Headcount Enrollment in UNC Institutions, Fall 2009



Graduation Rates at UNC

UNC 4-year Graduation Rate = 35.2%

National Average 4-year Graduation Rate (public) = 26.7%

UNC 6-year Graduation Rate = 58.8%

National Average 6-year Graduation Rate (public) = 49%

What is not considered in these calculations:

- Transfer Students Students that transfer out of a UNC institution to another college/university in NC or out-of-state.
- Students that return to the community college
- Rate is calculated based on time to degree, not credit hours towards degree.

Success NC Joint Initiative with Community Colleges

- Increase production of associate's and bachelor's degrees and certificates
- Improve the connection between high schools and colleges, and between community colleges and universities
- Develop articulation between community colleges and universities in online environment
- Jointly manage the transfer process



Recent Survey on Why Students Drop Out

- Myth No. 1: Most students go to college full-time. If they leave without a degree, it's because they're bored with their classes and don't want to work hard.
- Reality No. 1: Most students leave college because they're going to school and working to support themselves at the same time. At some point, the stress of work and study just becomes too much.
- Myth No. 2: Most college students are supported by their parents and take advantage of a multitude of loans, scholarships, and savings plans.
- Reality No. 2: Young people who fail to finish college are often going it alone financially. They're essentially putting themselves through college.

Recent Survey on Why Students Drop Out, continued

- Myth No. 3: Most students go through a meticulous process of choosing their college from an array of alternatives.
- Reality No. 3: Among students who don't graduate, the college selection process is far more limited and often seems happenstance and uninformed.
- Myth No. 4: Students who don't graduate understand fully the value of a college degree and the consequences and trade-offs of leaving school without a degree.
- Reality No. 4: Students who leave college realize that a diploma is an asset, but they may not fully recognize the impact that dropping out will have on their future.



Success Models

- Four-year and six-year graduation rates
- First to second year persistence + progress to degree
- Freshman enrollment in college level courses with no remediation required
- Full-time enrollment in college
- Freshman grade point average and/or attainment of specific grades in certain courses (C-WALL courses)
- Admission criteria appropriate for enrollment goals/targets



Some Emerging Themes from the Retention/Graduation Discussion

- Higher retention and graduation rates increase access
- Early warning and response system for addressing student difficulties is critical
- Data and evidence-based outcomes will determine the appropriate support methods for various cohorts of students
- Partner with the community colleges to prepare students who have not traditionally been successful to be successful as transfers
- Online and flexible course scheduling are tools to keep students enrolled

- Academic supports (tutoring, supplemental instruction & writing) (ECU, NCSU, NC A&T & WCU)
- Summer bridge programs: supporting the mission of access & diversity (FSU)
- Enhanced academic advising (NCCU)
- First year college (NCSU)
- Revised admissions approach (UNCA)
- Reorganizing for retention (UNCG, NCCU & WSU)
- Community college partnerships and Dual-degree programs (FSU & UNCP)
- Reducing academic load thru on-line assistance (UNC-SA)
