required in order for an unlawful transfer of custody to occur. Placement of a minor child in accordance with the Interstate Compact 10 <u>d.</u> 11 on the Placement of Children under Article 38 of Chapter 7B of the General Statutes or the Convention of 29 May 1993 on Protection of 12 Children and Co-operation in respect of Intercountry Adoption. 13 14 Temporary transfer of physical custody of a minor child to an individual <u>e.</u> with a prior substantial relationship with the child for a specified period 15 16 of time due to (i) the child's medical, mental health, educational, or 17 recreational needs or (ii) the parent's inability to provide proper care or supervision for the minor child, which may be due to the parent's 18 19 incarceration, military service, employment, medical treatment, 20 incapacity, or other voluntary or involuntary absence. 21 Transfer of physical custody of a minor child to a relative. <u>f.</u> 22 Temporary transfer of physical custody of a minor child to a behavioral g. 23 health facility or other health care provider, an educational institution, 24 or a recreational facility by a parent for a specified period of time due to the child's medical, mental health, educational, or recreational needs. 25 26 A voluntary foster care placement of the minor child made pursuant to <u>h.</u> an agreement between the minor child's parent and a county department 27 of social services as described in G.S. 7B-910. 28 29 Placement of a minor child with a prospective adoptive parent in <u>i.</u> 30 substantial compliance with the applicable adoption laws of this State or 31 of another state. 32 Any person who commits an offense under subsection (a) of this section is guilty of a (c) 33 Class A1 misdemeanor. 34 Any person who commits an offense under subsection (a) of this section that results in (d) serious physical injury to the child is guilty of a Class G felony." 35 36 **SECTION 2.** G.S. 48-10-101(b) reads as rewritten: No one other than a county department of social services, an adoption facilitator, or an 37 38 agency licensed by the Department in this State may advertise in any periodical or newspaper, or 39 by radio, television, or other public medium, that any person or entity will place or accept a child 40 for adoption. For purposes of this section, "other public medium" includes the use of any computerized system, including electronic mail, Internet site, Internet profile, or any similar 41 42 medium of communication provided via the Internet." 43 **SECTION 3.** G.S. 7B-101(15) reads as rewritten: 44 "§ 7B-101. Definitions. 45 As used in this Subchapter, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the following words 46 have the listed meanings: 47 48 Neglected juvenile. – A juvenile who does not receive proper care, supervision, (15)or discipline from the juvenile's parent, guardian, custodian, or caretaker; or 49 50

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who has been abandoned; or who is not provided necessary medical care; or

who is not provided necessary remedial care; or who lives in an environment

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injurious to the juvenile's welfare; or the custody of whom has been unlawfully transferred under G.S. 14-321.2; or who has been placed for care or adoption in violation of law. In determining whether a juvenile is a neglected juvenile, it is relevant whether that juvenile lives in a home where another juvenile has died as a result of suspected abuse or neglect or lives in a home where another juvenile has been subjected to abuse or neglect by an adult who regularly lives in the home."

SECTION 4. G.S. 7B-302(a) reads as rewritten:

When a report of abuse, neglect, or dependency is received, the director of the "(a) department of social services shall make a prompt and thorough assessment, using either a family assessment response or an investigative assessment response, in order to ascertain the facts of the case, the extent of the abuse or neglect, and the risk of harm to the juvenile, in order to determine whether protective services should be provided or the complaint filed as a petition. When the report alleges abuse, the director shall immediately, but no later than 24 hours after receipt of the report, initiate the assessment. When the report alleges neglect or dependency, the director shall initiate the assessment within 72 hours following receipt of the report. When the report alleges abandonment, abandonment of a juvenile or unlawful transfer of custody under G.S. 14-321.2, the director shall immediately initiate an assessment, assessment. When the report alleges abandonment, the director shall also take appropriate steps to assume temporary custody of the juvenile, and take appropriate steps to secure an order for nonsecure custody of the juvenile. The assessment and evaluation shall include a visit to the place where the juvenile resides, except when the report alleges abuse or neglect in a child care facility as defined in Article 7 of Chapter 110 of the General Statutes. When a report alleges abuse or neglect in a child care facility as defined in Article 7 of Chapter 110 of the General Statutes, a visit to the place where the juvenile resides is not required. When the report alleges abandonment, the assessment shall include a request from the director to law enforcement officials to investigate through the North Carolina Center for Missing Persons and other national and State resources whether the juvenile is a missing child."

SECTION 5. The Department of Health and Human Services shall develop a program to provide needed supports to families at risk of adoption dissolutions in order to keep families together.

SECTION 6. Sections 1, 3, and 4 of this act become effective December 1, 2016, and apply to offenses committed on or after that date. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law.
