION 8.25.(g) Notwithstanding the requirement in G.S. 115C-562.2(a), as amended by this section, that the State Education Assistance Authority (Authority) make available applications for scholarship grants to attend nonpublic schools by February 1, the Authority shall make applications for the award of scholarships for the 2015 spring semester available no later than October 1, 2014, and the Authority shall notify parents in writing of the eligibility as soon as practicable. Notwithstanding the awards criteria in G.S. 115C-562.2(a), as amended by this section, and the definition of eligible student in G.S. 115C-562.1(2), to be eligible to receive a scholarship grant for the 2015 spring semester, a student shall meet both of the following criteria:

- (1) Reside in a household with an income level not in excess of the amount required for the student to qualify for the federal free or reduced-price lunch program.

The Authority may also develop a process for awarding grants using a random lottery system.

20 with Section 8.29 of S.L. 2013-360 and the provisions of this section, any unspent funds in the
21 2014-2015 fiscal year for this purpose shall revert to the General Fund on June 30, 2015.

22 **SECTION 8.25.(m)** Subsection (b) of this section becomes effective July 1, 2013.
23 The remainder of this section is effective when it becomes law.

24 **INJURY PREVENTION AND RETURN-TO-WORK PROGRAMS**

25 **SECTION 8.26.** G.S. 115C-12 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

26 "(43) To Ensure that Local Boards of Education Implement Injury Prevention and
27 Return-to-Work Programs. – The State Board of Education shall develop

30 models adopted by the State Board. These models shall be designed to

32 ensure injured employees with workers' compensation claims return to work

ANNUAL DISTRIBUTION OF SCHOOL BULLYING/CYBER-BULLYING POLICIES

SECTION 8.32.(a) G.S. 115C-407.16(d) reads as rewritten:

"(d) At the beginning of each school year, the principal shall provide the local school administrative unit's policy prohibiting bullying and harassing behavior, including cyber-bullying, to staff, students, and parents as defined in G.S. 115C-390.1(b)(8). Notice of the local policy shall appear in any school unit publication that sets forth the comprehensive rules, procedures, and standards of conduct for schools within the school unit and in any student and school employee handbook."

SECTION 8.32.(b) G.S. 115C-238.29F is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(m) Policy Against Bullying. – A charter school is encouraged to adopt a policy against bullying or harassing behavior, including cyber-bullying, that is consistent with the provisions of Article 29C of this Chapter. If a charter school adopts a policy to prohibit bullying and harassing behavior, the charter school shall, at the beginning of each school year, provide the policy to staff, students, and parents as defined in G.S. 115C-390.1(b)(8)."

SECTION 8.32.(c) G.S. 115C-238.66 reads as rewritten:

"§ 115C-238.66. Board of directors; powers and duties.

The board of directors shall have the following powers and duties:

(12) Policy against bullying. – A regional school is encouraged to adopt a policy against bullying or harassing behavior, including cyber-bullying, that is consistent with the provisions of Article 29C of this Chapter. If a regional school adopts a policy to prohibit bullying and harassing behavior, the regional school shall, at the beginning of each school year, provide the policy to staff, students, and parents as defined in G.S. 115C-390.1(b)(8)."

SECTION 8.32.(d) This section applies beginning with the 2014-2015 school year.

CLARIFY SCHOOL COUNSELORS WORK DUTIES

"(b) ~~During the remainder of their work time, counselors shall spend adequate time on school counseling program support activities that consist of professional development; consultation, collaboration, and training; and program management and operations. School counseling program support activities do not include the coordination of standardized testing. However, During the remainder of their work time, school counselors may assist other staff with the coordination of standardized testing.~~"

SECTION 8.33.(b) Section 8.35(b) of S.L. 2013-360 is repealed.

FUNDS FOR CHARTER SCHOOL CLOSURE

SECTION 8.34.(a) G.S. 115C-238.29F(i) is repealed.

SECTION 8.34.(b) Article 16 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 115C-238.29L. Dissolution of a charter school.

(a) Funds Reserved for Closure Proceedings. – A charter school shall maintain, for the purposes of ensuring payment of expenses related to closure proceedings in the event of a voluntary or involuntary dissolution of the charter school, one or more of the options set forth in this subsection. The minimum aggregate value of the options chosen by the charter school shall be fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000). The State Board of Education shall not allocate any funds under G.S. 115C-238.29H to a charter school unless the school has provided documentation to the State Board that the charter school has met the requirements of this subsection. Permissible options to satisfy the requirements of this subsection include one or more of the following:

(1) An escrow account.

(2) A letter of credit.

(3) A bond.

(4) A deed of trust.

(b) Distribution of Assets. – Upon dissolution of a charter school, all net assets of the charter school purchased with public funds shall be deemed the property of the local school administrative unit in which the charter school is located."

1 **SECTION 8.34.(c)** G.S. 115C-238.29G(a1) reads as rewritten:

2 "(a1) The State Board shall adopt criteria for adequate performance by a charter school
3 and shall identify charter schools with inadequate performance. The criteria shall include a
4 requirement that a charter school which demonstrates no growth in student performance and
5 has annual performance composites below sixty percent (60%) in any two years in a three-year
6 period is inadequate.

7 ...
8 (2) If a charter school is inadequate and has had a charter for more than five
9 years, the State Board is authorized to terminate, not renew, or seek

20 21 **VIRTUAL CHARTER SCHOOL PILOT PROGRAM**

22 **SECTION 8.35.(a)** Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-238.29D or any other provision of
23 law to the contrary, the State Board of Education shall establish a pilot program to authorize the
24 operation of two virtual charter schools serving students in kindergarten through twelfth grade.
25 The State Board shall establish an application process to allow student enrollment in the
26 selected virtual charter schools beginning with the 2015-2016 school year. A virtual charter
27 school participating in the pilot may serve any grade span of students in kindergarten through
28 twelfth grade. The pilot program shall continue for a period of four school years and shall end
29 with the 2018-2019 school year.

30 **SECTION 8.35.(b)** The virtual charter schools participating in the pilot program
31 authorized by this section shall be subject to the statutes and rules applicable to charter schools
32 pursuant to Part 6A of Article 16 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes, except as follows:

- 33 (1) The maximum student enrollment in any participating school shall be no
34 greater than 1,500 in its first year of operation and may increase by twenty
35 percent (20%) for each participating school up to a maximum student
36 enrollment of 2,592 in the fourth year of the pilot. The State Board of
37 Education may waive this maximum student enrollment threshold, beginning
38 in the fourth year of the school's operation, if the State Board determines that

46 that (i) fair notice is provided to the parent and student and (ii) an
47 opportunity is provided, prior to withdrawal of the student by the school, for
48 the student and parent to demonstrate that failure to participate in courses is
49 due to a lawful absence recognized under Part I of Article 26 of Chapter
50 115C of the General Statutes and any applicable rules adopted by the State
51 Board of Education.

52 **SECTION 8.35.(c)** In addition to the operating requirements applicable to a virtual
53 charter school participating in the pilot program pursuant to Part 6A of Article 16 of Chapter
54 115C of the General Statutes, the following requirements shall apply to a participating virtual
55 charter school:

- 56 (1) The school shall maintain an administrative office within North Carolina. In
57 addition, the school shall maintain at least one testing center or meeting
58 place within each of the eight State Board of Education districts where the

- 1 participating students reside, to allow educators and administrators from the
2 school to meet students and parents.
- 3 (2) If the school contracts with a third party for the provision of administrative
4 staff, such staff fulfilling the equivalent positions of superintendent,
5 principal, or business officer shall be residents of North Carolina.
- 6 (3) All teaching staff shall carry the appropriate State certification to instruct
7 any course and shall receive professional development in virtual instruction
8 pursuant to the school's application to the State Board of Education to
9 participate in the pilot program within 30 days of the employee's date of hire.
10 At least ninety percent (90%) of the teaching staff shall reside within North
11 Carolina.
- 12 (4) The school shall have a withdrawal rate below twenty-five percent (25%). A
13 student enrolled in a school with the intent expressed prior to enrollment of
14 only being enrolled for a finite period of time within the school year shall
15 not be counted in the measured withdrawal rate. The school shall keep a
16 written record of a student's stated intent for finite enrollment. A count of
17 school attendance shall be taken at least once during each semester for
18 funding purposes.
- 19 (5) The school shall ensure that each student is assigned a learning coach. The
20 learning coach shall provide (i) daily support and supervision of students, (ii)
21 ensure student participation in online lessons, and (iii) coordinate teacher-led
22 instructional sessions and State assessments.

23 **SECTION 8.35.(d)** Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-238.29B and G.S. 115C-238.29D,
24 a participating virtual charter school that is successful in meeting the requirements of this
25 section and the applicable requirements of Part 6A of Article 16 of Chapter 115C of the
26 General Statutes during the period of the pilot program shall be eligible to be approved by the
27 State Board of Education, at its discretion, without additional application requirements.

28 **SECTION 8.35.(e)** The State Board of Education shall provide State funding to a
29 virtual charter school participating in the pilot program as provided in G.S. 115C-238.29H(a)
30 and G.S. 115C-238.29H(a1). The amount allocated pursuant to G.S. 115C-238.29H(a)(1) shall
31 not, however, include the allocation for low-wealth counties supplemental funding and the
32 allocation for small county supplemental funding. Virtual charter schools participating in the
33 pilot program shall also be subject to the requirements in G.S. 115C-238.29H(b) through
34 G.S. 115C-238.29H(d). The amount of local funds provided to participating schools pursuant to
35 G.S. 115C-238.29H(b) shall be the lesser of seven hundred ninety dollars (\$790.00) per pupil
36 or the amount computed in accordance with G.S. 115C-238.29H(b).

37 **SECTION 8.35.(f)** A participating virtual charter school that does not comply with
38 the provisions of this section may result in deferment or termination of enrollment expansion,
39 or termination of a pilot. Schools are subject to presentation of data to the State Board of
40 Education at the call of the Chair of the State Board with a minimum of 21 days' notice.

41 **SECTION 8.35.(g)** The State Board shall report on the initial implementation of
42 the pilot program to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by November 15,
43 2016, and on findings from three years of operation of the pilot program by November 15,
44 2018. At a minimum, the report shall include the following:

- 45 (1) The number of students who have enrolled in courses offered by the schools.
46 (2) The number and type of courses offered by the schools.
47 (3) The withdrawal rate of students after enrollment.
48 (4) Student performance and accountability data.
49 (5) Information on the implementation, administration, and funding for the pilot

56 Board of Education and the applicable governing Board that meets the
57 following criteria:

- 1 a. It has no more than 100 students per grade level. This criterion shall
 2 not apply to a regional school as defined in G.S. 115C-238.61.
 3 b. It partners with an institution of higher education to enable students
 4 to concurrently obtain a high school diploma and begin or complete
 5 an associate degree program, master a certificate or vocational
 6 program, or earn up to two years of college credit within five years.
 7 c. It is located on the campus of the partner institution of higher
 8 education, unless the governing Board or the local board of trustees
 9 for a private North Carolina college specifically waives the
 10 requirement through adoption of a formal resolution. This criterion
 11 shall not apply to a regional school established as provided in Part 10
 12 of this Article."

13 **SECTION 8.36.(b)** Notwithstanding the requirements of Part 9 of Article 16 of
 14 Chapter 115C of the General Statutes, for the 2014-2015 school year, the Northeast Regional
 15 School of Biotechnology and Agriscience shall be designated as a cooperative innovative high
 16 school. To maintain the designation as a cooperative innovative high school beyond the
 17 2014-2015 school year, the board of directors of the Northeast Regional School of
 18 Biotechnology and Agriscience shall apply with a local board of trustees for approval as a
 19 cooperative innovative high school program as provided under Part 9 of Article 16 of Chapter
 20 115C of the General Statutes.

24 **SECTION 8.38.** G.S. 115C-528(a) reads as rewritten:

25 "(a) Local boards of education may purchase or finance the purchase of automobiles;
 26 school buses; mobile classroom units; food service equipment, photocopiers; athletic lighting;
 27 and computers, computer hardware, computer software, and related support services by lease
 28 purchase contracts and installment purchase contracts as provided in this section. Computers,
 29 computer hardware, computer software, and related support services purchased under this
 30 section shall meet the technical standards specified in the North Carolina Instructional
 31 Technology Plan as developed and approved under G.S. 115C-102.6A and G.S. 115C-102.6B."
 32

33 **EDUCATION OF CHILDREN IN PRIVATE PSYCHIATRIC RESIDENTIAL**
 34 **TREATMENT FACILITIES**

35 **SECTION 8.39.(a)** G.S. 108A-80 reads as rewritten:

36 "**§ 108A-80. Confidentiality of records.**

37 (a) Except as provided in subsections (b) below, and (b1) of this section, it shall be
 38 unlawful for any person to obtain, disclose or use, or to authorize, permit, or acquiesce in the
 39 use of any list of names or other information concerning persons applying for or receiving
 40 public assistance or social services that may be directly or indirectly derived from the records,
 41 files or communications of the Department or the county boards of social services, or county
 42 departments of social services or acquired in the course of performing official duties except for
 43 the purposes directly connected with the administration of the programs of public assistance
 44 and social services in accordance with federal law, rules and regulations, and the rules of the
 45 Social Services Commission or the Department.

46 (b) The Department shall furnish a copy of the recipient check register monthly to each
 47 county auditor showing a complete list of all recipients of Work First Family Assistance in
 48 Standard Program Counties and State-County Special Assistance, their addresses, and the
 49 amounts of the monthly grants. An Electing County whose checks are not being issued by the
 50 State shall furnish a copy of the recipient check register monthly to its county auditor showing
 51 a complete list of all recipients of Work First Family Assistance in the Electing County, their
 52 addresses, and the amounts of the monthly payments. These registers shall be public records
 53 open to public inspection during the regular office hours of the county auditor, but the registers
 54 or the information contained therein may not be used for any commercial or political purpose.
 55 Any violation of this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor.

56 (b1) The Department may share confidential information concerning a person receiving
 57 public assistance or social services with a local school administrative unit and with the
 58 Department of Public Instruction. Disclosure is limited to that information necessary to

1 establish, coordinate, or maintain appropriate educational services for the person receiving
2 public assistance or social services.

3 (c) Any listing of recipients of benefits under any public assistance or social services
4 program compiled by or used for official purposes by a county board of social services or a
5 county department of social services shall not be used as a mailing list for political purposes.
6 This prohibition shall apply to any list of recipients of benefits of any federal, State, county or
7 mixed public assistance or social services program. Further, this prohibition shall apply to the
8 use of such listing by any person, organization, corporation, or business, including but not
9 limited to public officers or employees of federal, State, county, or other local governments, as
10 a mailing list for political purposes. Any violation of this section shall be punishable as a Class
11 1 misdemeanor.

12 (d) The Social Services Commission may adopt rules governing access to case files for
13 social services and public assistance programs, except the Medical Assistance Program. The
14 Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services shall have the authority to adopt
15 rules governing access to medical assistance case files."

16 **SECTION 8.39.(b)** G.S. 115C-12 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

17 "(44) Duty to Ensure Educational Services in Private Psychiatric Residential
18 Treatment Facilities (PRTFs). – The Board, in collaboration with the
19 Department of Health and Human Services, shall ensure that educational
20 services are provided to all students in PRTFs as required under Part 4 of
21 Article 6 of Chapter 122C of the General Statutes. The Board shall ensure
22 that a child with a disability as defined under G.S. 115C-106.3(1) in a PRTF
23 receives educational services and procedural safeguards as provided in
24 Article 9 of this Chapter."

25 **SECTION 8.39.(c)** G.S. 122C-23.1 reads as rewritten:

26 **"§ 122C-23.1. Licensure of residential treatment facilities.**

27 (a) The General Assembly finds:

- 28 (1) That much of the care for residential treatment facility residents is paid by
29 the State and the counties;
- 30 (2) That the cost to the State for care for residents of residential treatment
31 facilities is substantial, and high vacancy rates in residential treatment
32 facilities further increase the cost of care;
- 33 (3) That the proliferation of residential treatment facilities results in costly
34 duplication and underuse of facilities and may result in lower quality
35 service;
- 36 (4) There is currently no ongoing relationship between some applicants for
37 licensure and local management entities (LMEs) that are responsible for the
38 placement of children and adults in residential treatment facilities; and
- 39 (5) That it is necessary to protect the general welfare and lives, health, and
40 property of the people of the State for the local management entity (LME) to
41 verify that additional beds are needed in the LME's catchment area before
42 new residential treatment facilities are licensed. This process is established
43 to ensure that unnecessary costs to the State do not result, residential
44 treatment facility beds are available where needed, and that individuals who
45 need care in residential treatment facilities may have access to quality care.

46 Based on these findings, the Department of Health and Human Services may license new
47 residential treatment facilities if the applicant for licensure submits with the application a letter
48 of support obtained from the local management entity in whose catchment area the facility will
49 be located. The letter of support shall be submitted to the Department of Health and Human
50 Services, Division of Health Service Regulation and Division of Mental Health, Developmental
51 Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services, and shall specify the number of existing beds in the
52 same type of facility in the catchment area and the projected need for additional beds of the
53 same type of facility.

54 (b) All private psychiatric residential treatment facilities (PRTFs), as defined in
55 G.S. 122C-450(a)(3), that serve children eligible to attend the public schools in accordance
56 with G.S. 115C-366, including a student who has been suspended or expelled but otherwise
57 meets the requirements of that statute, shall have a facility-based school as a condition of
58 licensure. Subject to the time limits of subsection (c) of this section, the school shall meet all
59 the requirements of a qualified nonpublic school under Article 39 of Chapter 115C of the

1 General Statutes and of a Nonpublic Exceptional Children's Program as defined in
2 G.S. 122C-450(a)(2). The requirements of this subsection and subsection (c) of this section do
3 not apply to PRTFs that are approved charter schools pursuant to Part 6A of Article 16 of
4 Chapter 115C of the General Statutes.

5 (c) The Department of Health and Human Services may issue an initial license to a
6 PRTF that meets all licensure requirements except for the approval of the facility-based school
7 as a Nonpublic Exceptional Children's Program by the Department of Public Instruction. This
8 initial license is valid for a period of six months, during which time the PRTF shall obtain
9 approval of its facility-based school as a Nonpublic Exceptional Children's Program by the
10 Department of Public Instruction. If such approval is not obtained before the expiration of the
11 initial license, the Department of Health and Human Services shall review the PRTF's license
12 for appropriate action. If the PRTF obtains approval as a Nonpublic Exceptional Children's
13 Program, the Department of Health and Human Services may issue a license for the remainder
14 of the calendar year, and the facility is eligible for annual renewal thereafter.

15 (d) At any time upon receipt of a written notice from the Department of Public
16 Instruction that a PRTF has not provided or is not providing educational services, or is not
17 reasonably cooperating with the Department of Public Instruction to ensure those services are
18 provided and that compliance with State and federal law is assured, the Department of Health
19 and Human Services shall review the PRTF's license for appropriate action. The Department of
20 Health and Human Services may issue sanctions including (i) requiring a refund of all State
21 funds disbursed for the provision of educational services for the current fiscal year, (ii) barring
22 future funding for the provision of educational services for the current or following year, or (iii)
23 suspending or revoking the PRTF's license.

24 (e) As used in this ~~subsection~~section, "residential treatment facility" means a
25 "residential facility" as defined in and licensed under this Chapter, but not subject to Certificate
26 of Need requirements under Article 9 of Chapter 131E of the General Statutes."

27 **SECTION 8.39.(d)** G.S. 122C-55 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

28 "(g2) Whenever there is reason to believe that the client is eligible for educational
29 services through a governmental agency, a facility shall disclose client identifying information
30 to the Department of Public Instruction. Disclosure is limited to that information necessary to
31 establish, coordinate, or maintain educational services. The Department of Public Instruction
32 may further disclose client identifying information to a local school administrative unit as
33 necessary."

34 **SECTION 8.39.(e)** Article 6 of Chapter 122C of the General Statutes is amended
35 by adding a new Part to read:

36 "Part 4. Educational Services in Private Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facilities.

37 **§ 122C-450. Definitions.**

38 (a) The following definitions apply in this Part:

39 (1) "Educational services" means appropriate education-related assessment and
40 instruction provided to any child residing in a private psychiatric residential
41 treatment facility, including special education and related services to a child
42 with a disability as defined in G.S. 115C-106.3(1). An education-related
43 assessment includes the determination of need for special education and
44 related services.

45 (2) "Nonpublic Exceptional Children's Program" means a facility-based school
46 that meets all of the following criteria:

47 a. Provides at least one teacher for every 14 students. The PRTF shall
48 report exceptions to this requirement to (i) the Division of Mental
49 Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services
50 (MH/DD/SAS) to request additional funding for educational services
51 as provided under G.S. 122C-450.1(d) to the extent that funds are
52 available and, if funds are not available, (ii) the Department of Public
53 Instruction to request a waiver from this requirement.

54 b. Provides at least one teacher with a North Carolina Professional
55 Educator license in special education, if there is a child with a
56 disability as defined in G.S. 115C-106.3(1) residing in the PRTF.

57 c. Registers with the Department of Administration, Division of
58 Nonpublic Schools, under Article 39 of Chapter 115C of the General
59 Statutes.

1 d. Has been approved by the Department of Public Instruction to
2 provide educational services as promulgated by the rules adopted by
3 the State Board of Education pursuant to the Administrative
4 Procedures Act.

5 (3) "Private psychiatric residential treatment facility" (PRTF) means a facility,
6 other than a hospital, that provides psychiatric and other behavioral health
7 services as described in Subpart D of C.F.R. Part 441 of Chapter 42 to
8 individuals under age 21 in an inpatient setting licensed by the Department
9 of Health and Human Services as provided under Chapter 122C of the
10 General Statutes. A PRTF does not include a State-operated facility.

11 **"§ 122C-450.1. Eligibility and allocations.**

12 (a) A child who is receiving psychiatric and other behavioral health services in a PRTF
13 shall also receive educational services in accordance with federal and State law, if the child is
14 eligible to enroll in public schools as provided in G.S. 115C-366, including a student who has
15 been suspended or expelled but otherwise meets the requirements of that statute. For a child
16 with a disability, as defined in G.S. 115C-106.3(1), who has been placed in a PRTF, all
17 educational services shall meet applicable standards as required under Article 9 of Chapter
18 115C of the General Statutes.

19 (b) A PRTF shall be qualified to receive a funding allocation, to the extent that funds
20 are available from the Department of Health and Human Services, to provide educational
21 services if the following conditions are met:

22 (1) The PRTF is licensed by the Department of Health and Human Services
23 pursuant to Chapter 122C of the General Statutes and has a facility-based
24 school approved by the Department of Public Instruction as a Nonpublic
25 Exceptional Children's Program.

26 (2) The PRTF documents deviations from educational and other programmatic
27 requirements when it is medically necessary for a resident in accordance
28 with G.S. 122C-62(e).

29 (c) A PRTF that meets the qualification standards required in subsection (b) of this
30 section may enter into an educational services contract, to the extent that funds are available,
31 with a local school administrative unit to assist in the delivery of educational services to the
32 children in the PRTF. The contract shall clearly define the education-related assessment,
33 instruction, and legal responsibilities of both parties engaging in the educational services
34 contract. A PRTF entering into an educational services contract with a local school
35 administrative unit shall submit the educational services contract to both the Department of
36 Public Instruction and the Department of Health and Human Services for inclusion in any
37 required reports to the General Assembly regarding the provision of educational services to
38 children in PRTFs.

39 (d) To the extent that funds are available in the Department of Public Instruction for the
40 delivery of educational services in PRTFs as provided in this Part, those funds shall be
41 transferred to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health,
42 Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services (DMH/DD/SAS). The funds
43 transferred for the purchase of educational services within the PRTF shall not be allocated to
44 LME/MCOs but shall be held in reserve at the DMH/DD/SAS. The DMH/DD/SAS shall use
45 the reserve funds to pay for educational services authorized by the Department of Public
46 Instruction and billed by the PRTFs in a process established by the DMH/DD/SAS. The funds
47 transferred to the DMH/DD/SAS pursuant to this section shall be allocated to the PRTFs for
48 educational services in a manner determined by the Department of Health and Human Services
49 and the Department of Public Instruction in a Memorandum of Understanding or a
50 Memorandum of Agreement. The Department of Health and Human Services shall disburse for
51 these purposes only those funds transferred from the Department of Public Instruction.

52 (e) The Department of Health and Human Services shall cease disbursement of
53 educational funding to a PRTF upon receipt of a written notice from the Department of Public
54 Instruction that educational services have not been provided. Educational funding disbursement
55 shall be reinstated by the Department of Health and Human Services upon written notice from
56 the Department of Public Instruction that the PRTF is providing educational services.

57 (f) A PRTF that receives educational funding shall comply with all audit and
58 accounting policies applicable to other public and private entities receiving public funding.

59 **"§ 122C-450.2. Information sharing.**

1 (a) Within three business days of admitting a child into a PRTF, the admitting PRTF
2 shall notify (i) the Department of Public Instruction and (ii) the local school administrative unit
3 in which the child was last enrolled, if known. The PRTF shall request a copy of the child's
4 most current Individualized Education Program and any other available documents related to
5 the provision of appropriate educational services from the local school administrative unit. To
6 the extent practicable, the local school administrative unit shall provide this information within
7 three business days of receiving a request made pursuant to this subsection. Upon withdrawal
8 or discharge of a child, the PRTF shall notify the Department of Public Instruction within three
9 business days of such withdrawal or discharge.

10 (b) The PRTF and the receiving local school administrative unit shall work together to
11 develop a transition plan, including a revised Individualized Education Program, if necessary,
12 to be implemented upon discharge of the child residing in a PRTF.

13 **"§ 122C-450.3. Technical assistance and monitoring.**

14 The State Board of Education and the Department of Public Instruction shall (i) offer
15 training to PRTFs on compliance with special education laws and regulations, (ii) maintain a
16 current list of names of children residing in PRTFs along with the name and contact
17 information of the PRTF in which each child resides, and (iii) develop and implement rules to
18 monitor the delivery of educational services in PRTFs, including a process to inform the
19 Department of Health and Human Services when services are not being provided. The
20 Department of Health and Human Services shall appropriately enforce applicable licensing
21 requirements as provided under G.S. 122C-23.1.

22 **"§ 122C-450.4. Reporting requirement.**

23 The Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Public Instruction,
24 in collaboration with other interested agencies, shall submit, by January 15 of each year, a joint
25 report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee and to the Joint Legislative
26 Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services on the delivery of educational services in
27 PRTFs, including (i) the annual number of children by age residing in a PRTF both with and
28 without an Individualized Education Program, (ii) the average length of stay of these children,
29 (iii) the types of educational services, including number of hours each type of service has been
30 provided, (iv) the costs and outcomes of providing educational services, and (v)
31 recommendations for improving the efficiency and effectiveness of delivering educational
32 services to children residing in PRTFs."

33 **SECTION 8.39.(f)** As of the effective date of this act, PRTFs that are licensed to
34 serve children eligible to enroll in public schools as provided in G.S. 115C-366, including a
35 student who has been suspended or expelled but otherwise meets the requirements of that
36 statute, shall have six months after their next annual renewal to obtain approval of their
37 facility-based school by the Department of Public Instruction as a Nonpublic Exceptional
38 Children's Program. If such approval is not obtained before the expiration of the additional six
39 months, the Department of Health and Human Services shall review the PRTF's license for
40 appropriate action. This subsection does not apply to PRTFs that are approved charter schools
41 pursuant to Part 6A of Article 16 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes.

42 **SECTION 8.39.(g)** The State Board of Education shall adopt emergency rules
43 pursuant to G.S. 150B-21.1A to monitor the delivery of educational services in PRTFs,
44 including a process to inform the Department of Health and Human Services when services are
45 not being provided.

46 **SECTION 8.39.(h)** The Department of Health and Human Services and the
47 Department of Public Instruction, in collaboration with other interested agencies, shall submit
48 its initial joint report, as required by G.S. 122C-450.4, to the Joint Legislative Education
49 Oversight Committee and to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human
50 Services by January 15, 2015.

51 **SECTION 8.39.(i)** In accordance with G.S. 122C-450.1(d), as enacted by this act,
52 the Department of Public Instruction shall transfer the funds provided for in this act for the
53 purchase of educational services within PRTFs pursuant to this section to the Department of
54 Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and
55 Substance Abuse Services (DMH/DD/SAS).

56 **SECTION 8.39.(j)** The Department of Public Instruction shall process all
57 applications submitted by PRTFs on or before September 1, 2014, for approval as a Nonpublic
58 Exceptional Children's Program no later than December 1, 2014.

ALLOW CONTINUED TRANSFER OF FUNDS FROM SPECIAL EDUCATION TAX CREDITS

SECTION 8.40. Section 6(b) of S.L. 2013-364 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 6.(b) The State Controller shall transfer the fund balance from the Fund for Special Education and Related Services to Nontax Budget Code 19978 (Intrastate Transfers) or the appropriate budget code as determined by the State Controller to support General Fund appropriations for the 2013-2014 fiscal year: appropriations."

DIFFERENTIATED PAY FOR HIGHLY EFFECTIVE TEACHERS

SECTION 8.41.(a) Intent. – It is the intent of the General Assembly to provide local boards of education additional State funds for local programs to provide differentiated pay for highly effective classroom teachers through funds appropriated from the North Carolina Education Endowment Fund as provided in Section 8.11(i) of this act.

SECTION 8.41.(b) Proposals. – Local boards of education shall submit proposals to establish a local program to provide differentiated pay for highly effective classroom teachers to the Senate Appropriations/Base Budget Committee, the House Committee on Appropriations, and the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by January 15, 2015.

- (1) Proposals may include any of the following types of differentiated pay for classroom teachers:
 - a. Performance-based salary increases for classroom teachers rated highly effective on the North Carolina Teacher Evaluation instrument based on successful performance relative to classroom instruction and student academic growth.
 - b. Differentiated bonuses for classroom teachers, including:
 - 1. Hard-to-staff subject areas, such as science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) education and exceptional children.
 - 2. Hard-to-staff schools.
 - 3. Assignment of additional academic responsibilities and leadership roles.
 - 4. Assignment as an instructional coach.
- (2) Proposals shall limit eligibility for differentiated pay to the following employees of local boards of education:
 - a. Classroom teachers. – An eligible classroom teacher is a teacher who is employed as a teacher who spends at least seventy percent (70%) of his or her work time in classroom instruction and is not employed as instructional support personnel.
 - b. Instructional coach, as classified by the Department of Public Instruction, in a Title I school, as identified under Part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended.

PART IX. COMPENSATION OF PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

TEACHER SALARY SCHEDULE

SECTION 9.1.(a) The following monthly teacher salary schedule shall apply for the 2014-2015 fiscal year to licensed personnel of the public schools who are classified as teachers. The schedule contains steps with each step corresponding to one year of teaching experience.

SECTION 9.1.(b) Salary Supplements for Teachers Paid on This Salary Schedule. –

- (1) Licensed teachers who have NBPTS certification shall receive a salary supplement each month of twelve percent (12%) of their monthly salary on the "A" salary schedule.
- (2) Licensed teachers who are classified as "M" teachers shall receive a salary supplement each month of ten percent (10%) of their monthly salary on the "A" salary schedule.
- (3) Licensed teachers with licensure based on academic preparation at the six-year degree level shall receive a salary supplement of one hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month in addition to the supplement provided to them as "M" teachers.
- (4) Licensed teachers with licensure based on academic preparation at the doctoral degree level shall receive a salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month in addition to the supplement provided to them as "M" teachers.
- (5) Certified school nurses shall receive a salary supplement each month of ten percent (10%) of their monthly salary on the "A" salary schedule.

SECTION 9.1.(c) The first step of the salary schedule for (i) school psychologists, (ii) school speech pathologists who are licensed as speech pathologists at the master's degree level or higher, and (iii) school audiologists who are licensed as audiologists at the master's degree level or higher shall be equivalent to Step 5 of the "A" salary schedule. These employees shall receive a salary supplement each month of ten percent (10%) of their monthly salary and are eligible to receive salary supplements equivalent to those of teachers for academic preparation at the six-year degree level or the doctoral degree level.

SECTION 9.1.(d) In lieu of providing annual longevity payments to teachers paid on this salary schedule for the 2014-2015 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years, the amounts of those longevity payments are built into this salary schedule.

SECTION 9.1.(e) A teacher compensated in accordance with this salary schedule shall receive an amount equal to the greater of (i) the applicable amount on the salary schedule or (ii) the sum of the teacher's salary plus the annual longevity payment that was effective for the 2013-2014 school year.

In addition, educators receiving compensation equal to the sum of the teacher's salary plus the annual longevity payment that was effective for the 2013-2014 school year shall receive an annual bonus of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), payable monthly.

SECTION 9.1.(f) Teachers who earned longevity during the 2013-2014 fiscal year shall be paid a prorated longevity amount for annual longevity earned prior to July 1, 2014. If the funds appropriated for the 2014-2015 fiscal year to the Accrued Longevity Reserve – Educators are insufficient, the Department of Public Instruction shall use other funds within the State Public School Fund for these purposes.

SECTION 9.1.(g) As used in this section, the term "teacher" shall also include instructional support personnel.

SECTION 9.1.(h) Section 35.11 of S.L. 2013-360 is repealed.

SCHOOL-BASED ADMINISTRATOR SALARY SCHEDULE

SECTION 9.11.(a) The following base salary schedule for school-based administrators shall apply only to principals and assistant principals. This base salary schedule shall apply for the 2014-2015 fiscal year commencing July 1, 2014.

 2 assistant principals on the salary schedule, except for principals in alternative schools and in
 3 cooperative innovative high schools, shall be determined in accordance with the following

 19 schools who supervise 33 or more teachers shall be classified according to the number of

21 **SECTION 9.11.(c)** A principal shall be placed on the step on the salary schedule
 22 that reflects total number of years of experience as a certified employee of the public schools
 23 and an additional step for every three years of experience serving as a principal on or before
 24 June 30, 2009. A principal or assistant principal shall also continue to receive any additional
 25 State-funded percentage increases earned for the 1997-1998, 1998-1999, and 1999-2000 school
 26 years for improvement in student performance or maintaining a safe and orderly school.

27 **SECTION 9.11.(d)** Principals and assistant principals with certification based on
 28 academic preparation at the six-year degree level shall be paid a salary supplement of one
 29 hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month and at the doctoral degree level shall be paid a
 30 salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month.

31 **SECTION 9.11.(e)** Longevity pay for principals and assistant principals shall be as
 32 provided for State employees under the North Carolina Human Resources Act.

33 **SECTION 9.11.(f)** If a principal is reassigned to a higher job classification because
 34 the principal is transferred to a school within a local school administrative unit with a larger
 35 number of State-allotted teachers, the principal shall be placed on the salary schedule as if the
 36 principal had served the principal's entire career as a principal at the higher job classification.

37 If a principal is reassigned to a lower job classification because the principal is
 38 transferred to a school within a local school administrative unit with a smaller number of
 39 State-allotted teachers, the principal shall be placed on the salary schedule as if the principal
 40 had served the principal's entire career as a principal at the lower job classification.

41 This subsection applies to all transfers on or after the effective date of this section,
 42 except transfers in school systems that have been created, or will be created, by merging two or
 43 more school systems. Transfers in these merged systems are exempt from the provisions of this
 44 subsection for one calendar year following the date of the merger.

45 **SECTION 9.11.(g)** Participants in an approved full-time master's in-school
 46 administration program shall receive up to a 10-month stipend at the beginning salary of an
 47 assistant principal during the internship period of the master's program. The stipend shall not
 48 exceed the difference between the beginning salary of an assistant principal plus the cost of
 49 tuition, fees, and books and any fellowship funds received by the intern as a full-time student,
 50 including awards of the Principal Fellows Program. The Principal Fellows Program or the
 51 school of education where the intern participates in a full-time master's in-school administration
 52 program shall supply the Department of Public Instruction with certification of eligible
 53 full-time interns.

54 **SECTION 9.11.(h)** During the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, the placement on the
 55 salary schedule of an administrator with a one-year provisional assistant principal's certificate
 56 shall be at the entry-level salary for an assistant principal or the appropriate step on the teacher
 57 salary schedule, whichever is higher.

1 **SECTION 9.11.(i)** Effective July 1, 2014, any person paid on the State Salary
 2 Schedule in the 2013-2014 school year and employed on July 1, 2014, who does not receive a
 3 salary increase on this salary schedule shall receive a nonrecurring salary bonus of eight

 38 provided for State employees under the State Personnel Act.

39 **"SECTION 35.13.(d)** Superintendents, assistant superintendents, associate superintendents,
 40 directors/coordinators, supervisors, and finance officers with certification based on academic
 41 preparation at the six-year degree level shall receive a salary supplement of one hundred
 42 twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided pursuant to
 43 this section. Superintendents, assistant superintendents, associate superintendents,
 44 directors/coordinators, supervisors, and finance officers with certification based on academic
 45 preparation at the doctoral degree level shall receive a salary supplement of two hundred
 46 fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for under this
 47 section.

48 **"SECTION 35.13.(e)** The State Board of Education shall not permit local school
 49 administrative units to transfer State funds from other funding categories for salaries for public
 50 school central office administrators.

51 **"SECTION 35.13.(f)** The annual salaries of all permanent, full-time personnel paid from
 52 the Central Office Allotment shall remain unchanged for the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, be
 53 increased by five hundred dollars (\$500.00)."

34 Carolina for training and developing vocational expertise and job readiness
35 in students with intellectual disabilities.
- 36 (2) Enhancing employment outcomes for individuals with intellectual
37 disabilities.
- 38 (3) Barriers to employment for individuals with intellectual disabilities.
- 39 (4) Establishment and expansion of partnerships between community colleges,
40 constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina, the Department
41 of Health and Human Services, Division of Vocational Rehabilitative
42 Services, and community-based organizations that offer job training and job
43 placement opportunities for individuals with intellectual disabilities.
- 44 (5) Policies for ensuring that students with intellectual disabilities are prepared
45 for higher educational opportunities upon completion of their elementary
46 and secondary school education.
- 47 (6) Policies for transition planning and job training for students with intellectual
48 disabilities as they complete their elementary and secondary school
49 education.

50 **SECTION 10.4.(b)** The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee shall
51 report the results of the study required by subsection (a) of this section to the General Assembly
52 prior to the convening of the 2015 General Assembly.
53

54 **EXTEND AUTHORITY TO REORGANIZE THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES** 55 **SYSTEM OFFICE**

56 **SECTION 10.5.** Section 10.1(b) of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

1 **PERMIT THE BOARD OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO TRANSFER CERTAIN**
2 **FUNDS TO DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE TO OFFSET APPRENTICESHIP**
3 **FEES**

4 **SECTION 10.6.(a)** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, of the funds
5 appropriated by this act for the Customized Industry Training Program for the 2014-2015 fiscal
6 year, the State Board of Community Colleges shall transfer three hundred thousand dollars
7 (\$300,000) to the Department of Commerce to offset fee revenue lost when apprenticeship fees
8 assessed pursuant to G.S. 94-12 are waived.

9 **SECTION 10.6.(b)** This section shall expire June 30, 2015.

10
11 **COMMUNITY COLLEGES AND UNC STUDY BILATERAL AGREEMENTS**
12 **REGARDING TRANSFER PROCESS**

13 **SECTION 10.7.(a)** The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina
14 and the State Board of Community Colleges shall jointly study the various bilateral agreements
15 and partnerships that exist between constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina
16 and the community colleges throughout the State. The study shall specifically focus on those
17 agreements and partnerships that aid in the transfer process and those agreements and
18 partnerships that encourage or require students to complete some coursework at a community
19 college before attending or transferring to a constituent institution. The study shall also provide
20 data on the agreements and partnerships, to the extent this information is available, on all of the
21 following:

- 22 (1) A description of the agreement or partnership;
- 23 (2) The number of years it has been in existence;
- 24 (3) The number of participants by year; and
- 25 (4) An analysis of student outcomes after a transfer under the agreement or
26 partnership.

27 **SECTION 10.7.(b)** The findings of the study shall be reported to the Joint
28 Legislative Education Oversight Committee and the Senate Appropriations Committee on
29 Education/Higher Education and the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Education by
30 February 1, 2015. The final report shall also include recommendations on replication and
31 expansion possibilities for the various agreements and partnerships.

32
33 **GUILFORD TECHNICAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE PROPERTY LEASE**

34 **SECTION 10.9.(a)** Section 1 of S.L. 2011-153 reads as rewritten:

35 "**SECTION 1.** Notwithstanding G.S. 115D-15, Article 12 of Chapter 160A of the General
36 Statutes, Chapter 66 of the General Statutes, or any other provision of law, the board of trustees
37 of Guilford Technical Community College may lease at private sale to ~~The North Carolina~~
38 ~~Center for Global Logistics, LLC, GTCC Innovative Resources Corporation or its successor in~~
39 interest a portion of its land and improvements now or hereafter located on the Donald W.
40 Cameron Campus of Guilford Technical Community College. The terms and conditions of the
41 lease shall be set by the board of trustees of Guilford Technical Community College and may
42 include rental at less than fair market value. The lease shall not be subject to the prior approval
43 of the State Board of Community Colleges."

44 **SECTION 10.9.(b)** Section 3 of S.L. 2011-153 reads as rewritten:

45 "**SECTION 3.** Notwithstanding G.S. 66-58(a), the personnel and facilities of Guilford
46 Technical Community College may, with the consent of the trustees of the college, be used (i)
47 in support of economic development through the operation of the Donald W. Cameron Campus
48 of Guilford Technical Community College and its companion facilities as an event
49 ~~venue.~~ venue, (ii) by, for, or in connection with GTCC Innovative Resources Corporation, an
50 affiliated nonprofit corporation that is a supporting organization of the college, or its successor
51 in interest, or (iii) for both purposes. Proceeds generated shall be used either to pay the
52 operational costs of the college's facilities, to support the event venue, or to support the mission
53 of the college."

55 **PART XI. UNIVERSITIES**

56
57 **STRATEGIC PLAN AND DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR ENDOWMENT FUND**

58 **SECTION 11.1.(a)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 116-11 and
59 G.S. 116-30.2, the Board of Governors and the campuses of the constituent institutions shall

1 consider reducing State funds for centers and institutes, speaker series, and other nonacademic
2 activities by up to fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000); if reductions are taken, then the Board
3 of Governors may use those reductions to do either or both of the following:

- 4 (1) Provide a State match of up to ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) for gifts
5 from private sources for the Distinguished Professors Endowment Trust
6 Fund.
- 7 (2) Expend up to five million dollars (\$5,000,000) to implement provisions of
8 The University of North Carolina Strategic Plan as set out in the report "Our
9 Time, Our Future: The University of North Carolina Compact with North
10 Carolina." These funds are in addition to the fifteen million dollars
11 (\$15,000,000) that may be expended pursuant to subsection (h) of Section
12 11.13 of S.L. 2013-360.

13 **SECTION 11.1.(b)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 116-41.13 through
14 G.S. 116-41.19, for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, no State match shall be required to use donations
15 and gifts that were or are intended by the donor as matching funds for a State appropriation for
16 distinguished professorships. If the terms of a particular donation or gift require a State match,
17 then this subsection shall not apply without the written consent of the donor.
18

19 **UNC TO FUND NORTH CAROLINA RESEARCH CAMPUS**

20 **SECTION 11.2.** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Board of Governors of
21 The University of North Carolina, the Board of Governors shall use twenty-nine million dollars
22 (\$29,000,000) to support UNC-related activities at the North Carolina Research Campus at
23 Kannapolis.
24

25 **UNC BUDGET REDUCTIONS**

26 **SECTION 11.3.** Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act, no reduction in
27 State funds except reductions based on enrollment growth model changes or tuition increases,
28 shall be allocated to any of the following:

- 29 (1) Any special responsibility constituent institution which has been granted a
30 basic type designation of "Special Focus Institution" under the Carnegie
31 Classification of Institutions of Higher Education.
- 32 (2) Any special responsibility constituent institution which has been granted a
33 basic type designation of "Baccalaureate Colleges—Arts & Sciences" under
34 the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education.
- 35 (3) Any constituent high school of The University of North Carolina.
36

37 **REPORT ON INSTITUTIONAL TRUST FUNDS**

38 **SECTION 11.4.** G.S. 116-36.1(e) reads as rewritten:

39 "(e) Each institution shall submit such reports or other information concerning its trust
40 fund accounts as may be required by the ~~Board~~ Board or by the Director of the Budget."
41

42 **REPORT ON ACADEMIC SUMMER BRIDGE**

43 **SECTION 11.5.** No later than January 1, 2015, the Board of Governors of The
44 University of North Carolina shall report to the Office of State Budget and Management and
45 the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the impact of Academic Summer
46 Bridge programs on student outcomes. At a minimum, the report shall include information by
47 institution on graduation rates, average time to degree, and student academic performance at
48 multiple intervals over a four-year course of study.
49

50 **OPERATION OF 4-H CAMPS AND USE OF VARIOUS SITES OF DEFUNCT 4-H 51 CAMPS AND TRANSFER 4-H CAMP SERTOMA/MOORE SPRINGS TO THE 52 STATE PARKS SYSTEM.**

53 **SECTION 11.7.(a)** Part 5 of Article 1 of Chapter 116 of the General Statutes is
54 amended by adding a new section to read:

55 **"§ 116-43.20. Operation of 4-H camps.**

56 (a) North Carolina State University shall not close the 4-H camps listed in subdivisions
57 (1) through (3) of this subsection. Further, North Carolina State University shall continue to
58 operate each of those camps as 4-H camps and to offer programs and services at the sites of
59 each of those camps at a level that is at least equivalent to the programs and services offered at

1 each site as of June 30, 2013. The following three 4-H camps are to continue and are to be
2 operated as 4-H camps as provided by this subsection:

- 3 (1) Eastern 4-H Center located in Columbia, NC.
- 4 (2) Millstone 4-H Camp located near Ellerbe, NC.
- 5 (3) Betsy-Jeff Penn 4-H Educational Center located near Reidsville, NC.

6 (b) The 4-H camps that were located at the sites listed in subdivisions (1) and (2) of this
7 subsection have ceased to operate as 4-H camps. At the request of the board of county
8 commissioners of any county that is the site of one of the defunct 4-H camps listed in this
9 subsection, North Carolina State University shall consult with the board regarding actions that
10 may be taken to reopen the 4-H camp in that county and other options that may be available for
11 the use of the site.

12 Within 90 days after any consultation with a board of county commissioners conducted
13 pursuant to this subsection, North Carolina State University shall submit a written report to the
14 Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, the Senate Appropriations Committee on
15 Education/Higher Education, the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on
16 Education, and the Fiscal Research Division regarding the feasibility of reopening the site as a
17 4-H camp and any other options considered for the use of the site.

18 The list of defunct 4-H camps follows:

- 19 (1) Anita-Alta 4-H Camp in the Pisgah National Forest in Lenoir, NC.
- 20 (2) Swannanoa 4-H Camp located at Swannanoa, NC.

21 (c) North Carolina State University shall take all practicable measures to operate the
22 4-H camps in a manner that will generate a positive fund balance in the institutional trust funds
23 that account for the activities of the 4-H camps."

24 **SECTION 11.7.(b)** Article 7 of Chapter 146 of the General Statutes is amended by
25 adding a new section to read:

26 **"§ 146-30.1. Application of net proceeds of disposition or use of real property allocated to**
27 **the 4-H Camping Program.**

28 (a) Limitation. – Notwithstanding G.S. 146-30 or any other provision of law, and
29 subject to the limitations contained in any applicable deed, the net proceeds of any disposition
30 of, use of, or activity on real property allocated to the 4-H Camping Program shall be used
31 solely for the operation of the 4-H Camping Program, for the acquisition of real property for
32 the 4-H Camping Program, or for the funding of an endowment to support these purposes.
33 These proceeds shall not be used to pay any debt or other financial obligation owed to a State
34 agency that arose prior to the effective date of this section.

35 (b) Definition of Net Proceeds. – For purposes of this section, the term "net proceeds"
36 shall have the same meaning as in G.S. 146-30.

37 (c) No Supplanting of General Fund Support. – It is the intent of the General Assembly
38 that appropriations for the 4-H Camping Program not be reduced as a result of the realization of
39 proceeds under this section. Instead, the General Assembly intends that the amount of
40 appropriations be determined as if no proceeds had been realized under this section. The
41 Director of the Budget shall not decrease the recommended continuation budget requirements
42 for the 4-H Camping Program as a result of proceeds being realized under this section.

43 (d) Proceeds Must Be Appropriated. – Nothing in this section shall be construed to
44 appropriate the proceeds described in this section."

45 **SECTION 11.7.(c)** If on the effective date of this section the net proceeds of any

58 (c) All funds received by the Authority in association with its administration of the
59 Teaching Fellows Program, including all funds received as repayment of scholarship loans and

1 all interest earned on these funds, shall be deposited into the Forgivable Education Loans for
2 Service Fund established in G.S. 116-209.45."

3 **SECTION 11.10.(c)** The North Carolina Teaching Fellows Commission shall
4 deliver to the State Education Assistance Authority, in a format acceptable to the Authority,
5 complete electronic and paper records on (i) all outstanding scholarship loans previously
6 awarded but not canceled by service or otherwise satisfied in full as of the date of delivery,
7 including records of applicable teaching service performed to that date, and (ii) aggregate
8 historical data on the numbers of loans made that are no longer active and, of those, numbers
9 and dollars paid in cash, paid in service, or written off due to death, disability, or uncollectible

50 **SECTION 11.12.(a)** Article 14 of Chapter 116 of the General Statutes is amended

53 (a) The following definitions apply in this section:

- 54 (1) Institution of higher education. – Has the same meaning as in

5 agreement with the United States Secretary of Veterans Affairs to participate in the Yellow
6 Ribbon Program. The agreements shall include all of the following terms:

7 (1) A grant of ninety percent (90%) of the cost of tuition and mandatory fees not
8 otherwise covered shall be provided for every eligible veteran or eligible
9 spouse or dependent relative of a veteran who is enrolled or will be enrolled
10 as an undergraduate student at a constituent institution or as a student at a
11 community college.

12 (2) To be eligible for grants under the Yellow Ribbon Program, a student must
13 meet all program requirements established by the federal government. In
14 addition, to be eligible for a Yellow Ribbon grant in which the school share
15 of the grant is paid with State appropriation, a student must be enrolled as an
16 undergraduate student at a constituent institution or as a student at a North
17 Carolina community college.

18 (c) This section is not intended to prohibit constituent institutions from using private
19 funds to provide Yellow Ribbon grants for students enrolled in master's or doctoral level
20 programs.

21 (d) The General Assembly encourages private institutions of higher education in North
22 Carolina to participate in the Yellow Ribbon Program."

23 **SECTION 11.12.(b)** It is the intent of the General Assembly to establish two
24 reserve funds for the purpose of forward funding tuition assistance to students who participate
25 in the Yellow Ribbon Program. Therefore, the General Assembly establishes the two following
26 reserve funds:

27 (1) There is established the UNC Yellow Ribbon Reserve to be managed by the
28 Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina. Of the funds
29 appropriated by this act to the Board of Governors, the sum of four million

32 shall be held in reserve for the 2014-2015 fiscal year. Beginning with the

34 be used to fund undergraduate tuition assistance to participants in the Yellow
35 Ribbon Program for the 2015-2016 academic year and each subsequent
36 academic year.

37 (2) There is established the Community College Yellow Ribbon Reserve to be
38 managed by the State Board of Community Colleges. Of the funds
39 appropriated by this act to the Community Colleges System Office, the sum
40 of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) shall be allocated to the Community
41 College Yellow Ribbon Reserve and shall be held in reserve for the
42 2014-2015 fiscal year. Beginning with the 2015-2016 fiscal year, the funds
43 in the Community College Yellow Ribbon Reserve shall be used to fund
44 tuition assistance to participants in the Yellow Ribbon Program for the
45 2015-2016 academic year and each subsequent academic year.

46 **SECTION 11.12.(c)** The Board of Governors and the State Board of Community
47 Colleges shall each report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by January
48 1, 2015, regarding their planned participation in the Yellow Ribbon Program for the 2015-2016
49 academic year. Each report shall include the following information:

50 (1) The number and identity of constituent institutions or community colleges
51 that will participate in the Yellow Ribbon Program.

52 (2) The methodology used by each governing board to select the institutions of
53 higher education that will participate in the Yellow Ribbon Program.

54 (3) For each institution that will participate, the maximum number of students

HEALTH CARE EDUCATION/PUBLIC PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP

SECTION 11.14. Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina, the Board of Governors shall use two million dollars (\$2,000,000) in the 2014-2015 fiscal year to support Union Square Campus, Inc., a nonprofit entity, that will build a facility to house nursing programs for North Carolina A&T State University, the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and Guilford Technical Community College, as well as the training facilities for Cone Health Cardiovascular Physician Management Company, Inc.

STUDY UNIVERSITY TUITION

SECTION 11.15.(a) The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee shall study the increasing cost of attendance for resident and nonresident students attending The University of North Carolina. In doing so, the Committee shall consider, at a minimum, all of the following:

- (1) The tuition and mandatory fees at the constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina.
- (2) How changes in tuition and fees in recent years have compared to overall economic inflation.
- (3) The funding available to offset increases in the cost of attendance, which could include non-General Fund revenues and the availability of State- and non-State-funded financial aid.
- (4) The tuition cost controls or limits that may have been implemented in other states.

40 (\$27,243,157) for the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

41 **UNC STRATEGIC PLAN FUNDS**

24 with the institution.
- 25 (2) A breakdown of all funds available to assist the institution with these

- 27 (3) A projected number of applicants for the affiliated school of optometry.

28 **SECTION 11.21.(c)** The North Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities,

40 **ECSU STUDY**

41 **SECTION 11.24.(a)** The General Assembly finds that Elizabeth City State

43 educational and economic resource for northeastern North Carolina. The Joint Legislative
44 Education Oversight Committee shall evaluate and study strategies to address any financial or
45 enrollment concerns.

46 **SECTION 11.24.(b)** The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee shall

49 from the John B. McLendon Scholarship Fund established in
50 G.S. 116-209.40 to the Reserve.

51 "**SECTION 11.2.(d)** G.S. 116-209.40 is repealed.

52 "**SECTION 11.2.(e)** There is appropriated from the Escheat Fund income to the Board of
53 Governors of The University of North Carolina the sum of nineteen million one hundred thirty
54 thousand seven hundred twenty-eight dollars (\$19,130,728) for the 2014-2015 fiscal year for
55 the Reserve."

HHS COMPETITIVE GRANTS PROCESS REVISIONS

SECTION 12A.1. Section 12A.2 of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"FUNDING FOR NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS/ESTABLISH COMPETITIVE GRANTS PROCESS

"SECTION 12A.2.(a) Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support, the sum of nine million five hundred twenty-nine thousand one hundred thirty-four dollars (\$9,529,134) in recurring funds for ~~each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, the 2013-2014 fiscal year and the sum of~~ nine million one hundred three thousand nine hundred eleven dollars (\$9,103,911) in recurring funds for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred seventeen thousand four hundred dollars (\$317,400) in nonrecurring funds for each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, and the sum of three million eight hundred fifty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,852,500) appropriated in Section 12J.1 of this act in Social Services Block Grant funds for each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium shall be used to allocate funds for nonprofit organizations.

"SECTION 12A.2.(d) It is the intent of the General Assembly that, beginning fiscal year 2014-2015, the Department implement a competitive grants process for nonprofit funding. To that end, the Department shall develop a plan that establishes a competitive grants process to be administered by the Division of Central Management and Support. The Department shall develop a plan that, at a minimum, includes each of the following:

- (1) A request for application (RFA) process to allow nonprofits to apply for and receive State funds on a competitive basis.
- (2) A requirement that nonprofits match a minimum of ten percent (10%) of the total amount of the grant award.
- (3) A requirement that the Secretary prioritize grant awards to those nonprofits that are able to leverage non-State funds in addition to the grant award.
- (4) A process that awards grants to nonprofits ~~dedicated to providing that have~~ the capacity to provide services on a statewide basis and that support any of the following State health and wellness initiatives:
 - a. A program targeting advocacy, support, education, or residential services for persons diagnosed with autism.
 - ~~b. A comprehensive program of education, advocacy, and support related to brain injury and those affected by brain injury.~~
 - c. A system of residential supports for those afflicted with substance abuse addiction.
 - d. A program of advocacy and supports for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities or severe and persistent mental illness, substance abusers, or the elderly.
 - e. Supports and services to children and adults with developmental disabilities or mental health diagnoses.
 - f. A food distribution system for needy individuals.
 - g. The provision and coordination of services for the homeless.
 - h. The provision of services for individuals aging out of foster care.
 - i. Programs promoting wellness, physical activity, and health education programming for North Carolinians.
 - j. A program focused on enhancing vision screening through the State's public school system.
 - k. Provision for the delivery of after-school services for apprenticeships or mentoring at-risk youth.
 - l. The provision of direct services for amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) and those diagnosed with the disease.
 - m. The provision of assistive information technology services for blind and disabled persons.
 - n. A comprehensive smoking prevention and cessation program that screens and treats tobacco use in pregnant women and postpartum mothers.

- 1 (5) Ensures that funds received by the Department to implement the plan
2 supplement and do not supplant existing funds for health and wellness
3 programs and initiatives.
4

5 "SECTION 12A.2.(h) For fiscal year 2014-2015 only, from the sum of nine million one
6 hundred three thousand nine hundred eleven dollars (\$9,103,911) referred to in subsection (a)
7 of this section, the Department shall allocate the sum of one hundred seventy-five thousand
8 dollars (\$175,000) to St. Gerard House for the purpose of assisting individuals with autism
9 spectrum disorders (ASD), learning disabilities, developmental delays, and behavioral health
10 needs. St. Gerard House shall be required to seek future funding through the competitive grants
11 process in accordance with subsection (d) of this section."
12

13 FUNDS FOR STATEWIDE HEALTH INFORMATION EXCHANGE

14 **SECTION 12A.2.(a)** It is the intent of the General Assembly:

- 15 (1) To maximize receipt of federal funds for administration and support of the
16 statewide health information exchange network (HIE Network).
17 (2) To allow the North Carolina Health Information Exchange (NC HIE), the
18 nonprofit corporation responsible for overseeing and administering the HIE
19 Network, to receive the State's share of available federal funds for
20 administration and support of the HIE Network in order to reduce the
21 operating costs of the HIE Network by an amount sufficient to allow for the

23 imposes on hospitals required to connect to the HIE Network pursuant to

25 (3) Beginning with the 2015-2016 fiscal year, to make the Department of Health
26 and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support,
27 responsible for using State funds to draw down available matching federal
28 funds for administration and support of the HIE Network.

29 **SECTION 12A.2.(b)** From the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
30 Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support, for the health
31 information exchange for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the Department shall allocate to the North
32 Carolina Health Information Exchange, a nonprofit corporation, an amount sufficient to
33 represent the State share for the maximum amount of approved federal matching funds for
34 allowable Medicaid administrative costs related to the HIE Network.

35 **SECTION 12A.2.(c)** By March 1, 2015, the NC HIE shall report to the Joint
36 Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services, the Joint Legislative
37 Oversight Committee on Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research Division on its use
38 of (i) State appropriations allocated to the NC HIE pursuant to this section and (ii) federal
39 matching funds received by the NC HIE for costs related to the HIE Network. The report shall
40 include a detailed, audited report of all State and federal funds received by the NC HIE and all
41 expenditures from these funds.

43 DEVELOPMENT OF PLAN TO IMPLEMENT SINGLE INFORMATION 44 TECHNOLOGY SYSTEM FOR MEDICAID CLAIM ADJUDICATION BY LOCAL 45 MANAGEMENT ENTITIES/MANAGED CARE ORGANIZATIONS

46 **SECTION 12A.4.(a)** Section 12A.4(j) of S.L. 2013-360 is repealed.

47 **SECTION 12A.4.(b)** Section 12A.4(k) of S.L. 2013-360, as amended by Section
48 4.11 of S.L. 2013-363, is repealed.

49 **SECTION 12A.4.(c)** Not later than December 1, 2014, the Department of Health
50 and Human Services shall develop and submit to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committees
51 on Health and Human Services and Information Technology and to the Fiscal Research
52 Division a report on a plan to implement a single, stand-alone information technology system
53 to be used for Medicaid claim adjudication by all local management entities, including local
54 management entities approved to operate the 1915(b)/(c) Medicaid Waiver. Prior to submitting
55 this report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committees on Health and Human Services and
56 Information Technology and to the Fiscal Research Division, the Department shall submit the
57 plan for review by the Enterprise Project Management Office and make any changes deemed
58 necessary by that Office. The Department shall not implement the plan until (i) it is reviewed
59 by the Enterprise Project Management Office and (ii) submitted to the Joint Legislative

Oversight Committees on Health and Human Services and Information Technology and to the Fiscal Research Division in accordance with this section.

FUNDS FOR REPLACEMENT MEDICAID MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM

SECTION 12A.5. Section 12A.4(a) of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 12A.4.(a) The Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services may utilize prior year earned revenue received for the replacement MMIS in the amount of nine million six hundred fifty-eight thousand one hundred fifty-two dollars (\$9,658,152) for the 2013-2014 fiscal year and in the amount of ~~one million six hundred sixty-six thousand six hundred twenty-five dollars (\$1,666,625)~~ six million eight hundred ninety thousand six hundred dollars (\$6,890,600) for the 2014-2015 fiscal year. In the event the Department does not receive prior year earned revenues in the amounts authorized by this section, or funds are insufficient to advance the project, the Department may, with prior approval from the Office of State Budget and Management (OSBM), utilize overrealized receipts and funds appropriated to the Department to achieve the level of funding specified in this section for the replacement MMIS."

FUNDS FOR NORTH CAROLINA FAMILIES ACCESSING SERVICES THROUGH TECHNOLOGY (NC FAST)

SECTION 12A.6. Section 12A.6(a) of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 12A.6.(a) Funds appropriated in this act in the amount of eight hundred sixty-four thousand six hundred fifty-five dollars (\$864,655) for State fiscal year 2014-2015 along with prior year earned revenue in the amount of four million one hundred thirty-eight thousand two dollars (\$4,138,002) and the cash balance in Budget Code 24410 Fund 2411 for the North Carolina Families Accessing Services through Technology (NC FAST) project shall be used to match federal funds in fiscal years 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 to expedite the development and implementation of the Eligibility Information System (EIS), Child Care, Low Income Energy Assistance, and Crisis Intervention Programs, and Child Service components of the NC FAST project."

SUPPLEMENTAL SHORT-TERM ASSISTANCE FOR GROUP HOMES

SECTION 12A.7.(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services, for the 2014-2015 fiscal year for unpaid LME liabilities is reduced by the sum of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) in nonrecurring funds, and that amount is instead allocated to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support, for the 2014-2015 fiscal year to provide temporary, short-term financial assistance in the form of a monthly payment to group homes on behalf of each resident who meets all of the following criteria:

- (1) Was eligible for Medicaid-covered personal care services (PCS) prior to January 1, 2013, but was determined to be ineligible for PCS on or after January 1, 2013, due to Medicaid State Plan changes in PCS eligibility criteria specified in Section 10.9F of S.L. 2012-142, as amended by Section 3.7 of S.L. 2012-145 and Section 70 of S.L. 2012-194.
- (2) Has continuously resided in a group home since December 31, 2012.

SECTION 12A.7.(b) These monthly payments shall be subject to all of the following requirements and limitations:

- (1) The amount of the monthly payments authorized by this section shall not exceed four hundred sixty-four dollars and thirty cents (\$464.30) per month for each resident who meets all criteria specified in subsection (a) of this section.
- (2) A group home that receives the monthly payments authorized by this section shall not, under any circumstances, use these payments for any purpose other than providing, as necessary, supervision and medication management for a resident who meets all criteria specified in subsection (a) of this section.
- (3) The Department shall make monthly payments authorized by this section to a group home on behalf of each resident who meets all criteria specified in subsection (a) of this section only for the period commencing July 1, 2014,

1 and ending June 30, 2015, or upon depletion of the two million dollars
2 (\$2,000,000) in nonrecurring funds appropriated in this act to the Division of
3 Central Management and Support for the 2014-2015 fiscal year for the
4 purpose of this section, whichever is earlier.

5 (4) The Department shall make monthly payments authorized by this section
6 only to the extent sufficient funds are available from the two million dollars
7 (\$2,000,000) in nonrecurring funds appropriated in this act to the Division of
8 Central Management and Support for the 2014-2015 fiscal year for the
9 purpose of this section.

10 (5) The Department shall not make monthly payments authorized by this section
11 to a group home on behalf of a resident during the pendency of an appeal by
12 or on behalf of the resident under G.S. 108A-70.9A.

13 (6) The Department shall terminate all monthly payments pursuant to this
14 section on June 30, 2015, or upon depletion of the funds appropriated in this
15 act to the Division of Central Management and Support for the 2014-2015
16 fiscal year for the purpose of this section, whichever is earlier.

17 (7) Each group home that receives the monthly payments authorized by this
18 section shall submit to the Department a list of all funding sources for the
19 operational costs of the group home for the preceding two years, in
20 accordance with the schedule and format prescribed by the Department.

21 **SECTION 12A.7.(c)** The Department shall use an existing mechanism to
22 administer these funds in the least restrictive manner that ensures compliance with this section
23 and timely and accurate payments to group homes. The Department shall not, under any
24 circumstances, use any portion of the two million dollars (\$2,000,000) appropriated in this act
25 to the Division of Central Management and Support for the purpose of this section for any other
26 purpose.

27 **SECTION 12A.7.(d)** By no later than April 1, 2015, the Department of Health and
28 Human Services shall submit to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and
29 Human Services and the Fiscal Research Division the following:

30 (1) A detailed plan for a long-term solution for individuals residing in group
31 homes who would like to continue residing in this setting and, as a result of
32 an independent assessment, have been determined to need only supervision,
33 medication management, or both.

34 (2) A list of funding sources for each group home that receives assistance
35 authorized by this section, based on the information provided to the
36 Department pursuant to subdivision (7) of subsection (b) of this section.

37 **SECTION 12A.7.(e)** Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, if the
38 Department of Health and Human Services fails to submit the detailed plan required by
39 subsection (d) of this section by April 1, 2015, then any remaining balance of the funds
40 appropriated for the purpose of this section as of that date shall revert to the General Fund and
41 the Department shall terminate all monthly payments pursuant to this section.

42 **SECTION 12A.7.(f)** Nothing in this section shall be construed as an obligation by
43 the General Assembly to appropriate funds for the purpose of this section, or as an entitlement
44 by any group home, resident of a group home, or other person to receive temporary, short-term
45 financial assistance under this section.

46 **SECTION 12A.7.(g)** As used in this act, "group home" means any facility that (i)
47 is licensed under Chapter 122C of the General Statutes, (ii) meets the definition of a supervised
48 living facility under 10A NCAC 27G .5601(c)(1) or 10A NCAC 27G .5601(c)(3), and (iii)
49 serves adults whose primary diagnosis is mental illness or a developmental disability but may
50 also have other diagnoses.

51 **SECTION 12A.7.(h)** This section expires June 30, 2015.

52 **SUBPART XII-B. DIVISION OF CHILD DEVELOPMENT AND EARLY EDUCATION**

53 **CHILD CARE SUBSIDY RATES/REVISE CO-PAYMENTS AND ELIGIBILITY** 54 **CRITERIA**

55 **SECTION 12B.1.** Section 12B.3 of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:
56 **"CHILD CARE SUBSIDY RATES**

1 "SECTION 12B.3.(a) The Beginning October 1, 2014, the maximum gross annual income
 2 for initial eligibility, adjusted biennially, for subsidized child care services shall be seventy-five
 3 percent (75%) of the State median income, adjusted for family size, determined based on a
 4 percentage of the federal poverty level as follows:

8 The eligibility for any child with special needs, including a child who is 13 years of age or
 9 older, shall be two hundred percent (200%) of the federal poverty level.

10 "SECTION 12B.3.(a1) A child receiving child care subsidy based on seventy-five percent
 11 (75%) of the State median income shall continue to receive subsidy based on seventy-five
 12 percent (75%) of the State median income until the child's next eligibility redetermination by
 13 the Department, and at that redetermination, the child's income eligibility shall be based on the
 14 eligibility criteria set forth in subsection (a) of this section.

15 "SECTION 12B.3.(b) Fees Beginning October 1, 2014, fees for families who are required
 16 to share in the cost of care shall be established based on a ten percent (10%) of gross family
 17 income and adjusted for family size. Fees shall be determined as follows: income. Co-payments
 18 shall not be prorated for part-time care.

24 "SECTION 12B.3.(b1) No later than January 1, 2015, the Department of Health and
 25 Human Services, Division of Child Development and Early Education, shall revise its child
 26 care subsidy policy to include in the policy's definition of "income unit" the following:

- 27 (1) A stepparent and the stepparent's child, if applicable.
- 28 (2) A nonparent relative caretaker, and the caretaker's spouse and child, if
 29 applicable, when the parent of the child receiving child care subsidy does not
 30 live in the home with the child.

31 ...
 32 "SECTION 12B.3.(h) Payment for subsidized child care services provided with Work
 33 First Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant funds shall comply with all
 34 regulations and policies issued by the Division of Child Development for the subsidized child
 35 care program.

 39 **ENHANCEMENTS/IMPLEMENT FUND-RAISING PLAN/CODIFY TANF**
 40 **MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT REQUIREMENT**

41 SECTION 12B.2.(a) Section 12B.9 of S.L. 2013-360 is amended by adding the
 42 following new subsection to read:

43 "SECTION 12B.9.(i) The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., (Partnership)
 44 shall implement a plan to increase local capacity to raise private funds to support early
 45 childhood activities. The plan shall include the following:

- 46 (1) Providing training and technical assistance on fund-raising for local
 47 partnerships and boards.
- 48 (2) Building the capacity and composition of local boards to enhance fund
 49 development and long-term sustainability.
- 50 (3) Partnering with State and local businesses and organizations to create
 51 fund-raising events.
- 52 (4) Identifying grant opportunities at the State and local level."

53 SECTION 12B.2.(b) G.S. 143B-168.15(g) reads as rewritten:
 54 "(g) Not less than thirty percent (30%) of the funds spent in each year of each local
 55 partnership's direct services allocation shall be used to expand child care subsidies. To the
 56 extent practicable, these funds shall be used to enhance the affordability, availability, and
 57 quality of child care services as described in this section. The North Carolina Partnership may
 58 increase this percentage requirement up to a maximum of fifty percent (50%) when, based upon
 59 a significant local waiting list for subsidized child care, the North Carolina Partnership

1 determines a higher percentage is justified. Local partnerships shall spend an amount for child
2 care subsidies that provides at least fifty-two million dollars (\$52,000,000) for the Temporary
3 Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) maintenance of effort requirement and the Child Care
4 Development Fund and Block Grant match requirement."
5

6 **STUDY CHILD CARE SUBSIDY FOR 11- AND 12-YEAR OLDS**

7 **SECTION 12B.3.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
8 Child Development and Early Education, shall study child care subsidy for 11- and 12-year
9 olds. The Division shall study (i) available options for 11- and 12- year olds for before and after
10 school care, (ii) available resources other than child care subsidy to pay for before and after
11 school care, and (iii) the average cost of care for 11- and 12- year olds.

12 **SECTION 12B.3.(b)** The Division shall report its findings and recommendations
13 to the Joint Legislative Committee on Health and Human Services and the Fiscal Research
14 Division no later than November 30, 2014. The report shall include separate findings and
15 recommendations for 11- and 12-year olds.
16

17 **REVISE CHILD CARE ALLOCATION FORMULA**

18 **SECTION 12B.4.** Section 12B.4 of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:
19 **"CHILD CARE ALLOCATION FORMULA**

20 **"SECTION 12B.4.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall allocate child
21 care subsidy voucher funds to pay the costs of necessary child care for minor children of needy
22 families. The mandatory thirty percent (30%) North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc.,
23 subsidy allocation under G.S. 143B-168.15(g) shall constitute the base amount for each
24 county's child care subsidy allocation. The Department of Health and Human Services shall use
25 the following method when allocating federal and State child care funds, not including the
26 aggregate mandatory thirty percent (30%) North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc.,
27 subsidy allocation:

- 28 (1) Funds shall be allocated to a county based upon the projected cost of serving
29 children under age 11 in families with all parents working who earn less than
30 ~~seventy five percent (75%) of the State median income~~ the applicable
31 federal poverty level percentage set forth in Section 12B.3(a) of this act, as
32 amended.
- 33 (2) No county's allocation shall be less than ninety percent (90%) of its State
34 fiscal year 2001-2002 initial child care subsidy allocation.
- 35 (3) For fiscal years 2013-2014 and 2014-2015, the Division of Child
36 Development and Early Education shall base the formula identified in
37 subdivision (1) of this subsection on the same data source used for the
38 2012-2013 fiscal year.
- 39 (4) The Department of Health and Human Services shall allocate to counties all
40 State funds appropriated for child care subsidy and shall not withhold funds
41 during the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 fiscal years.

42 **"SECTION 12B.4.(b)** The Department of Health and Human Services may reallocate
43 unused child care subsidy voucher funds in order to meet the child care needs of low-income
44 families. Any reallocation of funds shall be based upon the expenditures of all child care
45 subsidy voucher funding, including North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., funds within
46 a county.

47 **"SECTION 12B.4.(c)** When implementing the formula under subsection (a) of this
48 section, the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Child Development and
49 Early Education, shall include the market rate increase in the formula process, rather than
50 calculating the increases outside of the formula process. Additionally, the Department shall do
51 the following:

- 52 (1) Beginning fiscal year 2014-2015, implement (i) one-third of the change in a
53 county's allocation based on the new Census data; (ii) an additional one-third
54 of the change in a county's allocation beginning fiscal year 2016-2017; and
55 (iii) the final one-third change in a county's allocation beginning fiscal year
56 2018-2019. However, the following applies regarding increases to a county's
57 allocation:
 - 58 a. For the 2014-2015 fiscal year allocations, a county that did not have
59 a child care subsidy waiting list during the 2013-2014 fiscal year

1 shall not receive an increase in its allocation due to the new
2 allocation formula directed in this subdivision.

3 b. Beginning fiscal year 2015-2016, a county whose spending
4 coefficient is below ninety-five percent (95%) in the previous fiscal
5 year shall not receive an increase in its allocation in the following
6 fiscal year. The Division may waive this requirement and allow an
7 increase if the spending coefficient is below ninety-five percent
8 (95%) due to extraordinary circumstances, such as a State or federal
9 disaster declaration in the affected county. By October 1st of each
10 year, the Division shall report to the Joint Legislative Oversight
11 Committee on Health and Human Services and the Fiscal Research
12 Division the counties that received a waiver pursuant to this
13 sub-subdivision and the reasons for the waiver.

14 (2) Effective immediately following the next new Census data release,
15 implement (i) one-third of the change in a county's allocation in the year
16 following the data release; (ii) an additional one-third of the change in a
17 county's allocation beginning two years after the initial change under this
18 subdivision; and (iii) the final one-third change in a county's allocation
19 beginning the following two years thereafter."

21 CHILD CARE MARKET RATE ADJUSTMENTS

22 **SECTION 12B.5.** Effective January 1, 2015, the Department shall implement an
23 adjustment to child care market rates based upon the 2013 Child Care Market Rate Study.
24 Three- to five-star rated child care centers and three- to five-star rated child care homes shall
25 receive twenty-five percent (25%) of the recommended rate adjustments as defined in the 2013
26 Child Care Market Rate Study.

27 NC PRE-K AUDITS

28 **SECTION 12B.6.** Section 12B.1 of S.L. 2013-360, as amended by Sections 4.2
29 and 4.3 of S.L. 2013-363, is amended by adding the following new subsection to read:

30 "**SECTION 12B.1.(k)** The administration of the NC Pre-K program by local partnerships
31 shall be subject to the biennial financial and compliance audits authorized under

34 SUBPART XII-C. DIVISION OF SOCIAL SERVICES

35 CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES IMPROVEMENT INITIATIVE

36 **SECTION 12C.1.(a)** Findings and Intent. – The General Assembly makes the
37 following findings:

- 38 (1) Child Protective Services' policy from the Department of Health and Human
39 Services, Division of Social Services, recommends that the average child
40 protective services caseload be no greater than 10 families at any time for
41 workers performing child protective services assessments and 10 families at
42 any time for staff providing in-home services. However, data suggests that in
43 43 of the counties in this State, 21 have a caseload size of more than 15
44 cases per worker; and further, in nine of those 21 counties, there is an
45 average caseload size of more than 20 cases per worker.
- 46 (2) During the 2013-2014 fiscal year, county departments of social services lost
47 federal funding for child protective services under the Temporary Assistance
48 for Needy Families (TANF) Block Grant and Title IV-E funding. However,
49 the number of Child Protective Services investigations has grown by twenty
50 percent (20%) from fiscal year 2002 to fiscal year 2012.
- 51 (3) There is no current, statewide data available on the performance of county
52 departments of social services regarding child protective services.
- 53 (4) There exists the potential for a conflict of interest to arise when a county
54 department of social services has been appointed as guardian for both (i) a
55 child who is the subject of a report of abuse, neglect, or dependency that
56 would be investigated by Child Protective Services and (ii) for the parent or
57 legal guardian of the child.

1 It is the intent of the General Assembly to (i) reduce caseload size for Child
2 Protective Services' workers to the recommended standard, (ii) provide adequate resources for
3 county departments of social services to provide child protective services for abused, neglected,
4 and dependent children, (iii) provide for a comprehensive evaluation of various functions and
5 funding regarding child protective services, and (iv) study ways to reduce conflicts of interest
6 regarding guardianship and child protective services. To that end, the General Assembly
7 supports the initiatives and the allocation of funds for child welfare services as described in this
8 section.

9 **SECTION 12C.1.(b)** Funds for Child Protective Services. – Of the funds
10 appropriated in this act to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social
11 Services, the sum of seven million three hundred sixty-nine thousand nine hundred seventy
12 dollars (\$7,369,970) shall be allocated to county departments of social services. Four million
13 five hundred thousand dollars (\$4,500,000) of those funds shall be used to replace federal funds
14 counties lost during the 2013-2014 fiscal year previously used to pay for child protective
15 services' workers. Beginning October 1, 2014, the remaining two million eight hundred
16 sixty-nine thousand nine hundred seventy dollars (\$2,869,970) shall be used to provide
17 additional funding for child protective services' workers to reduce caseloads to an average of 10
18 families per worker.

19 **SECTION 12C.1.(c)** Funds for In-Home Services. – Of the funds appropriated in
20 this act to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, the sum
21 of four million five hundred thousand dollars (\$4,500,000) shall be allocated for child welfare
22 in-home services to provide and coordinate interventions and services that focus on child safety
23 and protection, family preservation, and the prevention of further abuse or neglect.

24 **SECTION 12C.1.(d)** Funds for Oversight of Child Welfare Services. – Of the
25 funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
26 Social Services, the sum of seven hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000) shall be allocated
27 to fund nine positions to the Division to enhance oversight of child welfare services in county
28 departments of social services. These positions shall be used to monitor, train, and provide
29 technical assistance to the county departments of social services to ensure children and families
30 are provided services that address the safety, permanency, and well-being of children served by
31 child welfare services.

32 **SECTION 12C.1.(e)** Pilot Program. – Of the funds appropriated in this act to the
33 Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, the sum of three
34 hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) shall be used to establish and implement a child protective
35 services pilot program. The funds shall be used to enhance coordination of services and
36 information among county departments of social services, local law enforcement agencies, the
37 court system, guardian ad litem programs, and other agencies as deemed appropriate by the
38 Department. The Department shall determine the number of sites that may participate in the
39 pilot program and include regions that are geographically diverse.

40 The Division shall coordinate with the Government Data Analytics Center (GDAC)
41 in developing the pilot program and commence the pilot program by December 1, 2014. The
42 Division shall provide a progress report on the pilot program to the Senate Appropriations
43 Committee on Health and Human Services, the House of Representatives Appropriations
44 Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division no later than
45 March 1, 2015. The Division shall make a final report of its findings and recommendations on
46 the pilot program to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services
47 no later than March 1, 2016.

48 **SECTION 12C.1.(f)** Statewide Evaluation. – Of the funds appropriated in this act
49 to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, the sum of
50 seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000) shall be used to provide for a comprehensive,
51 statewide evaluation of the State's child protective services system. The Division of Social
52 Services shall contract for an independent evaluation of the system, which evaluation shall
53 include developing recommendations on the following:

- 54 (1) The performance of county departments of social services as related to child
55 protective services.
- 56 (2) Caseload sizes.
- 57 (3) The administrative structure of the child protective services system in the
58 State.
- 59 (4) Adequacy of funding.

1 (5) Child protective services' worker turnover.
 2 (6) Monitoring and oversight of county departments of social services.
 3 The Division shall report the findings and recommendations from the evaluation to
 4 the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services no later than January
 5 1, 2016.

6 **SECTION 12C.1.(g)** Study Conflicts of Interest/Public Guardianship and Child
 7 Protective Services. – The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social
 8 Services, shall study the issue of conflicts of interest in child welfare cases as related to public
 9 guardianship. In conducting the study, the Department shall consider the following regarding
 10 addressing potential conflicts of interest:

- 11 (1) Creating internal firewalls to prevent information sharing and influence
 12 among staff members involved with the conflicting cases.
- 13 (2) Creating a formal or an informal "buddy system" allowing a county with a
 14 conflict to refer a case to a neighboring county.
- 15 (3) Referring the guardianship to a corporate guardian until the child welfare
 16 case is resolved.
- 17 (4) Having the Department assume responsibility for either the guardianship or
 18 the child welfare case.
- 19 (5) Recommending legislation to permit the clerk the option to appoint a public
 20 agency or official, other than the Director of Social Services, to serve as a
 21 disinterested public agent in exceptional circumstances only.
- 22 (6) Any other issues specific to this matter the Department deems appropriate.

23 The Division shall submit a final report of its findings and recommendations to the
 24 Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, the House of
 25 Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal
 26 Research Division no later than February 1, 2015.

27
 28 **CLARIFY WORK FIRST FAMILY ASSISTANCE INCOME LEVELS**

29 **SECTION 12C.2.** G.S. 108A-27.01 reads as rewritten:

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 46 **EASTERN BAND OF CHEROKEE INDIANS/ASSUMPTION BY TRIBE OF VARIOUS**
 47 **HUMAN SERVICES**

48 **SECTION 12C.3.(a)** The purpose of this section is to enable the Eastern Band of
 49 Cherokee Indians to assume responsibility for certain social services, healthcare benefit
 50 programs, ancillary services, including Medicaid administrative and service related functions,
 51 and related reimbursements.

52 **SECTION 12C.3.(b)** Beginning October 1, 2014, or upon federal approval, the
 53 Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians may begin assuming the responsibility for the Supplemental
 54 Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). When the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians assumes
 55 responsibility for SNAP, then any State statutes, portions of statutes, or rules relating to the
 56 provision of social services regarding SNAP services by a county department of social services
 57 for members of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians shall no longer apply to the Tribe, and
 58 the functions, administration, and funding requirements relating to those social services are
 59 thereby delegated to the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians.

1 No later than October 1, 2015, and with the exception of services related to special
2 assistance, childcare, and adult care homes, the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians may assume
3 responsibility for other programs as described under G.S. 108A-25(e), enacted in subsection (c)
4 of this section. When the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians assumes responsibility for any of
5 those other programs, then any State statutes, portions of statutes, or rules relating to the
6 provision of services for those programs by a county department of social services for members
7 of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians shall no longer apply to the Tribe, and the functions,
8 administration, and funding requirements relating to those programs are thereby delegated to
9 the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians.

10 **SECTION 12C.3.(c)** G.S. 108A-25 reads as rewritten:

11 "**§ 108A-25. Creation of ~~programs~~ programs; assumption by federally recognized tribe of**
12 **programs.**

13 ...
14 (e) When any federally recognized Native American tribe within the State assumes
15 responsibility for any social services, Medicaid and NC Health Choice healthcare benefit
16 programs, and ancillary services, including Medicaid administrative and service functions, that
17 are otherwise the responsibility of a county under State law, then, notwithstanding any other
18 provision of law, the county shall be relieved of the legal responsibility related to the tribe's
19 assumption of those services."

20 **SECTION 12C.3.(d)** G.S. 108A-87 reads as rewritten:

21 "**§ 108A-87. Allocation of nonfederal shares.**

22 (a) The nonfederal share of the annual cost of each public assistance and social services
23 program and related administrative costs may be divided between the State and counties as
24 determined by the General Assembly and in a manner consistent with federal laws and
25 regulations.

26 (b) The nonfederal share of the annual cost of public assistance and social services
27 programs and related administrative costs provided to Indians living on federal reservations
28 held in trust by the United States on their behalf shall be borne entirely by the State.

29 (c) Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b) of this section, when the Eastern Band of
30 Cherokee Indians assumes responsibility for a program described under G.S. 108A-25(e), the
31 following shall occur:

32 (1) Nonfederal matching funds designated to Jackson and Swain counties to
33 serve the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians for that program previously
34 borne by the State shall be allocated directly to the Eastern Band of
35 Cherokee Indians rather than to those counties.

36 (2) Any portion of nonfederal matching funds borne by counties for public
37 assistance and social services programs and related administrative costs shall
38 be borne by the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians."

39 **SECTION 12C.3.(e)** No later than October 1, 2014, the Department of Health and
40 Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall submit to the Centers for Medicare and
41 Medicaid Services (CMS) Medicaid and NC Health Choice state plan amendments and
42 Medicaid waivers necessary to achieve the following:

43 (1) To effectuate the changes required by this section.

44 (2) To address the healthcare needs identified in community health assessments
45 and plans conducted by the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, provided that
46 changes to Medicaid and NC Health Choice services made by the state plan
47 amendments or waivers will be one hundred percent (100%) federally
48 funded. If any state plan amendments or waivers authorized by this
49 subdivision will increase the state share of administrative or other costs, the
50 Department shall report the anticipated increased costs to the Joint
51 Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services.

52 The state plan amendments and waivers authorized by this section shall have an
53 effective date no later than October 1, 2015.

55 **ELIGIBILITY FOR STATE-COUNTY SPECIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**

 12 Health and Human Services and (ii) insufficient income or other resources to

 14 determined by the rules and regulations of the Social Services ~~Commission;~~
 15 and Commission."

16 **SECTION 12D.1.(c)** G.S. 108A-41(b)(3) reads as rewritten:

 36 State-County Special Assistance applicants approved to receive State-County Special
 37 Assistance benefits prior to the effective date of subsection (b) of this section.

38 **SECTION 12D.1.(f)** Not later than October 31, 2014, the Department of Health and
 39 Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall submit to the federal Centers for
 40 Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) an amendment to the Medicaid State Plan to allow
 41 Medicaid recipients who were approved to receive State-County Special Assistance benefits

14 ~~this program for the 2011-2012 fiscal year. Each county shall use these county funds budgeted~~
15 ~~for the State-County Special Assistance program, program for this program, for the~~
16 ~~State-County Special Assistance in-home program, and for rental assistance."~~

18 **EXAMINATION OF WAYS TO IMPROVE THE PUBLIC GUARDIANSHIP SYSTEM**

19 **SECTION 12D.3.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services
20 (Department), Division of Aging and Adult Services, shall collaborate with the Administrative
21 Office of the Courts to develop a plan regarding the Department's evaluation of complaints
22 pertaining to wards under the care of publicly funded guardians in order to ensure that, in
23 addition to current requirements, the complaint process incorporates a face-to-face observation
24 of the ward, an interview with the ward, or both. The plan shall include a requirement that an
25 individual with experience in understanding the unique needs and abilities of the ward be

31 Elder Law, and any other interested groups to develop a model plan for transitioning a ward to
32 an alternative guardianship arrangement when an individual guardian of the person becomes
33 unable or unwilling to serve. The model plan shall focus on ways to prevent the appointment of
34 a public guardian.

35 **SECTION 12D.3.(c)** The Department shall continue to study whether utilization of
36 care coordination services would provide needed oversight to safeguard against conflicts of

39 recommendations for each of the issues described in subsections (a) through (c) of this section

45 **SECTION 12D.4.(a)** G.S. 35A-1202(14) reads as rewritten:

46 "(14) "Status report" means the report required by G.S. 35A-1242 to be filed by
47 the general guardian or guardian of the person. ~~A status report shall include a~~
48 ~~report of a recent medical and dental examination of the ward by one or~~
49 ~~more physicians or dentists, a report on the guardian's performance of the~~
50 ~~duties set forth in this Chapter and in the clerk's order appointing the~~
51 ~~guardian, and a report on the ward's condition, needs, and development. The~~
52 ~~clerk may direct that the report contain other or different information. The~~
53 ~~report may also contain, without limitation, reports of mental health or~~
54 ~~mental retardation professionals, psychologists, social workers, persons in~~
55 ~~loco parentis, a member of a multidisciplinary evaluation team, a designated~~
56 ~~agency, a disinterested public agent or agency, a guardian ad litem, a~~
57 ~~guardian of the estate, an interim guardian, a successor guardian, an officer,~~
58 ~~official, employee or agent of the Department of Health and Human~~
59 ~~Services, or any other interested persons including, if applicable to the~~

ward's situation, group home parents or supervisors, employers, members of the staff of a treatment facility, or foster parents."

SECTION 12D.4.(b) G.S. 35A-1242 reads as rewritten:

"§ 35A-1242. **Status reports for incompetent wards.**

(a) Any corporation or disinterested public agent that is guardian of the person for an incompetent person, within six months after being appointed, shall file an initial status report with ~~the designated agency, if there is one, or with the clerk.~~ the clerk and submit a copy of the initial status report to the designated agency, if there is one. Such guardian shall file a second status report with ~~the designated agency or the clerk~~ one year after being appointed, and subsequent reports annually thereafter. The clerk may order any other guardian of the person to file status reports. If a guardian required by this section to file a status report is employed by the designated agency, the guardian shall file any required status report with ~~both the designated agency and the clerk.~~ the clerk and submit a copy of the status report to the designated agency.

(a1) Each status report shall include all of the following:

- (1) A report or summary of recent medical and dental examinations of the ward by one or more physicians and dentists. In instances when the guardian has made diligent but unsuccessful attempts to secure this information, the guardian shall include in the status report an explanation and documentation of all actions taken to attempt to secure this information.
- (2) A report on the guardian's performance of the duties set forth in this Chapter and in the clerk's order appointing the guardian.
- (3) A report on the ward's residence, education, employment, and rehabilitation or habilitation.
- (4) A report of the guardian's efforts to restore competency.
- (5) A report of the guardian's efforts to seek alternatives to guardianship.
- (6) If the guardian is a disinterested public agent or corporation, a report of the efforts to identify alternative guardians.
- (7) The guardian's recommendations for implementing a more limited guardianship, preserving for the ward the opportunity to exercise rights that are within the ward's comprehension and judgment.
- (8) Any additional reports or information required by the clerk.

(a2) The guardian may include in each status report additional information pertaining to the ward's best interests.

(b) Each status report shall be filed (i) under the guardian's oath or affirmation that the report is complete and accurate so far as ~~he~~ the guardian is informed and can determine. determine or (ii) with the signature of a disinterested, competent witness to a statement by the guardian that the report is complete and accurate so far as the guardian is informed and can determine. Status reports filed with the signature of a disinterested, competent witness shall include the full name, address, and telephone number of the witness.

(b1) The clerk shall make status reports submitted by corporations or disinterested public agents available to the Director, or the Director's designee, of the Division of Aging and Adult Services within the Department of Health and Human Services. (c) A clerk or designated agency that receives a status report shall not make the status report available to anyone other than the guardian, the ward, the court, or State or local human resource services agencies providing services to the ward.

(d) The clerk, on the clerk's own motion, or any interested party, may file a motion in the cause pursuant to G.S. 35A-1207 with the clerk in the county where the guardianship is filed to request modification of the order appointing the guardian or guardians or for consideration of any matters contained in the status report."

SECTION 12D.4.(c) This section becomes effective October 1, 2014.

42 this State but may also appoint licensed physician assistants, nurse practitioners, nurses,
43 coroners, or emergency medical technician paramedics. A medical examiner may serve more
44 than one county. The Chief Medical Examiner may take jurisdiction in any case or appoint
45 another medical examiner to do so."

47 **SECTION 12E.6.(b)** On or before November 1, 2014, the Department of Health
48 and Human Services, Division of Public Health, shall study and report to the Joint Legislative
49 Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services on all of the following:

- 50 (1) The adequacy of the current fee paid by the State and counties (i) pursuant to
51 G.S. 130A-387 for investigations and reports and (ii) pursuant to
52 G.S. 130A-389 for autopsies. This portion of the report shall include
53 recommendations for any fee increase deemed necessary by the Department,
54 as well as an explanation and documentation to support the recommended

- 58 (3) Recommended qualifications of, and training requirements for, medical
59 examiners.

4 establish a system of oversight to achieve operational efficiencies and improve quality

57 **SUBPART XII-F. DIVISION OF MH/DD/SAS AND STATE OPERATED 58 HEALTHCARE FACILITIES**

TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY FUNDING

SECTION 12F.1. Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services, for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the sum of two million three hundred seventy-three thousand eighty-six dollars (\$2,373,086) shall be used exclusively to support traumatic brain injury (TBI) services as follows:

- (1) The sum of three hundred fifty-nine thousand two hundred eighteen dollars (\$359,218) shall be used to fund contracts with the Brain Injury Association of North Carolina, Carolinas Rehabilitation, or other appropriate service providers.
- (2) The sum of seven hundred ninety-six thousand nine hundred thirty-four dollars (\$796,934) shall be used to support residential programs across the State that are specifically designed to serve individuals with TBI.
- (3) The sum of one million two hundred sixteen thousand nine hundred thirty-four dollars (\$1,216,934) shall be used to support requests submitted by individual consumers for assistance with residential support services, home modifications, transportation, and other requests deemed necessary by the consumer's local management entity and primary care physician.

REPORT ON STRATEGIES FOR IMPROVING MENTAL HEALTH, DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES, AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICES

SECTION 12F.3.(a) The Department of Health and Human Services (Department) shall submit a report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services and the Fiscal Research Division by November 1, 2014, that includes all of the following components:

- (1) A strategy for improving communication and coordination among all divisions within the Department that administer funds or programs related to the delivery of behavioral health services, especially regarding the most appropriate and efficient uses of public and private inpatient behavioral health services. The Department shall include as part of its strategy a process to address shortages and deficiencies identified in the annual State Medical Facilities Plan.
- (2) A plan developed in collaboration with local management entities that have been approved to operate as managed care organizations (LME/MCOs) to increase access to, and availability of, community-based outpatient crisis and emergency services for the stabilization and treatment of individuals experiencing mental health, developmental disability, or substance abuse crises in settings other than local hospital emergency departments and State-operated psychiatric hospitals.
- (3) A plan to ensure that a comprehensive array of outpatient treatment and crisis prevention and intervention services are available and accessible to children, adolescents, and adults in every LME/MCO catchment area. The plan shall ensure that an adequate number of crisis stabilization units are available in each LME/MCO catchment area. The plan shall include specific strategies for increasing the number of Facility-Based Crisis Programs for Children and Adolescents in high-need areas of the State and the availability of Professional Treatment Services in Facility-Based Crisis Programs for Children and Adolescents as defined in section 4.b.(8)(k) of the current Medicaid State Plan. The plan shall further describe in detail all actions necessary to implement those strategies, including a description of how the Department's funds will be utilized.
- (4) Findings and recommendations for increasing the inventory of inpatient psychiatric and substance abuse services within the State. In developing its findings and recommendations, the Department shall examine the advantages and disadvantages of increasing this inventory of services through (i) additional State-operated facilities, (ii) community hospital beds, (iii) United States Veterans Administration beds, and (iv) community-based services that decrease the need for inpatient treatment.

- 1 (5) A plan for offering hospitals and other entities incentives to apply for
2 licenses to begin offering new inpatient behavioral health services, or to
3 begin operating existing licensed beds that are currently unstaffed, or both.
- 4 (6) Recommendations on the use of the existing Cherry Hospital buildings after
5 patients and operations are relocated to the replacement facility. In
6 developing its findings and recommendations, the Department shall conduct
7 a study that includes development of an inventory and assessment of the
8 condition of every building located on the existing Cherry Hospital campus.
9 The study shall include an examination of the feasibility of using the existing
10 Cherry Hospital facility to provide community-based and facility-based
11 behavioral health services, including additional child and adolescent
12 inpatient beds.
- 13 (7) A method by which the Division of Health Service Regulation can begin
14 tracking and separately reporting no later than January 1, 2015, on the
15 inventory of inpatient behavioral health beds for children ages six through
16 12 and for adolescents over age 12.
- 17 (8) A status update on the implementation of each component of the 2008
18 Mental Health Commission Workforce Development Plan.

19 **SECTION 12F.3.(b)** The Department shall submit a report to the House
20 Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations
21 Committee on Health and Human Services, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on
22 Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division by March 1, 2015, that includes
23 all of the following components:

- 24 (1) A comprehensive strategy, developed in collaboration with stakeholders
25 deemed relevant by the Department, to address the dearth of licensed child
26 and adolescent inpatient psychiatric beds in facilities throughout the State.
27 The strategy shall do all of the following:
- 28 a. Ensure that an adequate inventory of child and adolescent beds are
29 available in each LME/MCO catchment area.
- 30 b. Include the development and implementation of a child and
31 adolescent psychiatric bed registry to provide real-time information
32 on the number of beds available at each licensed and nonlicensed
33 facility in the State.
- 34 c. Include recommendations as to any regulatory changes necessary to
35 ensure safety and quality in Facility-Based Crisis Programs for
36 Children and Adolescents.
- 37 (2) Recommendations for meaningful outcome measures to be implemented by
38 State-operated alcohol and drug abuse treatment centers to assess the impact
39 of inpatient treatment on an individual's substance use following discharge
40 from a State-operated alcohol and drug abuse treatment center. The
41 recommendations shall include a proposed time line for implementation of
42 these outcome measures.

44 **REPORT AND PLAN REGARDING BUDGET SHORTFALLS WITHIN THE**
45 **DIVISION OF MENTAL HEALTH, DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES, AND**
46 **SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICES**

47 **SECTION 12F.4.** By December 1, 2014, the Department of Health and Human
48 Services shall provide a report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and
49 Human Services and the Fiscal Research Division on the budget shortfalls within the
50 Department as a result of liabilities associated with (i) the provision of community services for
51 the treatment of mental illness, developmental disabilities, and substance abuse disorders and
52 (ii) the State-operated health care facilities under the jurisdiction of the Department. The report
53 shall include a detailed explanation of all of the following:

- 54 (1) A history of the annual budget shortfalls since 2008 and all the contributing
55 factors.
- 56 (2) An explanation of actions taken by the Department and the Office of State
57 Budget and Management to address these budget shortfalls.
- 58 (3) A plan for eliminating these budget shortfalls.
- 59

1 **FUNDS APPROPRIATED TO IMPLEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE JOINT**

36 "(f) The Department shall exempt from certificate of need review the purchase of any
37 replacement equipment that exceeds the two million dollar (\$2,000,000) threshold set forth in
38 ~~G.S. 131E-176(22)~~ G.S. 131E-176(22a) if all of the following conditions are met:

- 39 (1) The equipment being replaced is located on the main campus.
40 (2) The Department has previously issued a certificate of need for the equipment
41 being replaced. This subdivision does not apply if a certificate of need was
42 not required at the time the equipment being replaced was initially purchased
43 by the licensed health service facility.
44 (3) The licensed health service facility proposing to purchase the replacement
45 equipment shall provide prior written notice to the Department, along with
46 supporting documentation to demonstrate that it meets the exemption criteria

1 defined in section 607(1) of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act
2 of 1974. An entity that writes a health benefit plan and is one of the
3 following:

- 4 a. An insurance company under Article 3 of Chapter 58 of the General
5 Statutes.
6 b. A service corporation under Article 65 of Chapter 58 of the General
7 Statutes.
8 c. A health maintenance organization under Article 67 of Chapter 58 of
9 the General Statutes.
10 d. A third-party administrator of one or more group health plans, as
11 defined in section 607(1) of the Employee Retirement Income
12 Security Act of 1974 (29 U.S.C. § 1167(1)).

13 (4) Hospital. – A medical care facility licensed under Article 5 of this Chapter or
14 under Article 2 of Chapter 122C of the General Statutes.

15 (5) Public or private third party. – Includes the State, the federal government,
16 employers, health insurers, third-party administrators, and managed care
17 organizations.

18 (b) Beginning with the quarter ending June 30, 2014, and quarterly thereafter, each
19 hospital shall provide to the Department of Health and Human Services, utilizing electronic
20 health records software, the following information about the 100 most frequently reported
21 admissions by DRG for inpatients as established by the ~~Commission~~ Department:

- 22 (1) The amount that will be charged to a patient for each DRG if all charges are
23 paid in full without a public or private third party paying for any portion of
24 the charges.
25 (2) The average negotiated settlement on the amount that will be charged to a
26 patient required to be provided in subdivision (1) of this subsection.
27 (3) The amount of Medicaid reimbursement for each DRG, including claims and
28 pro rata supplemental payments.
29 (4) The amount of Medicare reimbursement for each DRG.
30 (5) For each of the five largest health insurers providing payment to the hospital
31 on behalf of insureds and teachers and State employees, the range and the
32 average of the amount of payment made for each DRG. Prior to providing
33 this information to the Department, each hospital shall redact the names of
34 the health insurers and any other information that would otherwise identify
35 the health insurers.

36 A hospital shall not be required to report the information required by this subsection for any
37 of the 100 most frequently reported admissions where the reporting of that information
38 reasonably could lead to the identification of the person or persons admitted to the hospital in
39 violation of the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA)
40 or other federal law.

41 (c) The Commission shall adopt rules on or before ~~March 1, 2014~~ January 1, 2015, to
42 ensure that subsection (b) of this section is properly implemented and that hospitals report this
43 information to the Department in a uniform manner. The rules shall include all of the

- 45 (1) The method by which the Department shall determine the 100 most
46 frequently reported DRGs for inpatients for which hospitals must provide the
47 data set out in subsection (b) of this section.
48 (2) Specific categories by which hospitals shall be grouped for the purpose of
49 disclosing this information to the public on the Department's Internet Web
50 site.

51 (d) Beginning with the quarter ending September 30, 2014, and quarterly thereafter,

53 electronic health records software, information on the total costs for the 20 most common
54 surgical procedures and the 20 most common imaging procedures, by volume, performed in
55 hospital outpatient settings or in ambulatory surgical facilities, along with the related CPT and
56 HCPCS codes. Hospitals and ambulatory surgical facilities shall report this information in the
57 same manner as required by subdivisions (b)(1) through (5) of this section, provided that
58 hospitals and ambulatory surgical facilities shall not be required to report the information
59 required by this subsection where the reporting of that information reasonably could lead to the

1 identification of the person or persons admitted to the hospital in violation of the federal Health
2 Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA) or other federal law.

3 (e) The Commission shall adopt rules on or before ~~June 1, 2014,~~ January 1, 2015, to
4 ensure that subsection (d) of this section is properly implemented and that hospitals and
5 ambulatory surgical facilities report this information to the Department in a uniform manner.
6 The rules shall include the ~~list of method by which the Department shall determine the 20 most~~

8 ~~performed in a hospital outpatient setting and those performed in an ambulatory surgical~~
9 ~~facility, along with the related CPT and HCPCS codes, procedures for which the hospitals must~~

11 (e1) The Commission shall adopt rules to establish quality measures identical to those
12 established by the Joint Commission for each of the following:

- 13 a. Primary cesarean section rate, uncomplicated (TJC PC-02)
- 14 b. Early elective delivery rate (TJC PC-01)
- 15 c. C. difficile infection SIR (NHSN)
- 16 d. Multidrug resistant organisms (NHSN)
- 17 e. Surgical site infection SRI for colon surgeries (NSHN)
- 18 f. Post op sepsis rate (PSII3)
- 19 g. Thrombolytic therapy for acute ischemic stroke patients (STK-4)
- 20 h. Stroke education (STK-8)
- 21 i. Venous thrombolism prophylaxis (VTE-1)
- 22 j. Venous thrombolism discharge instructions (VTE-5)

23 (f) Upon request of a patient for a particular DRG, imaging procedure, or surgery
24 procedure reported in this section, a hospital or ambulatory surgical facility shall provide the
25 information required by subsection (b) or subsection (d) of this section to the patient in writing,
26 either electronically or by mail, within three business days after receiving the request.

27 (g) G.S. 150B-21.3 does not apply to rules adopted under subsections (c) and (e) of this
28 section. A rule adopted under subsections (c) and (e) of this section becomes effective on the
29 last day of the month following the month in which the rule is approved by the Commission."

31 **STUDY CONCERNING EXPANSION OF HEALTH CARE COST REDUCTION AND** 32 **TRANSPARENCY ACT TO ADDITIONAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS**

33 **SECTION 12G.3.** By December 1, 2014, the Department of Health and Human
34 Services shall study and submit a written report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee
35 on Health and Human Services and the Fiscal Research Division summarizing its
36 recommendations for extending North Carolina's Health Care Cost Reduction and
37 Transparency Act of 2013 (the Act) to additional health care providers. The report shall
38 identify all of the following:

- 39 (1) Recommended categories of additional health care providers that should be
40 subject to the requirements of the Act.
- 41 (2) Recommended data to be collected for the purpose of transparency from
42 each category of identified health care providers.
- 43 (3) Recommended exemptions, if any, from certain requirements of the Act for
44 each category of identified health care providers.
- 45 (4) Recommended effective dates for the applicability of the Act to each
46 category of identified health care providers.

48 **MORATORIUM ON HOME CARE AGENCY LICENSES FOR IN-HOME AIDE** 49 **SERVICES**

50 **SECTION 12G.4.(a)** For the period commencing on the effective date of this
51 section, and ending June 30, 2016, and notwithstanding the provisions of the Home Care
52 Agency Licensure Act set forth in Part 3 of Article 6 of Chapter 131E of the General Statutes or
53 any rules adopted pursuant to that Part, the Department of Health and Human Services shall not
54 issue any licenses for home care agencies as defined in G.S. 131E-136(2) that intend to offer
55 in-home aide services. This prohibition does not apply to companion and sitter services and
56 shall not restrict the Department from doing any of the following:

- 57 (1) Issuing a license to a certified home health agency as defined in
58 G.S. 131E-176(12) that intends to offer in-home aide services.

- 1 (2) Issuing a license to an agency that needs a new license for an existing home
2 care agency being acquired.
- 3 (3) Issuing a license for a new home care agency in any area of the State upon a
4 determination by the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human
5 Services that increased access to care is necessary in that area.

6 **SECTION 12G.4.(b)** This section is effective when it becomes law.

7

8 **MORATORIUM ON SPECIAL CARE UNIT LICENSES**

9 **SECTION 12G.5.** Section 12G.1(a) of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

10 "**SECTION 12G.1.(a)** For the period beginning July 31, 2013, and ending ~~July 1,~~
11 ~~2016, June 30, 2016,~~ the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Health Service
12 Regulation (Department), shall not issue any licenses for special care units as defined in
13 G.S. 131D-4.6 and G.S. 131E-114. This prohibition shall not restrict the Department from
14 doing any of the following:

- 15 (1) Issuing a license to a facility that is acquiring an existing special care unit.
- 16 (2) Issuing a license for a special care unit in any area of the State upon a
17 determination by the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human
18 Services that increased access to this type of care is necessary in that area
19 during the ~~three-year~~ moratorium imposed by this section.
- 20 (3) Processing all completed applications for special care unit licenses received
21 by the Division of Health Service Regulation along with the applicable
22 license fee prior to June 1, 2013.
- 23 (4) Issuing a license to a facility that was in possession of a certificate of need as
24 of July 31, 2013, that included authorization to operate special care unit
25 beds."

27 **SUBPART XII-H. DIVISION OF MEDICAL ASSISTANCE (MEDICAID)**

28

29 **MEDICAID REFORM**

30 **SECTION 12H.1.** It is the intent of the General Assembly to continue to work
31 toward the details of Medicaid reform during a special session in November 2014. Until the
32 General Assembly enacts legislation authorizing a plan to reform Medicaid, the Department of
33 Health and Human Services (i) shall continue to consult with stakeholder groups, study, and
34 recommend options for Medicaid reform that will provide greater budget predictability for the
35 Medicaid program and (ii) shall not commit the State to any particular course on Medicaid
36 reform and shall not submit any reform-related State plan amendments, waivers, or grant
37 applications nor enter into any contracts related to implementing Medicaid reform.

38

39 **REINSTATE MEDICAID ANNUAL REPORT**

40 **SECTION 12H.2.** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
41 Medical Assistance, shall reinstate the publication of the Medicaid Annual Report and
42 accompanying tables, which was discontinued after 2008. The Division shall publish the report
43 and tables on its Web site and shall not publish copies in print.

44

45 **MODIFY INTENSIVE IN-HOME SERVICE**

46 **SECTION 12H.4.** No later than October 1, 2014, the Department of Health and
47 Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall modify the service definition for the
48 Intensive In-Home Service to reflect a team-to-family ratio of one Intensive In-Home team to
49 12 families for both the Medicaid and NC Health Choice programs.

50

51 **STUDY ADDITIONAL 1915(C) WAIVER**

52 **SECTION 12H.5.** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
53 Medical Assistance, shall design and draft a 1915(c) wavier that meets the following
54 requirements:

- 55 (1) The waiver should create 1,000 new slots each year for 3 years, to serve a
56 total of 3,000 additional adults with developmental disabilities from January
57 1, 2016, to June 30, 2019.

- 1 (2) The budget for each slot should be capped at twenty thousand dollars
2 (\$20,000) per plan year per beneficiary, and slots will target individuals on
3 the registry of unmet needs.
4 (3) The slots should be managed as part of the LME/MCO managed care
5 system.

6 The Department shall report the draft waiver, other findings, and any other options
7 or recommendations to best serve the additional adults with developmental disabilities on the
8 registry of unmet needs to the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human
9 Services and the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services by March 1,
10 2015. The Department may submit drafts of the waiver to the Centers for Medicare and
11 Medicaid Services (CMS) to solicit feedback but shall not submit the waiver for CMS approval
12 until authorized by the General Assembly.
13

14 **TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY WAIVER**

15 **SECTION 12H.6.** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
16 Medical Assistance, and Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance
17 Abuse Services, in conjunction with the North Carolina Traumatic Brain Injury Advisory
18 Council, shall design and draft a 1915(c) waiver to add a new service package for Medicaid
19 eligibles with traumatic brain injury (TBI). This draft waiver may be based on an update to the
20 2010 report on a waiver to serve individuals with traumatic brain injury. The Department shall
21 report the draft waiver, other findings, and any additional options to provide Medicaid services
22 to those suffering from TBI to the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human
23 Services and the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services by February
24 1, 2015. The Department may submit drafts of the waiver to the Centers for Medicare and
25 Medicaid Services (CMS) to solicit feedback but shall not submit the waiver for CMS approval
26 until authorized by the General Assembly.
27

28 **FREEZE NURSING HOME CASE MIX INDEX**

29 **SECTION 12H.7.** Section 12H.13(b) of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

30 "**SECTION 12H.13.(b)** Effective July 1, 2013, any rate methodologies that contain an
31 automatic inflationary or increase factor shall not increase above the rate in effect on June 30,
32 2013, unless the rate is otherwise increased by the General Assembly. Interim hospital
33 outpatient services' percentage of cost used for payment shall be adjusted to compensate for
34 expected inflation that hospitals would be eligible for, and cost settlement will only be up to the
35 percentage in subsection (e) of this section. The following rates are excluded from this
36 subsection: Federally Qualified Health Centers, Rural Health Centers, critical access hospitals,
37 State-Operated services, Hospice, Part B and D Premiums, third-party and HMO premiums,
38 drugs, MCO capitation payments, and nursing home direct care services case mix index
39 increases. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the exclusion from this subsection for nursing home
40 direct care services case mix index increases expires January 1, 2015, and the rate for nursing
41 home direct care services case mix shall not increase above the rate in effect on December 31,
42 2014."
43

44 **DRUG REIMBURSEMENT USING AVERAGE ACQUISITION COST**

45 **SECTION 12H.8.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
46 Medical Assistance, shall adopt an average acquisition cost methodology for brand and generic
47 drug ingredient pricing to be effective beginning on January 1, 2015. The drug ingredient
48 pricing methodology shall be consistent with new federal requirements or, if the new federal
49 requirements have not yet been finalized by October 1, 2014, consistent with the draft federal
50 requirements. In adopting a new drug ingredient pricing methodology, the Department shall
51 also do all of the following:

- 52 (1) Raise dispensing fees so that the average acquisition cost ingredient pricing
53 plus the dispensing fees, net of any drug rebates, generates nine hundred
54 seventy-five thousand dollars (\$975,000) in savings in General Fund
55 appropriations.
56 (2) Maintain a distinction between the dispensing fees for preferred and brand
57 drugs.
58 (3) Ensure that ingredient prices are updated at least monthly.

1 **SECTION 12H.8.(b)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
2 Medical Assistance, shall issue a request for proposals (RFP) for a contractor to perform a
3 statewide drug dispensing fee study to begin on March 1, 2015. The Department shall use the
4 one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) appropriated in this budget for this study as the State
5 share to draw down additional federal Medicaid funds for this study.

6 **SECTION 12H.8.(c)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
7 Medical Assistance, shall follow the procedures in G.S. 108A-54.1A in submitting the State
8 plan amendment required to implement this section.
9

10 **SUBSTITUTION OF GENERIC DRUGS FOR UNAVAILABLE PREFERRED DRUGS**

11 **SECTION 12H.8A.** If the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
12 Medical Assistance, finds that there are net General Fund savings to the Medicaid program
13 from doing so, then the Division may allow a pharmacist to substitute and dispense a generic
14 drug in place of a preferred drug without prior authorization, subject to all of the following
15 being true:

- 16 (1) The Division normally requires the dispensing of the preferred drug over the
17 equivalent generic drug.
- 18 (2) The pharmacist has not been able to acquire the preferred drug from at least
19 two separate wholesalers within the two weeks prior to dispensing the
20 generic substitute.
- 21 (3) The pharmacist maintains records of the failed attempts to acquire the
22 preferred drug. Such records shall be open to inspection and audit by the
23 Division.
- 24 (4) The prescriber has not indicated that the preferred drug is "medically
25 necessary."
- 26 (5) The pharmacist notifies the prescriber of the substitution and receives
27 approval from the prescriber for the substitution.
- 28 (6) The pharmacist notifies the patient of the substitution and gives the patient
29 the opportunity to accept or refuse the substitution.

30 For purposes of this section, "savings to the Medicaid program" shall not be limited to savings
31 within the prescription drug service area but shall also include savings in other areas of the
32 program, such as savings associated with eliminating the prior authorization process or savings
33 from instances where missed doses may lead to negative and costly patient outcomes.
34

35 **MENTAL HEALTH DRUG MANAGEMENT**

36 **SECTION 12H.9.(a)** Effective January 1, 2015, Section 12H.13(g) of S.L.
37 2013-360, as amended by Section 4.4 of S.L. 2013-363, is repealed.

38 **SECTION 12H.9.(b)** Effective January 1, 2015, the Department of Health and
39 Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall manage mental health drugs to produce
40 twelve million dollars (\$12,000,000), net of rebates, in recurring annual savings to General
41 Fund appropriations to the Medicaid program. In order to achieve these savings, the
42 Department shall first make adjustments to the preferred drug list to maximize supplemental
43 rebates. Next, in order to achieve these savings, the Department is authorized to impose
44 controls including prior authorization, utilization review criteria, and other restrictions.
45 Notwithstanding the foregoing, because of the effective date of this section, savings in fiscal
46 year 2014-2015 shall be six million dollars (\$6,000,000).

47 **SECTION 12H.9.(c)** No later than October 1, 2015, the Department of Health and
48 Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall report to the Joint Legislative Oversight
49 Committee on Health and Human Services on the Department's fiscal year 2014-2015 savings
50 from making the changes required by subsection (b) of this section.
51

52 **PERSONAL CARE SERVICES MANAGEMENT**

53 **SECTION 12H.10.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
54 Medical Assistance, shall implement the rate reduction specified in Section 2 of S.L. 2013-306
55 retroactively to October 1, 2013, by recouping all payments in excess of the rate approved in
56 the State plan amendment required in Section 3 of S.L. 2013-306. The Department shall then
57 additionally recoup the three percent (3%) reduction required by Section 12H.18(b) of S.L.
58 2013-360.

1 **SECTION 12H.10.(b)** By March 1, 2015, the Department of Health and Human
2 Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall propose a financial plan to contain the budget
3 growth of personal care services (PCS) for fiscal year 2015-2016, including any rate reductions
4 necessary to keep the total PCS budget at the same level as the fiscal year 2014-2015 certified
5 budget for PCS, code 1310, North Carolina Accounting System code 536144, in the Division of
6 Medical Assistance fund 14445.

7 **SECTION 12H.10.(c)** The Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and
8 Human Services shall engage a contractor to study issues related to reforming and redesigning
9 personal care services (PCS) while meeting the State's obligations under the Americans with
10 Disabilities Act and the United States Supreme Court's decision in *Olmstead v. L.C. ex rel.*
11 *Zimring*, 527 U.S. 581 (1999). The study shall examine the following issues:

- 12 (1) What categories of Medicaid recipients are currently receiving PCS, and in
13 what settings are they being served?
- 14 (2) What is the total number of Medicaid recipients receiving PCS in each
15 category, and what is the anticipated growth in each category?
- 16 (3) What is the current cost of serving Medicaid recipients in each setting, and
17 specifically, the sources of public funding utilized to serve those
18 individuals?
- 19 (4) What alternative, more cost-effective assistance models could be
20 implemented for each category of Medicaid recipient?
- 21 (5) Specifically, whether more cost-effective assistance could be offered
22 through the new 1915(i) State plan home- and community-based services
23 and 1915 waiver options for each category of Medicaid recipient.
- 24 (6) Recommendations regarding what outcomes the redesigned program should
25 be designed to achieve.
- 26 (7) The impact of reforming and redesigning personal care services on appeals
27 and litigation.
- 28 (8) Other areas as deemed appropriate by the chairs of the Joint Legislative
29 Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services.

30 The study shall specifically examine the effect of the moratorium on home care
31 agency licenses for in-home aide services required by Section 12G.4 of this act and the
32 moratorium on special care unit licenses required by Section 12G.5 of this act and make
33 recommendations on whether each of these moratoria should be continued.

34 The study shall also address the quality of resident care within adult care homes and
35 the adequacy of State oversight of adult care homes, including inspections, procedures, and
36 processes.

37 No later than December 1, 2015, the contractor shall report the results and
38 recommendations of the study to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and
39 Human Services. The Department of Health and Human Services shall give the contractor full
40 access to all data necessary to complete the study and the report. The Department of Health and
41 Human Services shall make payments to the contractor hired by the Joint Legislative Oversight
42 Committee on Health and Human Services from funds appropriated elsewhere in this budget
43 for this contract as well as from federal Medicaid matching funds available for this contract.

44 **ADULT CARE HOME COST REPORTING**

45 **SECTION 12H.11.** The Department of Health and Human Services shall require
46 compliance with the adult care home cost reporting requirements set forth in G.S. 131D-4.2.
47 The Department shall make available the data collected from the cost reporting in a
48 character-separated values (CSV) plain text format or other file format that may easily be
49 imported into software used for spreadsheets, databases, and data analytics.

50 **CREATE STATEWIDE HOSPITAL BASE RATE**

51 **SECTION 12H.12.(a)** Section 12H.20(b) of S.L. 2013-360 is repealed.

52 **SECTION 12H.12.(b)** Effective January 1, 2015, the individualized base rates for
53 hospital inpatient services under the Medicaid and NC Health Choice programs are hereby
54 replaced with a single statewide base rate for hospital inpatient services equal to the sum of two
55 thousand seven hundred eighty-eight dollars (\$2,788) or the statewide median rate on June 30,
56 2014, whichever is less. This subsection does not apply to UNC Hospitals or Vidant Medical
57
58

Center, which was previously known as Pitt County Memorial Hospital, and their base rates shall not be included in the calculation of the statewide median rate.

SUPPLEMENTAL PAYMENTS TO ELIGIBLE MEDICAL PROFESSIONAL PROVIDERS

SECTION 12H.13.(a) Effective July 1, 2014, supplemental payments that increase reimbursement to the average commercial rate for certain eligible medical providers described in the Medicaid State Plan, Attachment 4.19-B, Section 5, Pages 2 and 3, shall be modified as follows:

- (1) The number of eligible medical professional providers shall be limited as follows:
 - a. 418 with the East Carolina University (ECU) Brody School of Medicine.
 - b. 1,176 with the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC) Faculty Physicians.
 - c. 14 with the UNC Hospitals Pediatric Clinic.
 - d. 75 with UNC Physicians Network.
 - e. 18 with Chatham Hospital.
- (2) Supplemental payments shall not be made for services provided in Wake County.

The Department of Health and Human Services shall not make any other modifications to the portion of the Medicaid State Plan referenced in this section, except as provided herein.

SECTION 12H.13.(b) Beginning on December 31, 2014, and annually thereafter, UNC and ECU shall submit an annual report based on their preceding fiscal year to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services containing all of the following information for each individual provider for whom this supplemental payment is received:

- (1) For each service provided by the provider and for which the supplemental payment is received, the location where the service was provided, including county, municipality, and zip code.
- (2) The percentage of the provider's total time spent serving Medicaid recipients annually that is for services provided at locations other than the ECU Brody School of Medicine, the Firetower Medical Office, or the UNC School of Medicine.
- (3) The amount of Medicaid reimbursement for each service for which a supplemental payment was made for services provided by the provider.
- (4) On an annual basis, the percentage of the provider's time spent engaging in the following:
 - a. Clinical patient care.
 - b. Teaching.
 - c. Research.
 - d. Other activities.

SECTION 12H.13.(c) Any State plan amendments required to implement this section shall not be subject to the 90-day prior submission requirement of G.S. 108A-54.1A(e).

COST SETTLE NORTH CAROLINA UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS AT SAME RATE AS OTHER HOSPITALS

SECTION 12H.13A. Effective July 1, 2014, the settlement for outpatient Medicaid services performed by UNC Hospitals and Vidant Medical Center, which was previously known as Pitt County Memorial Hospital, shall be done at seventy percent (70%) of costs.

REPEAL SHARED SAVINGS PROGRAM; MAINTAIN CERTAIN RATE REDUCTIONS

SECTION 12H.14.(a) All subsections of Section 12H.18 of S.L. 2013-360, except for subsection (b), are repealed.

SECTION 12H.14.(b) Section 12H.18(b) of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 12H.18.(b) During the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, the Department of Health and Human Services shall ~~withhold~~ reduce by three percent (3%) of the payments for the

1 following services rendered to Medicaid and NC Health Choice recipients on or after January
2 1, 2014:

3 ...
4 ~~Funds from payments withheld under this section that are budgeted to be shared with providers~~
5 ~~shall not revert to the General Fund."~~

6 **SECTION 12H.14.(c)** Effective June 1, 2015, Section 12H.18(b) of S.L. 2013-360,
7 as amended by subsection (b) of this section, reads as rewritten:

8 "**SECTION 12H.18.(b)** During the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, the Department of Health
9 and Human Services shall reduce by three percent (3%) the payments for the following services
10 rendered to Medicaid and NC Health Choice recipients on or after January 1, 2014:

- 11 (1) Inpatient hospital.
- 12 (2) Physician, excluding primary care until January 1, 2015.
- 13 (3) Dental.
- 14 (4) Optical services and supplies.

- 17 (7) Hearing aids.
- 18 (8) Personal care services.
- 19 ~~(9) Nursing homes.~~

22 **SECTION 12H.14.(d)** Consistent with the requirements of the Affordable Care
23 Act, the primary care physicians excluded from the three percent (3%) rate reduction for the
24 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, referenced in Section 12H.18(b) of S.L. 2013-360, are those
25 physicians for whom the Affordable Care Act requires payment at one hundred percent (100%)
26 of the Medicare rate until January 1, 2015.

27 28 **PROVIDER RATE REDUCTION**

29 **SECTION 12H.14A.** Effective January 1, 2015, the Department of Health and
30 Human Services shall reduce by one percent (1.0%) all fee-for-services payments for services
31 rendered to Medicaid and NC Health Choice recipients on or after January 1, 2015, except for
32 inpatient hospital services, home care services other than personal care services, private duty
33 nursing, drugs, dispensing fees, nursing homes, all cost-based providers, services where rates or
34 rate methodologies are set by the federal government or negotiated through a contract, hospice,
35 CAP services, federally qualified health centers, and rural health centers.

36 37 **CASE WEIGHTING FACTOR REDUCTION**

38 **SECTION 12H.14B.** Effective January 1, 2015, the Department of Health and
39 Human Services shall reduce by two and one-tenth percent (2.1%) the diagnosis-related group
40 (DRG) case weighting factors for all DRGs for inpatient services payments rendered to
41 Medicaid and NC Health Choice recipients on or after January 1, 2015. The two and one-tenth
42 percent (2.1%) reduction factor shall be applied uniformly to the case weighting factor assigned
43 to each DRG.

44 45 **PUBLISH MEDICAID PAYMENTS TO PROVIDERS**

46 **SECTION 12H.15.(a)** For payments made in fiscal year 2013-2014 and for
47 subsequent fiscal years, the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical
48 Assistance, shall publish on its Web site comprehensive information on Medicaid payments
49 made to providers. The information shall be updated annually within three months of the close
50 of a State fiscal year to include payments for that fiscal year. The information published shall
51 include all of the following for each individual providing Medicaid services:

- 52 (1) Name of the individual providing the service.
- 53 (2) Location of service provider's principal place of business.
- 54 (3) Location of provided services, listed with both municipality and county. If
55 an individual provides services in multiple locations, then those shall be
56 specified and the items in subdivisions (6) through (10) of this subsection
57 shall be provided for each location.
- 58 (4) Practice name, hospital name, or other business name with which the
59 individual providing service is affiliated.

- 1 (5) Type of service provider and practice area.
- 2 (6) Number of Medicaid patients seen.
- 3 (7) Number of visits with Medicaid patients.
- 4 (8) Number of procedures performed or items furnished for Medicaid patients.
- 5 (9) Amount of Medicaid service payments received.
- 6 (10) Amount of Medicaid supplemental payments received.
- 7 (11) Amount of Medicaid settlement payments received.
- 8 (12) Amount of Medicaid recoupments.

9 The information shall be published in a character-separated values (CSV) plain text format or
10 other file format that may easily be imported into software used for spreadsheets, databases,
11 and data analytics. The Department shall ensure that no protected patient information be
12 published.

13 **SECTION 12H.15.(b)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
14 Medical Assistance, shall begin discussions with the UNC School of Public Health or any other
15 appropriate party of an educational or nonprofit nature to perform analytics on the information
16 or to generate an interactive Web site to access the information contained within the data
17 required to be reported under subsection (a) of this section. Such a Web site should be designed
18 to exceed the functionality of South Carolina's HealthViz Medicaid statistics Web site.

19 **INCREASE HOSPITAL ASSESSMENT RETENTION BY STATE**

20 **SECTION 12H.17.(a)** G.S. 108A-121(8) reads as rewritten:

21 "(8) State's annual Medicaid payment. – For an assessment collected under this
22 Article, an amount equal to ~~twenty five and nine tenths percent (25.9%)~~
23 twenty-eight and eighty-five one hundredths percent (28.85%) of the total
24 amount collected under the assessment."

26 **SECTION 12H.17.(b)** G.S. 108A-128 reads as rewritten:

27 **"§ 108A-128. Payment for providers formerly subject to this Article.**

28 If a hospital provider (i) is exempt from both the equity and UPL assessments under this
29 Article, (ii) makes an intergovernmental transfer (IGT) to the Department of Health and Human
30 Services to be used to draw down matching federal funds, and (iii) has acquired, merged,

32 shall transfer to the State an additional amount, which shall be retained by the State. The

40 **REPEAL PLANNED CCNC PAYMENT OF PMPMS**

41 **SECTION 12H.19.** It is the intent of the General Assembly that the structure of per
42 member per month (PMPM) payments or other payments to providers participating in
43 Community Care of North Carolina (CCNC) programs be considered as a part of any Medicaid
44 reform plan for the State. Therefore, Section 12H.22 of S.L. 2013-360 is repealed.
45

46 **PRIMARY CARE CASE MANAGEMENT FOR DUAL ELIGIBLES**

47 **SECTION 12H.20.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
48 Medical Assistance, shall draft one or more waivers that would expand primary care case
49 management and that are designed to accomplish the following:

- 50 (1) Medicare and Medicaid dual eligibles shall be required to enroll in primary
51 care case management to the maximum extent allowed by the Centers for
52 Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).
- 53 (2) Primary care case management shall be provided for enrolled dual eligibles.
- 54 (3) Primary care case management for dual eligibles with a primary diagnosis of
55 mental illness or intellectual or developmental disability may be
56 administered by the LME/MCOs.

57 The Department may submit drafts of the waivers to the Centers for Medicare and
58 Medicaid Services (CMS) to solicit feedback but shall not submit the waivers for CMS
59 approval until authorized by the General Assembly.

1 **SECTION 12H.20.(b)** No later than March 1, 2015, the Department shall submit
2 to the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services and the Senate
3 Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services a copy of the draft waivers and a
4 report, which shall include the following:

- 5 (1) The anticipated increase in number of dual eligibles that will enroll in
6 primary care case management.
- 7 (2) The costs associated with serving the increased number of enrolled dual
8 eligibles.
- 9 (3) The anticipated savings to the Medicaid program.
- 10 (4) A detailed fiscal analysis supporting any calculation of anticipated savings.

11 **OPTION TO CANCEL CONTRACTS**

12 **SECTION 12H.20A.(a)** During fiscal year 2014-2015, the Department of Health
13 and Human Services and the Division of Medical Assistance shall ensure that any
14 Medicaid-related or NC Health Choice-related State contract entered into after the effective
15 date of this section contains a clause that allows the Department or the Division to terminate the
16 contract without cause upon 30 days' notice. Any contract subject to this section that is entered
17 into on or after the effective date of this section but that lacks such a termination clause shall,
18 nonetheless, be deemed to include such a termination clause and shall be cancellable without
19 cause upon 30 days' notice.

20 **SECTION 12H.20A.(b)** This section is effective when it becomes law.

21 **ADDITIONAL NOTICE ON SPAS**

22 **SECTION 12H.21.(a)** G.S. 108A-54.1A reads as rewritten:

23 **"§ 108A-54.1A. Amendments to Medicaid State Plan and Medicaid Waivers.**

24 ...

25 (d) No fewer than 10 days prior to submitting an amendment to the State Plan to the
26 federal government, the Department shall post the amendment on its Web site and notify the
27 members of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services and the
28 Fiscal Research Division that the amendment has been posted. This requirement shall not apply
29 to draft or proposed amendments submitted to the federal government for comments but not
30 submitted for approval. The amendment shall remain posted on the Department's Web site at
31 least until the plan has been approved, rejected, or withdrawn. If the authority for submitting
32 the amendment to the State Plan is pursuant to subdivision (3), (4), (5), or (6) of subsection (b)
33 of this section, then, prior to submitting an amendment to the federal government, the

48 public notice has been posted. Public notices shall remain posted on the Department's Web
49 site."

50 **SECTION 12H.21.(b)** G.S. 108A-55(c) reads as rewritten:

51 (c) The Department shall reimburse providers of services, equipment, or supplies under
52 the Medical Assistance Program in the following amounts:

- 53 (1) The amount approved by the ~~Health Care Financing Administration~~ Centers
54 for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) of the United States Department
55 of Health and Human Services, if ~~that Administration~~ CMS approves an
56 exact reimbursement ~~amount;~~ amount.

- (2) The amount determined by application of a method approved by the ~~Health Care Financing Administration~~ Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) of the United States Department of Health and Human Services, if ~~that Administration~~ CMS approves the method by which a reimbursement amount is determined, and not the exact amount.

The Department shall establish the methods by which reimbursement amounts are determined in accordance with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes. A change in a reimbursement amount becomes effective as of the date for which the change is approved by the ~~Health Care Financing Administration~~ Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) of the United States Department of Health and Human Services. ~~The Department shall report to the Fiscal Research Division of the Legislative Services Office and to the Senate Appropriations Committee on Human Resources and the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Human Resources or the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services on any change in a reimbursement amount at the same time as it sends out public notice of this change prior to presentation to the Health Care Financing Administration."~~

SECTION 12H.21.(c) By repealing language in subsection (b) of this section related to giving to the General Assembly notice of a public notice, it is not the intent of the General Assembly to remove the required notice of the changes to reimbursement amounts for services, equipment, or supplies. Rather, it is the intent that those notices be given pursuant to G.S. 108A-54.1A(f), rather than pursuant to both G.S. 108A-54.1A(f) and G.S. 108A-55(c).

SECTION 12H.21.(d) This section becomes effective September 1, 2014, and the amendment to G.S. 108A-54.1A(e) applies to State Plan Amendments with effective dates on or after December 1, 2014.

COMPREHENSIVE PROGRAM INTEGRITY CONTRACT

SECTION 12H.22.(a) No later than June 30, 2015, the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall issue a request for proposals (RFP) for one contract for the following program integrity functions:

- (1) Postpayment reviews.
- (2) Data analytics.
- (3) Medical necessity reviews.
- (4) Investigation.
- (5) Recovery Audit Contracts.
- (6) Prepayment review.

SECTION 12H.22.(b) The RFP required by this section shall request proposals that contain at least all the following information:

- (1) Pricing.
- (2) Proposed date contract would begin.
- (3) The bidder's relevant experience.
- (4) The measurable outcomes that would be delivered.
- (5) A description of the results achieved in other states.

SECTION 12H.22.(c) No later than December 31, 2015, the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services detailing the results of the RFP required by this section.

SECTION 12H.22.(d) The Department shall not enter into a contract as a result of the RFP required by this section until authorized by an act of the General Assembly.

SECTION 12H.22.(e) This section shall not apply to program integrity functions performed by LME/MCOs.

CLARIFY NOTICE OF EXTRAPOLATED OVERPAYMENTS

SECTION 12H.26.(a) G.S. 108C-5(i) reads as rewritten:

"(i) Prior to extrapolating the results of any audits, the Department shall demonstrate and inform the provider that (i) the provider failed to substantially comply with the requirements of State or federal law or regulation or (ii) the Department has a credible allegation of fraud concerning the provider. Nothing in the subsection shall be construed to prohibit the Department from identifying the extrapolated overpayment amount in the same notice that meets the requirements of this subsection."

1 **SECTION 12H.26.(b)** G.S. 108C-5 is amended by adding a new subsection to
2 read:

3 "**(t)** Nothing in this Chapter shall be construed to prohibit the Department from utilizing
4 a contractor to send notices to providers on behalf of the Department."

6 **MODIFY MEDICAID APPEALS**

7 **SECTION 12H.27.(a)** G.S. 108C-12(d) reads as rewritten:

10 **SECTION 12H.27.(b)** G.S. 108A-70.9B reads as rewritten:

54 appeals of notices of adverse determination mailed on or after that date and appeals of notices
55 of resolution mailed on or after that date.

57 **RFP FOR IMAGING UTILIZATION MANAGEMENT SERVICES CONTRACT**

58 **SECTION 12H.30.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
59 Medical Assistance, shall issue a request for proposals (RFP) for a contract for imaging

1 utilization management services to ascertain whether the State can achieve better savings with
2 an alternative vendor and, if so, enter into a contract with the alternative vendor. Such an RFP
3 shall incorporate the same requirements as those specified in Section 10.68B of S.L. 2009-451,
4 which was enacted by Section 6 of S.L. 2009-575.

5 **SECTION 12H.30.(b)** No later than March 1, 2015, the Department of Health and

30 **SECTION 12H.33.(b)** Any State plan amendment required to implement this
31 section shall not be subject to the 90-day prior submission requirement of G.S. 108A-54.1A(e).

32 **BOTOX REIMBURSEMENT**

33 **SECTION 12H.33A.** For the Medicaid and NC Health Choice Programs, the
34 provider reimbursement rate for Botox, when provided in accordance with medical coverage
35 policy, shall be the same as the pharmacy reimbursement rate. This section is effective when it
36 becomes law.

37 **REPORT ON PACE PROGRAM**

38 **SECTION 12H.34.(a)** By October 1, 2014, the Department of Health and Human
39 Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall report to the Joint Legislative Oversight
40 Committee on Health and Human Services with the following information on the Program of
41 All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE):

- 42 (1) The number of individuals being served in each of the PACE service areas.
- 43 (2) A description of the program enrollment criteria and enrollment process.
- 44 (3) Detailed figures showing how funding for the program has been spent during
45 the past two fiscal years.
- 46 (4) The per member per month cost of serving individuals through the PACE
47 program compared to the cost of serving individuals in a nursing home.
- 48 (5) An estimate of how many PACE participants would enter a nursing home if
49 they were not enrolled with the PACE program.

50 **SECTION 12H.34.(b)** By January 1, 2015, the Department of Health and Human
51 Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall submit an additional report to the Joint
52 Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services with the following
53 information on the Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE):

- 54 (1) An update on all of the information required by subsection (a) of this
55 section.

- 1 (2) A comparison of North Carolina's PACE program to PACE programs in
2 other states.
- 3 (3) Recommendations for how to make the program sustainable.
4

5 **MEDICAID COUNTY OF ORIGIN**

6 **SECTION 12H.35.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall take
7 measures to address issues arising when Medicaid recipients move residence from one county
8 to another county and from one LME/MCO catchment area to another. The measures shall
9 include the following:

- 10 (1) Reduce administrative burden on intermediate care facilities (ICFs) which
11 contract with more than one LME/MCO.
- 12 (2) Engage the counties to create a plan to resolve issues related to the county of
13 origin for social services and public assistance programs. The plan shall
14 provide for uniform statewide policies for determining county of residence
15 for Medicaid eligibility as well as for other social services and public
16 assistance programs. The North Carolina Association of County
17 Commissioners shall participate in the development of the plan.

18 **SECTION 12H.35.(b)** By February 1, 2015, the Department of Health and Human
19 Services shall report to the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human
20 Services and the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services on the
21 progress of the measures in subsection (a) of this Section. The report shall include the
22 following:

- 23 (1) For the issues related to intermediate care facilities (ICFs) which contract
24 with more than one LME/MCO:
 - 25 a. Identify measures taken to reduce administrative burden.
 - 26 b. Describe the adequacy of the measures taken.
 - 27 c. Identify any additional measures that need to be taken and provide an
28 expected time line for implementation of additional measures.
- 29 (2) For the county of origin issues:
 - 30 a. Report the plan.
 - 31 b. Propose necessary changes to law and policy.
 - 32 c. Identify whether programming changes to NC FAST are needed and
33 provide a detailed explanation of any costs associated with needed
34 changes.
 - 35 d. Provide an estimated time line for implementing the plan.
36

37 **ALIGN ANNUAL MEDICAID BASIC BILLING UNIT LIMITS TO FISCAL YEAR**

38 **SECTION 12H.37.(a)** Beginning July 1, 2015, the Department of Health and
39 Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall require that annual Medicaid billing
40 unit limits for services managed by the LME/MCOs be based upon the fiscal year, provided
41 that this standardization can be accomplished with no net fiscal impact on General Fund
42 appropriations.

43 **SECTION 12H.37.(b)** Any State Plan Amendment required to implement this
44 section shall not be subject to the 90-day prior submission requirement of G.S. 108A-54.1A(e).
45

46 **MEDICAID CONTINGENCY RESERVE**

47 **SECTION 12H.38.(a)** There is established in the General Fund the Medicaid
48 Contingency Reserve. The Office of the State Controller shall reserve from funds available in
49 the General Fund the sum of one hundred eighty-six million three hundred seventy-two
50 thousand six hundred seventy-three dollars (\$186,372,673) in recurring funds to the Medicaid
51 Contingency Reserve. Funds in the Medicaid Contingency Reserve shall be used only for
52 budget shortfalls in the Medicaid Program that occur during the 2014-2015 fiscal year. These
53 funds shall be available for expenditure only upon an appropriation by act of the General
54 Assembly.

55 **SECTION 12H.38.(b)** It is the intent of the General Assembly to appropriate funds
56 from the Medicaid Contingency Reserve only if:

- 57 (1) The Director of the Budget, after the State Controller has verified that
58 receipts are being used appropriately, has found that additional funds are
59 needed to cover a shortfall in the Medicaid budget for the State fiscal year.

1 (2) The Department of Health and Human Services has submitted a State plan
2 amendment to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to delink
3 eligibility for Medicaid from eligibility for State-County Special Assistance,
4 to be effective 90 days after the date of submission of the State plan
5 amendment. At least 45 days prior to submitting that State plan amendment,
6 the Department of Health and Human Services must have submitted a draft
7 of that plan to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and
8 Human Services and, if the General Assembly was not in session, must have
9 consulted with the Committee on that draft.

10 (3) The Director of the Budget has reported immediately to the Fiscal Research
11 Division on the amount of the shortfall found in accordance with subdivision
12 (1) of this subsection. This report shall include an analysis of the causes of
13 the shortfall, such as (i) unanticipated enrollment and mix of enrollment, (ii)
14 unanticipated growth or utilization within particular service areas, (iii) errors
15 in the data or analysis used to project the Medicaid budget, (iv) the failure of
16 the program to achieve budgeted savings, (v) other factors and market trends
17 that have impacted the price of or spending for services, (vi) variations in
18 receipts from prior years or from assumptions used to prepare the Medicaid
19 budget for the current fiscal year, or (vii) other factors. The report shall also
20 include data in an electronic format that is adequate for the Fiscal Research
21 Division to confirm the amount of the shortfall and its causes.

22 **SECTION 12H.38.(c)** Effective 90 days after the State plan amendment is
23 submitted to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) or when CMS approves
24 the State plan amendment, whichever occurs later, eligibility for Medicaid coverage is delinked
25 from eligibility for State-County Special Assistance and recipients of State-County Special
26 Assistance no longer automatically qualify for Medicaid coverage solely because of their
27 receipt of State-County Special Assistance.

28 **SECTION 12H.38.(d)** Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the
29 authority of the Governor to carry out his duties under the Constitution.

30 **SUBPART XII-I. MISCELLANEOUS**

33 **SECTION 12I.1.(a)** G.S. 90-413.3A(b) reads as rewritten:

35 health record system shall connect to the ~~NC HIE~~ HIE Network and submit individual patient
36 demographic and clinical data on services paid for with Medicaid funds, based upon the

40 the HIE Network. At the request of the Director of the Fiscal Research, Bill Drafting, Research,
41 or Program Evaluation Divisions of the General Assembly, the NC HIE shall provide the
42 professional staff of these Divisions with data and information responsive to the Director's
43 request. Prior to providing the General Assembly's staff with any data or information disclosed
44 through the HIE Network pursuant to this subsection, the NC HIE shall redact any personal
45 identifying information in a manner consistent with the standards specified for de-identification
46 of health information under the HIPAA Privacy Rule, 45 C.F.R. 164.15, as amended."

47 **SECTION 12I.1.(b)** G.S. 90-413.3A is amended by adding a new subsection to

The Department shall develop the plan in consultation with the Office of Information Technology Services and the NC HIE and submit the plan to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services and the Fiscal Research Division no later than February 1, 2015.

ESTABLISHMENT OF TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY SUBCOMMITTEE OF THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

SECTION 12I.2.(a) Notwithstanding G.S. 120-208.2(d), the cochairs of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services shall establish a Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) Subcommittee for the purpose of examining all of the following issues:

- (1) Existing TBI services and any deficiencies in service array, quality of services, accessibility, and availability of services across each age group of persons with TBI regardless of the age at which the trauma occurred.
- (2) Current inventory, availability, and accessibility of residential facilities specifically designed to service individuals with TBI.
- (3) Existing TBI-specific service definitions for children and adults who receive services through federally funded programs, including Medicaid, federal block grants, and the Veterans Administration; through State-funded programs, including the Traumatic Brain Injury Trust Fund; through county-funded programs; and through other funding sources, as well as the need for additional or revised service definitions to meet the specific needs of those with TBI.
- (4) Current reimbursement rates tied to settings that treat adults with TBI and the adequacy of these reimbursement rates.
- (5) Current accessibility to TBI services, service information, educational materials, and family resources; and any deficiencies that need to be addressed.
- (6) Current status of TBI-specific screening, assessment, triage, and service referrals for children, adults, and veterans; and any deficiencies that need to be addressed.
- (7) This State's current organizational model for providing comprehensive needs assessment, information management, policy development, service delivery, monitoring, and quality assurance for children and adults with TBI as compared to TBI organizational structures in other states; and specific organizational models to manage services for persons with TBI that are well coordinated for all citizens, including veterans.
- (8) Any other matters related to TBI services for children, adults, veterans, and their families.

SECTION 12I.2.(b) The cochairs of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services shall appoint members to the Traumatic Brain Injury Subcommittee established pursuant to subsection (a) of this section from members of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services.

SECTION 12I.2.(c) The Traumatic Brain Injury Subcommittee established pursuant to subsection (a) of this section shall submit a final report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services no later than December 15, 2014. The Subcommittee shall terminate upon the filing of its final report.

 40 University of North Carolina Health Care System, the term "debt" is

 44 was covered by commercial insurance, Medicaid, Health Choice,
 45 Medicare, Medicare Advantage, a Medicare supplement plan, or any
 46 other government insurance."

SECTION 12I.4.(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, (i) the registration required under G.S. 105A-3 of any agency reauthorized to utilize the collection remedy of debt setoff under this section is not affected by the repeal of the authority under Section 12.1 of S.L. 2013-382 and (ii) the priority of the agency under G.S. 105A-12 is determined based on the registration date of the agency under the initial statutory authority to utilize the collection remedy of debt setoff.

SECTION 12I.4.(d) This section is effective when it becomes law and applies to tax refunds determined by the Department of Revenue on or after that date and to lottery prizes determined by the Lottery Commission on or after that date.

6 these funds.

7 **"SECTION 12J.1.(j)** The sum of six hundred thirty-two thousand four hundred sixteen
8 dollars (\$632,416) appropriated in this section to the Department of Health and Human
9 Services in TANF funds for each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium shall be used to
10 continue support for the Child Welfare Collaborative.

11
12 **"SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT**

13 **"SECTION 12J.1.(k)** The sum of twenty-nine million four hundred twenty-two thousand
14 one hundred thirty-seven dollars (\$29,422,137) appropriated in this section in the Social
15 Services Block Grant to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social
16 Services, for each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, the 2013-2014 fiscal year and the sum
17 of twenty-seven million four hundred twenty-seven thousand fifteen dollars (\$27,427,015)
18 appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block Grant for the 2014-2015 fiscal year
19 shall be used for county block grants. The Division shall certify these funds in the appropriate
20 State-level services based on prior year actual expenditures. The Division has the authority to
21 realign the authorized budget for these funds among the State-level services based on current
22 year actual expenditures.

23 **"SECTION 12J.1.(l)** The sum of one million three hundred thousand dollars (\$1,300,000)
24 appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block Grant to the Department of Health and
25 Human Services, Division of Social Services, for each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium
26 shall be used to support various child welfare training projects as follows:

- 27 (1) Provide a regional training center in southeastern North Carolina.
- 28 (2) Provide training for residential child caring facilities.
- 29 (3) Provide for various other child welfare training initiatives.

30 **"SECTION 12J.1.(m)** The Department of Health and Human Services is authorized,
31 subject to the approval of the Office of State Budget and Management, to transfer Social
32 Services Block Grant funding allocated for departmental administration between divisions that
33 have received administrative allocations from the Social Services Block Grant.

34 **"SECTION 12J.1.(n)** Social Services Block Grant funds appropriated for the Special
35 Childrens Adoption Incentive Fund will require a fifty percent (50%) local match.

36 **"SECTION 12J.1.(o)** The sum of five million forty thousand dollars (\$5,040,000)
37 appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block Grant for each year of the 2013-2015
38 fiscal biennium shall be allocated to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division
39 of Social Services. The Division shall allocate these funds to local departments of social
40 services to replace the loss of Child Protective Services State funds that are currently used by
41 county government to pay for Child Protective Services staff at the local level. These funds
42 shall be used to maintain the number of Child Protective Services workers throughout the State.
43 These Social Services Block Grant funds shall be used to pay for salaries and related expenses
44 only and are exempt from 10A NCAC 71R .0201(3) requiring a local match of twenty-five
45 percent (25%).

46 **"SECTION 12J.1.(p)** The sum of three million eight hundred fifty-two thousand five
47 hundred dollars (\$3,852,500) appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block Grant to
48 the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support,
49 shall be used for DHHS competitive block grants pursuant to Section 12A.2 of this act for each
50 year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium. These funds are exempt from the provisions of 10A
51 NCAC 71R .0201(3).

52 **"SECTION 12J.1.(q)** The sum of three hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$375,000)
53 appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block Grant for each year of the 2013-2015
54 fiscal biennium to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services,
55 shall be used to continue support for the Child Advocacy Centers and are exempt from the
56 provisions of 10A NCAC 71R .0201(3).

57 **"SECTION 12J.1.(r)** The sum of three million nine hundred seventy-eight thousand three
58 hundred sixty dollars (\$3,978,360) appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block
59 Grant for each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium to the Department of Health and Human

1 Services, Divisions of Social Services and Aging and Adult Services, shall be used for
2 guardianship services pursuant to Chapter 35A of the General Statutes. The Department may
3 expend funds appropriated in this section to support (i) existing corporate guardianship
4 contracts during the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 fiscal years and (ii) guardianship contracts
5 transferred to the State from local management entities or managed care organizations during
6 the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 fiscal years.

7 8 **"LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE BLOCK GRANT**

9 **"SECTION 12J.1.(s)** Additional emergency contingency funds received may be allocated
10 for Energy Assistance Payments or Crisis Intervention Payments without prior consultation
11 with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations. Additional funds received
12 shall be reported to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the
13 Fiscal Research Division upon notification of the award. The Department of Health and Human
14 Services shall not allocate funds for any activities, including increasing administration, other
15 than assistance payments, without prior consultation with the Joint Legislative Commission on
16 Governmental Operations.

17 **"SECTION 12J.1.(t)** The sum of fifty million eight hundred seventy-six thousand four
18 hundred forty dollars (\$50,876,440) appropriated in this section in the Low-Income Home
19 Energy Assistance Block Grant for each year of the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium to the
20 Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, shall be used for
21 energy assistance payments for the households of (i) elderly persons age 60 and above with
22 income up to one hundred thirty percent (130%) of the federal poverty level and (ii) disabled
23 persons eligible for services funded through the Division of Aging and Adult Services.

24 County departments of social services shall submit to the Division of Social Services an
25 outreach plan for targeting households with 60-year-old household members no later than
26 August 1 of each year. The outreach plan shall comply with the following:

- 27 (1) Ensure that eligible households are made aware of the available assistance
28 with particular attention paid to the elderly population age 60 and above and
29 disabled persons receiving services through the Division of Aging and Adult

37 38 **"CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT FUND BLOCK GRANT**

39 **"SECTION 12J.1.(u)** Payment for subsidized child care services provided with federal
40 TANF funds shall comply with all regulations and policies issued by the Division of Child
41 Development for the subsidized child care program.

42 **"SECTION 12J.1.(v)** If funds appropriated through the Child Care and Development Fund
43 Block Grant for any program cannot be obligated or spent in that program within the obligation
44 or liquidation periods allowed by the federal grants, the Department may move funds to child
45 care subsidies, unless otherwise prohibited by federal requirements of the grant, in order to use
46 the federal funds fully.

47 48 **"SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT BLOCK GRANT**

49 **"SECTION 12J.1.(v1)** The sum of two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000)
50 appropriated in this section in the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant to
51 the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental
52 Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services, for the 2014-2015 fiscal year shall be allocated to
53 the Department of Administration, Division of Veterans Affairs, to establish a call-in center to
54 assist veterans in locating service benefits and crisis services. The call-in center shall be staffed
55 by certified veteran peers within the Division of Veterans Affairs and trained by the Division of
56 Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services.

57 58 **"MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH BLOCK GRANT**

1 "SECTION 12J.1.(w) If federal funds are received under the Maternal and Child Health
2 Block Grant for abstinence education, pursuant to section 912 of Public Law 104-193 (42
3 U.S.C. § 710), for the 2013-2014 fiscal year or the 2014-2015 fiscal year, then those funds shall
4 be transferred to the State Board of Education to be administered by the Department of Public
5 Instruction. The Department of Public Instruction shall use the funds to establish an abstinence
6 until marriage education program and shall delegate to one or more persons the responsibility
7 of implementing the program and G.S. 115C-81(e1)(4) and (4a). The Department of Public
8 Instruction shall carefully and strictly follow federal guidelines in implementing and
9 administering the abstinence education grant funds.

10 "SECTION 12J.1.(x) The Department of Health and Human Services shall ensure that
11 there will be follow-up testing in the Newborn Screening Program."

14 PLANT SCIENCES RESEARCH AND INNOVATION INITIATIVE

17 the Commissioner to develop jointly with the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at North

20 academic institutions, private companies in the agribusiness and bioscience sectors, the

23 "Plant Sciences Research and Innovation Initiative" and (ii) the sum of two hundred fifty
24 thousand dollars (\$250,000) for a partnership to be known as the "Food Processing Initiative."

25 SECTION 13.1.(b) The Department and North Carolina State University shall
26 jointly submit a copy of the proposal and report on the results of the economic needs
27 assessment to the Chairs of the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on
28 Natural and Economic Resources, the Chairs of the Senate Appropriations Committee on
29 Natural and Economic Resources, the Agriculture and Forestry Awareness Study Commission,
30 and the Fiscal Research Division by January 1, 2015.
31

32 BEDDING LAW ACCOUNT FUND

33 SECTION 13.1A. The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services may use
34 funds from the Bedding Law Account not transferred pursuant to Section 2.2 of this act for the
35 information technology needs of the Structural Pest Control & Pesticides Division of the
36 Department. Any information technology project undertaken by the Department under the
37 authorization granted by this section shall comply with Article 3D of Chapter 147 of the
38 General Statutes. By February 1, 2015, and more frequently as requested, the Department shall
39 report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology and the Fiscal
40 Research Division regarding the implementation of any information technology project
41 undertaken by or on behalf of the Structural Pest Control & Pesticides Division.

44 STATE FAIR ADMISSION

45 SECTION 13.2.(a) G.S. 150B-1(d) is amended by adding a new subdivision to

5 **WATER RESOURCES ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FUNDING**

6 **SECTION 13.3.(a)** G.S. 139-60(c)(3) reads as rewritten:

7 "(3) Establish criteria to allocate funds to local soil and water conservation
8 districts. The criteria shall include the development of agricultural wells."

9 **SECTION 13.3.(b)** This section is effective when it becomes law.

10
11 **"GOT TO BE NC" MARKETING CAMPAIGN TO BE THE OFFICIAL**
12 **AGRICULTURAL MARKETING CAMPAIGN FOR THE STATE**

13 **SECTION 13.4.** G.S. 106-550 reads as rewritten:

14 **"§ 106-550. Policy as to promotion of use of, and markets for, farm products.**

15 (a) It is declared to be in the interest of the public welfare that the North Carolina
16 farmers who are producers of livestock, poultry, seafood, field crops and other agricultural
17 products, including cattle, sheep, broilers, turkeys, commercial eggs, peanuts, cotton, potatoes,

19 bulbs and flowers and other agricultural products having a domestic or foreign market, shall be
20 permitted and encouraged to act jointly and in cooperation with growers, handlers, dealers and
21 processors of such products in promoting and stimulating, by advertising and other methods,
22 the increased production, use and sale, domestic and foreign, of any and all of such agricultural
23 commodities. The provisions of this Article, however, shall not include the agricultural
24 products of tobacco, strawberries, strawberry plants, porcine animals, or equines, with respect
25 to which separate provisions have been made.

26 (b) The "Got to be NC" marketing campaign of the Department of Agriculture and
27 Consumer Services shall be the official agricultural marketing campaign for the State."

28
29 **DACS RESEARCH STATIONS**

30 **SECTION 13.8.** G.S. 106-6.3 reads as rewritten:

31 **"§ 106-6.3. Create special revenue fund for research stations.**

32 The Research Stations Fund is established as a special revenue fund within the Department
33 of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Division of Research Stations. This Fund shall consist
34 of receipts from the sale of commodities produced on the Department's research stations and
35 any gifts, bequests, or grants for the benefit of this Fund. No General Fund appropriations shall
36 be credited to this Fund. Any balance exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000) remaining in

42 **CERTIFICATION OF PRIVATE PESTICIDE APPLICATORS**

43 **SECTION 13.10.(a)** G.S. 143-440(b) reads as rewritten:

44 (b) The Board may include in any such restricted use regulation the time and conditions
45 of sale, distribution, or use of such restricted use pesticides, may prohibit the use of any
46 restricted use pesticide for designated purposes or at designated times; may require the
47 purchaser or user to certify that restricted use pesticides will be used only as labeled or as
48 further restricted by regulation; may require the certification and recertification of private
49 applicators, and charge a fee of up to ten dollars (\$10.00), with the fee set at a level to make the
50 certification/recertification program self-supporting, and, after opportunity for a hearing, may
51 suspend, revoke or modify the certification for violation of any provision of this Article, or any
52 rule or regulation adopted thereunder; may adopt rules to classify private applicators; and may,
53 if it deems it necessary to carry out the provisions of this Part, require that any or all restricted
54 use pesticides shall be purchased, possessed, or used only under permit of the Board and under
55 its direct supervision in certain areas and/or under certain conditions or in certain quantities or
56 concentrations except that any person licensed to sell such pesticides may purchase and possess
57 such pesticides without a permit. The Board may require all persons issued such permits to
58 maintain records as to the use of the restricted use pesticides. The Board may authorize the use
59 of restricted use pesticides by persons licensed under the North Carolina Structural Pest Control

1 Act without a permit. A nonrefundable fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be charged for each
2 examination required by this section. This examination fee is in addition to the certification or
3 recertification fee, and any other fee authorized pursuant to any other provision of Article 4C of
4 Chapter 106 of the General Statutes."

5 **SECTION 13.10.(b)** The Structural Pest Control Committee shall adopt rules
6 regarding ancillary activities that may be performed in association with the control of
7 wood-destroying organisms or household pests as regulated by Article 4C of Chapter 106 of the
8 General Statutes. The rules shall include, at a minimum, the following:

- 9 (1) Specification of the categories of ancillary activities that may be exempted
10 from structural pest control licensing requirements or may be performed by
11 unlicensed persons acting under the direct supervision of a structural pest
12 control licensee. These categories shall include, but not be limited to, the
13 moving of furniture or bedding, as defined in G.S. 106-65.95, and the
14 cleaning, maintenance, or repair of property.
- 15 (2) Provisions allowing persons engaged in exempt ancillary activities or
16 performing ancillary activities under the direct supervision of a certified
17 applicator to be engaged in such activities, whether as an employee,
18 independent contractor, or otherwise, for one or more structural pest control
19 licensees.

20 **SECTION 13.10.(c)** The Structural Pest Control Committee may issue rules
21 pursuant to subsection (b) of this section without complying with the requirements of Article
22 2A of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes. The Committee shall post proposed rules on its
23 Web site within two weeks of the date this act becomes law and provide notice of the rules,
24 along with a citation to this section, to all persons named on the mailing list maintained
25 pursuant to G.S. 150B-21.2(d). The authority to adopt rules without complying with the
26 requirements of Article 2A of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes shall expire on July 1,
27 2016, and the Department shall adopt permanent rules to implement subsection (b) of this
28 section by that date.

30 INCREASE FEES ASSOCIATED WITH NATIONAL POULTRY IMPROVEMENT 31 PLAN

32 **SECTION 13.11.(a)** G.S. 106-543 reads as rewritten:

33 "**§ 106-543. Requirements of ~~national poultry improvement plan~~ National Poultry**

43 fees for certification in the National Poultry Improvement Plan to cover the costs of pullorum
44 testing:

- 47 (2) An annual recertification fee of ten dollars (\$10.00), plus ten cents (10¢) per
48 bird."

28 Agricultural Water Resources Assistance Program to fund projects in the
29 following counties: Avery, Buncombe, Burke, Cherokee, Clay, Graham,
30 Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, Macon, Madison, McDowell, Mitchell,
31 Swain, Transylvania, Watauga, Yancey.
- 32 (2a) Five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the 2014-2015 fiscal year to

35 WNC Communities may use up to fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for

46 **"SECTION 13.3.(b)** Funds allocated under subdivision (1) of subsection (a) of this section
47 shall not be used to acquire ~~land~~ land or purchase conservation easements."

49 **PART XIV. DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES**

50 **AGENCIES REPORT ON FEDERAL GRANTS**

51 **SECTION 14.1.** The Department of Environment and Natural Resources, the
52 Wildlife Resources Commission, the Department of Labor, the Department of Commerce, and
53 the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall review every active federal grant
54 received by the respective departments and report no later than February 1, 2015, to the Chairs
55 of the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Natural and Economic
56 Resources, the Chairs of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Natural and Economic
57 Resources, and the Fiscal Research Division regarding the source and amount of the grant, the
58 match or maintenance of effort required for the grant from State funds, and any conditions,

1 limitations, restrictions, or additional actions or programs the department is required to fulfill or
2 undertake as a result of accepting the grant.

4 **NER FACILITIES AND ADMINISTRATIVE FEES**

5 **SECTION 14.2.** The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, the
6 Department of Commerce, the North Carolina Biotechnology Center, and the Department of
7 Environment and Natural Resources shall negotiate indirect cost waivers with every constituent
8 institution of The University of North Carolina performing State-funded research for the Center
9 or the respective Departments. The waivers shall provide that the Center or the Departments
10 pay facilities and administrative costs at a rate no greater than the lowest rate paid by any other
11 State agency, department, or commission for research at that constituent institution.
12

13 **EFFICIENCIES REPORTING BY NER AGENCIES**

- 23 (2) Positions transferred among divisions, sections, or programs.
- 24 (3) New divisions, sections, and programs established.
- 25 (4) A comparison of the organizational charts before and after the
26 reorganizations or other administrative modifications with each structural
27 change clearly identified.
- 28 (5) A list of divisions, sections, and programs that were unaffected by the
29 reorganizations or other administrative modifications.
- 30 (6) Resulting cost-savings, itemized by funding source.
- 31 (7) An explanation of improvements in the administrative capability of the
32 department to manage its programs and carry out its mission.
- 33 (8) An identification of any obsolete or overlapping activities.

58 **HOUSING PROGRAMS STUDY**

1 **SECTION 14.3.(a)** The Office of State Budget and Management shall study the
2 various programs related to housing conducted by State departments, agencies, and
3 commissions, including the weatherization program of the Department of Environment and
4 Natural Resources. The Office shall include examinations of the following in the study:

- 5 (1) Overlap or duplication between programs and the possible cost-savings or
6 other benefits from the merger of certain housing programs.
- 7 (2) Unmet needs or gaps in the State's housing programs, when compared to

- 9 (3) Any recommendations for changes in housing program governance for

27 Estuarine Water Beach Access Fund established by subsection (a) of this section no later than
28 September 30, 2014.

29 **CAROLINA BEACH STATE PARK MARINA**

30 **SECTION 14.5.(a)** The Department of Environment and Natural Resources,

32 proposals for a sublease to private parties for the operation of the State-owned marina at
33 Carolina Beach State Park. The RFI shall contain sufficient detail to address the following:

- 37 (3) Compliance with State parks system rules and regulations and standards of

It is lastly the intent of the General Assembly that moneys from the Fund also be used to preserve lands that could be used for water supply reservoirs. While the purpose of this Article is to focus on the cleanup and prevention of pollution of the State's surface waters, the establishment of a network of riparian buffers and greenways, and the preservation of property for establishing clean water supplies, the General Assembly believes that the results of these efforts will also be beneficial to wildlife and marine fisheries habitats."~~

 13 and shared facility costs, engineering and design work, plan review, and shared personnel
 14 costs."

 33 completed due to an EPA administrative order.
 - 34 b. The application is deemed complete by the Division and meets the
 35 minimum requirements for the program from which it is seeking
 36 funding.

16 **SECTION 14.19.(a)** G.S. 143-215.73F reads as rewritten:

17 "**§ 143-215.73F. Shallow Draft Navigation Channel Dredging and Lake Dredging**
18 **Maintenance Fund.**

19 The Shallow Draft Navigation Channel Dredging and Lake Dredging-Maintenance Fund is
20 established as a special revenue fund. The Fund consists of fees credited to it under G.S. 75A-3,
21 75A-38, and 105-449.126. Revenue in the Fund may only be used to provide the State's share
22 of the costs associated with any dredging project designed to keep shallow draft navigation
23 channels located in State waters or waters of the state located within lakes navigable and safe-
24 safe, or for aquatic weed control projects in waters of the State located within lakes under
25 Article 15 of Chapter 113A of the General Statutes. Funding for aquatic weed control projects
26 is limited to five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) in each fiscal year. Any project funded
27 by revenue from the Fund must be cost-shared with non-State dollars on a one-to-one
28 basis-basis, provided that the cost-share for a lake located within a component of the State
29 Parks System shall be provided by the Division of Parks and Recreation of the Department of
30 Environment and Natural Resources. The Division of Parks and Recreation may use funds
31 allocated to the State Parks System for capital projects under G.S. 113-44.15 for the cost-share.
32 For purposes of this section, "shallow draft navigation channel" means (i) a waterway
33 connection with a maximum depth of 16 feet between the Atlantic Ocean and a bay or the
34 Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway, (ii) a river entrance to the Atlantic Ocean through which tidal
35 and other currents flow, or (iii) other interior coastal waterways. "Shallow draft navigation
36 channel" includes the Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway and its side channels, Beaufort Harbor,
37 Bogue Inlet, Carolina Beach Inlet, the channel from Back Sound to Lookout Back, channels
38 connected to federal navigation channels, Lockwoods Folly River, Manteo/Shallowbag Bay,
39 including Oregon Inlet, Masonboro Inlet, New River, New Topsail Inlet, Rodanthe, Rollinson,
40 Shallotte River, Silver Lake Harbor, and the waterway connecting Pamlico Sound and Beaufort
41 Harbor."

42 **SECTION 14.19.(b)** G.S. 75A-3(c) reads as rewritten:

43 "(c) The Boating Account is established within the Wildlife Resources Fund created
44 under G.S. 143-250. Interest and other investment income earned by the Account accrues to the
45 Account. All moneys collected pursuant to the numbering and titling provisions of this Chapter
46 shall be credited to this Account. Motor fuel excise tax revenue is credited to the Account
47 under G.S. 105-449.126. The Commission shall use revenue in the Account, subject to the
48 Executive Budget Act and the Personnel Act, for the administration and enforcement of this

50 marking and improvement; and for boating access area acquisition, development, and

53 number fee collected under the numbering provisions of G.S. 75A-5 for boating access area
54 acquisition, development, and maintenance. The Commission shall transfer on a quarterly basis
55 fifty percent (50%) of each one-year certificate of number fee and fifty percent (50%) of each
56 three-year certificate of number fee collected under the numbering provisions of G.S. 75A-5 to
57 the Shallow Draft Navigation Channel Dredging and Lake Dredging-Maintenance Fund
58 established by G.S. 143-215.73F."

16 historical footage or similar footage taken at least 30 days before it is

19 f. It is a talk, game, or awards show or other gala event. For purposes
20 of this exception, an awards show is television programming
21 involving the filming of a ceremony in which individuals, groups, or
22 organizations are given an award.

24 that the production was "Filmed in North Carolina," a logo provided
25 by the North Carolina Film Office, and an acknowledgement of the
26 regional film office responsible for the geographic area in which the

28 company will offer marketing opportunities to be evaluated by the
29 North Carolina Film Office to ensure that they offer promotional

6 of the episodes of the series produced for a single season.
- 7 (6) Production company. – Defined in G.S. 105-164.3.
- 8 (7) Qualifying expenses. – The sum of the amounts listed in this subdivision,
9 substantiated pursuant to subsection (d) of this section, and spent in this
10 State by a production company in connection with a production, less the
11 amount paid in excess of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) to a highly
12 compensated individual.
- 13 a. Goods and services leased or purchased. For goods with a purchase
14 price of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) or more, the amount
15 included in qualifying expenses is the purchase price less the fair
16 market value of the good at the time the production is completed.
17 Goods and services includes the costs of tangible and intangible
18 property used for, and services performed primarily and customarily
19 in, production, including preproduction and postproduction and other
20 direct costs of producing the project in accordance with generally
21 accepted entertainment industry practices. Goods and services
22 exclude costs for development, marketing, and distribution; costs of
23 financing for the production, of bonding related to the production, of
24 production-related insurance coverage obtained on the production;
25 and expenses for insurance coverage purchased from a related
26 member.
- 27 b. Compensation and wages and payments on which withholding
28 payments are remitted to the Department of Revenue under Article
29 4A of Chapter 105 of the General Statutes. Payments made to a
30 loan-out company for services provided in North Carolina shall be
31 subject to gross income tax withholding at the applicable rate under

55 (2) In no event may a physician receive reimbursement in excess of ninety-five
56 percent (95%) of the AWP of the drugs dispensed by a physician, as
57 determined by reference to the original manufacturer's NDC number.

58 (3) A repackaged NDC number may not be used and will not be considered the
59 original manufacturer's NDC number. If a health care provider seeking

1 reimbursement for drugs dispensed by a physician does not include the
2 original manufacturer's NDC number on the bills and reports required by this
3 section, reimbursement shall be limited to one hundred percent (100%) of
4 the AWP of the least expensive clinically equivalent drug, calculated on a
5 per unit basis.

6 (4) No outpatient provider, other than a licensed pharmacy, may receive
7 reimbursement for a Schedule II controlled substance, as defined in
8 G.S. 90-90, or a Schedule III controlled substance, as defined in G.S. 90-91,
9 dispensed in excess of an initial five-day supply, commencing upon the
10 employee's initial treatment following injury. Reimbursement under this
11 subdivision shall be made for the five-day supply at the rates provided in this
12 section.

13 (5) For purposes of this section, the term "clinically equivalent" means a drug
14 has chemical equivalents which, when administered in the same amounts,
15 will provide essentially the same therapeutic effect as measured by the
16 control of a symptom or disease."

"SECTION 15.30.(c) The Center shall comply with the following reporting requirements:

(1) By September 1 of each year, and more frequently as requested, report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Fiscal Research Division on prior State fiscal year program activities, objectives, and accomplishments and prior State fiscal year itemized expenditures and fund sources.

(2) Provide to the Fiscal Research Division a copy of the Center's annual audited financial statement within 30 days of issuance of the statement.

"SECTION 15.30.(d) Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Center, the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2014-2015 fiscal year shall be allocated as follows:

(1) Continued efforts growing the Ag Biotech sector – \$250,000.

(2) Concentrated attention on biodefense cluster effort – \$750,000."

26 **SECTION 15.20.(a)** Upon the Department of Commerce's raising the sum of two
 27 hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) in non-State funds for the study described in subsection
 28 (b) of this section, the Department shall use those funds, together with the sum of two hundred
 29 thousand dollars (\$200,000) in nonrecurring funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
 30 Commerce for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, to conduct the study described in subsection (b) of
 31 this section.

32 **SECTION 15.20.(b)** The Department of Commerce shall, in conjunction with the
 33 Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of Administration, the City of
 34 Morganton, and the County of Burke, use the funds described in subsection (a) of this section
 35 to study potential uses for vacated Broughton Hospital facilities and potential development or
 36 redevelopment of adjoining State-owned properties to ascertain the economic benefits of use,
 37 development, and redevelopment. The study required by this section shall examine all of the

SECTION 15.20.(b) Destination Cleveland County, Inc., shall do the following:

- (1) By September 1 of each year, and more frequently as requested, report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Fiscal Research Division on the Center's prior State fiscal year activities, objectives, and accomplishments and prior State fiscal year itemized expenditures and fund sources.
- (2) Provide to the Fiscal Research Division a copy of the Center's annual audited financial statement within 30 days of issuance of the statement.

PART XVI. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY**SUBPART XVI-A. GENERAL PROVISIONS****GOVERNOR'S CRIME COMMISSION**

SECTION 16A.2. G.S. 143B-1101(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) The Governor's Crime Commission shall review the level of gang activity throughout the State and assess the progress and accomplishments of the State, and of local governments, in preventing the proliferation of gangs and addressing the needs of juveniles who have been identified as being associated with gang activity.

The Governor's Crime Commission shall develop recommendations concerning the establishment of priorities and needed improvements with respect to gang prevention ~~to the General Assembly~~ and shall report those recommendations to the Chairs of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Justice and Public Safety, the Chairs of the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Justice and Public Safety, and to the Chairs of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public Safety on or before March 1 of each year."

LIMITED AUTHORITY TO RECLASSIFY AND ELIMINATE CERTAIN POSITIONS

SECTION 16A.3. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, subject to the approval of the Director of the Budget, the Secretary of the Department of Public Safety may reclassify or eliminate existing positions in the Division of Administration that are not specifically addressed in this act as needed for the efficient operation of the Department. No position shall be reclassified pursuant to this section solely for the purpose of providing a person in that position with a salary increase. The Secretary of the Department of Public Safety shall report any position reclassification undertaken pursuant to this section to the Chairs of the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Justice and Public Safety, the Chairs of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Justice and Public Safety, and the Fiscal Research Division within 30 days of the reclassification. The report shall include the position number, original title, original fund code, original budgeted salary, new title, new fund code, and new budgeted salary for each reclassified position.

SUBPART XVI-B. DIVISION OF LAW ENFORCEMENT**COMPLIANCE WITH CJIS DATA SECURITY STANDARDS**

SECTION 16B.1. The Department of Public Safety shall use funds available to the Division of Law Enforcement to ensure compliance with applicable Federal Bureau of Investigation security standards relating to the access of data in its Criminal Justice Information System. The Department is encouraged to use funds transferred to the State from federal asset forfeiture programs for this purpose.

ABC PERMIT FEE INCREASE

SECTION 16B.2.(a) G.S. 18B-903 reads as rewritten:

"§ 18B-903. Duration of permit; renewal and transfer.

(b) Renewal. – Application for renewal of an ABC permit shall be on a form provided by the Commission. An application for renewal shall be accompanied by an application fee of ~~twenty five percent (25%) of the original application fee set in G.S. 18B-902, fee.~~ The application fee shall be the same amount as the initial fee set in G.S. 18B-902, except that the renewal application fee for each wine shop permit shall be five hundred dollars (\$500.00), and the renewal application fee for each mixed beverages permit and each guest room cabinet permit shall be ~~seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00), one thousand dollars (\$1,000).~~ A renewal fee shall not be refundable.

(b1) Registration. – Each person holding a malt beverage, fortified wine, or unfortified wine permit issued pursuant to G.S. 18B-902(d)(1) through G.S. 18B-902(d)(6) shall register by May 1 of each year on a form provided by the Commission, in order to provide information needed by the State in enforcing this Chapter and to support the costs of that enforcement. The registration required by this subsection shall be accompanied by an annual registration and inspection fee of ~~two hundred dollars (\$200.00)~~ four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for each permit held. The fee shall be paid by May 1 of each year. A registration fee shall not be refundable. Failure to pay the annual registration and inspection fee shall result in revocation of the permit.

SECTION 16B.2.(b) This section applies to fees assessed or collected for permits issued or renewed on or after July 1, 2014.

SECTION 16B.3.(a) G.S. 166A-21 reads as rewritten:

"§ 166A-21. Definitions.

(1) Department. – The Department of Public Safety.

(2) Division. – The Division of Emergency Management.

(1)(3) ~~"Hazardous materials emergency response team" or "hazmat team" means an~~ Hazardous materials emergency response team or hazmat team. – An organized group of persons specially trained and equipped to respond to and control actual or potential leaks or spills of hazardous materials.

(2)(4) ~~"Hazardous material" means any Hazardous material.~~ – Any material defined as a hazardous substance under 29 Code of Federal Regulations § 1910.120(a)(3).

(3)(5) ~~"Hazardous materials incident" or "hazardous materials emergency" means an~~ Hazardous materials incident or hazardous materials emergency. – An uncontrolled release or threatened release of a hazardous substance requiring outside assistance by a local fire department or hazmat team to contain and control.

(4)(6) ~~"Regional response team" means a Regional response team.~~ – A hazmat team under contract with the State to provide response to hazardous materials emergencies occurring outside the hazmat team's local jurisdiction at the direction of the Department of Public Safety, Division of Emergency Management.

(5)(7) ~~"Secretary" means the Secretary.~~ – The Secretary of the Department of Public Safety.

(6)(8) ~~"Technician level entry capability" means the Technician-level entry~~ capability. – The capacity of a hazmat team, in terms of training and equipment as specified in 29 Code of Federal Regulations § 1910.120, to respond to a hazardous materials incident requiring affirmative measures, such as patching, plugging, or other action necessary to stop and contain the release of a hazardous substance at its source.

(7)(9) ~~"Terrorist incident" means activities~~ Terrorist incident. – Activities that occur within the territorial jurisdiction of the United States, involve acts dangerous to human life that are a violation of the criminal laws of the United States or of any state, and are intended to do one of the following:

a. Intimidate or coerce a civilian population.

- 1 b. Influence the policy of a government by intimidation or coercion.
2 c. Affect the conduct of a government by mass destruction,
3 assassination, or kidnapping."

4 **SECTION 16B.3.(b)** Article 2 of Chapter 166A of the General Statutes is amended

28 (b) Annual Fee Shall Be Charged. – A person required under Section 302 or 312 of
29 EPCRA to submit a notification or an annual inventory form to the Division shall be required to
30 pay to the Department an annual fee in the amount set forth in subsection (c) of this section.

31 (c) Amount of Fee. – The amount of the annual fee charged pursuant to subsection (b)
32 of this section shall be calculated in accordance with the following, up to a maximum annual
33 amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000):

- 34 (1) A fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) shall be assessed for each substance reported
35 by a facility that is classified as a hazardous chemical.

6 materials emergencies and terrorist incidents.
7 (3) To provide grants to counties for hazardous materials emergency response

10 an additional hazmat team to serve Lee and Moore Counties and shall use proceeds from fees
11 assessed and collected pursuant to G.S. 166A-29.1 to ensure that the hazardous materials
12 emergency response capabilities in Moore and Lee Counties are sufficient to respond to any
13 hazardous materials emergencies occurring in those counties as a result of natural gas
14 exploration and extraction.

31 funds available to the Division of Law Enforcement to purchase mobile VIPER radios for the
32 State Highway Patrol. The Department is encouraged to use funds transferred to the State from

DETER INMATE ACCESS TO CELL PHONES

SECTION 16C.9. The Department of Public Safety, Division of Adult Correction, may use funds available to fund enhanced prison security technology to deter illegal access of cell phones by inmates in the State's prison system. The Division of Adult Correction is encouraged to identify non-General Fund sources of funds, including federal and foundation grants and other receipts, to achieve this purpose.

USE OF CLOSED FACILITIES

SECTION 16C.10. Section 16A.3 of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 16A.3. In conjunction with the closing of prison facilities, youth detention centers, and youth development centers, the Department of Public Safety shall consult with the county or municipality in which the facility is located, with the elected State and local officials, and with State and federal agencies about the possibility of converting that facility to other use. The Department may also consult with any private for-profit or nonprofit firm about the possibility of converting the facility to other use. In developing a proposal for future use of each facility, the Department shall give priority to converting the facility to other criminal justice use. Consistent with existing law and the future needs of the Department of Public Safety, the State may provide for the transfer or the lease of any of these facilities to counties, municipalities, State agencies, federal agencies, or private firms wishing to convert them to other use. The Department of Public Safety may also consider converting some of the facilities recommended for closing from one security custody level to another, where that conversion would be cost-effective. A prison unit under lease to a county pursuant to the provisions of this section for use as a jail is exempt for the period of the lease from any of the minimum standards adopted by the Secretary of Health and Human Services pursuant to G.S. 153A-221 for the housing of adult prisoners that would subject the unit to greater standards than those required of a unit of the State prison system.

In addition, the Department of Public Safety may use available funds to reopen and convert closed facilities for use as treatment and behavior modification facilities for offenders serving a period of confinement in response to violation pursuant to G.S. 15A-1344(d2)."

JUSTICE REINVESTMENT ACT/LIMITED AUTHORITY TO RECLASSIFY VACANT POSITIONS

SECTION 16C.11. Section 16C.13 of S.L. 2013-360 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 16C.13.(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, subject to the approval of the Director of the Budget, the Secretary of Public Safety may reclassify vacant positions within the Department to create up to 30 new field services specialist or chief probation/parole officer positions in order to meet the increasing caseloads resulting from the implementation of the Justice Reinvestment Act of 2011, S.L. 2011-192, as amended. However, no position shall be reclassified pursuant to this section solely for the purpose of providing a person in that position with a salary increase.

"SECTION 16C.13.(b) The Department of Public Safety shall report to the Chairs of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Justice and Public Safety and the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Justice and Public Safety by ~~March 1, 2014,~~ March 1, 2015, on the following:

- (1) The position number, position type, salary, and position location of each new position created under the authority of this section.
- (2) The position number, position type, fund code, and position location of each vacant position used to create new positions under the authority of this section."

STATE COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS ADVISORY BOARD APPOINTMENT

SECTION 16C.12. G.S. 143B-1157 reads as rewritten:

"§ 143B-1157. State Community Corrections Advisory Board.

(a) The State Board shall act as an advisory body to the Secretary with regard to this Subpart. The State Board shall consist of ~~23~~22 members as follows, to be appointed as provided in subsection (b) of this section:

- (1) A member of the Senate.
- (2) A member of the House of Representatives.
- (3) A judge of the superior court.

- (4) A judge of the district court.
 - (5) A district attorney.
 - (6) A criminal defense attorney.
 - (7) A county sheriff.
 - (8) A chief of a city police department.
 - (9) Two county commissioners, one from a predominantly urban county and one from a predominantly rural county.
 - (10) A representative of an existing community-based corrections program.
 - (11) A member of the public who has been the victim of a crime.
 - (12) ~~Two rehabilitated ex-offenders.~~ A rehabilitated ex-offender.
 - (13) A member of the business community.
 - (14) Three members of the general public, one of whom is a person recovering from chemical dependency or who is a previous consumer of substance abuse treatment services.
 - (15) A victim service provider.
 - (16) A member selected from each of the following service areas: mental health, substance abuse, and employment and training.
 - (17) A clerk of superior court.
- (b) The membership of the State Board shall be selected as follows:
- (1) The Governor shall appoint the following members: the county sheriff, the chief of a city police department, the member of the public who has been the victim of a crime, ~~at~~ the rehabilitated ex-offender, and the members selected from each of the service areas.
 - (2) The Lieutenant Governor shall appoint the following members: the member of the business community, one member of the general public who is a person recovering from chemical dependency or who is a previous consumer of substance abuse treatment services, and the victim service provider.
 - (3) The Chief Justice of the North Carolina Supreme Court shall appoint the following members: the superior court judge, the district court judge, the district attorney, the clerk of superior court, the criminal defense attorney, and the representative of an existing community-based corrections program.
 - (4) The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint the following members: the member of the Senate, the county commissioner from a predominantly urban county, and one member of the general public.
 - (5) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint the following members: the member of the House of Representatives, the county commissioner from a predominantly rural county, and one member of the general public.

In appointing the members of the State Board, the appointing authorities shall make every effort to ensure fair geographic representation of the State Board membership and to ensure that minority persons and women are fairly represented.

(c) The initial members shall serve staggered terms; one-third shall be appointed for a term of one year, one-third shall be appointed for a term of two years, and one-third shall be appointed for a term of three years. The members identified in subdivisions (1) through (7) of subsection (a) of this section shall be appointed initially for a term of one year. The members identified in subdivisions (8) through (13) in subsection (a) of this section shall be appointed initially for a term of two years. The members identified in subdivisions (14) through (16) of subsection (a) of this section shall each be appointed for a term of three years. The additional member identified in subdivision (17) in subsection (a) of this section shall be appointed initially for a term of three years.

At the end of their respective terms of office their successors shall be appointed for terms of three years. A vacancy occurring before the expiration of the term of office shall be filled in the same manner as original appointments for the remainder of the term. Members may be reappointed without limitation.

(d) Each appointing authority shall have the power to remove a member it appointed from the State Board for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance.

(e) The members of the State Board shall, within 30 days after the last initial appointment is made, meet and elect one member as Chair and one member as Vice-Chair.

1 (f) The State Board shall meet at least quarterly and may also hold special meetings at
2 the call of the Chair. For purposes of transacting business, a majority of the membership shall
3 constitute a quorum.

4 (g) Any member who has an interest in a governmental agency or unit or private
5 nonprofit agency which is applying for a Treatment for Effective Community Supervision
6 Program contract or which has received a contract and which is the subject of an inquiry or
7 vote by a contract oversight committee, shall publicly disclose that interest on the record and
8 shall take no part in discussion or have any vote in regard to any matter directly affecting that
9 particular grant applicant or grantee. "Interest" in a grant applicant or grantee means a formal
10 and direct connection to the entity, including, but not limited to, employment, partnership,

 25 sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) to be remitted to the Department of

 27 cases in which, as part of the investigation leading to the defendant's
 28 conviction, the laboratories have performed DNA analysis of the crime, tests
 29 of bodily fluids of the defendant for the presence of alcohol or controlled
 30 substances, or analysis of any controlled substance possessed by the
 31 defendant or the defendant's agent.

32 (8) For the services of any crime laboratory facility operated by a local
 33 government or group of local governments, the district or superior court
 34 judge shall, upon conviction, order payment of the sum of six hundred
 35 dollars (\$600.00) to be remitted to the general fund of the local

 47 under contract with a prosecutorial district, the district or superior court
 48 judge shall, upon conviction, order payment of the sum of six hundred

 50 General Court of Justice. The cost shall be assessed only in cases in which,
 51 as part of the investigation leading to the defendant's conviction, the

 40 for Certain Challenges to State Laws.

41 **§ 1-267.1. Three-judge panel for actions challenging plans apportioning or redistricting**
 42 **State legislative or congressional districts; districts; claims challenging the facial**
 43 **validity of an act of the General Assembly.**

44 (a) Any action challenging the validity of any act of the General Assembly that
 45 apportions or redistricts State legislative or congressional districts shall be filed in the Superior
 46 Court of Wake County and shall be heard and determined by a three-judge panel of the
 47 Superior Court of Wake County organized as provided by subsection (b) of this section.

48 (a1) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (a) of this section, any facial challenge
 49 to the validity of an act of the General Assembly shall be transferred pursuant to G.S. 1A-1,
 50 Rule 42(b)(4), to the Superior Court of Wake County and shall be heard and determined by a
 51 three-judge panel of the Superior Court of Wake County, organized as provided by subsection
 52 (b2) of this section.

53 (b) Whenever any person files in the Superior Court of Wake County any action
 54 challenging the validity of any act of the General Assembly that apportions or redistricts State
 55 legislative or congressional districts, a copy of the complaint shall be served upon the senior
 56 resident superior court judge of Wake County, who shall be the presiding judge of the

57 G.S. 1-267.1(a1) and G.S. 1-1A, Rule 42(b)(4), claims described in this subsection that are
58 filed or raised in courts other than Wake County Superior Court or that are filed in Wake
59 County Superior Court shall be transferred to a three-judge panel of the Wake County Superior

1 Court if, after all other questions of law in the action have been resolved, a determination as to
2 the facial validity of an act of the General Assembly must be made in order to completely
3 resolve any issues in the case.

4 (b) Any action brought concerning an act of the General Assembly apportioning or
5 redistricting the State legislative or congressional districts shall be filed in the Superior Court of
6 Wake County."

7 **SECTION 18B.16.(c)** G.S. 1A-1, Rule 42, reads as rewritten:

8 **"Rule 42. Consolidation; separate trials.**

9 (a) Consolidation. – Except as provided in subdivision (b)(2) of this section, when
10 actions involving a common question of law or fact are pending in one division of the court, the
11 judge may order a joint hearing or trial of any or all the matters in issue in the actions; he may
12 order all the actions consolidated; and he may make such orders concerning proceedings
13 therein as may tend to avoid unnecessary costs or delay. When actions involving a common
14 question of law or fact are pending in both the superior and the district court of the same
15 county, a judge of the superior court in which the action is pending may order all the actions
16 consolidated, and he may make such orders concerning proceedings therein as may tend to
17 avoid unnecessary costs or delay.

18 (b) Separate trials. –

19 (1) The court may in furtherance of convenience or to avoid prejudice and shall
20 for considerations of venue upon timely motion order a separate trial of any
21 claim, cross-claim, counterclaim, or third-party claim, or of any separate
22 issue or of any number of claims, cross-claims, counterclaims, third-party
23 claims, or issues.

24 (2) Upon motion of any party in an action that includes a claim commenced
25 under Article 1G of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes involving a managed
26 care entity as defined in G.S. 90-21.50, the court shall order separate
27 discovery and a separate trial of any claim, cross-claim, counterclaim, or
28 third-party claim against a physician or other medical provider.

29 (3) Upon motion of any party in an action in tort wherein the plaintiff seeks
30 damages exceeding one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000), the court
31 shall order separate trials for the issue of liability and the issue of damages,
32 unless the court for good cause shown orders a single trial. Evidence relating
33 solely to compensatory damages shall not be admissible until the trier of fact
34 has determined that the defendant is liable. The same trier of fact that tries
35 the issues relating to liability shall try the issues relating to damages.

37 General Assembly, other than a challenge to plans apportioning or

41 court in this State, or if such a challenge is raised by the defendant in the
42 defendant's answer, responsive pleading, or within 30 days of filing the
43 defendant's answer or responsive pleading. In that event, the court shall, on
44 its own motion, transfer that portion of the action challenging the validity of
45 the act of the General Assembly to the Superior Court of Wake County for
46 resolution by a three-judge panel if, after all other matters in the action have
47 been resolved, a determination as to the facial validity of an act of the
48 General Assembly must be made in order to completely resolve any matters
49 in the case. The court in which the action originated shall maintain
50 jurisdiction over all matters other than the challenge to the act's facial
51 validity and shall stay all matters that are contingent upon the outcome of the
52 challenge to the act's facial validity pending a ruling on that challenge and
53 until all appeal rights are exhausted. Once the three-judge panel has ruled
54 and all appeal rights have been exhausted, the matter shall be transferred or
55 remanded to the three-judge panel or the trial court in which the action
56 originated for resolution of any outstanding matters, as appropriate."

58 **"Rule 62. Stay of proceedings to enforce a judgment.**

1 (a) Automatic stay; exceptions – Injunctions and receiverships. – Except as otherwise

16 giving notice of appeal from the judgment had not expired before a stay under this subsection
17 was entered, that time shall begin to run immediately upon the expiration of any stay under this
18 section, and no execution shall issue nor shall proceedings be taken for enforcement of the
19 judgment until the expiration of that time.

20 (c) Injunction pending appeal. – When an appeal is taken from an interlocutory or final
21 judgment granting, dissolving, or denying an injunction, the court in its discretion may
22 suspend, modify, restore, or grant an injunction during the pendency of the appeal upon such
23 terms as to bond or otherwise as it considers proper for the security of the rights of the adverse
24 party.

25 (d) Stay upon appeal. – When an appeal is taken, the appellant may obtain a stay of
26 execution, subject to the exceptions contained in section (a), by proceeding in accordance with
27 and subject to the conditions of G.S. 1-289, G.S. 1-290, G.S. 1-291, G.S. 1-292, G.S. 1-293,
28 G.S. 1-294, and G.S. 1-295.

29 When stay is had by giving supersedeas bond, the bond may be given at or after the time of
30 filing the notice of appeal or of procuring the order allowing the appeal as the case may be, and
31 stay is then effective when the supersedeas bond is approved by the court.

32 (e) Stay in favor of North Carolina, city, county, local board of education, or agency
33 thereof. – When an appeal is taken by the State of North Carolina, or a city or a county thereof,
34 a local board of education, or an officer in his official capacity or agency thereof or by direction
35 of any department or agency of the State of North Carolina or a city or county thereof or a local
36 board of education and the operation or enforcement of the judgment is stayed, no bond,
37 obligation, or other security shall be required from the appellant.

38 (f) Power of appellate court not limited. – The provisions of this rule do not limit any
39 power of an appellate court or of a judge or justice thereof to stay proceedings during the
40 pendency of an appeal or to suspend, modify, restore, or grant an injunction during the
41 pendency of an appeal or to make any order appropriate to preserve the status quo or the
42 effectiveness of the judgment subsequently to be entered.

43 (g) Stay of judgment as to multiple claims or multiple parties. – When a court has
44 ordered a final judgment under the conditions stated in Rule 54(b), the court may stay
45 enforcement of that judgment until the entering of a subsequent judgment or judgments and
46 may prescribe such conditions as are necessary to secure the benefit thereof to the party in
47 whose favor the judgment is entered.

48 (h) Right to immediate interlocutory appeal of order granting or denying injunctive
49 relief in as-applied constitutional challenge. – Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a
50 party shall have the right of immediate appeal (i) from an adverse ruling by a trial court
51 granting or denying interlocutory, temporary, or permanent injunctive or declaratory relief
52 restraining the State or a political subdivision of the State from enforcing the operation or
53 execution of an act of the General Assembly as applied against a party in a civil action or (ii)
54 from an adverse ruling by a trial court denying a motion to stay an injunction restraining the
55 State or a political subdivision of the State from enforcing the operation or execution of an act
56 of the General Assembly as applied against a party in a civil action. This subsection only
57 applies where the State or a political subdivision of the State is a party in the civil action. This
58 subsection does not apply to facial challenges heard by a three-judge panel pursuant to G.S. 1-
59 267.1."

1 **SECTION 18B.16.(e)** G.S. 7A-27 reads as rewritten:
2 "**§ 7A-27. Appeals of right from the courts of the trial divisions.**

4 (a1) Appeal lies of right directly to the Supreme Court from any order or judgment of a
5 court, either final or interlocutory, that holds that an act of the General Assembly is facially
6 invalid on the basis that the act violates the North Carolina Constitution or federal law. Nothing
7 in this section shall be deemed to apply to appeals from orders of the trial courts pertaining to
8 criminal proceedings, to proceedings under Chapter 15A of the General Statutes, to
9 proceedings making a collateral attack on any judgment entered in a criminal proceeding, or to
10 appeals from orders of the trial courts pertaining to civil proceedings filed by a taxpayer
11 pursuant to G.S. 105-241.17.

12 (b) Appeal lies of right directly to the Court of Appeals in any of the following cases:

- 13 (1) From any final judgment of a superior court, other than the one described in
14 subsection (a) of this section, or one based on a plea of guilty or nolo
15 contendere, including any final judgment entered upon review of a decision
16 of an administrative agency, except for a final judgment entered upon review
17 of a court martial under G.S. 127A-62.
- 18 (2) From any final judgment of a district court in a civil action.
- 19 (3) From any interlocutory order or judgment of a superior court or district court
20 in a civil action or proceeding which does any of the following:
21 a. Affects a substantial right.
22 b. In effect determines the action and prevents a judgment from which
23 an appeal might be taken.
24 c. Discontinues the action.
25 d. Grants or refuses a new trial.
26 e. Determines a claim prosecuted under G.S. 50-19.1.

42 **LEGAL AID REPORT**

43 **SECTION 18B.17.** As a condition of continued receipt of funding through revenue
44 from court fees, Legal Aid of North Carolina shall report quarterly beginning October 1, 2014,
45 to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Committees and the
46 Fiscal Research Division. The report shall include the cases in the public record in which Legal
47 Aid has appeared as counsel, including a description of the type of case and its ongoing status.
48 The report shall also provide sufficiently detailed information about the focus of investigations
49 and the ways in which resources are being expended, to the extent permissible under the law, to
50 demonstrate that funds provided under the Access to Civil Justice Act are being used within the
51 eligibility limitations of G.S. 7A-474.3. This portion of the report detailing investigations and
52 use of resources shall also include a list of all site visits conducted by Legal Aid personnel,
53 with sufficient information even in the case of confidential information to identify the nature of
54 the visit and the type of site visited. Finally, the report shall describe Legal Aid's efforts to
55 more effectively bring legal services to North Carolina.

58 **PART XIX. DEPARTMENT OF CULTURAL RESOURCES**

CAP GRANTS FROM STATE AID TO LIBRARIES FUND

SECTION 19.2. The Department of Cultural Resources shall not allocate a grant to any municipal or single-county library from the Aid to Public Libraries Fund that exceeds four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) for the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

QUEEN ANNE'S REVENGE PROJECT SPECIAL FUND

SECTION 19.4. Part 1 of Article 2 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 143B-53.3. Queen Anne's Revenge Project.

(a) Fund. – The Queen Anne's Revenge Project Special Fund is created as a special, interest-bearing revenue fund within the Department of Cultural Resources, Office of Archives and History. The Fund shall consist of all receipts derived from private donations, grant funds, and earned revenue. The monies in the Fund may be used only for contracted services, personal services and operations, conference and meeting expenses, travel, staff salaries, operations for laboratory needs, museum exhibits, and other administrative costs related to the Queen Anne's Revenge Project. The staff of the Office of Archives and History and the Department of Cultural Resources shall determine how the funds will be used for the purposes of the Queen Anne's Revenge Project, and those funds are hereby appropriated for those purposes.

(b) Application. – This section applies to the Queen Anne's Revenge, the historic shipwreck owned by the State and managed by the Department of Cultural Resources, Office of Archives and History.

(c) Reports. – The Department of Cultural Resources shall submit a report by September 30 of each year to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on General Government, the Senate Appropriations Committee on General Government and Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research Division. This report shall include the source and amount of all funds credited to the Fund and the purpose and amount of all expenditures from the Fund during the prior fiscal year."

EXEMPT DCR FROM OPERATING RULES REQUIREMENTS RELATED TO HISTORIC SITES AND MUSEUMS

SECTION 19.5.(a) G.S. 121-7.3 reads as rewritten:

"§ 121-7.3. Admission and related activity fees-~~fees~~ and operating hours.

The Department of Cultural Resources may charge a reasonable admission and related activity fee to any historic site or museum administered by the Department. Admission and related activity fees collected under this section are receipts of the Department and shall be deposited in the appropriate special fund. The revenue collected pursuant to this section shall be used only for the individual historic site or museum where the receipts were generated. The Secretary may adopt rules necessary to carry out the provisions of this section. The Department is exempt from the requirements of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes and G.S. 12-3.1 when adopting, amending, or repealing rules for operating hours and admission fees or related activity fees at historic sites and museums. The Department shall submit a report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on the amount and purpose of a fee change within 30 days following its effective date."

SECTION 19.5.(b) G.S. 143B-71 reads as rewritten:

"§ 143B-71. Tryon Palace Commission – creation, powers and duties.

There is hereby created the Tryon Palace Commission of the Department of Cultural Resources with the power and duty to adopt, amend and rescind rules and regulations concerning the restoration and maintenance of the Tryon Palace complex, and other powers and duties as provided in Article 2 of Chapter 121 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, including the authority to charge reasonable admission and related activity fees. The Commission is exempt from the requirements of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes and G.S. 12-3.1 when adopting, amending, or repealing rules for operating hours and admission fees or related activity fees at Tryon Palace Historic Sites and Gardens. The Commission shall submit a report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on the amount and purpose of a fee change within 30 days following its effective date."

SECTION 19.5.(c) G.S. 143B-73 reads as rewritten:

"§ 143B-73. U.S.S. North Carolina Battleship Commission – creation, powers, and duties.

1 There is hereby created the U.S.S. North Carolina Battleship Commission of the
2 Department of Cultural Resources with the power and duty to adopt, amend, and rescind rules
3 and regulations under and not inconsistent with the laws of this State necessary in carrying out
4 the provisions and purposes of this Part.

6 (3) The Commission shall adopt rules and regulations consistent with the
7 provisions of this Chapter. The Commission is exempt from the

11 Commission shall submit a report to the Joint Legislative Commission on

15 **SECTION 19.6.** The Department of Cultural Resources, Division of History
16 Museums, shall not close the Mountain Gateway Museum during the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

18 **SECTION 19.7.** In the development of the 2015-2017 biennial continuation
19 budget, the Office of State Budget and Management shall restore various underfunded accounts
20 for Archives and Records, Historic Preservation, and Personal Services within the Department
21 of Cultural Resources.

Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to limit the Auditor's authority under subdivision (1) of this subsection.

(20) Whenever the Auditor believes that information received or collected by the Auditor may be evidence of criminal misconduct, the Auditor shall report that information to either the State Bureau of Investigation or the District Attorney for the county where the alleged misconduct occurred. Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to limit the Auditor's authority under subdivision (1) of this subsection.

PART XXVI. DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

MODIFY TAX LOCATOR SERVICES CAP

SECTION 26.1. G.S. 105-243.1(e) reads as rewritten:

The proceeds of the fee may not be used for any purpose that is not directly and primarily related to collecting overdue tax debts. The Department may apply the proceeds of the fee for the purposes listed in this subsection. The remaining proceeds of the fee may be spent only pursuant to appropriation by the General Assembly. The fee proceeds do not revert but remain in the special account until spent for the costs of collecting overdue tax debts. The Department and the Office of State Budget and Management must account for all expenditures using accounting procedures that clearly distinguish costs allocable to collecting overdue tax debts from costs allocable to other purposes and must demonstrate that none of the fee proceeds are used for any purpose other than collecting overdue tax debts.

The Department may apply the fee proceeds for the following purposes:

...

(3) To pay for taxpayer ~~locator~~-locator services, not to exceed ~~five hundred thousand~~ three hundred fifty thousand dollars ~~(\$500,000)~~ (\$350,000) a year.

...."

15 section 42 of the Code. The Agency shall take into consideration all eligible sources of funding
16 for each development project, including whether there are other eligible sources of funding
17 available for the development project. No loan made to a taxpayer under this section shall
18 exceed one million dollars (\$1,000,000) if the low-income housing development is located in a
19 low-income county, as designated by the Agency; seven hundred fifty thousand dollars

- 10 (4) Highway Maintenance Improvement Program Needs Assessment. – A report
11 of the amount of funds needed, the number of affected lane miles, and the
12 percentage of the primary and secondary system roads that are rated to need
13 a resurfacing or pavement preservation treatment within the Highway
14 Maintenance Improvement Program's three-year time period but are not
15 programmed due to funding constraints.
- 16 (5) Microsurfacing treatment. – A type of pavement preservation treatment that
17 involves mixing fine aggregate, asphalt emulsion, minerals, water, and a
18 polymer additive, and applying the mixture to the roadway.
- 19 (6) Pavement preservation treatment. – Includes full-width surface treatments
20 used to extend or renew the pavement life.
- 21 (7) Rehabilitation. – A contract resurfacing maintenance program that involves
22 applying multiple layers of pavement that exceed two inches.
- 23 (8) Resurfacing. – A contract resurfacing program that involves applying one
24 layer that does not exceed two inches of pavement.
- 25 (9) Slurry seal treatment. – A type of pavement preservation treatment that
26 involves mixing fine aggregate, asphalt emulsion, minerals, and water, and
27 applying the mixture to the roadway.

28 (b) Road Quality Improvement of Pavement Preservation Treatments. – It is the intent
29 of the General Assembly that (i) the Department use asphalt pavement preservation treatments
30 that are high-quality, long-lasting, and provide a smooth road surface and (ii) the Department
31 increase its contractual use of pavement preservation treatments.

32 (c) Highway Maintenance Improvement Program. – After the annual inspection of
33 roads within the State highway system, each highway division shall determine and report to the
34 Chief Engineer on the need for rehabilitation, resurfacing, or pavement preservation treatments.
35 The Chief Engineer shall establish a three-year priority list for each highway division based on
36 the Chief Engineer's estimate of need. In addition, the Chief Engineer shall establish a
37 three-year improvement schedule, sorted by county, for rehabilitation, resurfacing, and
38 pavement preservation treatment activities. The schedule shall be based on the amount of funds
39 appropriated to the contract resurfacing program and the pavement preservation program in the
40 fiscal year preceding the issuance of the Highway Maintenance Improvement Program for all
41 three years of the Highway Maintenance Improvement Program. State funding for the Highway
42 Maintenance Improvement Program shall be limited to funds appropriated from the State
43 Highway Fund.

44 (d) Contract Maintenance Resurfacing Program Letting Schedule. – Beginning in the

46 the General Assembly to the Department for the contract maintenance resurfacing program, the

49 (e) Single Chip Seal Treatment Prohibited on Subdivision Streets and Access Routes. –
50 Except as authorized in subsection (f) of this section, and unless used in combination with a
51 slurry seal, microsurfacing, or resurfacing treatment, the Department shall not use single chip
52 seal treatment on subdivision streets or access routes for Surface Transportation Assistance Act
53 Dimensioned Vehicles.

54 (f) Authorized Use of Single Chip Seal Treatment on Secondary Roads. – The
55 Department may use single chip seal treatments on secondary roads only under any of the
56 following conditions:

- 57 (1) The secondary road has a daily traffic volume of less than 15,000 vehicles.
58 Single chip treatments used under this subdivision shall be capped with a

1 final riding surface of sand or material of equivalent size to fill voids to
2 create a smooth riding surface.

3 (2) The single chip seal treatment is used in combination with a slurry seal,
4 microsurfacing, or resurfacing treatment.

5 (3) The condition of the secondary road requires a rough surface to improve
6 traction, such as a secondary road in a mountainous community or another

8 (g) Report. – The Department shall submit the Highway Maintenance Improvement
9 Program and Highway Maintenance Improvement Program Needs Assessment to the General
10 Assembly by April 1 of each year. If the General Assembly is in session, the Department shall
11 report to the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation, the
12 Senate Appropriations Committee on Transportation, and the Fiscal Research Division. If the
13 General Assembly is not in session, the Department shall report to the Joint Legislative
14 Transportation Oversight Committee and the Fiscal Research Division."

15 **SECTION 34.11.(c)** G.S. 136-44.3 reads as rewritten:

53 based on need.

54 (6) A cross-divisional comparison summary document, not to exceed one page
55 in length, which includes the divisional performance data described in
56 subdivision (2) of this section as well as the most deficient roads and bridges
57 in each division.

58 ~~On the basis of the report and from funds available, the Department of Transportation shall~~
59 ~~develop a statewide annual maintenance program for the State highway system, which shall be~~

1 subject to the approval of the Board of Transportation and is consistent with performance
2 standards.

4 **SECTION 34.11.(d)** G.S. 136-44.16 reads as rewritten:

5 "**§ 136-44.16. Authorized use of contract maintenance resurfacing program funds.**

6 (a) Of the contract maintenance resurfacing program funds appropriated by the General
7 Assembly to the Department of Transportation, an amount not to exceed fifteen percent (15%)
8 of the Board of Transportation's allocation of these funds may be used for widening existing
9 narrow pavements.

10 (b) The uses of slurry seal treatments, microsurfacing treatments, and thin lift asphalt
11 overlays for pavement preservation treatments are authorized uses of contract maintenance
12 resurfacing program funds."

13 **SECTION 34.11.(e)** 2014-2015 Contract Maintenance Resurfacing Program
14 Letting Schedule. – Beginning in the 2014-2015 fiscal year, and based on the amount of funds

46 (2) Routine maintenance activities used to maintain and preserve the condition

58 undertaken by the Department, with the remaining funds used for projects outsourced to private
59 contractors.

1 **SECTION 34.11.(i)** Future Outsourcing Targets. – The Department shall increase
 2 its use of outsourcing of pavement preservation activities to reach the following targets for
 3 outsourcing of pavement preservation projects:

- 4 (1) Thirty percent (30%) of pavement preservation program funds allocated by
 5 the 2015-2016 fiscal year.

OUTSOURCING OF PRECONSTRUCTION ACTIVITY

SECTION 34.13.(a) The Department of Transportation shall seek to increase the use of contracts to further privatize preconstruction work where practical, economical, and likely to lead to increased efficiency. In doing so, the Department of Transportation shall meet each of the following privatization requirements:

- (1) Increase the outsourcing of all activities performed by the Department's Preconstruction and Technical Services units to seventy percent (70%) of the total cost of activities performed by those units in fiscal year 2014-2015, excluding the cost of activities performed by the Turnpike Authority, the Structures Design and Management unit, and the Bridge Program.
- (2) Increase the outsourcing of all activities performed by the Department's Roadway Design unit to fifty percent (50%) of the total cost of activities performed by that unit in fiscal year 2014-2015.
- (3) Increase the outsourcing of all activities performed by the Department's Project Development and Environmental Analysis unit to sixty-five percent (65%) of the total cost of activities performed by that unit in fiscal year 2014-2015.
- (4) The Department's Right-of-Way unit shall increase the total expenditures for outsourced activity by five percent (5%) in fiscal year 2014-2015.

SECTION 34.13.(b) The Department may credit any reduction in expenditures due to a reduction in force towards meeting the requirements imposed by subsection (a) of this section.

SECTION 34.13.(c) The Department shall increase contracts for construction of transportation projects on a design-build basis awarded under the provisions of G.S. 136-28.11.

SECTION 34.13.(d) The Department shall report no later than October 1, 2014, and quarterly thereafter, to the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee and the Fiscal Research Division regarding its implementation of this section, including any reductions in force used to meet privatization requirements.

DOT SIGNAGE

SECTION 34.14.(a) G.S. 136-89.56 reads as rewritten:

"§ 136-89.56. Commercial enterprises.

No commercial enterprises or activities shall be authorized or conducted by the Department of Transportation, or the governing body of any city or town, within or on the property acquired for or designated as a controlled-access facility, as defined in this Article, except for:

- (1) Materials displayed at welcome centers which shall be directly related to travel, accommodations, tourist-related activities, tourist-related services, and attractions. The Department of Transportation shall issue rules regulating the display of these materials. These materials may contain advertisements for real estate; and
- (2) Vending machines permitted by the Department of Transportation and placed by the Division of Services for the Blind, Department of Health and Human Services, as the State licensing agency designated pursuant to Section 2(a)(5) of the Randolph-Sheppard Act (20 USC 107a(a)(5)). The Department of Transportation shall regulate the placing of the vending machines in highway rest areas and shall regulate the articles to be dispensed. In order to permit the establishment of adequate fuel and other service facilities by private owners or their lessees for the users of a controlled-access facility, the Department of Transportation shall permit access to service or frontage roads within the publicly owned right-of-way of any controlled-access facility established or designated as provided in this Article, at points which, in the opinion of the Department of Transportation, will best serve the public interest. The location of such fuel and other service facilities may be indicated to the users of the controlled-access facilities by appropriate signs, the size, style, and specifications of which shall be determined by the Department of Transportation.

1 The location of fuel, gas, food, lodging, camping, and attraction facilities may be indicated
 2 to the users of the controlled-access facilities by appropriate logos placed on signs owned,
 3 controlled, and erected by the Department of Transportation. The owners, operators or lessees
 4 of fuel, gas, food, lodging, camping, and attraction facilities who wish to place a logo
 5 identifying their business or service on a sign shall furnish a logo meeting the size, style and
 6 specifications determined by the Department of Transportation and shall pay the Department
 7 ~~for the costs of initial installation and subsequent maintenance. The fees for logo sign~~
 8 ~~installation and maintenance shall be set by the Board of Transportation based on cost, a fee set~~
 9 by the Board of Transportation. The Board shall set the fee to cover the initial costs of signs,
 10 sign installation, and maintenance, and the costs of administering the logo sign program."

11 **SECTION 34.14.(b)** G.S. 136-140.19 reads as rewritten:

12 "**§ 136-140.19. Department Board of Transportation to adopt rules to implement the**

27 **SECTION 34.15.(a)** The Department of Transportation, in conjunction with the
 28 State Parks and Recreation Division of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources,
 29 the Department of Commerce, and Friends of the Mountains-to-Sea Trail, Inc., a nonprofit
 30 corporation, shall study the use of highway signage as a means of improving the North Carolina
 31 residents' and tourists' awareness of State parks, including historic and cultural sites as well as
 32 the Mountains-to-Sea Trail. The study shall include an examination of at least all of the
 33 following:

- 34 (1) Whether signs currently located on or near highways in this State are
 35 sufficient in number, location, and size and presentation to make travelers on
 36 the highways of this State aware of the existence and location of all State
 37 parks, including historic and cultural sites as well as the Mountains-to-Sea
 38 Trail.
- 39 (2) Whether signs currently located on or near highways in this State adequately
 40 inform travelers that portions of the roads they travel on are part of the
 41 current route of the Mountains-to-Sea Trail.
- 42 (3) What measures could be taken to improve the efficacy of highway signage in
 43 achieving the goals described in subdivisions (1) and (2) of this subsection.
- 44 (4) What the costs and benefits of implementing the measures described in
 45 subdivision (3) of this subsection would be.

46 **SECTION 34.15.(b)** No later than April 1, 2015, the Department of Transportation
 47 shall report the results of the study required by this section to the chairs of the Joint Legislative
 48 Transportation Oversight Committee and to the Fiscal Research Division.

50 DOT STAFFING

51 **SECTION 34.16.(a)** The Department of Transportation shall review the
 52 organization and staffing of the Division of Highways and the Division of Preconstruction and
 53 identify areas of unnecessary duplication within management structures and variations in the
 54 number of employees reporting to persons identified as supervisors. Based on its review, the
 55 Department shall create and implement a plan for staffing changes and staffing efficiencies.
 56 The plan shall reduce layers of management to the level needed for carrying out the
 57 Department's functions and responsibilities and ensure that employees designated as
 58 supervisors have workloads and staff size that are appropriate given the function or task for
 59 which that supervisor has responsibility.

1 **SECTION 34.16.(b)** The Department shall report its progress on implementing this
2 section to the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee and the Fiscal Research
3 Division no later than December 1, 2014.

4
5 **BOARD OF TRANSPORTATION TO STUDY FEES, SPONSORSHIP, AND**
6 **PRIVATIZATION**

7 **SECTION 34.17.(a)** The Board of Transportation shall study how fees,
8 sponsorship, or privatization might be used to reduce the use of public funds for services
9 provided by the Department. The services the Board shall study include, but are not limited to,
10 the following:

- 11 (1) Inspection of streets and bridges within a private development for future
12 addition to the State highway system.
- 13 (2) Inspection, site review, and permitting of the installation of driveways by
14 private parties providing access to a component of the State highway system.
- 15 (3) Review and inspection of encroachments onto the State highway system.
- 16 (4) Lease or sale of property related to the resolution of encroachments or the
17 disposition of surplus right-of-way.
- 18 (5) Review of or consultation on development plats or plans.
- 19 (6) Review, engineering, or consultation regarding drainage issues,
20 improvements, or maintenance adjacent to components of the State highway
21 system.
- 22 (8) Training sessions or workshops offered to private consultants and
23 contractors.
- 24 (9) Review and engineering consultation regarding traffic plans.

25 **SECTION 34.17.(b)** The Board shall also study the existing fee structure for
26 services performed by Highway Division personnel and identify any fees that no longer cover
27 the direct and indirect costs incurred by the Department to perform the service.

28 **SECTION 34.17.(c)** The Department of Transportation shall report on the Board's
29 study and recommendations for fee adjustments or additions to the Joint Legislative
30 Transportation Oversight Committee and the Fiscal Research Division no later than December
31 1, 2014. This report shall also include recommendations from the Board on the use of
32 sponsorships for activities, programs, or functions currently performed by the Department or
33 the privatization of these functions, and include the following information:

- 34 (1) The current cost of activities proposed for sponsorship support or
35 privatization.
- 36 (2) The potential receipts that could reasonably be collected through
37 sponsorships or the cost-savings achieved through privatization.
- 38 (3) A proposed process for the screening and selection of sponsors.
- 39 (4) Mock-ups of potential sponsorship signage on materials, buildings, vehicles,
40 vessels, or other locations.
- 41 (5) Any administrative, statutory, or regulatory changes needed for the
42 Department to proceed with sponsorship or privatization programs.

43
44 **RENAME AND REDIRECT TAX PROCEEDS OF SYSTEM PRESERVATION**
45 **PROGRAM**

46 **SECTION 34.18.(a)** The Department of Transportation shall rename the "system
47 preservation program" (fund center 1500/157839) the "bridge program." Funds allocated to this
48 program shall be used for improvements to structurally deficient and functionally obsolete
49 bridges. All projects funded under this program, with the exception of inspection,
50 pre-engineering, contract preparation, contract administration and oversight, and planning
51 activities, shall be outsourced to private contractors.

52 **SECTION 34.18.(b)** G.S. 119-18 reads as rewritten:
53 **"§ 119-18. Inspection tax and distribution of the tax proceeds.**

54 ...
55 (b) Proceeds. – The proceeds of the inspection tax levied by this section shall be applied
56 first to the costs of administering this Article and Subchapter V of Chapter 105 of the General
57 Statutes. The remainder of the proceeds shall be credited on a monthly basis to the Highway
58 Fund to be used for ~~system preservation~~ the bridge program under the Department of
59 Transportation in the highway maintenance program.

HIGHWAY FUND CREDIT RESERVE

SECTION 34.19.(a) G.S. 136-44.2 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:
"§ 136-44.2. Budget and appropriations.

(f1) The credit reserve for the Highway Fund consists of the following:

- (1)** The unreserved credit balance in the Highway Fund on the last day of the fiscal year to the extent the balances exceed the amount estimated for that date in the Current Operations Appropriations Act for the following fiscal year.
- (2)** The unallotted and unencumbered balances on the last day of the fiscal year for the following:
 - a.** Funds appropriated from the Highway Fund for the multimodal programs of the Department, consisting of funds for bicycle and pedestrian, ferry, railroad, aviation, and public transportation programs, excluding funds deposited in the Freight Rail & Rail Crossing Safety Improvement Fund.
 - b.** Funds appropriated from the Highway Fund for the construction programs of the Department, consisting of funds for secondary construction, access and public service roads, spot safety improvement, contingency, small urban construction, and economic development programs.
- (3)** The unencumbered and unexpended balances on the last day of the fiscal year for the following:
 - a.** Central and program administration.
 - b.** Transfers to other State agencies or departments not used or returned.
- (4)** The remaining balance for (i) any open project that has been inactive for two or more years after construction of the project has been completed or (ii) any project that is not obligated during the first two fiscal years in which funds are appropriated."

SECTION 34.19.(b) The sum of twelve million dollars (\$12,000,000) of the unallotted and unexpended balance of funds within the Bicycle program (fund center 1500/0036), Ferry Operations (fund center 1500/7825), Railroad program (fund center 1500/7829), Airports program (fund center 1500/7830), and the Public Transportation program (fund center 1500/7831), excluding funds deposited in the Freight Rail & Rail Crossing Safety Improvement Fund, shall be transferred to the Highway Fund as appropriated and allocated by this act.

SALE OF CERTAIN FORMER NC RAILROAD PROPERTIES

SECTION 34.20.(a) Subject to the right of first refusal in subsection (b) of this section, the Department of Administration shall dispose of the following parcels following the procedures set out in Chapter 146 of the General Statutes, provided that the Department may not dispose of the properties by gift or for less than fair market value:

SECTION 34.20.(b) Before the Department disposes of any property described in subsection (a), the city of Morehead City, Carteret County, or the city and county jointly shall be given the right of first refusal to purchase, lease, or rent any or all of the parcels at fair market value as determined by rules adopted by the Department under G.S. 146-29. Any lease or rental agreement under this subsection shall provide that the lessee or tenant may not sublease the property, except to a public entity for a public purpose. The right of first refusal shall expire on June 30, 2015.

SECTION 34.20.(c) Following expiration of the right of first refusal period set forth in subsection (b) of this section, or upon written notice from the city of Morehead City

1 and Carteret County waiving the right of first refusal, the Department shall dispose of the
2 properties by sale.

3 **SECTION 34.20.(d)** Notwithstanding G.S. 146-30, the Department shall deposit

15 the bridge transfer would require the Department to change the planned

17 **"FIRST IN FREEDOM" REGISTRATION PLATES**

18 **SECTION 34.28.(a)** G.S. 20-63 reads as rewritten:

19 "**§ 20-63. Registration plates furnished by Division; requirements; replacement of regular**
20 **plates with First in Flight plates; ~~plates or First in Freedom plates; surrender~~**
21 **and reissuance; displaying; preservation and cleaning; alteration or**

25 (b) Every license plate must display the registration number assigned to the vehicle for
26 which it is issued, the name of the State of North Carolina, which may be abbreviated, and the
27 year number for which it is issued or the date of expiration. A plate issued for a commercial
28 vehicle, as defined in G.S. 20-4.2(1), and weighing 26,001 pounds or more, must bear the word
29 "commercial," unless the plate is a special registration plate authorized in G.S. 20-79.4 or the
30 commercial vehicle is a trailer or is licensed for 6,000 pounds or less. The plate issued for
31 vehicles licensed for 7,000 pounds through 26,000 pounds must bear the word "weighted,"
32 unless the plate is a special registration plate authorized in G.S. 20-79.4.

33 A registration plate issued by the Division for a private passenger vehicle or for a private
34 hauler vehicle licensed for 6,000 pounds or less shall ~~be be~~, at the option of the owner, either (i)
35 a "First in Flight" ~~plate~~ or (ii) a "First in Freedom" plate. A "First in Flight" plate shall
36 have the words "First in Flight" printed at the top of the plate above all other letters and
37 numerals. The background of the "First in Flight" plate shall depict the Wright Brothers biplane
38 flying over Kitty Hawk Beach, with the plane flying slightly upward and to the right. A "First
39 in Freedom" plate shall have the words "First in Freedom" printed at the top of the plate above
40 all other letters and numerals. The background of the "First in Freedom" plate may include an
41 image chosen by the Division that is representative of the Mecklenburg Declaration of 1775 or
42 the Halifax Resolves of 1776.

43 (b1) The following special registration plates do not have to be a "First in Flight" plate or
44 "First in Freedom" plate as provided in subsection (b) of this section. The design of the plates
45 that are not "First in Flight" plates or "First in Freedom" plates must be developed in
46 accordance with G.S. 20-79.4(a3). For special plates authorized in G.S. 20-79.7 on or after July
47 1, 2013, the Division may not issue the plate on a background under this subsection unless it
48 receives at least 200 applications for the plate in addition to the applications required under
49 G.S. 20-79.4 or G.S. 20-81.12.

50

51 **SECTION 34.28.(b)** G.S. 20-79(c) reads as rewritten:

52 "(c) Form and Duration. – A dealer license plate is subject to G.S. 20-63, except for the

13 including communication links and components that control the unmanned
14 aircraft that are required for the pilot in command to operate safely and
15 efficiently in the national airspace system.
- 16 (b) General Prohibitions. – Except as otherwise provided in this section, no person,
17 entity, or State agency shall use an unmanned aircraft system to do any of the following:
- 18 (1) Conduct surveillance of:
- 19 a. A person or a dwelling occupied by a person and that dwelling's
20 curtilage without the person's consent.
21 b. Private real property without the consent of the owner, easement
22 holder, or lessee of the property.
- 23 (2) Photograph an individual, without the individual's consent, for the purpose
24 of publishing or otherwise publicly disseminating the photograph. This
25 subdivision shall not apply to newsgathering, newsworthy events, or events
26 or places to which the general public is invited.
- 27 (c) Law Enforcement Exceptions. – Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (b) of
28 this section, the use of unmanned aircraft systems by law enforcement agencies of the State or a
29 political subdivision of the State is not prohibited in the following instances:
- 30 (1) To counter a high risk of a terrorist attack by a specific individual or
31 organization if the United States Secretary of Homeland Security or the
32 Secretary of the North Carolina Department of Public Safety determines that
33 credible intelligence indicates that such a risk exists.
- 34 (2) To conduct surveillance in an area that is within a law enforcement officer's
35 plain view when the officer is in a location the officer has a legal right to be.
- 36 (3) If the law enforcement agency first obtains a search warrant authorizing the
37 use of an unmanned aircraft system.
- 38 (4) If the law enforcement agency possesses reasonable suspicion that, under
39 particular circumstances, swift action is needed to prevent imminent danger
40 to life or serious damage to property, to forestall the imminent escape of a
41 suspect or the destruction of evidence, to conduct pursuit of an escapee or
42 suspect, or to facilitate the search for a missing person.
- 43 (5) To photograph gatherings to which the general public is invited on public or
44 private land.
- 45 (d) Limitations on Use of Special Imaging Technology. – Commercial and private
46 unmanned aircraft systems may be equipped with infrared or other thermal imaging technology
47 subject to the provisions of this subsection. Infrared or other similar thermal imaging
48 technology equipment shall be for the sole purpose of scientific investigation; scientific
49 research; mapping and evaluating the earth's surface, including terrain and surface water bodies
50 and other features; investigation or evaluation of crops, livestock, or farming operations;
51 investigation of forests and forest management; and other similar investigations of vegetation
52 or wildlife.
- 53 (e) Any person who is the subject of unwarranted surveillance, or whose photograph is
54 taken in violation of the provisions of this section, shall have a civil cause of action against the
55 person, entity, or State agency that conducts the surveillance or that uses an unmanned aircraft
56 system to photograph for the purpose of publishing or otherwise disseminating the photograph.
57 In lieu of actual damages, the person whose photograph is taken may elect to recover five
58 thousand dollars (\$5,000) for each photograph or video that is published or otherwise

1 disseminated, as well as reasonable costs and attorneys' fees and injunctive or other relief as

4 evidence in a criminal prosecution in any court of law in this State except when obtained or

7 (a) No unmanned aircraft system may be launched or recovered from any State or
8 private property without consent.

9 (b) A unit of local government may adopt an ordinance to regulate the use of the local
10 government's property for the launch or recovery of unmanned aircraft systems."

18 whether the conduct by an unmanned aircraft system while in flight over this State constitutes a

50 It shall be a Class A1 misdemeanor to publish or disseminate, for any purpose, recorded
51 images taken by a person or non-law enforcement entity through the use of infrared or other

53 G.S. 15A-300.1, and revealing individuals, materials, or activities inside of a structure without
54 the consent of the property owner."

56 **"§ 113-295. Unlawful harassment of persons taking wildlife resources.**

57 (a) It is unlawful for a person to interfere intentionally with the lawful taking of wildlife
58 resources or to drive, harass, or intentionally disturb any wildlife resources for the purpose of
59 disrupting the lawful taking of wildlife resources. It is unlawful to take or abuse property,

1 equipment, or hunting dogs that are being used for the lawful taking of wildlife resources. This
2 subsection does not apply to a person who incidentally interferes with the taking of wildlife
3 resources while using the land for other lawful activity such as agriculture, mining, or
4 recreation. This subsection also does not apply to activity by a person on land he owns or
5 leases.

6 Violation of this subsection is a Class 2 misdemeanor for a first conviction and a Class 1
7 misdemeanor for a second or subsequent conviction.

8 (a1) It is unlawful to use an unmanned aircraft system, as defined in G.S. 15A-300.1, to
9 violate subsection (a) of this section. Violation of this subsection is a Class 1 misdemeanor.

10 (b) The Wildlife Resources Commission may, either before or after the institution of
11 any other action or proceeding authorized by this section, institute a civil action for injunctive
12 relief to restrain a violation or threatened violation of subsection (a) of this section pursuant to
13 G.S. 113-131. The action shall be brought in the superior court of the county in which the
14 violation or threatened violation is occurring or about to occur and shall be in the name of the
15 State upon the relation of the Wildlife Resources Commission. The court, in issuing any final
16 order in any action brought pursuant to this subsection may, in its discretion, award costs of
17 litigation including reasonable attorney and expert-witness fees to any party."

36 (a) No person shall operate an unmanned aircraft system, as defined in G.S. 15A-300.1,
37 in this State for commercial purposes unless the person is in possession of a license issued by
38 the Division valid for the unmanned aircraft system being operated. Application for such
39 license shall be made in the manner provided by the Division. Unless suspended or revoked,
40 the license shall be effective for a period to be established by the Division not exceeding eight
41 years.

42 (b) No person shall be issued a license under this section unless all of the following
43 apply:

44 (1) The person is at least 18 years of age.

45 (2) The person possesses a valid drivers license issued by any state or territory
46 of the United States or the District of Columbia.

47 (3) The person has passed the knowledge and skills test for operating an

2 (4) Technical guidance for complying with program requirements.
3 (5) Criteria under which the Division may suspend or revoke a license.
4 (6) Criteria under which the Division may waive licensure requirements for
5 applicants currently holding a valid license to operate unmanned aircraft
6 systems issued by another state or territory of the United States, the District
7 of Columbia, or the United States.
8 (7) A designation of the geographic area within which a licensee shall be
9 authorized to operate an unmanned aircraft system.
10 (8) Requirements pertaining to the collection, use, and retention of data by
11 licensees obtained through the operation of unmanned aircraft systems, to be
12 established in consultation with the State Chief Information Officer.
13 (9) Requirements for the marking of each unmanned aircraft system operated
14 pursuant to a license issued under this section sufficient to permit
15 identification of the owner of the system and the person licensed to operate
16 it.
17 (10) A system for providing agencies that conduct other operations within
18 regulated airspace with the identity and contact information of licensees and
19 the geographic areas within which the licensee is permitted to operate an
20 unmanned aircraft system.
21 (e) A person who operates an unmanned aircraft system for commercial purposes other
22 than as permitted under this section shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.
23 (f) The Division may issue rules and regulations to implement the provisions of this
24 section."

25 **SECTION 34.30.(h)** The Division of Aviation of the Department of Transportation
26 shall develop and implement the knowledge and skills test required by G.S. 63-95, as enacted
27 in subsection (g) of this section, no later than May 31, 2015, and shall report to the Joint
28 Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee on the status of implementation by June 15,
29 2015.

30 **SECTION 34.30.(i)** The Division of Aviation of the Department of Transportation

24 **SECTION 35.10A.(a)** Any person who is (i) a full-time permanent employee of
 25 the State or a community college institution on September 1, 2014, and (ii) eligible to earn
 26 annual leave shall have a one-time additional five days of annual leave credited on September
 27 1, 2014.

28 **SECTION 35.10A.(b)** The additional leave shall be accounted for separately with
 29 the leave provided by Section 28.3A of S.L. 2002-126, by Section 30.12B(a) of S.L. 2003-284,
 30 and by Section 29.14A of S.L. 2005-276 and shall remain available until used, notwithstanding
 31 any other limitation on the total number of days of annual leave that may be carried forward.
 32 Part-time permanent employees shall receive a pro rata amount of the five days.

 58 State Highway Patrol who have prior law enforcement or military police experience. No later
 59 than February 1, 2015, the State Highway Patrol shall report its findings to the Chairs of the

1 House Appropriations Committee, the Chairs of the Senate Appropriations/Base Budget
2 Committee, the Chairs of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Justice and Public
3 Safety, and the Chairs of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Justice and Public Safety.
4 The report shall include at least the following:

- 5 (1) An analysis of potential costs and benefits of granting experience and
6 education credit to prospective members of the State Highway Patrol who
7 have prior law enforcement or military police experience.
- 8 (2) Identification of additional resources that may be needed to facilitate the

- 10 (3) Identification of obstacles that may need to be addressed before a program of
11 granting credit under these circumstances can be implemented.

23 **"§ 143-166.13. Persons entitled to benefits under Article.**

24 (a) The following persons who are subject to the Criminal Justice Training and
25 Standards Act are entitled to benefits under this Article:

- 26 (1) State Government Security Officers, Department of Administration;
- 27 (2) State Correctional Officers, Division of Adult Correction of the Department
28 of Public Safety;
- 29 (3) State Probation and Parole Officers, Division of Adult Correction of the
30 Department of Public Safety;
- 31 (4) Sworn State Law-Enforcement Officers with the power of arrest, Division of
32 Adult Correction of the Department of Public Safety;
- 33 (5) Alcohol Law-Enforcement Agents, Department of Public Safety;
- 34 (6) State Highway Patrol Officers, Department of Public Safety;
- 35 (7) General Assembly Special Police, General Assembly;
- 36 (8) Sworn State Law-Enforcement Officers with the power of arrest,
37 Department of Health and Human Services;
- 38 (9) Juvenile Justice Officers, Division of Juvenile Justice of the Department of
39 Public Safety;
- 40 (10) Insurance Investigators, Department of Insurance;
- 41 (11) State Bureau of Investigation Officers and Agents, Department of Justice;
- 42 (12) Director and Assistant Director, License and Theft Enforcement Section,
43 Division of Motor Vehicles, Department of Transportation;
- 44 (13) Members of License and Theft Enforcement Section, Division of Motor
45 Vehicles, Department of Transportation, designated by the Commissioner of
46 Motor Vehicles as either "inspectors" or uniformed weigh station personnel;
- 47 (14) Utilities Commission Transportation Inspectors and Special Investigators;
- 48 (15) North Carolina Ports Authority Police, Department of Transportation;
- 49 (16) Sworn State Law-Enforcement Officers with the power of arrest,

4 (2) Employees of the Division of Adult Correction of the Department of Public
5 Safety injured by a direct and deliberate act of an offender supervised by the
6 Division or while performing supervisory duties over offenders which place
7 the employees at risk of such injury.

8 (c) As used in this Article, the term "eligible person" or "person" shall mean any
9 individual listed under subsection (a) or (b) of this section.

10 **"§ 143-166.14. Payment of salary notwithstanding incapacity; Workers' Compensation**
11 **Act applicable after two years; duration of payment.**

12 The salary of any of the above listed persons eligible person shall be paid as long as ~~his~~ the
13 person's employment in that position continues, notwithstanding ~~his~~ the person's total or partial
14 incapacity to perform any duties to which ~~he~~ the person may be lawfully assigned, if that
15 incapacity is the result of an injury by accident or an occupational disease arising out of and in
16 the course of the performance by him of his or injuries proximately caused by the heightened
17 risk and special hazards directly related to the violent nature of the eligible person's official
18 duties, except if that incapacity continues for more than two years from its inception, the person
19 shall, during the further continuance of that incapacity, be subject to the provisions of Chapter
20 97 of the General Statutes pertaining to workers' compensation. Salary paid to ~~an~~ an eligible
21 person pursuant to this Article shall cease upon the resumption of ~~his~~ the person's regularly
22 assigned duties, retirement, resignation, or death, whichever first occurs, except that temporary
23 return to duty shall not prohibit payment of salary for a subsequent period of incapacity which
24 can be shown to be directly related to the original injury.

25 **"§ 143-166.15. Application of § 97-27; how payments made.**

26 Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 143-166.14 of this Article, the persons entitled to
27 benefits shall be subject to the provisions of G.S. 97-27 during the two-year period of payment
28 of full salary. All payments of salary shall be made at the same time and in the same manner as
29 other salaries are paid to other persons in the same department.

30 **"§ 143-166.16. Effect on workers' compensation and other benefits; application of §**
31 **97-24.**

32 The provisions of G.S. 143-166.14 shall be in lieu of all compensation provided for the first
33 two years of incapacity by G.S. 97-29 and 97-30, but shall be in addition to any other benefits
34 or compensation to which such person shall be entitled under the provisions of the Workers'
35 Compensation Act. The provisions of G.S. 97-24 will commence at the end of the two-year
36 period for which salary is paid pursuant to G.S. 143-166.14.

37 **"§ 143-166.17. Period of incapacity not charged against sick leave or other leave.**

38 The period for which the salary of any person is paid pursuant to G.S. 143-166.14 while ~~he~~
39 the person is incapacitated as a result of an injury by accident or an occupational disease arising
40 out of and in the course of the performance by him of his or injuries proximately caused by the
41 heightened risk and special hazards directly related to the violent nature of the eligible person's
42 official duties, shall not be charged against any sick or other leave to which ~~he~~ the person shall
43 be entitled under any other provision of law.

44 **"§ 143-166.18. Report of incapacity.**

45 Any person designated in G.S. 143-166.13, who, as a result of an injury by accident arising
46 out of and in the course of the performance by him of his or injuries proximately caused by the
47 heightened risk and special hazards directly related to the violent nature of the eligible person's
48 official duties, is totally or partially incapacitated to perform any duties to which ~~he~~ the person
49 may be lawfully assigned, shall report the incapacity as soon as practicable in the manner
50 required by the secretary or other head of the department to which the agency is assigned by
51 statute.

52 **"§ 143-166.19. Determination of cause and extent of incapacity; hearing before Industrial**
53 **Commission; appeal; effect of refusal to perform duties.**

54 Upon the filing of the report, the secretary or other head of the department or, in the case of
55 the General Assembly, the Legislative Services Officer, shall determine the cause of the
56 incapacity and to what extent the claimant may be assigned to other than ~~his~~ the claimant's

58 right of the claimant to benefits under this Article. Notice of the finding shall be filed with the

2 ~~request for a hearing, the finding of the secretary or other department head shall be final. The~~

19 The same rights and remedies set forth in G.S. 97-10.2 shall apply in all third party liability
20 cases occurring under this Article, including cases involving the right of the affected State
21 agency to recover the salary paid to an injured officer during ~~his~~the officer's period of
22 disability."

23 **SECTION 35.12.(b)** This section becomes effective October 1, 2014, and applies

47 Law Enforcement Officers include sixteen hundredths percent (0.16%) for the Death Benefits
48 Plan. The rate for State Law Enforcement Officers includes five percent (5%) for Supplemental
49 Retirement Income. The rate for Teachers and State Employees and State Law Enforcement
50 Officers includes one hundredths percent (0.01%) for the Qualified Excess Benefit
51 Arrangement."

52 **SECTION 35.13.(b)** Effective July 1, 2014, the State's employer contribution rates
53 budgeted for retirement and related benefits as a percentage of covered salaries for the
54 2014-2015 fiscal year are (i) fifteen and twenty-one hundredths percent (15.21%) – Teachers
55 and State Employees; (ii) twenty and twenty-one hundredths percent (20.21%) – State Law
56 Enforcement Officers; (iii) twelve and seventy-four hundredths percent (12.74%) – University
57 Employees' Optional Retirement Program; (iv) twelve and seventy-four hundredths percent
58 (12.74%) – Community College Optional Retirement Program; (v) thirty-two and seventy
59 hundredths percent (32.70%) – Consolidated Judicial Retirement System; and (vi) five and

1 forty-nine hundredths percent (5.49%) – Legislative Retirement System. Each of the foregoing

10 hundredths percent (0.01%) for the Qualified Excess Benefit Arrangement.

25 beneficiaries whose retirement commenced on or before July 1, 2013, shall be increased by one
26 percent (1%) of the allowance payable on June 1, 2014, in accordance with G.S. 135-5(o).
27 Furthermore, from and after July 1, 2014, the retirement allowance to or on account of
28 beneficiaries whose retirement commenced after July 1, 2013, but before June 30, 2014, shall
29 be increased by a prorated amount of one percent (1%) of the allowance payable as determined
30 by the Board of Trustees based upon the number of months that a retirement allowance was
31 paid between July 1, 2013, and June 30, 2014."

32 **SECTION 35.14.(b)** G.S. 135-65 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

58 contribution increases.

1 **SECTION 35.15.(b)** If the Director of the Budget determines that funds
 2 appropriated to a State agency for increases exceed the amount required by that agency for that
 3 purpose, the Director may reallocate those funds to other State agencies that received
 4 insufficient funds for State Retirement System contribution increases.

5 **SECTION 35.15.(c)** No later than October 1, 2014, the Office of State Budget and
 6 Management shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on
 7 the expenditure of funds for State Retirement System contribution increases. This report shall
 8 include at least the following information for each State agency for the 2014-2015 fiscal year:

- 9 (1) The total amount of funds that the agency received for State Retirement
 10 System contribution increases.
- 11 (2) The total amount of funds transferred from the agency to other State
 12 agencies pursuant to subsection (b) of this section. This section of the report
 13 shall identify the amounts transferred to each recipient State agency.
- 14 (3) The total amount of funds used by the agency for State Retirement System
 15 contribution increases.
- 16 (4) The total amount of funds received by the agency for State Retirement
 17 System contribution increases that are anticipated to revert at the end of the
 18 fiscal year.

 20 **FUNDING FOR NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHERS' AND**
 21 **PROFESSIONAL EDUCATORS' INVESTMENT PLAN**

22 **SECTION 35.15A.** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 135-151(e), the assets
 23 of the Qualified Excess Benefit Arrangement (QEBA) established under Article 7 of Chapter
 24 135 of the General Statutes may be used to loan the sum of one hundred fifty thousand dollars
 25 (\$150,000) to the administrative account of the North Carolina Public School Teachers' and
 26 Professional Educators' Investment Plan established under G.S. 115C-341.2. The Plan shall
 27 repay the QEBA when the balance in its administrative account exceeds the sum of two
 28 hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000). The repayment shall be made with interest at a rate
 29 set by the Board of Trustees established under G.S. 135-6.

 31 **ENHANCE BENEFITS PAYABLE THROUGH THE NATIONAL GUARD PENSION**
 32 **FUND**

33 **SECTION 35.15C.** G.S. 127A-40(a) reads as rewritten:

34 "(a) Every member and former member of the North Carolina National Guard who
 35 meets the requirements of this section shall receive, commencing at age 60, a pension of
 36 ~~ninety-five dollars (\$95.00)~~ ninety-nine dollars (\$99.00) per month for 20 years' creditable
 37 military service with an additional ~~nine dollars fifty cents (\$9.50)~~ nine dollars ninety cents
 38 (\$9.90) per month for each additional year of such service; provided, however, that the total

 46 North Carolina National Guard.
- 47 (3) Have received an honorable discharge from the North Carolina National
 48 Guard."

 50 **ALTERNATIVE HEALTH BENEFIT COVERAGE FOR NONPERMANENT**
 51 **FULL-TIME STATE EMPLOYEES**

52 **SECTION 35.16.(a)** Section 1 of S.L. 2013-324 is repealed. The amendment to
 53 G.S. 135-48.43(a)(2) made in Section 4 of S.L. 2013-324 is repealed.

54 **SECTION 35.16.(b)** G.S. 135-48.22 reads as rewritten:

12 coverage under this section on a contributory basis, subject to the provisions of G.S. 135-48.43
13 and of this section, if (i) the employee's employing unit determines that the employee is a
14 full-time employee and (ii) the employee does not qualify for coverage under subdivision (1),
15 (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), or (10) of G.S. 135-48.40(b). For the purposes of this subsection, the

- 57 (2) Cost. – The term includes all of the following:
 - 58 a. The cost of constructing, reconstructing, renovating, repairing,
59 enlarging, acquiring, and improving State capital facilities, including

- 1 the acquisition of land, rights-of-way, easements, franchises,
2 equipment, machinery, furnishings, and other interests in real or
3 personal property acquired or used in connection with a State capital
4 facility.
- 5 b. The cost of engineering, architectural, and other consulting services
6 as may be required.
- 7 c. Administrative expenses and charges.
- 8 d. The cost of providing personnel to ensure effective project
9 management.
- 10 e. The cost of bond insurance, investment contracts, credit enhancement
11 and liquidity facilities, interest-rate swap agreements or other
12 derivative products, financial and legal consultants, and related costs
13 of bond and note issuance, to the extent and as determined by the
14 State Treasurer.
- 15 f. Finance charges, reserves for debt service, and other types of
16 reserves required pursuant to the terms of any bond or note or related
17 documents, interest before and during construction or acquisition of a
18 State capital facility and, if considered advisable by the State
19 Treasurer, for a period not exceeding two years after the estimated
20 date of completion of construction or acquisition.
- 21 g. The cost of bond insurance, investment contracts, credit enhancement
22 facilities and liquidity facilities, interest-rate swap agreements or
23 other derivative products, financial and legal consultants, and related
24 costs of the incurrence or issuance of any bond or note.
- 25 h. The cost of reimbursing the State for any payments made for any cost
26 described in this subdivision.
- 27 i. Any other costs and expenses necessary or incidental to the purposes
28 of this section.
- 29 (3) Credit facility. – An agreement entered into by the State Treasurer on behalf
30 of the State with a bank, savings and loan association, or other banking
31 institution, an insurance company, reinsurance company, surety company or
32 other insurance institution, a corporation, investment banking firm, or other
33 investment institution, or any financial institution or other similar provider
34 of a credit facility, which provider may be located within or without the
35 United States, such agreement providing for prompt payment of all or any
36 part of the principal or purchase price (whether at maturity, presentment or
37 tender for purchase, redemption, or acceleration), redemption premium, if
38 any, and interest on any bonds or notes payable on demand or tender by the
39 owner, in consideration of the State agreeing to repay the provider of the
40 credit facility in accordance with the terms and provisions of such
41 agreement.
- 42 (4) Notes. – Notes issued under this section.
- 43 (5) Par formula. – A provision or formula adopted by the State to provide for the
44 adjustment, from time to time, of the interest rate or rates borne by any
45 bonds or notes, including the following:
- 46 a. A provision providing for such adjustment so that the purchase price
47 of such bonds or notes in the open market would be as close to par as
48 possible.
- 49 b. A provision providing for such adjustment based upon a percentage
50 or percentages of a prime rate or base rate, which percentage or
51 percentages may vary or be applied for different periods of time.
- 52 c. Such other provision as the State Treasurer may determine to be
53 consistent with this act and will not materially and adversely affect
54 the financial position of the State and the marketing of bonds or notes
55 at a reasonable interest cost to the State.
- 56 (6) State. – The State of North Carolina, including any State agency.
- 57 (7) State agency. – Any agency, institution, board, commission, bureau, council,
58 department, division, officer, or employee of the State. The term does not

1 include counties, municipal corporations, political subdivisions, local boards
2 of education, or other local public bodies.

3 **SECTION 36.12.(d)** Authorization of Bonds and Notes. – The State Treasurer is
4 authorized, by and with the consent of the Council of State, to issue and sell at one time or from
5 time to time general obligation bonds of the State to be designated "State of North Carolina
6 General Obligation Bonds," with any additional designations as may be determined, or notes of
7 the State, in the aggregate principal amount of up to three hundred six million eight hundred
8 ninety-eight thousand dollars (\$306,898,000), this amount being not in excess of two-thirds of
9 the amount by which the State's outstanding indebtedness was reduced during the fiscal
10 biennium that ended June 30, 2013, for the purpose of providing funds, with any other available
11 funds, for the purposes authorized by this section.

12 **SECTION 36.12.(e)** Uses of Bond and Note Proceeds. – The proceeds of bonds
13 and notes shall be used for financing the cost of State capital facilities as provided in this
14 section. Any additional moneys which may be received by grant from the United States of
15 America or any agency or department thereof or from any other source to aid in financing the
16 cost of any State capital facilities authorized by this section may be placed by the State
17 Treasurer in a separate fund or funds and shall be disbursed, to the extent permitted by the
18 terms of the grant, without regard to any limitations imposed by this section.

19 The proceeds of bonds and notes may be used with any other moneys made
20 available by the General Assembly for the cost of State capital facilities, including the proceeds
21 of any other State bond or special indebtedness issues, whether heretofore made available or
22 which may be made available at the session of the General Assembly at which this section is
23 ratified or any subsequent sessions. The proceeds of bonds and notes shall be expended and
24 disbursed under the direction and supervision of the Director of the Budget. The funds provided
25 by this section shall be disbursed for the purposes provided in this section upon warrants drawn
26 on the State Treasurer by the State Controller, which warrants shall not be drawn until
27 requisition has been approved by the Director of the Budget and which requisition shall be
28 approved only after full compliance with the State Budget Act, Chapter 143C of the General
29 Statutes.

30 The Office of State Budget and Management shall provide semiannual reports to the
31 Chairs of the Senate Appropriations Committees and the House Appropriations Subcommittees
32 and to the Fiscal Research Division on the expenditure of moneys authorized by this section.
33 The reports shall continue until the completion of the projects provided for in this section.

34 **SECTION 36.12.(f)** Allocation of Proceeds. – The proceeds of bonds and notes
35 shall be allocated and expended as provided in this subsection:

47 issued pursuant to Article 9 of Chapter 142 of the General Statutes.
- 48 (3) A maximum aggregate principal amount of forty-two million three hundred
49 twenty-five thousand dollars (\$42,325,000) to finance the capital facility
50 costs of renovating the Albemarle Building.
- 51 (4) A maximum aggregate principal amount of five million one hundred
52 seventy-three thousand dollars (\$5,173,000) to finance the capital facility
53 costs of a Department of Public Safety Samarkand Training Facility.
- 54 (5) A maximum aggregate principal amount of two million dollars (\$2,000,000)
55 to finance the capital facility costs of repairing the roof of the McGough
56 Arena at the Western North Carolina Agricultural Center.
- 57 (6) A maximum aggregate principal amount of three million dollars
58 (\$3,000,000) to finance the capital facility costs of Hammocks Beach State
59 Park land acquisition.

- 1 (7) A maximum aggregate principal amount of three million dollars
2 (\$3,000,000) to finance the capital facility costs of completing a cofferdam
3 around the USS North Carolina Battleship.
- 4 (8) A maximum aggregate principal amount of thirty million dollars
5 (\$30,000,000) to finance the capital facility costs of repairs and renovations
6 to State facilities, the proceeds of which shall be allocated to the Reserve for
7 Repairs and Renovations and reallocated and expended pursuant to Section
8 36.5 of S.L. 2013-360.

9 **SECTION 36.12.(g) Issuance of Bonds and Notes. –**

- 10 (1) Terms and conditions. – Bonds or notes may bear a date or dates, may be
11 serial or term bonds or notes, or any combination thereof, may mature in
12 such amounts and at such time or times, not exceeding 40 years from their
13 date or dates, may be payable at such place or places, either within or
14 without the United States of America, in such coin or currency of the United
15 States of America as at the time of payment is legal tender for payment of
16 public and private debts, may bear interest at such rate or rates, which may
17 vary from time to time, and may be made redeemable before maturity, at the
18 option of the State or otherwise as may be provided by the State, at such
19 price or prices, including a price less than or greater than the face amount of
20 the bonds or notes, and under such terms and conditions, all as may be
21 determined by the State Treasurer, by and with the consent of the Council of
22 State.
- 23 (2) Signatures; form and denomination; registration. – Bonds or notes may be
24 issued in certificated or uncertificated form. If issued in certificated form,
25 bonds or notes shall be signed on behalf of the State by the Governor or shall
26 bear the Governor's facsimile signature, shall be signed by the State
27 Treasurer or shall bear the State Treasurer's facsimile signature, and shall
28 bear the Great Seal of the State, or a facsimile of the Seal shall be impressed
29 or imprinted thereon. If bonds or notes bear the facsimile signatures of the
30 Governor and the State Treasurer, the bonds or notes shall also bear a
31 manual signature which may be that of a bond registrar, trustee, paying
32 agent, or designated assistant of the State Treasurer. Should any officer
33 whose signature or facsimile signature appears on bonds or notes cease to be
34 such officer before the delivery of the bonds or notes, the signature or
35 facsimile signature shall nevertheless have the same validity for all purposes
36 as if the officer had remained in office until delivery. Bonds or notes may
37 bear the facsimile signatures of persons, who at the actual time of the
38 execution of the bonds or notes shall be the proper officers to sign any bond
39 or note, although at the date of the bond or note such persons may not have
40 been such officers. The form and denomination of bonds or notes, including
41 the provisions with respect to registration of the bonds or notes and any
42 system for their registration, shall be as the State Treasurer may determine in
43 conformity with this section.
- 44 (3) Manner of sale; expenses. – Subject to the approval by the Council of State
45 as to the manner in which bonds or notes shall be offered for sale, whether at
46 public or private sale, whether within or without the United States, and
47 whether by publishing notices in certain newspapers and financial journals,
48 mailing notices, inviting bids by correspondence, negotiating contracts of
49 purchase, or otherwise, the State Treasurer is authorized to sell bonds or
50 notes at one time or from time to time at any rates of interest, which may
51 vary from time to time, and at any prices, including a price less than or
52 greater than the face amount of the bonds or notes, as the State Treasurer
53 may determine. All expenses incurred in the preparation, sale, and issuance
54 of bonds or notes shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the proceeds of
55 bonds or notes or other available moneys.
- 56 (4) Notes; repayment. –
- 57 a. By and with the consent of the Council of State, the State Treasurer
58 is hereby authorized to borrow money and to execute and issue notes

1 of the State for the same, but only in the following circumstances and
2 under the following conditions:

- 3 1. For anticipating the sale of bonds, the issuance of which the
4 Council of State has approved, if the State Treasurer
5 considers it advisable to postpone the issuance of the bonds;
- 6 2. For the payment of interest on or any installment of principal
7 of any bonds then outstanding, if there are not sufficient
8 funds in the State treasury with which to pay the interest or
9 installment of principal as they respectively become due;
- 10 3. For the renewal of any loan evidenced by notes authorized in
11 this section;
- 12 4. For the purposes authorized in this section; and
- 13 5. For refunding bonds or notes as authorized in this section.

14 b. Funds derived from the sale of bonds or notes may be used in the
15 payment of any bond anticipation notes issued under this section.
16 Funds provided by the General Assembly for the payment of interest
17 on or principal of bonds shall be used in paying the interest on or
18 principal of any notes and any renewals thereof, the proceeds of
19 which shall have been used in paying interest on or principal of the
20 bonds.

21 (5) Refunding bonds and notes. – By and with the consent of the Council of
22 State, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue and sell refunding bonds and
23 notes pursuant to the provisions of the State Refunding Bond Act for the
24 purpose of refunding bonds or notes issued pursuant to this section. The
25 refunding bonds and notes may be combined with any other issues of State
26 bonds and notes similarly secured. Refunding bonds or notes may be issued
27 at any time prior to the final maturity of the debt obligation to be refunded.
28 The proceeds from the sale of any refunding bonds or notes shall be applied
29 to the immediate payment and retirement of the bonds or notes being
30 refunded or, if not required for the immediate payment of the bonds or notes
31 being refunded, the proceeds shall be deposited in trust to provide for the
32 payment and retirement of the bonds or notes being refunded and to pay any
33 expenses incurred in connection with the refunding. Money in a trust fund
34 may be invested in (i) direct obligations of the United States government, (ii)
35 obligations the principal of and interest on which are guaranteed by the
36 United States government, (iii) obligations of any agency or instrumentality
37 of the United States government if the timely payment of principal and
38 interest on the obligations is unconditionally guaranteed by the United States
39 government, or (iv) certificates of deposit issued by a bank or trust company
40 located in the State if the certificates are secured by a pledge of any of the
41 obligations described in (i), (ii), or (iii) above having an aggregate market
42 value, exclusive of accrued interest, equal at least to the principal amount of
43 the certificates so secured. This section does not limit the duration of any
44 deposit in trust for the retirement of bonds or notes being refunded but that
45 have not matured and are not presently redeemable, or if presently
46 redeemable, have not been called for redemption.

47 (6) Tax exemption. – Bonds and notes shall at all times be free from taxation by
48 the State or any political subdivision or any of their agencies, excepting
49 estate, inheritance, or gift taxes, income taxes on the gain from the transfer
50 of bonds or notes, and franchise taxes. The interest on bonds or notes is not
51 subject to taxation as income.

52 (7) Investment eligibility. – Bonds and notes are securities in which all of the
53 following may invest, including capital in their control or belonging to them:
54 public officers, agencies, and public bodies of the State and its political
55 subdivisions, all insurance companies, trust companies, investment
56 companies, banks, savings banks, savings and loan associations, credit
57 unions, pension or retirement funds, other financial institutions engaged in
58 business in the State, executors, administrators, trustees, and other
59 fiduciaries. Bonds and notes are hereby made securities which may properly

1 and legally be deposited with and received by any officer or agency of the
2 State or political subdivision of the State for any purpose for which the
3 deposit of bonds, notes, or obligations of the State or any political
4 subdivision is now or may hereafter be authorized by law.

5 (8) Faith and credit. – The faith and credit and taxing power of the State are
6 hereby pledged for the payment of the principal of and the interest on bonds
7 and notes. The State expressly reserves the right to amend any provision of
8 this section to the extent it does not impair any contractual right of a bond
9 owner.

10 (9) Other agreements. – The State Treasurer may authorize, execute, obtain, or
11 otherwise provide for bond insurance, investment contracts, credit and
12 liquidity facilities, interest-rate swap agreements and other derivative
13 products, and any other related instruments and matters the State Treasurer
14 determines are desirable in connection with issuance, incurrence, carrying,
15 or securing of bonds or notes. The State Treasurer is authorized to employ
16 and designate any financial consultants, underwriters, and bond attorneys to
17 be associated with any bond or note issue under this section as the State
18 Treasurer considers necessary.

19 **SECTION 36.12.(h)** Variable Rate Demand Bonds and Notes. – In fixing the
20 details of bonds and notes, the State Treasurer may provide that any of the bonds or notes may:

21 (1) Be made payable from time to time on demand or tender for purchase by the
22 owner, if a credit facility supports the bonds or notes, unless the State
23 Treasurer specifically determines that a credit facility is not required upon a
24 finding and determination by the State Treasurer that the absence of a credit
25 facility will not materially and adversely affect the financial position of the
26 State and the marketing of the bonds or notes at a reasonable interest cost to
27 the State;

28 (2) Be additionally supported by a credit facility;

29 (3) Be made subject to redemption or a mandatory tender for purchase prior to
30 maturity;

31 (4) Bear interest at a rate or rates that may vary for any period of time, as may
32 be provided in the proceedings providing for the issuance of the bonds or
33 notes, including, without limitation, such variations as may be permitted
34 pursuant to a par formula; and

35 (5) Be made the subject of a remarketing agreement whereby an attempt is made
36 to remarket bonds or notes to new purchasers prior to their presentment for
37 payment to the provider of the credit facility or to the State.

38 If the aggregate principal amount payable by the State under a credit facility is in
39 excess of the aggregate principal amount of bonds or notes secured by the credit facility,
40 whether as a result of the inclusion in the credit facility of a provision for the payment of
41 interest for a limited period of time or the payment of a redemption premium or for any other
42 reason, then the amount of authorized but unissued bonds or notes during the term of such
43 credit facility shall not be less than the amount of such excess, unless the payment of such
44 excess is otherwise provided for by agreement of the State executed by the State Treasurer.

45 **SECTION 36.12.(i)** Interpretation of Section. –

46 (1) Additional method. – The foregoing subsections of this section shall be
47 deemed to provide an additional and alternative method for the doing of the
48 things authorized under it and shall be regarded as supplemental and
49 additional to powers conferred by other laws and shall not be regarded as in
50 derogation of any powers now existing.

51 (2) Statutory references. – References in this section to specific sections or
52 Chapters of the General Statutes or to specific acts are intended to be
53 references to such sections, Chapters, or acts as they may be amended from
54 time to time by the General Assembly.

55 (3) Broad construction. – This section, being necessary for the health and
56 welfare of the people of the State, shall be broadly construed to effect the
57 purposes thereof.

- 1 (4) Inconsistent provisions. – Insofar as the provisions of this section are
2 inconsistent with the provisions of any general, special, or local laws, or
3 parts thereof, the provisions of this section shall be controlling.
- 4 (5) Severability. – If any provision of this section or the application thereof to
5 any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect
6 other provisions or applications of the section which can be given effect
7 without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of
8 this section are declared to be severable.

9 **SECTION 36.12.(j)** The State, upon the direction of the Director of the Budget,
10 may finance with the proceeds of special indebtedness the capital facility costs of a Western
11 Crime Lab, renovation of the Albemarle Building, and renovation of Department of Public
12 Safety Samarkand Training Facility, approved for financing with proceeds of bonds authorized
13 pursuant to this act. If the financing is to be provided by special indebtedness, then such
14 indebtedness may be issued or incurred before the enactment of this act or during or beyond the
15 fiscal biennium ending June 30, 2015. The amount of financing for the Western Crime Lab,
16 Albemarle Building, and Samarkand Training Facility from special indebtedness and the
17 proceeds of two-thirds bonds issued pursuant to this act shall not exceed sixty-two million eight
18 hundred ninety-eight thousand dollars (\$62,898,000).

19 **SECTION 36.12.(k)** This section is effective when it becomes law.

21 **TRANSFER UNSPENT CAPITAL FUNDS TO PROJECT RESERVE ACCOUNT**

22 **SECTION 36.14.** G.S. 143C-8-11 reads as rewritten:

24 **authorization; authorization; transfer of funds remaining after project**

27 (c) Funds Remaining After Project Completion. – The State Controller shall transfer
28 any balance of State funds appropriated for a capital project that remains unspent and
29 unencumbered two years after completion of the project in accordance with this section. If
30 applicable law requires a particular disposition of the funds, then the transfer shall be made in
31 accordance with that requirement. Otherwise, the transfer shall be made in accordance with the
32 following requirements:

- 33 (1) If the funds were initially allocated from the Reserve for Repairs and
34 Renovations, then the funds shall be transferred to that Reserve.
35 (2) All other funds shall be transferred to the Project Reserve Account created
36 by G.S. 143C-8-10."

38 **REPORT ON APPALACHIAN STATE UNIVERSITY HEALTH SCIENCES** 39 **BUILDING**

40 **SECTION 36.16.(a)** No later than October 1, 2014, Appalachian State University
41 shall submit to the Board of Governors and to the Fiscal Research Division a detailed plan for
42 the construction and operation of the Health Sciences Building that will be located on its
43 campus. The report shall include information about the construction planning as well as several
44 options for financing the construction and operation of the facility.

45 **SECTION 36.16.(b)** The General Assembly authorizes planning of the Health
46 Sciences Building at Appalachian State University in an amount not to exceed the sum of seven
47 million two hundred two thousand eight hundred eighty-three dollars (\$7,202,883). This
48 amount represents the total amount authorized to be spent for planning this project. The
49 General Assembly has appropriated five million dollars (\$5,000,000) for this purpose in the
50 2013-2015 fiscal biennium and does not intend to appropriate additional funds for planning this
51 project in the future. Accordingly, the General Assembly hereby authorizes the remaining sum
52 of two million two hundred two thousand eight hundred eighty-three dollars (\$2,202,883) to be
53 funded with receipts or from other non-General Fund sources available to Appalachian State
54 University during the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

11 net General Fund tax collections for fiscal year 2014-2015 exceed the targeted amount of
12 twenty billion two hundred million dollars (\$20,200,000,000). The rate is decreased by one
13 percent (1%) if net General Fund tax collections for fiscal year 2015-2016 exceed the targeted

A county's Medicaid service costs for fiscal years 2008-2009, 2009-2010, and 2010-2011 are determined without regard to the changes made to the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage by section 5001 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

...."

SECTION 37.2.(d) Effective July 1, 2017, G.S. 105-523, as amended by subsection (c) of this section, reads as rewritten:

"§ 105-523. County hold harmless for repealed local taxes.

(a) Intent. – It is the intent of the General Assembly that each county ~~benefit by at least one hundred twenty five thousand dollars (\$125,000) annually~~ be held harmless from the exchange of a portion of the local sales and use taxes for the State's agreement to assume the responsibility for the non-administrative costs of Medicaid.

(b) Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section:

...

(2) Hold harmless threshold. – The amount of a county's Medicaid service costs and Medicare Part D clawback payments assumed by the State under G.S. 108A-54 for the fiscal year, less ~~one hundred twenty five thousand dollars (\$125,000)~~ year. A county's Medicaid service costs for fiscal years 2008-2009, 2009-2010, and 2010-2011 are determined without regard to the changes made to the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage by section 5001 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

...."

MODULAR/MANUFACTURED HOME SALES TAX

SECTION 37.3.(a) G.S. 105-164.13 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"§ 105-164.13. Retail sales and use tax.

The sale at retail and the use, storage, or consumption in this State of the following tangible personal property, digital property, and services are specifically exempted from the tax imposed by this Article:

...

(64) Fifty percent (50%) of the sales price of a modular home or a manufactured home, including all accessories attached when delivered to the purchaser."

SECTION 37.3.(b) This section becomes effective September 1, 2014, and applies to sales made on or after that date.

PART XXXVIII. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

STATE BUDGET ACT APPLIES

SECTION 38.1. The provisions of the State Budget Act, Chapter 143C of the General Statutes, are reenacted and shall remain in full force and effect and are incorporated in this act by reference.

COMMITTEE REPORT

SECTION 38.2.(a) The Joint Conference Committee Report on the Continuation, Expansion, and Capital Budgets for Senate Bill 744, dated July 30, 2014, which was distributed in the Senate and the House of Representatives and used to explain this act, shall indicate action by the General Assembly on this act and shall, therefore, be used to construe this act, as provided in the State Budget Act, Chapter 143C of the General Statutes, as appropriate, and for these purposes shall be considered a part of this act and, as such, shall be printed as a part of the Session Laws.

SECTION 38.2.(b) The budget enacted by the General Assembly is for the maintenance of the various departments, institutions, and other spending agencies of the State for the 2014-2015 budget as provided in G.S. 143C-3-5. This budget includes the appropriations of State funds as defined in G.S. 143C-1-1(d)(25).

The Director of the Budget submitted recommended adjustments to the budget to the General Assembly in May 2014 in the document "The Governor of North Carolina's Recommended Budget Adjustments" for the 2014-2015 fiscal year for the various departments, institutions, and other spending agencies of the State. The adjustments to these documents made by the General Assembly are set out in the Committee Report.

SECTION 38.2.(c) The budget enacted by the General Assembly shall also be interpreted in accordance with G.S. 143C-5-5, the special provisions in this act, and other appropriate legislation.

In the event that there is a conflict between the line-item budget certified by the Director of the Budget and the budget enacted by the General Assembly, the budget enacted by the General Assembly shall prevail.

REPORT BY FISCAL RESEARCH DIVISION ON CHANGES TO 2014-2015 BUDGET/PUBLICATION

SECTION 38.3.(a) The Fiscal Research Division of the Legislative Services Commission shall issue a report on budget actions taken by the 2013 Regular Session of the General Assembly in 2014. The report shall be in the form of a revision of the Committee Report adopted for Senate Bill 744 pursuant to G.S. 143C-5-5 and shall include all modifications made to the 2014-2015 budget prior to sine die adjournment of the 2013 Regular Session.

SECTION 38.3.(b) The Director of the Fiscal Research Division of the Legislative Services Commission shall send a copy of the report issued pursuant to this section to the Director of the Budget. The report shall be published on the General Assembly's Internet Web site for public access.

MOST TEXT APPLIES ONLY TO 2014-2015 FISCAL YEAR

SECTION 38.4. Except for statutory changes or other provisions that clearly indicate an intention to have effects beyond the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the textual provisions of this act apply only to funds appropriated for, and activities occurring during, the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

EFFECT OF HEADINGS

SECTION 38.5. The headings to the parts and sections of this act are a convenience to the reader and are for reference only. The headings do not expand, limit, or define the text of this act, except for effective dates referring to a part.

APPROPRIATIONS LIMITATIONS AND DIRECTIONS APPLY

SECTION 38.6.(a) Except where expressly repealed or amended by this act, the provisions of S.L. 2013-360, S.L. 2013-363, S.L. 2013-364, and S.L. 2013-397 remain in effect.

SECTION 38.6.(b) Notwithstanding any modifications by this act in the amounts appropriated, except where expressly repealed or amended, the limitations and directions for the 2014-2015 fiscal year in S.L. 2013-360, S.L. 2013-363, S.L. 2013-364, and S.L. 2013-397 that applied to appropriations to particular agencies or for particular purposes apply to the newly enacted appropriations and budget reductions of this act for those same particular purposes.

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SEVERABILITY

SECTION 38.7. If any section or provision of this act is declared unconstitutional or invalid by the courts, it does not affect the validity of this act as a whole or any part other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 38.8. Except as otherwise provided, this act becomes effective July 1, 2014.
