31		any information that may be relevant to a child's best interests so that the court

33	<u>(8)</u>	Provide input to, advocate for, and seek out support from the supervising
34	(0)	agency without fear of reprisal, including the right to request respite as needed
35		or to request a break between placements.
36	<u>(9)</u>	Reasonable opportunities to be consulted with and considered in the
37	(2)	scheduling of home visits, therapies, and other meetings related to the child
38		that the foster or resource parents are allowed or required to attend.
39	(10)	Request a change in licensing workers.
40	(10) (11)	Be considered as prospective adoptive placement after a termination of
41	(11)	parental rights hearing or relinquishment pursuant to G.S. 7B-1112.1.
42	<u>(12)</u>	Utilize the reasonable and prudent parent standard in determining whether a
43	(12)	foster parent can allow a child in the foster parent's care to participate in
43		educational field trips and extracurricular, enrichment, and social activities.
45		This standard is characterized by careful and thoughtful parental
46 47		decision-making that is intended to maintain a child's health, safety, and best
47		interest while encouraging the child's social, emotional, and developmental
48	(12)	growth. Request a shared momenting agreement that includes along expectations and
49	<u>(13)</u>	Request a shared parenting agreement that includes clear expectations and
50		appropriate boundaries for all parties.

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- (14) Request contact information be kept confidential by the supervising agency when safety concerns are present.
- (c) A violation of this Bill of Rights shall not be construed to create a cause of action under this section against the State, the Department of Health and Human Services, private supervising agencies, local county departments of social services, or an entity providing foster care pursuant to this Article. Nothing in this Bill of Rights shall override existing law or administrative rule."

SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
