

NCVPS - Historic Sources of Funding





Teacher Pay & Course Limits

- Per student pay rates
 - \$200 per student for summer courses/credit recovery
 - \$350 per student for semester or block courses
 - \$400 per student for year-long courses
 - Each class limited to 30 students
- Course limits (waivers allowed)
 - − Full-time teachers − 2 courses per fiscal year
 - Part-time (contract) teachers 8 courses per fiscal year
- Salary cannot exceed \$85,000 per year without a waiver
- Payment via two checks: 1 after drop/add, 1 after course completion



NCVPS Access/Tuition

- NCVPS courses are provided at no charge for public school students
- 2009 Budget directed State Board to report its policy for nonpublic school students
 - Dec 2009: SBE made decision to begin charging tuition to nonpublic school students taking NCVPS courses
 - March 2010: State Board discusses 5 options
 - Semester course tuitions ranging from \$375 to \$450
 - Decision expected at April 2010 State Board meeting regarding tuition rates



Issues for 2010 Session

Implementing a Formula

- GA required that SBE present a funding formula:
 - Realize savings that accrue since VPS students are not in a face-to-face classroom
 - Create a sustainable funding source as enrollment continues to grow
- SBE proposal:
 - Project number of courses in future years
 - Multiply by \$247 (marginal cost per course)
- GA will consider SBE proposal, among other options

Issues for 2010 Session

Expansion to K-8

- Currently, NCVPS limited to high school courses
- Governor's 2009 Budget recommended expanding into lower grades
- 2010 Session, General Assembly will likely continue to weigh costs and benefits of expanding offerings to lower grade levels
