In accordance with G.S. 120-76.1 the following expenditure was approved without consulting the Commission because of an emergency that posed an imminent threat to public health and safety.

Wildlife Resources Commission (WRC) – Holly Shelter Game Land Bridge (\$200,000)

A wooden bridge has deteriorated to the point of being unsafe. The bridge spans Ashes Creek and is located in the Bear Garden Tract of Holly Shelter Game Land in Pender County. The bridge is currently used to provide public access, safety, fire control and management of the eastern half of the Bear Garden Tract. The WRC examined replacing the bridge in 2004, but found the \$400,000 estimates to be cost-prohibitive. The bridge has deteriorated much more quickly than expected and needs to be replaced for safety concerns. Due to current economic conditions the estimated cost of replacing the bridge has decreased to \$200,000 and there are federal funds currently available to pay 75% of the cost resulting in an outlay of \$50,000 of state funds that would come from timber receipts.
