8	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:			
9	SECT	TION 1. Notwithstanding Executive Order No. 141, Easing Restrictions on		
10	Travel, Business	Operations, and Mass Gatherings: Phase Two, issued by Governor Roy A.		
11		20, 2020, any venue for receptions or parties, as referenced in Section 8 of		
12	Executive Order	No. 141, may open and resume operations provided all of the following apply:		
13	(1)	The venue was in existence on March 10, 2020, is properly licensed and		
14		permitted, and holds all necessary State and local regulatory permits,		
15		including, if applicable, any necessary ABC permits.		
16	(2)	Total capacity is limited to fifty percent (50%) of the authorized fire capacity,		
17		12 people per 1,000 square feet, or 300 people, whichever is less.		
18	(3)	All employees shall have their temperature taken daily prior to working. Any		
19		employee showing symptoms or with a fever of 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit or		
20		higher shall not be allowed to enter the venue.		
21	(4)	All guests shall have their temperature taken by thermal temple thermometers.		
21 22 23		Any guest with a fever of 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit or higher shall not be		
23	4-5	permitted entry.		
24 25	(5)	All employees shall wear face masks and gloves. All guests are strongly		
25	(-2)	encouraged to wear face masks.		
26	(6)	Food and beverage service shall not include self-service or buffet options.		
27	(7)	Hand sanitizer stations shall be available throughout the venue. All hand		
28	(0)	sanitizer is comprised of at least sixty percent (60%) alcohol.		
29	(8)	The venue shall maintain and enforce the social distancing requirements		
30		recommended by the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and		
31		the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services.		



- (9) The venue shall comply with all rules and regulations promulgated by the Division of Public Health of the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services applicable to restaurants.
- (10) Employees shall conduct frequent routine cleanings of high-touch and high-use areas while the venue is open and conduct a deep clean of the entire venue after the close of business every day. Disinfectants that are EPA-approved for SARS-CoV-2 (the virus that causes COVID-19) are used for all cleanings.
- (11) Signage shall be posted to remind employees and guests of the social distancing and sanitation requirements in place.
- (12) The venue shall collect and retain guest contact information on file for 15 days past the date of the event, which shall be made available for contact tracing if so requested.

SECTION 2. Notwithstanding Executive Order No. 141, Easing Restrictions on Travel, Business Operations, and Mass Gatherings: Phase Two, issued by Governor Roy A. Cooper on May 20, 2020, any outdoor stadium with a spectator capacity of 12,000 or less that operates a restaurant, as defined in G.S. 18B-1000(6), on the premises of the stadium may open and operate food and drink service for on-premises consumption provided all of the following apply:

- (1) The stadium was in existence on March 10, 2020, is properly licensed and permitted, and holds all necessary State and local regulatory permits, including, if applicable, any ABC permits.
- (2) The food and drink service operation for on-premises consumption is limited to any authorized indoor seating specifically designated for the restaurant operation and to the outdoor seating location.
- (3) The outdoor food and drink service seating capacity is limited to ten percent (10%) of the spectator capacity of the stadium.
- (4) The outdoor seating location must be part of the stadium, may include the playing area of the stadium, and must contain or have access to lavatory and toilet facilities for employees and customers as required for on-site preparation and consumption of food and beverage under rules established by the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services.
- (5) If the establishment holds ABC permits and serves alcohol pursuant to those permits, the outdoor seating location must have delineated vertical boundaries that the consumer would recognize as indicating the boundaries that physically separate areas where consumption of alcohol is allowed from areas open to the general public other than customers of the establishment.
- (6) The establishment maintains and enforces the social distancing requirements recommended by the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services.
- (7) The establishment complies with all rules and regulations promulgated by the Division of Public Health of the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services applicable to outdoor food and drink service.

SECTION 3. Notwithstanding Executive Order No. 141, Easing Restrictions on Travel, Business Operations, and Mass Gatherings: Phase Two, issued by Governor Roy A. Cooper on May 20, 2020, any (i) skating rinks or (ii) bowling alleys, as referenced in Section 8 of Executive Order No. 141, may open and resume operations provided all of the following apply:

- (1) The establishment was in existence on March 10, 2020, or had a valid certificate of occupancy and business license issued by that date.
- (2) Total indoor capacity is limited to fifty percent (50%) of the authorized fire capacity. Employees are excluded from the total indoor capacity.

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1	(3)	All employees answer a health questionnaire and have their temperature taken
2	` '	daily prior to working. Any employee showing symptoms or with a fever is
3		not allowed to enter the establishment.
4	(4)	All employees wear face masks. All visitors are strongly encouraged to wear
5		face masks.
6	(5)	Contactless check-in is available, including propping open all entry doors
7		when possible. Markings are on the ground to denote proper social distancing
8		of at least 6 feet in the check-in area.
9	(6)	Sanitation spray bottles with disinfectant or disinfectant wipes that are
10		EPA-approved for SARS-CoV-2 (the virus that causes COVID-19) are
11		available throughout the establishment.
12	(7)	Hand sanitizer stations are available throughout the establishment. All hand
13		sanitizer is comprised of at least sixty percent (60%) alcohol.
14	(8)	Employees conduct frequent routine cleanings of high-touch equipment and
15		high-use areas while the establishment is open and conduct a deep clean of the
16		entire establishment after the close of business every day. For establishments
17		that are open 24 hours a day, a deep clean of the entire establishment must
18		occur at least once every 24 hours. Disinfectants that are EPA-approved for
19	(0)	SARS-CoV-2 (the virus that causes COVID-19) are used for all cleanings.
20	(9)	The following practices must be maintained:
21		a. Equipment is used in a manner to ensure social distancing of at least 6
22		feet.
23 24		b. Signage directs foot traffic for social distancing.
24 25		c. Employees monitor for social distancing and to ensure that equipment is being cleaned with disinfectant or disinfectant wipes after each user.
25 26	(10)	All personal hygiene areas and amenity services are closed, except for toilets,
20 27	(10)	lavatories, and lockers where social distancing must be maintained.
28	(11)	Water fountains are limited to filling water bottles only.
29	(12)	Signage is posted to remind employees, members, and visitors of the social
30	(12)	distancing and sanitation requirements in place.
