Attorney General Jackson:

Pursuant to §120-14 of the North Carolina General Statutes, the House Select Committee on Oversight and Reform (“the Committee”) requests your appearance to testify on April 16, 2026, at 9:00 am in the Legislative Building Auditorium.

As you know, North Carolina law assigns the Department of Justice a central role in protecting the integrity of the Medicaid program through the investigation and prosecution of fraud. With billions of taxpayer dollars flowing through the program each year, the public has a right to expect that these authorities are used fully and aggressively to identify and pursue fraud and hold bad actors accountable. Examples in North Carolina and other states have heightened concerns about the adequacy of efforts to prevent, police, and prosecute Medicaid fraud, waste, and abuse.

In your role as Attorney General, please be prepared to address how your office has exercised its statutory responsibility to investigate and prosecute Medicaid fraud in North Carolina. This includes

- Activities of the state’s Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, the Medicaid Investigation Division
- Staffing and resources dedicated to those efforts
- Coordination with the Department of Health and Human Services
- Steps to identify, investigate, and pursue fraud, waste, and abuse involving Medicaid funds

- Other topics as deemed appropriate by the Committee

The Committee also intends to review whether the investigative and enforcement authorities provided under North Carolina law are being fully and effectively utilized to protect the integrity of the Medicaid program and the taxpayers who fund it.

To ensure a complete and accurate record, the Committee further requests that the North Carolina Department of Justice produce the following records for the period January 1, 2023, through the present, by 12:00 noon on April 7, 2026:

1. All reports, summaries, or data reflecting Medicaid fraud investigations opened, closed, or referred by the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (“MFCU”), including case outcomes and recoveries.
2. All records reflecting criminal charges, civil actions, settlements, or enforcement actions resulting from MFCU investigations.
3. All records reflecting referrals of suspected Medicaid fraud received by MFCU, including the source of the referral and disposition.
4. All records reflecting open or pending Medicaid fraud investigations, including date opened and current status.
5. All internal tracking logs, case management reports, or records reflecting backlog, delay, or prioritization of MFCU cases.
6. Organizational charts for MFCU and all records reflecting authorized positions, filled positions, vacancies, and staffing levels.
7. All records reflecting budget allocations, expenditures, and funding sources for MFCU.
8. All communications between the Department of Justice and the Department of Health and Human Services relating to Medicaid fraud, waste, or abuse, including referrals and coordination.
9. All agreements, memoranda of understanding, or protocols governing coordination between DOJ and DHHS regarding Medicaid fraud investigations.
10. All policies, procedures, or internal guidance governing Medicaid fraud investigations and enforcement priorities.
11. All records reflecting the use of investigative tools, including subpoenas, search warrants, or other enforcement mechanisms in Medicaid fraud cases.
12. All complaints, tips, or whistleblower reports related to Medicaid fraud received by DOJ, and records reflecting how those complaints were handled.
13. All reports, audits, or performance evaluations related to the effectiveness of MFCU, including any reports submitted to federal agencies.

Please read this letter carefully to ensure that you comply with all hearing requirements and that you understand your rights as a witness.

Each witness who is to appear before the House Oversight Committee must file with Committee Staff a written statement of proposed testimony. This must be filed by 12:00 noon one week before your appearance. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in the exclusion of your written testimony from the hearing record, the barring of your oral presentation of the testimony, or both. Responses to questions at the hearing should be limited to no more than five minutes per response.

A witness appearing before the Committee must include with their written testimony and a current résumé summarizing education, experience, and affiliations pertinent to the subject matter of the hearing.


Witnesses at hearings may be accompanied by counsel to advise them concerning their constitutional rights but accompanying counsel shall not directly respond to questions. We reserve the right to place any witness under oath. Finally, witnesses may obtain a transcript copy of their testimony given in open, public session, or in a closed session only when authorized by the Committee.

To fully prepare for this hearing, your testimony must be submitted electronically in Microsoft Word (docx), PowerPoint (pptx), or Adobe Acrobat (pdf) format to Mary.Moorefield@ncleg.gov no later than 12:00 noon one week before the hearing.


