The NCMB maintains a registry of polysomnographic technicians ("sleep techs"), but does not license them. In 2018, the NCMB registered 53 sleep techs in North Carolina.

- (5a) The number who failed the examination: N/A.
- (6) The number who applied for license by reciprocity or comity: N/A.
- (7) The number who were granted licenses by reciprocity or comity: N/A.

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- (7a) The number of official complaints received involving licensed or unlicensed activities: In 2018, the NCMB opened 2,680 cases. Of those cases, 1,502 complaints were from patients/public in 2018. The other cases were opened based on out-of-state actions, field investigations, malpractice payment reviews, licensing applications, Safe Opioid Prescribing Initiative, and Medical Examiner reports.
- (7b) The number of disciplinary actions taken against licensees, or other actions taken against nonlicensees, including injunctive relief: The NCMB took 207 prejudicial actions* against licensees or Nurse Practitioners in 2018. Please note that some individuals had more than one action for the year.

*prejudicial action includes: revocation, suspension, reprimands, surrender or denial of a license, probation, condition, limitation or restriction of license or practice, public letters of concern and/or fines.

- (8) The number of licenses suspended or revoked: The NCMB suspended 25 licenses and revoked 3 licenses. There was also 1 summary suspension.
- (9) The number of licenses terminated for any reason other than failure to pay the required renewal fee: In 2018, 25 licenses were suspended, 6 licenses were surrendered, 3 licenses were revoked, 7 licensees entered into non-practice agreements, 1 license was made inactive in lieu of other action, and 1 license was summarily suspended.
- (9a) The number of applicants for a license and, of that number, the number granted a license. The Board issued 5,277 licenses. The Board denied 3 licenses.
- (9b) The number of applicants with a conviction record and, of that number, the number granted a license, denied a license for any reason, and denied a license because of a conviction. In 2017, the Board voted to remove the question regarding charges, arrests and convictions from its licensing applications. The Board would rely on collecting misdemeanor and felony information from background checks. There are restrictions on the use of the data from background checks and the Board is unable to ascertain the number of applicants with a conviction record and of that number the number granted a license. However, the Board only denied 3 licenses in 2018 and none of them were denied on the basis of a conviction.
