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1 (a) The Opportunity Scholarship Grant Fund Reserve is established as a reserve to be 2 administered by the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina for the purpose of 3 allocating funds to the Authority for the award of scholarship grants in accordance with this Part. 4 The Reserve shall consist of monies appropriated from the General Fund to the Reserve by the 5 General Assembly and any interest accrued to it thereon. These funds shall be used to award 6 scholarship grants to eligible students for the school year that begins in the fiscal year following 7 the fiscal year in which the appropriation is made to the Reserve. The Board of Governors shall 8 only use monies in the Reserve in accordance with the purposes set forth in this section. 28	(b) Monies in the Reserve Fund shall not revert at the end of each fiscal year but shall
29	remain available until expended for the purposes of this Part.
30	(c) The Authority may use up to one and one-half percent (1.5%) of the funds available
31	in the Reserve Fund each fiscal year for administrative costs related to the Program."
32	SECTION 3.(b) This section is effective when it becomes law and shall award
33	scholarships for use in the 2025-2026 school year.
