DRAFT MINUTES Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee October 13, 2009

The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee met on Tuesday, October 13, 2009 at 1:00 pm in Room 544 of the Legislative Office Building. House Co-Chairman, Representative Doug Yongue presided and first welcomed our new Senate Co-Chairman, Senator Tony Foriest to the committee. This first interim meeting was attended by Representatives Bell, Blackwood, Cotham, Fisher, Jeffus, Johnson, Lucas, Parmon, Rapp, Tolson, Warren, and Wiley, in addition to Senators Atwater, Dannelly, Goss, Hartsell, Nesbitt, Queen, Stevens, Swindell, and Tillman. Chairman Yongue welcomed the new members – Representatives Earline Parmon and Laura Wiley. He then welcomed the committee staff – Ms. Shirley Iorio, Ms. Kara McKraw, Ms. Drupti Chauhan, Ms. Dee Atkinson, Ms. Sara Kamprath, Ms. Jackie Ray, and Ms. Katie Stanley, as well as the Sergeant-at-Arms staff – Mr. Dusty Rhodes, Mr. Mike Martin, Mr. James Worth, Mr. John Fitchett, Mr. Wade Evans, Mr. Curtis Dowd, and Mr. Stan Johnson. Chairman Yongue asked fellow Chairman Foriest to say a few words. Chairman Foriest told the committee of his gratitude for this opportunity to serve on this committee and contribute to decisions that may enhance the state of education in North Carolina. Chairman Yongue then asked the committee to submit potential agenda items to staff for review in the coming days. The agenda, attendance record, and list of visitors are attached (Attachments 1-3).

As the first order of business, Chairman Yongue invited Ms. Shirley Iorio to present the committee's authorizing legislation, estimated budget, possible studies, and reports due to the committee. Ms. Iorio provided this information to the committee.

Chairman Yongue asked the committee to review minutes from the January 14, 2009 meeting. With a motion for approval from Representative Bell, the committee voted to approve these minutes. Chairman Yongue then invited the first presenter.

Effect of Budget Reductions

NC Independent Colleges & Universities

Dr. Hope Williams, President, NC Independent Colleges and Universities, began by thanking members of the committee for funding the various grants-in-aid to private college students. She highlighted the various struggles facing these colleges and students. Dr. Williams noted that during these tough economic times, donor support has decreased and colleges have made cuts to their budgets. Even more students are requesting financial aid and some are returning to request additional aid due to family financial struggles. The State Contractual Scholarship was funded at the current level, with no cut. At the state level, three major program areas were cut in the 2009 budget, beginning with the Legislative Tuition Grant. This grant-in-aid program, initiated in 1972, provides taxpayer assistance in the amount of \$1,850 (post-cut) per year to in-state students attending private colleges or universities, regardless of need. This cut of \$100 per student applies to each student. The second cut was a total program elimination of any aid to part-time or half-time students as they are called. This aid was targeted towards adult students who take courses in the evening or on weekends in order to complete a bachelor's degree. After hearing back from some colleges' financial aid offices, Dr. Williams reported that adults

previously benefitting from the part-time aid in 2008 are now taking fewer courses or none at all. The third program, the EARN program was cut in half for the fall semester, and eliminated for the spring semester. This need-based aid program will mean a loss for students who have experienced a 200% poverty rate, and may receive up to \$4,000 in aid per year over a 2 year period. A typical student receiving aid from the EARN scholarship will loose up to \$4,000 during this year. Dr. Williams also reviewed other financial aid resources that students may benefit from in North Carolina, like the need-based lottery scholarship or other institutional aid programs. She claimed that while colleges are working hard on behalf of students to make up for lost aid; the gap still exists for many.

Senator Swindell commended Dr. Williams and the private colleges and universities for the work they are doing. Senator Swindell asked Dr. Williams to comment on the variance of costs to the state depending on where a student attends and the tuition costs. Dr. Williams explained that the State Contractual Scholarship is a need-based program allocated to campuses according to the number of North Carolina students. From that point, the money is allocated to students based on the level of financial need. The average amount of a need-based grant is about \$2,800 according to Dr. Williams. Representative Blackwood asked if enrollment numbers changed. Dr. Williams notes that while data is still coming in, the idea is that enrollment has decrease at some private colleges and has increased at others. Representative Blackwood asked Dr. Williams for the cost to the state per student. Dr. Williams answered saying that a student with financial need may cost the state \$3,200, which includes the \$1,850 Legislative Tuition Grant and \$1,350 from the State Contractual Scholarship. A student with no financial need would only cost the state \$1,850. Senator Foriest asked about the impact of cuts in total on the 37,000 students educated in private college students. Dr. Williams knew of no specific number of students who were unable to attend courses due to budget cuts. Senator Goss asked if there is any alternative to students with need appearing before the staff in a financial aid office. Dr. Williams affirmed that students with additional need know to go to the financial aid office. Representative Rapp, a professor at Mars Hill College, asked Dr. Williams to identify how many adult students attend private colleges in NC. Dr. Williams said that many colleges may have as many as 50% adult students. Representative Wiley acknowledged and commended the private colleges for stretching a dollar. She asked Dr. Williams to identify efforts made to decrease the actual cost to a student. Dr. Williams noted the many cuts to personnel, degree programs, and other items within operating budgets. Chairman Yongue praised the private colleges for the opportunities they have afforded to students, and the legislature for their support.

The University of North Carolina

Chairman Yongue invited President Erskine Bowles, the University System of North Carolina, to present to the committee on the impact of the recession and the recent legislative budget cuts. The University System has cut over 900 administrative positions. Over 600 of these 900 positions were filled only one year ago. These total cuts have amounted to \$294 million dollars. President Bowles cited several initiatives to increase efficiency such as the work of the UNC Tomorrow Commission, the Bain Study, the PACE Initiative, the Financial Improvement and Transformation project, and other internal reviews. Administrative costs have been reduced by more than 23%, which includes a permanent reduction of 18%. Reductions to academic costs have amounted to 5%, which included a 1% permanent cut. These cuts were

aimed at protecting the academic core and reducing duplication. President Bowles proceeded to explain the 2009-2010 Action Plan as presented by the UNC Tomorrow Commission. The Action Plan is attached as well as a handout outlining budget reductions and expansion items (Attachments 4-5).

The five major goals are as follows:

- 1. Improve K-12 public education by producing more and better teachers and principals. The Longitudinal Data Study, to be complete by December 2009, will aid the University system in achieving these goals.
- 2. Increase access to the higher education by working closely with the North Carolina Community Colleges, investing in distance education, studying need-based financial aid, reviewing enrollment growth plans, and reviewing 4-year tuition plans.
- 3. Transform institutions to be more nimble, efficient, and responsive by eliminating needless regulations, evaluating performance goals, emphasizing demand, instituting E-Procurement, and many other efforts.
- 4. Increase focused research and become more actively engaged in economic transformation by focusing on innovation, research needs indentified by the UNC Tomorrow Commission, and taking advantage of stimulus funding.
- 5. Enhance global competitiveness of the institutions and graduates by setting high, uniform standards, providing better customer service, and focusing on retention and graduation.

Representative Fisher asked President Bowles to comment on efforts to bridge the gap between high school students and the universities. President Bowles mentioned the Acupuncture Test aimed at gauging whether or not a high school student is ready and prepared for the university by testing the student in the 10th grade. Chairman Foriest praised the University System for their efforts to make smart cuts, to identify strengths and weaknesses, and to realize opportunities even in these tough economic times. Representative Johnson asked if security was cut, since the General Assembly gave expansion dollars to the University System two years ago to strengthen security o campuses. President Bowles assured the committee that security was identified as a major priority and was not cut. Representative Blackwood asked President Bowles to identify control measures for different variables in the longitudinal data study. He assured Representative Blackwood that the study does properly control for variables outside of teacher performance. This information will be presented to the committee once the study is complete. Senator Queen asked how we, as a state, can improve upon our private Research and Development fund balance. President Bowles suggested that we are doubling our federal research efforts. The UNC System is working with IBM as a partner to revise legal documents and map patents. Representative Rapp asked for a breakdown of data to identify the age of students at universities and for a copy of the SLOAN Report. President Bowles promised to provide this information at a later date. Representative Bell asked why the state's universities

are not incorporating the National Board Certification curriculum within our teacher preparation program. President Bowles assured Representative Bell that the longitudinal study, once complete, will provide more information like this to identify best practices. With no further questions, Chairman Yongue invited the next presenter.

The NC Community College System

Dr. Scott Ralls, President, NC Community College System, began by presenting an overview of budget reductions, totaling \$1.24 million in state dollars. He began by reviewing enrollment trends in the last decade, where the community colleges educated an additional 100,000 students. A marked 30% spike in enrollment occurred last year in 2008-2009. President Ralls thanked members for there support during the budget cycle. With completion of the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement a decade ago, enrollment in arts and sciences has more than doubled. The arts and sciences courses are general education requirements that students may take when planning to transfer to the university. The Health Sciences program has experienced over 73% growth in the last ten years as the demand for health professionals has increased. Other growing programs areas include public service, technical programs, and business technologies. The NC Community Colleges are putting more emphasis on the measurement of a student's success by tracking the rate that students are awarded certificates, degrees, and diplomas. Over the past ten years, the total number of degrees, certificates, and diplomas awarded has increased 53%. Other factors contributing to higher enrollment may be seen in President Ralls' presentation (Attachment 6). In a normal year, the community colleges experience some attrition in the spring semester. With record unemployment numbers in this economy, the community colleges may have increased enrollment in the spring. The system is highly influenced by the cyclical economy, feeling the enrollment highs and lows according to the unemployment rate. President Ralls noted that enrollment may be as high at an additional 20,000 full-time equivalent students, or a 12% increase. Colleges are trying to accommodate students when one course is unavailable, by suggesting another required course instead. However, with the issue of physical space available and classroom capacity, students have been turned away at 24 colleges from specific courses.

Senator Foriest asked if the colleges are burdened with the added pressure of educating high school students in early colleges and middle colleges, as well as prepare thousands for transfer into a university. President Ralls answered, saying that while they do feel pressure, they'll be identifying ways to remedy some of these pressures in the future. He assured the committee that so long as the legislature expresses the need for more allied heath professionals and technical education students, they will meet these priority needs while filling many other roles. Representative Rapp asked President Ralls to address the impact of dual enrollment programs. President Ralls suggested that the data is not yet available, but has had a significant impact that has been felt. Representative Blackwood questioned the enrollment funding measure – FTE – and asked President Ralls to comment. President Ralls assured the committee that while he appreciates the legislature's efforts to address enrollment shortfalls by appropriating dollars to a reserve fund, the colleges would love to be funded more like public schools. The public schools are able to project enrollment and then adjust during the first month or so. The community colleges are funded in arrears and are unprepared when an enrollment spike occurs. Representative Blackwood asked for the cost per student to the state. Ms. Jennifer Haygood,

Chief Financial Officer, NC Community College System, stated that the state's cost per student is about \$4,200. The total cost is \$5,500, with the difference of \$1,300 made up by tuition receipts. Representative Lucas asked how many students in the arts and sciences program go on to the university. President Ralls said about one third of the students transfer to the university. He then assured the committee that there is a renewed focus on measuring student success in the future. Senator Goss asked if, during these stressed economic times, students are referred to a nearby college if the closest campus is at capacity. President Ralls said that this naturally happens especially in English 111 or health sciences. Senator Queen asked for comment on the use of performance measures. President Ralls said the community colleges are making performance based decisions. They are working on the P-20 longitudinal data study and working to improve intermediate measures – to produce an outcome. Senator Dannelly asked if any other state has a better funding mechanism. President Ralls could not identify a mechanism better than FTE, but suggested that there are ways to improve – such as forward funding. There were no further questions.

NC Department of Public Instruction

Dr. June Atkinson, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, discussed the impact of the budget on public schools. The 2009 budget's reductions occurred in four main areas – program elimination, permanent program cuts, non-recurring program cuts, and a discretionary adjustment for each LEA. The discretionary cuts have impacted personnel through teacher and teacher assistant layoffs. The Department has cut 64 positions and felt the impact in cuts to school support. Please see the presentation in its entirety (Attachment 7). Representative Rapp asked about our potential for being awarded American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds. Superintendent Atkinson said the state is positioned well to receive these funds. She sought to quell fears that a state mandated charter school cap may hold us back, by mentioning other innovative programs – like Learn and Earn online. Senator Queen asked about the ratio of administrative cuts to classroom cuts. Superintendent Atkinson noted that 12% of cuts were made to central office staff, with the remaining 88% affecting classrooms.

Chairman Yongue announced that the committee would meet again tomorrow morning, October 14, 2009 at 9:00 am. With no further business, Chairman Yongue adjourned the meeting at 4:00 pm.

JOINT LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

October 14, 2009

The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee met on Wednesday, October 14, 2009, at 9:00 a.m. in Room 544 of the Legislative Office Building. Senator Tony Foriest, Senate Co-Chairman, presided and the following senators were in attendance: Senators Atwater, Dannelly, Goss, Hartsell, Swindell and Tillman. The following House members were also present: Representative Douglas Yongue, House Co-Chairman; Representatives Bell, Blackwood, Cotham, Fisher, Jeffus, Johnson, Lucas, Parmon, Tolson, Warren and Wiley. The following members of the Legislative Research staff were in attendance: Shirley Iorio, Drupti Chauhan, Kara McCraw, Sara Kamprath and Dee Atkinson. Members of the Fiscal Research Division were present. Committee Clerks Jackie Ray and Katie Stanley were present as well. Members of the sergeant-at-arms were present.

Chairman Foriest convened the meeting and welcomed members, staff and guests. He briefly recapped some of the information received from the October 13th meeting and noted that the Committee had learned a lot about how the existing budget deficit has affected various educational institutions. Senator Foriest further noted that the Committee's work is vital in order to ensure that education stays at the forefront of what is done here at the General Assembly.

Race to the Top Fund

Chairman Foriest recognized officials from the NC Department of Public Instruction (DPI), who addressed the Committee regarding the Race to the Top Fund (RTTT) initiative (Attachment 1).

Dr. June Atkinson, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, addressed the Committee concerning what NC is doing to get RTTT dollars. She noted that as an initiative of Governor Perdue, there are many partners working together in trying to secure these competitive dollars for NC. The steering committee working with this initiative includes: Myra Best, of the Governor's Office; Dr. Bill Harrison, Chairman, State Board of Education; Dr. Atkinson; Allison Bailey of the Boston Consulting Group; and Dr. Glenn Kleiman, of the Friday Institute at NC State University.

The RTTT is an application/proposal to request additional education funds from the US Department of Education's American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The US Department of Education has been allotted discretionary funds of approximately \$5 billion. The Secretary of Education also has \$350 million for new assessments and \$650 million for innovation to be distributed. North Carolina's proposal is to vie for part of that money – somewhere between \$300-500 million. Dr. Atkinson noted that although 50% of the dollars received must go to school districts, there must be provisions for other costs including administrative and technology infrastructure. She indicated that other dollars received will depend on NC's alignment within the RTTT framework.

Dr. Atkinson noted that should we get them, RTTT dollars would allow NC to accelerate and enhance the State Board of Education's goals adopted approximately three years ago. She stated that the whole conceptual reason of obtaining the RTTT dollars is to ensure that all of NC students are college and career ready without needing remediation. Dr. Atkinson used as a model the analogy of a GPS system in navigating to get students ready for college or a career.

RTTT requires four advance core reforms:

- 1) College and career-ready standards and high quality, valid, and reliable assessments for all students, including students who have English as a second language as well as students with disabilities;
- 2) Pre-K to higher education data systems that meet the principles in the American COMPETES Act;
- 3) Teacher effectiveness and equitable distribution of effective teachers; and,
- 4) Intensive support and effective interventions for lowest-performing schools.

Dr. Atkinson noted that final guidelines for developing the RTTT proposals are not due out until November, the final proposal is due to the Department of Education in January 2010, and that first-round funding and grant approval is scheduled for April 2010. She indicated that there are many successful factors which place NC at or near the top for receiving funding. These factors include: NC being a leading state for educational reform and improvement, NC being a model state where educational initiatives can be replicated, NC having a well-designed, research-based plan, and NC's adherence to RTTT criteria and guidelines.

Dr. Atkinson discussed measurable goals and bold initiatives designed to enhance and accelerate NC's strategic approach. Such goals include:

- Increase graduation rate
- Turn low-performing schools into successful schools
- Increase number of students taking challenging capstones courses
- Ensure qualified, effective teachers and principals in all classes and schools
- Prepare all students to be college- and/or career-ready

The initiatives include:

- New teacher and school executive standards and evaluation processes
- ACRE
- CEDARS
- District and School Transformation
- NC Virtual Public School
- School connectivity
- Teacher Working Conditions survey
- Nationally Board Certified Teachers
- Early college high schools

Work has been progressing on various aspects of the RTTT proposal, including \$250,000 in funding from the Gates Foundation to hire the Boston Consulting Group to assist in preparing the proposal. Dr. Atkinson noted that all of these approaches and initiatives, as well as partnerships and broad

support received are designed to ensure that NC has the best proposal for RTTT efforts and that we remain highly competitive.

Dr. Rebecca Garland, Associate State Superintendent/Chief Academic Officer, and Adam Levinson, Director of Policy and Strategic Planning, NC Department of Public Instruction addressed the Committee regarding the status of the reforms and initiatives laid out by Dr. Atkinson. The following assurances were discussed:

Assurance One: Standards and Assessments – (Dr. Garland)

Accountability Curriculum Revision Effort (ACRE), a new standard course of development which deals with benchmarks, assessments, and accountability measures for graduating globally competitive students.

Assurance Two: Longitudinal Data Systems – (Mr. Levinson)

Common Education Data Analysis and Reporting System (CEDARS), which includes core components of NC P-20+ and P-13 education data designed with the following goals in mind:

- 1) Provide infrastructure to enable data-driven decision making
- 2) Increase quality and accessibility of education data

Assurance Three: Turning Around Struggling Schools – (Dr. Garland)

This is designed to help student achievement through a statewide system of support. Focus includes low-performing schools, corrective action, turnaround schools, partnership with school districts, and consent order to work with Halifax County schools as issued by Superior Court Judge Howard Manning (Attachment 2).

Assurance Four: Effective Leaders - (Dr. Garland)

Designed to identify gaps in terms of 21st century skills with a regional approach to address needs and provide teachers, administrators, and leaders with the necessary support they need to successfully run schools and districts.

Mr. Levinson rounded out the discussion concerning issues relative to the four assurance areas. These include the use of technology to provide cost-effective support, as well as the need for strong research and evaluation planning for identifying programs that are working.

Dr. Atkinson emphasized that the work involved in getting the grant would be tedious; however, it is important that students get to their destination, graduate, and are prepared both college and career-ready. The RTTT effort will help attain this goal and will also help students to move and accelerate with 100% graduation rates. Dr. Atkinson noted that should NC not receive the RTTT dollars, or the amount requested, they will continue to move forward, although they may move at a much more uneven pace. She noted that if such is the case, they would apply for other competitive grants which would help get dollars to do some portions of the total picture of the RTTT.

Chairman Foriest thanked the DPI officials for their presentations. Chairman Yongue briefly addressed the Committee. There were questions and comments taken from Committee members regarding RTTT concerns and appropriate DPI staff answered and/or addressed accordingly.

Update on DPI Organization

Chairman Foriest recognized Dr. Bill Harrison, who, along with Dr. Atkinson, addressed the Committee regarding the organization of the State Board of Education and the NC DPI. Dr. Harrison noted that the status of the recent court case has been resolved. He indicated that although he did resign his position as CEO, he was excited about the opportunity to serve as Chairman of the State Board of Education. Dr. Harrison stated that they will continue to focus on policy and provide support to Dr. Atkinson's staff to ensure that the needs of every child in the state of NC are met. Dr. Atkinson concurred that she was glad that the court case was behind them and that she has had a tradition of working well with the State Board of Education.

Dr. Atkinson referenced the different areas of the Public Schools of NC Organizational Chart (Attachment 3). She noted that although some DPI employees have flexible hours and are required to be out of the office, if anyone from the NC General Assembly, or any other agency, needs to contact them directly, they are doing their best to be responsive.

Chairman Foriest thanked Dr. Harrison and Dr. Atkinson for their efforts. He noted that the next Committee meeting was scheduled for November 9 and 10, 2009. Chairman Foriest indicated that in trying to address issues important to the NC General Assembly and to this Committee, the Chairs ask that requests be made to the Committee in writing.

Chairman Yongue announced that a schedule was being passed out to members noting a change in the Committee schedule for February 2010 (Attachment 4).

Chairman Foriest adjourned the meeting at 11:15 a.m.





Student Headcount Enrollment


1999-2009 Unduplicated Total Headcount






Full-Time Equivalent Student Enrollment

1999-2009 Total FTE




FTE Student Enrollment by Program





1999-2009 Curriculum Enrollment







Growth in Degrees Awarded



Percentage of Students Employed While Enrolled




Percentage of Students Enrolled Full-Time

Number of Students Receiving Pell Grant










