3	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:					
4	SECT	TON 1. There is established the Opportunity Gap Task Force (Task Force).				
5		TON 2. The Task Force shall consist of 14 members as follows:				
6	(1)	Three persons who are members of the House of Representatives at the time				
7		of appointment, at least one of whom represents the minority party, appointed				
8		by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.				
9	(2)	Three persons who are members of the Senate at the time of appointment, at				
10		least one of whom represents the minority party, appointed by the President				
11		Pro Tempore of the Senate.				
12	(3)	The chair of the State Board of Education, or his or her designee.				
13	(4)	The Superintendent of Public Instruction, or his or her designee.				
14	(5)	The President of The University of North Carolina, or his or her designee.				
15	(6)	The President of the North Carolina System of Community Colleges, or his or				
16		her designee.				
17	(7)	The President of the North Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities,				
18		Inc., or his or her designee.				
19	(8)	The President and Chief Executive Officer of North Carolina Business

General Assembly Of North Carolina

1	SECTION 5. The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President Pro				
2	Tempore of the Senate shall each select a cochair for the Task Force from among its members.				
3	The Task Force shall meet upon the call of its cochairs. A quorum of the Task Force is a majority				
4	of its members. No action may be taken except by a majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum				
5	is present. The Task Force, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers				
6	provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Task Force may				
7	contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services, as provided by G.S. 120-32.02. If the				
8	Task Force hires a consultant, the consultant shall not be a State employee or a person currently				
9	under contract with the State to provide services.				
10	Members of the Task Force shall serve without compensation but may receive travel				
11	and subsistence as follows:				
12	(1) Members who are officials or employees of a State agency or unit of local				
13	government, in accordance with G.S. 138-6.				
14	(2) Members who serve in the General Assembly, in accordance with				
15	G.S. 120-3.1.				
16	(3) All other members at the rate established in G.S. 138-5.				
17	All State departments and agencies and local governments and their subdivisions shall				
18	furnish the Task Force with any requested information in their possession or available to them.				
19	SECTION 6. The Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional and clerical				
20	staff to assist the Task Force in its work. The Director of Legislative Assistants of the House of				
21	Representatives and the Director of Legislative Assistants of the Senate shall assign clerical				
22	support to the Task Force.				
23	SECTION 7. Meetings of the Task Force shall begin no later than September 1,				
24	2021. The Task Force shall submit a final report on the results of its study, including its proposed				
25	plan and any proposed legislation, to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on or				
26	before December 1, 2022, by filing a copy of the report with the Office of the President Pro				
27	Tempore of the Senate, the Office of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Joint				
28	Legislative Education Oversight Committee, and the Legislative Library. The Task Force shall				
29	terminate on December 1, 2022, or upon the filing of its final report, whichever comes first.				
30	SECTION 8. This act is effective when it becomes law.
