The notice shall include the same information provided under G.S. 115C-102.35(b). The notice shall also inform parents 6 7 of the local board's policy for participation in reproductive health and safety programs, as 8 established in G.S. 115C-81.30(c), when applicable, and provide a form that allows parents to 9 exercise parental rights under that policy. 10 "§ 115C-102.55. Within two weeks of the hearing, the local committee shall make a 39 recommendation to the local board of education on whether the challenge has merit and whether 40 the challenged material should be retained or removed as unfit material. The local committee's 41 determination shall be limited to considerations of whether the material is unfit on the specific 42 grounds of the material being (i) obscene, (ii) inappropriate to the age, maturity, or grade level 43 of the students, or (iii) not aligned with the standard course of study. 44 At the next meeting of the local board of education after the local committee's (e) recommendation is received, the local board shall determine whether the challenge has merit and 45 46 whether the challenged material should be retained or removed as unfit material. 47 If the local board of education determines that the challenged material shall be (f) 48 retained, a challenger may appeal the local board's decision to the State Community Media 49 Advisory Committee. 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1 **SECTION 4.(a)** Effective July 1, 2019, the existing Textbooks and Digital 2 Resources funding allotment in the State Public School Fund shall be designated as the 3 Instructional Materials funding allotment in the State Public School Fund. The State Board of 4 Education shall establish the purposes for which the funds within the new Instructional Materials 5 funding allotment may be used as follows: (i) to acquire instructional or supplemental materials 6 as defined in G.S. 115C-102.20, as enacted by this act, and (ii) to acquire hardware, software, or 7 other equipment necessary for the use of the instructional or supplemental materials. 8 **SECTION 4.(b)** G.S. 115C-105.25(b)(12) reads as rewritten:

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"(12) only be used for the purchase of textbooks and digital resources. instructional and supplemental materials, as defined in G.S. 115C-102.20, and to acquire hardware, software, or other equipment necessary for the use of the instructional or supplemental materials. These funds shall not be transferred

Funds allotted for textbooks and digital resources instructional materials may

G.S. 115C-102.50. Local boards of education shall adopt policies to provide 24 opportunities either for parents and legal guardians to consent or for parents and legal guardians 25 to withhold their consent to the students' participation in any or all of these programs."

26 **SECTION 6.** The State Board of Education shall not enter into any new contracts 27 for textbooks or instructional materials and shall not renew any existing contracts for textbooks 28 or instructional materials. The State Board of Education shall make available for purchase any 29 textbooks or instructional materials available through existing contracts to local boards of 30 education.

SECTION 7. Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-102.25, as enacted by this act, a local 31 32 board of education may, by resolution, continue use of previously adopted State textbooks for a 33 standard course of study until that standard course of study is revised by the State Board of 34 Education.

35 **SECTION 8.** All local boards of education shall establish a program repository of 36 current health and safety programs, as required by G.S. 115C-102.50, as enacted by this act, for 37 access to parents prior to the start of the 2019-2020 school year, and shall not implement any 38 program until that program is included in the repository.

39 **SECTION 9.** This act becomes effective July 1, 2019, and applies beginning with 40 the 2019-2020 school year.
