1. What were the original goals and expectations for the activity supported by this grant?

PfS utilizes this appropriation for general operating expenses, including staff salaries, facility operations, and administrative overhead of the North Carolina Estuarium (Washington), the Roanoke/Cashie River Center (Windsor), the Columbia Theater Cultural Resources Center (Columbia), our corporate/central office (Columbia), Hyde County programming, and associated activities. The central office coordinates activities among the centers and PfS home communities. PfS facilities serve as focal points for environmental education, tourism, and local activities in our home communities and region. Our goals and expectations are to: (1) provide informative and entertaining programs about the ecology and cultural history of the Albemarle-Pamlico region; (2) help stimulate nature-based and heritage tourism in order to support locally-owned business development; (3) work with an array of community partners and organizations to help put on local programs, festivals, and events; (4) promote the natural and cultural resources of Albemarle-Pamlico Peninsula from a regional perspective; and (5) encourage stewardship of Albemarle-Pamlico estuarine environment. The grant is fully expended during the course of each fiscal year during our regular schedule of operations.

2.	If applicable, how have those goals and expectations been revised or refined during the course of the project?
	No significant changes were made. However, PfS is continuously updating and changing programs and events at all of our facilities.
3.	What has the activity accomplished with these grant funds? Please include specific information including facts

	In FY 2010/11, our facilities welcomed 64,305 visitors, including thousands of schoolchildren, local residents, North Carolinians from other regions, citizens from every State in the US, and travelers from 30 foreign countries.
	Programs include estuarine ecology, wildlife, Native American heritage, agricultural history, regional cuisine, artistic expression, maritime life, and more. We work with local groups with goals to promote sustainable
	economic development while protecting the vital natural resources of this region.
4.	If the activity is a continuing one, briefly summarize future plans and funding prospects.
	Our facilities are integral participants in our home communities. Our operating budget supports 13 regular staff and
	several part-time staff in addition to funding facility maintenance and operational overhead. State funding provides 2/3 of our operating budget; the remainder comes from facility admission fees and gift shop sales, local
	appropriations, donations, and grants. Our funding for 2011/12 was reduced 15% to \$409,326 which will be funded by NC Department of Commerce.

\$150,000 for 2010/11 was used to operate the Tyrrell County Visitor's Center in Columbia, NC. The Tyrrell County Visitor's Center serves as a gateway to the entire Albemarle-Pamlico area. The goal of the Visitor's Center is to provide the traveling public with up-to-date travel information and to assist them with other travel needs if possible. Information available at the Visitor's Center includes local, regional, and statewide brochures, maps, tourist information, and current weather information. The operating hours at TCVC are Monday through Saturday from 9 to 5, with Sunday hours from 1 to 5 during the tourist season.

2. If applicable, how have those goals and expectations been revised or refined during the course of the project?							
No significant changes were made. The Visitor's Center is continuously updating and making changes to its inventory of brochures and travel information, so that the traveling public has the best travel information available.

Visitors comment that we are one of the nicest Visitors Centers in the state, with helpful and courteous staff. Thousands of vehicles stop, finding information about various points of interest in the Albemarle-Pamlico region as well as the State of NC. Our scenic location on the Scuppernong River makes a perfect respite for weary travelers. From July 1, 2010 through June 30/2011, TCVC was able to promote local, regional and State tourism to 28,480 registered guests with 475,178 stopping at the rest area.
