1 Grant in this section. In allocating an increase in federal fund availability, the Office of State 2 Budget and Management shall not approve funding for new programs or activities not 3 appropriated in this act.

4 If the Congress of the United States decreases the federal fund availability for any of 5 the Block Grants or contingency funds and other grants related to existing Block Grants administered by the Department of Health and Human Services from the amounts appropriated 6 7 in this act, the Department shall develop a plan to adjust the Block Grants based on reduced 8 federal funding.

9 Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, for fiscal years 2019-2020 and 10 2020-2021, increases in the federal fund availability for the Temporary Assistance to Needy 11 Families (TANF) Block Grant shall be used only for the North Carolina Child Care Subsidy 12 program to pay for child care in four- or five-star rated facilities for 4-year-old children and shall 13 not be used to supplant State funds.

14 Prior to allocating the change in federal fund availability, the proposed allocation must be approved by the Office of State Budget and Management. If the Department adjusts the 15 16 allocation of any Block Grant due to changes in federal fund availability, then a report shall be 17 made to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services and the Fiscal 18 Research Division.

19 **SECTION 1.1.(d)** Except as otherwise provided, appropriations from federal Block 20 Grant funds are made for each year of the fiscal biennium ending June 30, 2021, according to the 21 schedule enacted for State fiscal years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 or until a new schedule is 22 enacted by the General Assembly.

23 **SECTION 1.1.(e)** All changes to the budgeted allocations to the Block Grants or 24 contingency funds and other grants related to existing Block Grants administered by the 25 Department of Health and Human Services that are not specifically addressed in this section shall 26 be approved by the Office of State Budget and Management. The Office of State Budget and 27 Management shall not approve funding for new programs or activities not appropriated in this 28 section. Additionally, if budgeted allocations are decreased, the Office of State Budget and 29 Management shall not approve any reduction of funds designated for subrecipients in subsection 30 (a) of this section under (i) Item 03 of the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block 31 Grant or (ii) Item 01 of the Maternal and Child Health Block Grant. The Office of State Budget 32 and Management shall consult with the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and 33 Human Services for review prior to implementing any changes. In consulting, the report shall 34 include an itemized listing of affected programs, including associated changes in budgeted 35 allocations. All changes to the budgeted allocations to the Block Grants shall be reported 36 immediately to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services and 37 the Fiscal Research Division. This subsection does not apply to Block Grant changes caused by 38 legislative salary increases and benefit adjustments.

39 **SECTION 1.1.(f)** Except as otherwise provided, the Department of Health and 40 Human Services shall have flexibility to transfer funding between the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Block Grant and the TANF Emergency Contingency Funds Block Grant 41 42 so long as the total allocation for the line items within those block grants remains the same.

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TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES (TANF) FUNDS

45 **SECTION 1.1.(g)** The sum of eighty million ninety-three thousand five hundred 46 sixty-six dollars (\$80,093,566) for each year of the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium appropriated in this act in TANF funds to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social 47 48 Services, shall be used for Work First County Block Grants. The Division shall certify these 49 funds in the appropriate State-level services based on prior year actual expenditures. The Division 50 has the authority to realign the authorized budget for these funds among the State-level services based on current year actual expenditures. The Division shall also have the authority to realign 51

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appropriated funds from Work First Family Assistance for electing counties to the Work First
 County Block Grant for electing counties based on current year expenditures so long as the
 electing counties meet Maintenance of Effort requirements.

electing counties meet Maintenance of Effort requirements.
 SECTION 1.1.(h) The sum of nine million four hundred twelve thousand three
 hundred ninety-one dollars (\$9,412,391) appropriated in this act to the Department of Health and
 Human Services, Division of Social Services, in TANF funds for each fiscal year of the
 2019-2021 fiscal biennium for child welfare improvements shall be allocated to the county
 departments of social services for hiring or contracting staff to investigate and provide services
 in Child Protective Services cases; to provide foster care and support services; to recruit, train,
 license, and support prospective foster and adoptive families; and to provide interstate and

11 post-adoption services for eligible families.

Counties shall maintain their level of expenditures in local funds for Child Protective Services workers. Of the Block Grant funds appropriated for Child Protective Services workers, the total expenditures from State and local funds for fiscal years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 shall not be less than the total expended from State and local funds for the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

16 SECTION 1.1.(i) The sum of two million twenty-six thousand eight hundred 17 seventy-seven dollars (\$2,026,877) appropriated in this act in TANF funds to the Department of 18 Health and Human Services, Special Children Adoption Fund, for each fiscal year of the 19 2019-2021 fiscal biennium shall be used in accordance with G.S. 108A-50.2. The Division of 20 Social Services, in consultation with the North Carolina Association of County Directors of 21 Social Services and representatives of licensed private adoption agencies, shall develop guidelines for the awarding of funds to licensed public and private adoption agencies upon the 22 23 adoption of children described in G.S. 108A-50 and in foster care. Payments received from the 24 Special Children Adoption Fund by participating agencies shall be used exclusively to enhance 25 the adoption services program. No local match shall be required as a condition for receipt of these 26 funds.

SECTION 1.1.(j) The sum of one million four hundred thousand dollars (\$1,400,000) appropriated in this act in TANF funds to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, for each fiscal year of the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium shall be used for child welfare initiatives to (i) enhance the skills of social workers to improve the outcomes for families and children involved in child welfare and (ii) enhance the provision of services to families in their homes in the least restrictive setting.

33 **SECTION 1.1.(k)** Of the three million four hundred fifty thousand dollars 34 (\$3,450,000) allocated in this act in TANF funds to the Department of Health and Human 35 Services, Division of Public Health, for each year of the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium for teen 36 pregnancy prevention initiatives, the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) in each 37 year of the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium shall be used to provide services for youth in foster care 38 or the juvenile justice system.

39 **SECTION 1.1.(k1)** The total requirements for NC Pre-K shall remain unchanged 40 due to the additional sum of four million one hundred thousand dollars (\$4,100,000) in recurring 41 funds for the 2019-2020 fiscal year and the additional sum of six million one hundred thousand 42 dollars (\$6,100,000) in recurring funds for the 2020-2021 fiscal year from TANF funds 43 appropriated in this section. Funds made available after the adjustment in this subsection shall 44 remain unspent until otherwise appropriated by the General Assembly.

45 **SECTION 1.1.(k2)** The total requirements for the Child Care Subsidy program shall 46 remain unchanged due to the additional sum of five million four hundred thousand dollars 47 (\$5,400,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2019-2020 fiscal year and the additional sum of twelve 48 million six hundred thousand dollars (\$12,600,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2020-2021 49 fiscal year from additional TANF funds appropriated in this section. Funds made available after 50 the adjustment in this subsection shall remain unspent until otherwise appropriated by the 51 General Assembly.

SECTION 1.1. (<i>l</i>) The sum of nineteen million nine hundred five thousand eight
hundred forty-nine dollars (\$19,905,849) for each year of the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium
appropriated in this act in the Social Services Block Grant to the Department of Health and
Human Services, Division of Social Services, and the sum of thirteen million ninety-seven
thousand seven hundred eighty-three dollars (\$13,097,783) for each year of the 2019-2021 fisca
biennium transferred from funds appropriated in the TANF Block Grant shall be used for count
block grants. The Division shall certify these funds in the appropriate State-level services base
on prior year actual expenditures. The Division has the authority to realign the authorized budge
for these funds, as well as State Social Services Block Grant funds, among the State-level service
based on current year actual expenditures.
Of the funds allocated in this subsection for each year of the 2019-2021 fisca
biennium for county block grants, three million dollars (\$3,000,000) shall be used to assis
counties in the implementation of Project 4, Child Services, in North Carolina Familie
Accessing Services Through Technology (NC FAST). These funds shall be available in eac
fiscal year of the fiscal biennium for this purpose.
SECTION 1.1.(m) The sum of one million three hundred thousand dollar
