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Introduction

Article 29A of Chapter 116 of the North Carolina General Statutes provides for the University of North Carolina (UNC) to establish nine (9) laboratory schools by 2019



Mission

Creates public schools of choice with three goals:


- Improve outcomes of K-8 students from lowperforming settings
- Strengthen teacher preparation
- Strengthen principal preparation

Year 1 Laboratory Schools

- East Carolina University opened the ECU Laboratory
 School at South Greenville Elementary School in Pitt
 County serving grades 2 through 4
- Western Carolina University opened the Catamount
 School at Smoky Mountain High School in Jackson
 County serving grades 6 through 8



Year 2 Laboratory Schools

- ASU is working with Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Schools at Middle Fork Elementary School
- UNCW is working with New Hanover County Schools at D.C. Virgo Preparatory Academy
- UNCG is working with Rockingham County Schools at Moss Street Elementary School



Year 3 Laboratory Schools

- UNCP is working with the Public Schools of Robeson County to open an elementary school
- UNCC is working with Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools to open an elementary school
- NCCU is in the process of identifying a partner
- A ninth institution will be identified



Current Enrollment

	ECU	WCU	TOTAL
Number of Applications Received	104	74	178
Number of Students Enrolled	72	57	129



Current Enrollment

- 63% of students were previously enrolled in a lowperforming school. The others failed to meet expected growth as defined by the legislation.
- The majority of students are male (65% ECU, 58% WCU).
- 54% of students are African American and 39% are white.

2018 Reporting Requirements (2 of 2)

4. Academic progress

- Against previous school year
- Against other LEA and state schools
- 5. Educator preparation outcomes for teachers and principals prepared at the laboratory schools
- 6. Best practices resulting from laboratory school operations
- 7. Other information





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
