Short Title: ACH/Infection Prevention Requirements.

2 AN ACT UPDATING ADULT CARE HOME INFECTION PREVENTION
3 REQUIREMENTS.

4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5 SECTION 1. G.S. 131D-4.4A reads as rewritten:

6 "§ 131D-4.4A. Adult care home infection prevention requirements.

7 (a) As used in this section, "adult care home staff" means any employee of an adult care
8 home involved in direct resident care.

9 (b) In order to prevent transmission of ~~HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C, and other bloodborne~~
10 ~~pathogens, infectious diseases,~~ each adult care home shall do all of the following, beginning
11 January 1, 2012: following:

12 (1) Implement and maintain within the facility a written infection prevention and
13 control policy consistent with the federal Centers for Disease Control and
14 Prevention guidelines national standards on infection control that addresses
15 control, which shall be accessible to all adult care home staff working at the
16 facility. The policy shall include at least all of the following:

- 17 a. Proper disposal of single-use equipment used to puncture skin, mucous
18 membranes, and other tissues, and proper disinfection of reusable
19 ~~patient-resident~~ care items that are used for multiple residents.
- 20 b. Sanitation of rooms and equipment, including cleaning procedures,
21 agents, and schedules.
- 22 c. Accessibility of infection control devices and supplies.
- 23 d. Blood and bodily fluid precautions.
- 24 e. Procedures to be followed when adult care home staff is exposed to
25 blood or other body fluids of another person in a manner that poses a
26 significant risk of transmission of HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C, or
27 other bloodborne pathogens.
- 28 f. Procedures to prohibit adult care home staff with exudative lesions or
29 weeping dermatitis from engaging in direct resident care that involves
30 the potential for contact between the resident, equipment, or devices
31 and the lesion or dermatitis until the condition resolves.
- 32 g. Standard and transmission-based precautions, including the following:
- 33 1. Respiratory hygiene and cough etiquette.
- 34 2. Environmental cleaning and disinfection.
- 35 3. Reprocessing and disinfection of reusable resident devices.
- 36 4. Hand hygiene.



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- 1 5. Accessibility and proper use of personal protective equipment.
2 6. Types of transmission-based precautions and when each type
3 is indicated, including contact precautions, droplet
4 precautions, and airborne precautions.
5 h. When and how to report to the local health department suspected or
6 confirmed, reportable communicable disease cases or conditions, or
7 communicable disease outbreaks.
8 i. Measures the facility should consider for specific types of
9 communicable disease outbreaks in order to prevent the spread of
10 illness, such as:
11 1. Isolating infected residents.
12 2. Limiting or stopping group activities and communal dining.
13 3. Restricting outside visitation to the facility.
14 4. Screening staff, residents, and visitors for signs of illness.
15 5. Using source control as tolerated by the residents.
16 j. Strategies for addressing potential staffing issues and ensuring
17 adequate staffing is available to meet the needs of the residents during
18 a communicable disease outbreak.
19 (2) Require and monitor compliance with the facility's infection control policy.
20 (3) Update the infection control policy as necessary to ~~prevent the transmission~~
21 ~~of HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C, and other bloodborne pathogens.~~maintain
22 consistency with the infection prevention and control guidelines included in
23 the course developed by the Department pursuant to G.S. 131D-4.5C.
24 (4) Designate one on-site staff member for each noncontiguous facility who is
25 knowledgeable about the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
26 guidelines on infection control to direct the facility's infection control
27 activities and ensure that all adult care staff is trained in the facility's written
28 infection prevention and control policy. ~~Beginning October 1, 2013, any~~
29 ~~policy developed pursuant to subdivision (b)(1) of this section within 30 days~~
30 ~~after hire and annually thereafter. Any nonsupervisory staff member~~
31 designated to direct the facility's infection control activities shall complete the
32 infection control course developed by the Department pursuant to
33 G.S. 131D-4.5C.
34 (5) When a communicable disease outbreak has been identified at a facility or
35 there is an emerging infectious disease threat, the facility shall ensure
36 implementation of the facility's infection control and prevention policy
37 developed pursuant to subdivision (b)(1) of this section and related policies
38 and procedures. Notwithstanding this subdivision, if guidance or directives
39 specific to the communicable disease outbreak or emerging infectious disease
40 threat have been issued in writing by the Department or local health
41 department, the specific guidance or directives shall be implemented by the
42 facility."

43 **SECTION 2.** This act becomes effective October 1, 2021.
