5	SECTION 1. Appropriation of Funds. – There is appropriated from the ARPA						
6	Temporary Savings Fund, established under Section 1.3 of S.L. 2023-7, to the Department of

8 9	funds for the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium to be allocated and used as provided in Section 2 of this

SECTION 2 (b) Allocation of Remaining Funds Of the funds appropriated in

4 **SECTION 2.(h)** Allocation of Remaining Funds. – Of the funds appropriated in 5 Section 1 of this act, the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) shall be allocated to 6 the Department of Health and Human Services to be used for administrative purposes related to 7 one or more programs for which funds have been allocated under subsections (a) through (g) of 8 this section.

9 SECTION 2.(i) Authorization for Time-Limited Positions. – As part of the 10 implementation or administration of the programs for which funds have been allocated under 11 subsections (a) through (g) of this section, the Department of Health and Human Services is 12 authorized to create up to 48 time-limited positions.

13 **SECTION 3.** Timing of Funding. – The funds appropriated in Section 1 of this act 14 shall become available during the course of the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium as the funds are 15 deposited into the ARPA Temporary Savings Fund, established under Section 1.3 of S.L. 2023-7. 16 The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) shall not provide allocations of the 17 funds appropriated in Section 1 of this act until the funds are available within the ARPA 18 Temporary Savings Fund, in whole or in part. When any portion of the funds appropriated in 19 Section 1 of this act becomes available, the Secretary of DHHS shall promptly allocate those 20 funds for the uses described in Section 2 of this act and, at the discretion of the Secretary, shall 21 prioritize the allocations, taking into account any time lines for the use of the funds, the best 22 interest of the citizens of the State, and the avoidance of any disruption in services to those 23 citizens.

24 **SECTION 4.** Report on Use of Funds. – In addition to any report required under this 25 act or any other law, the Department of Health and Human Services shall submit a quarterly 26 report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services and the Fiscal 27 Research Division beginning on January 1, 2024, detailing the use of funds appropriated in this 28 act. Each report required under this section shall include the amount of funds received to date, 29 how the funds were used during the quarterly reporting period, and the amount of funds that 30 remained unspent at the end of the quarterly reporting period. The requirement under this section 31 to submit a quarterly report shall end upon submission of the final report, which shall be no later 32 than 90 days from the date the allocated funds have been fully expended.

33 SECTION 5.(a) Section 1 of this act is effective on the date the Current Operations
34 Appropriations Act for the 2023-2024 fiscal year becomes law or July 1, 2023, whichever is later.
35 SECTION 5.(b) If, by June 30, 2024, no Current Operations Appropriations Act for
36 the 2023-2024 fiscal year has become law, then this act shall expire on that date.

37 **SECTION 6.** Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective when it becomes 38 law.
