4		The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:				
5	SECTION 1. G.S. 105-187.63 reads as rewritten:					
6	"§ 105-187.63. Use of tax proceeds.					
7	From the taxes received pursuant to this Article, the Secretary may retain the costs of					
8	collection, not to exceed two hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) a year, as					
9	reimbursement to the Department. The Secretary must credit or distribute taxes received pursuant					
10 11	to this Article, less the cost of collection, on a quarterly basis as follows:					
11	(1)	Fifty percent (50%) to the Inactive Hazardous Sites Cleanup Fund established by G.S. 130A-310.11.				
12	(2)	Thirty-seven and one half percent (37.5%) to cities and counties in the State				
13 14	(2)	on a per capita basis, using the most recent annual estimate of population				
15		certified by the State Budget Officer. One-half of this amount must be				
16		distributed to cities, and one-half of this amount must be distributed to				
17		counties. For purposes of this distribution, the population of a county does not

19		A city or county is excluded from the distribution under this subdivision				
20		if it does not provide solid waste management programs and services and is

41	SECTION 4.(a) The Legislative Services Officer shall evaluate all opportunities to				
42	reduce the use of food service ware in food establishments and beverage services operated by the				
43	General Assembly and implement such measures at the earliest date that (i) does not result in				
44	disposal prior to use of food service ware already procured on the date this act becomes law and				
45	(ii) does not impair contracts for purchase of such food service ware in effect on the date this act				
46	becomes law. As used in this section, the term "beverage services" includes the provision of				
47	coffee, water, and other beverages in committee meetings and the legislative chambers. The				
48	Legislative Services Officer shall issue a preliminary report on implementation of the				
49	requirements of t	his section to the Environmental Review Commissio	n no later than September		
50	1, 2023, and shal	l provide a final report to the Commission no later that	an March 1, 2024.		

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SECTION 4.(b) The Division of Services for the Blind, within the Department of 1 2 Health and Human Services, shall implement a pilot program to eliminate the sale or provision 3 of food or beverages in or with food service ware, for consumption on or off the premises, at 4 State agencies or agencies of a political subdivision of the State that is using State funds. In 5 implementing this pilot, the Division shall identify five facilities operated pursuant to Article 3 6 of Chapter 111 of the General Statutes to implement measures to eliminate food service ware at 7 the earliest possible date that (i) does not result in disposal prior to use of food service ware 8 already procured by the agency on the date this act becomes law and (ii) does not impair contracts 9 for purchase of such food service ware in effect on the date this act becomes law. The Division 10 shall issue a preliminary report on implementation of the requirements of this section to the 11 Environmental Review Commission no later than September 1, 2023, and shall provide a final 12 report to the Commission no later than March 1, 2024.

13 **SECTION 5.** For purposes of Sections 3 and 4 of this act, the term "food service 14 ware" means noncompostable and nonrecyclable products used by a food provider that are 15 designed for one-time use for serving or transporting prepared, ready-to-consume food or 16 beverages, including plates, cups, bowls, trays, utensils, straws, cup lids, and hinged or lidded 17 containers. As used in this section, the term "nonrecyclable" does not include post-use polymers 18 or recovered feedstock processed at an advanced recycling facility.

19 SECTION 6. Section 1 of this act becomes effective July 1, 2024. The remainder of
 20 this act is effective when it becomes law.
