- (1) The number of applicants for a license $\underline{613}$, and of that number, the number granted a license $\underline{416}$.
- (2) The number of applicants with a conviction record $\underline{20}$, and of that number, the number granted a license $\underline{9}$, denied a license for any reason $\underline{1}$, and denied a license because of a conviction $\underline{1}$.
- (3) The number of applicants with military training $\underline{0}$, the number granted a license $\underline{0}$, the number denied a license for any reason $\underline{0}$, and a summary of the reasons for denial <u>N/A</u> The information provided in accordance with this subdivision shall not disclose any identifying information of any applicant.
- (4) The number of applicants who are military spouses $\underline{2}$, the number granted a license 2, the number denied a license for any reason $\underline{0}$, and a summary of the reasons for denial $\underline{N/A}$. The information provided in accordance with this subdivision shall not disclose any identifying information of any applicant.

*NOTE: For (3) and (4) Session Law 2020-87, PART III, SECTION 4. became effective 12/1/2020 and applies to applications for licensure received on or after that date. Numbers provided reflect seven (7) months of the Fiscal Year 2020 - 2021. It appears that "military training" as used in the statute refers to relevance to the state agency licensing requirements rather than a broader military *service* experience.

Please note that <u>18</u> applicants with military *service* were qualified as eligible to take the state licensing exam because they successfully completed a pre-licensing course, some through veterans programs, and were issued licenses.

For all applicants with military training, military spouses or military *service*, the summary of reasons for denial is like those without:

- 1. Primarily, a failure to pass the North Carolina state licensing examination.
- 2. Secondarily, not meeting Board Rule 11 NCAC 08 .1004 EQUIVALENT EXPERIENCE requirements nor individual case-by-case review by the Application Evaluation Committee (i.e. out-of-state home inspection report does not meet Standards of Practice requirements). Most military trained individuals are aware whether their MOS (Military Occupational Specialty) may not be applicable to licensure as a home inspector and decide to take a prelicensing course (individual examples include: pilot, air crew, logistics, medic, infantryman, artillery, etc.).
