17 **SECTION 3.1(b)** During the regular session that reconvenes on Tuesday, November
18 19, 2024, only the following matters may be considered:

- 19 (1) Bills directly and primarily affecting the State budget, including (i) the budget
20 of an occupational licensing board for fiscal year 2024-2025 and (ii) bills
21 authorizing a fee for a unit of State government or political subdivision of the
22 State, provided that the bill was introduced in the House of Representatives or
23 filed for introduction in the Senate no later than 4:00 P.M. Thursday, May 2,
24 2024.

26 a. Proposing an amendment or amendments to the North Carolina
27 Constitution and containing no other matter.
28 b. Proposing an amendment or amendments to the North Carolina
29 Constitution and containing no other matter other than statutory
30 conforming changes to implement such bills.
31 c. Solely making statutory and transitional changes to implement bills
32 under sub-subdivision a. of this subdivision.
33 (3) Bills and resolutions introduced in 2023 (i) that passed third reading in 2023
34 in the house in which introduced, were received in the other house in
35 accordance with Senate Rule 41 or House Rule 31.1(h), as appropriate, and
36 not disposed of in the other house by tabling, unfavorable committee report,
37 indefinite postponement, or failure to pass any reading, and which do not
38 violate the rules of the receiving house or (ii) not subject to the deadline set
39 forth in Senate Rule 41 or House Rule 31.1(h), as appropriate.
40 (4) Bills and resolutions implementing the recommendations of:
41 a. Study commissions, authorities, and statutory commissions authorized
42 or directed to report to the 2023 Regular Session.

12 introduction in the Senate by 4:00 P.M. Tuesday, May 7, 2024.
13 (6) Bills providing for the selection, appointment, or confirmation as required by
14 law, including the filling of vacancies of positions for which the appointees
15 were elected by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker
16 of the House of Representatives, President of the Senate, President Pro
17 Tempore of the Senate, or a minority leader of a chamber of the General
18 Assembly.
19 (7) Bills providing for action on gubernatorial nominations or appointments.
20 (8) Any matter authorized by joint resolution passed by a two-thirds majority of
21 the members of the House of Representatives present and voting and by a
22 two-thirds majority of the members of the Senate present and voting. A bill or
23 resolution filed in either house under the provisions of this subdivision shall
24 have a copy of the ratified enabling resolution attached to the jacket before
25 filing for introduction in the Senate or introduction in the House of
