A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO REVISE THE EXPERTISE REQUIRED FOR REVIEW AND ACCEPTANCE OF MATERIALS USED IN REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND SAFETY EDUCATION AND TO PROHIBIT TEACHING ABOUT CERTAIN DRUGS THAT MAY CAUSE SPONTANEOUS ABORTIONS AS A PART OF REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND SAFETY EDUCATION.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 115C-81(e1)(4) reads as rewritten:

- Each local school administrative unit shall provide a reproductive health and safety education program commencing in the seventh grade that includes the following instruction:
 - Teaches that abstinence from sexual activity outside of marriage is a. the expected standard for all school-age children.
 - Presents techniques and strategies to deal with peer pressure and b. offering positive reinforcement.
 - Presents reasons, skills, and strategies for remaining or becoming c. abstinent from sexual activity.
 - Teaches that abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain d. means of avoiding out-of-wedlock pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases when transmitted through sexual contact, including HIV/AIDS, and other associated health and emotional problems.
 - Teaches that a mutually faithful monogamous heterosexual e. relationship in the context of marriage is the best lifelong means of avoiding sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV/AIDS.
 - f. Teaches the positive benefits of abstinence until marriage and the risks of premarital sexual activity.
 - Provides opportunities that allow for interaction between the parent g. or legal guardian and the student.
 - Provides factually accurate biological or pathological information h. that is related to the human reproductive system.
 - i. Teaches about the preventable risks for preterm birth in subsequent pregnancies, including induced abortion, smoking, consumption, the use of illicit drugs, and inadequate prenatal care.

Materials used in this instruction shall be age appropriate for use with students. Information conveyed during the instruction shall be objective and based upon scientific research that is peer reviewed and accepted by

1 professionals and credentialed experts in the field of sexual health 2 education.experts." 3 **SECTION 2.** G.S. 115C-81(e1)(4a) reads as rewritten: 4 "(4a) Each local school administrative unit shall also include as part of the 5 instruction required under subdivision (4) of this subsection the following 6 instruction: 7 Teaches about sexually transmitted diseases. Instruction shall include a. 8 how sexually transmitted diseases are and are not transmitted, the 9 effectiveness and safety of all federal Food and Drug Administration 10 (FDA)-approved methods of reducing the risk of contracting sexually 11 transmitted diseases, and information on local resources for testing and medical care for sexually transmitted diseases. Instruction shall 12 13 include the rates of infection among pre-teen and teens of each 14 known sexually transmitted disease and the effects of contracting each sexually transmitted disease. In particular, the instruction shall 15 include information about the effects of contracting the Human 16 17 Papilloma Virus, including sterility and cervical cancer. Teaches about the effectiveness and safety of all FDA-approved 18 b. 19 contraceptive methods in preventing pregnancy, except 20 for drugs such as those marketed under the name "Preven" or "Plan 21 B" or any "equivalent drug product" as defined in G.S. 90-85.27(1) 22 that may cause spontaneous abortions. 23 Teaches awareness of sexual assault, sexual abuse, and risk c. 24 reduction. The instruction and materials shall: 25 Focus on healthy relationships. 1. 26 2. Teach students what constitutes sexual assault and sexual 27 abuse, the causes of those behaviors, and risk reduction. 28 3. Inform students about resources and reporting procedures if 29 they experience sexual assault or sexual abuse. 30 4. Examine common misconceptions and stereotypes about 31 sexual assault and sexual abuse. 32 Materials used in this instruction shall be age appropriate for use with 33 students. Information conveyed during the instruction shall be objective and 34 based upon scientific research that is peer reviewed and accepted by 35 professionals and credentialed experts in the field of sexual health education. 36 Each local board of education shall adopt a policy and provide a mechanism 37 to allow a parent or a guardian to withdraw his or her child from instruction 38 required under this subdivision." 39 **SECTION 3.** This act is effective when it becomes law and applies beginning with

the 2015-2016 school year.
