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From the Chief Executive Officer

As in years past, this Annual Report was designed to give you more detailed information about the Board than is required by State Law. For example, as I prepare this letter the number of licensed nurses in North Carolina has surpassed 157,000. Among those licensees are 11,000 Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRN), a record for North Carolina. Our state is very fortunate in that, as our population grows to more than 10.5 million people, our nursing population continues to increase.

A new era of interstate licensure was ushered in this year when the North Carolina General Assembly passed and the Governor signed the Enhanced Nurse Licensure Compact legislation (eNLC) in July 2017. North Carolina was the 26th state to pass the necessary legislation which triggered enactment of the eNLC, which will be implemented on January 19, 2018.

This past year there have been numerous high profile news stories about organizations that have unwittingly compromised personal data of their clients or customers. The Board of Nursing continues to maintain all licensee personally identifiable information with great care to preserve the security and confidentiality of personal information from unauthorized access, use or disclosure. In addition, we are periodically audited by the FBI to confirm that our systems meet compliance requirements and that licensee data is thoroughly protected.

Lastly, I am proud to report that our audited financial statements continue to reflect sound fiscal management.




As of Jan. 19, 2018, the eNLC multistate license allows nurses to practice in other eNLC states (lighter blue states) but not in the remaining original NLC states (darker blue states) unless they apply for a single-state license in those states.

Administrative Rule Actions

Periodic Review of Existing Rules

In 2017, the Board conducted a review of the Board's existing administrative rules in accordance with N.C. Gen. Stat. § 150B-21.3A. The Periodic Review Determination Report will be reviewed by the Rules Review Commission in November 2017. In 2018, the Board anticipates re-adoption of Rules based upon the final determination report and the deadline for re-adoption as established by the Commission.



Practice Act Amendments



In 2017, the Board proposed legislation to update the Nurse Licensure Compact. The Enhanced Nurse Licensure Compact (eNLC) was signed into law by Governor Roy Cooper on July 20, 2017.





Fiscal

The financial statements represent our continuing commitment to providing the highest standards of financial management and reporting, as well as responsibility and accountability for the resources of the North Carolina Board of Nursing.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States as prescribed by Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

The financial statements report all activities of the North Carolina Board of Nursing using the full accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized in the accounting period in which they are earned and become measurable. Expenses are recognized when incurred, if measurable.

Licenses are renewed for a period of two years. License renewal fees are deferred and recognized as revenue over the two-year period to which they relate.
