Justification for Position (including description of duties and responsibilities):

Since the opening of the Pisgah Center for Wildlife Education in 1998, over 13,000 participants and 125,000 visitors have been served each year. The center is open 7 days a week, 8 am -5 pm daily. The 9 [permanent] staff members could not run the center 7 days a week without the help of 5 seasonals currently working 11 months at the Pisgah Center for Wildlife Education. In order for the center to run smoothly, the seasonals perform the same job duties as the permanent staff. The three seasonal educator positions primarily develop and deliver educational programs conducted at the center. In addition, these educators must serve in such capacities as upkeep of the fish exhibits and displays, monitoring the fisheries raceways, overseeing the Wild Store, stocking vending machines, and site maintenance. Morale issues arise because the seasonals are asked to perform the same job duties as permanent staff, often on weekends and holidays, without adequate compensation. By converting this seasonal educator position to permanent status, we will be able to maintain continuity and avoid recruiting and training education professionals in the seasonal position each year.

Dear President Basnight and Speaker Black:

The purpose of this correspondence is to advise you of a recent re-organization within the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission.

The Division of Engineering Services was created through agency reorganization in 1997. Since its inception the interaction of the division and scope of services have changed considerably. When the division was formed in 1997, its assigned responsibilities included administration and management of the Wildlife Resources Commission capital improvement projects, development of new public boating access facilities and maintenance of 185 public boating access facilities. Each of the assigned responsibilities has undergone significant scope and complexity growth while additional agency level programs have been assigned to this organizational unit. On October 11, 2006, the executive director implemented a realignment of the Director's Office that established a new Deputy Director for Operations and Technical Services. The new deputy director supervises three new sections: Design Services; Capital Development and Construction; and Facilities and Operations. This organization will logically carry projects from the design phase through construction to maintenance and operation, including all the support services necessary to comply with policies and procedures. The concept is to provide support services to the core programs of the agency, which are wildlife management, inland fisheries, law enforcement, and conservation education. This arrangement will allow those programs to concentrate their resources fully on accomplishing their mission. A brief historical background and basis for change is outlined below:

Capital Development: In 1997, the Division of Engineering Services managed approximately 4 capital projects per year. Typical projects included pre-engineered metal buildings to be used by field staff for maintenance depots, dam repairs and small infrastructure repairs at state fish hatcheries. By 2004, the division reached a peak capital improvement project load of 30 active projects with a cumulative cost exceeding \$30,000,000. While some of the projects were of similar scope to those of preceding years, several noteworthy projects stand out as significantly more complex. For example, the Division managed the planning, design, and construction of the new 73,000 square ft. agency headquarters and Centennial Campus Wildlife Education Center. The total project cost was approximately \$13,500,000. Other projects that clearly illustrate increased scope and complexity include Armstrong State Fish Hatchery and Pisgah State Fish Hatchery infrastructure improvements. The Commission also recently completed major infrastructure improvements and construction of a state of the art warm water fish production facility at Watha State Fish Hatchery. The cost of the Watha project was approximately \$4,600,000. Ongoing operations, expanded agency program scope and added infrastructure demands associated with new buildings and recent acquisitions of tens of thousands of acres are indicators that the capital improvement needs of the agency will not subside in the next decade.

Boating Access: In 1997, the division operated and maintained approximately 185 public boating access facilities. The division also administered an access development program that included "in-house" planning, design and construction of public boating access facilities. As of October 2006, the operations and maintenance obligations of the division increased to more than 200 public boating access areas and 45 public fishing access areas. This change represents a 32% increase in public access facility maintenance obligations. Even though the Commission has increased the number of public access areas available through its programs, boaters in eastern North Carolina are experiencing a net loss of access largely due to increased development pressures that have resulted in conversion of semi-public access to private. The Commission is committed to addressing the loss of access by re-tooling its access program to become enable increased technical assistance to local government, increased planning and assessment capabilities, and enhanced capital development and construction services ability. All of these improvements must be coupled with enhanced and efficient operations and maintenance capabilities.

Facilities Management: Facilities management responsibilities were added to the division upon the completion of the 73,000 square ft. agency headquarters located on the Centennial Campus of N. C. State University. The headquarters building is the first sustainably designed state government building and requires careful facility management to optimize system operational efficiency. After assuming facility management responsibility for the headquareters, the division assumed similar responsibilities for the Outer Banks Center for Wildlife Education and the Pisgah Center for Wildlife Education. Future facility management responsibilities are expected at the John E. Pechmann Fishing Education Center and several state fish hatcheries.

Health and Safety: The Wildlife Commission Health and Safety Program was moved from Human Resources to the division in 2005. This state-wide program is designed to ensure compliance with all state and federal laws and increase employee and public safety and reduce workplace injuries through education, training and enforcement of the program policies and procedures.

Warehouse and Fulfillment Services: The Division of Engineering Services was assigned responsibility for warehouse operations in 2004. The division is currently converting the facility to a fulfillment center and expects to realize annual savings in excess of \$100,000.

Wildlife Inmate Services Program: The Commission entered into an agreement with the Department of Corrections in the fall of 2006. Under this agreement the Commission will operate a small manufacturing operation on the grounds of Dan River Prison Work Farm to supply Commission programs. The current production line includes floating dock units, buoy anchors, concrete parking curbs, and sign kiosks. The site includes six acres of underground irrigation and division staff are working with the horticulture program at Piedmont Community College to begin cultivating native plants to use in stream restoration and other habitat improvement projects.

Legislative Representation: The Engineering Services division chief was selected by the executive director to represent the Commission on matters of legislative interest in the 2005 short session of the General Assembly. These responsibilities were permanently assigned to him in his new capacity as a deputy director. It is his responsibility to develop and implement agency legislative relations strategies and legislative representation including testimony in discussions with state legislators, the governor's office, and the congressional delegation.

Sustainability: The recent completion of a sustainably designed headquarters is a testament to its commitment to sustainability. The building was designed to reflect the agency's commitment to conserving the state's natural resources. The recent creation of an agency level sustainability program is the next step in the Commission's commitment to sustainability. This program is delegated to the newly created deputy director
