# JOINT LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

Monday October 31, 2011

The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee met on Monday, October 31, 2011, at 10:00 a.m. in room 643 of the Legislative Office Building. Representative Bryan Holloway, House Co-Chairman, presided. ### **Private Colleges and Universities Current Efforts and Future Plans**

Chairman Holloway introduced Dr. A. Hope Williams, President of North Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities.

Dr. Williams addressed the committee on North Carolina independent colleges and Universities initiatives and specific questions regarding college readiness. She discussed a few facts so the members of the committee would know a generalized background about how many Universities, Independent Colleges and North Carolina Undergrads we currently hold in our state. Dr. Williams referenced 36 private non-profit universities and independent colleges across the state, 40,000 North Carolina undergrads attending our Colleges and Universities and NCICU currently awards 1/3 of baccalaureate degrees in the state. She emphasized that NCICU takes North Carolina students very seriously and continues to strive for them all to be successful.

Dr. Williams then spoke towards remediation challenges on every campus. She said that finding a common definition is difficult based on the different ways remediation affects different Colleges and Universities. She spoke about the progression, attention, and work being done with the UNC System and Community Colleges to improve career and college readiness.

Dr. Williams spoke about how North Carolina Colleges believe there is much more needed than a score on a test in determining their student's remediation. Other ways Colleges are seeking to improve this is to look at other factors such as essay writing, interviews, technology literacy, maturity, motivation, and determination. Deans and others College and University Leadership have found willingness for students to work hard can mean just as much as their G.P.A. They have determined that being able to control not only your work, but your work habits in a college environment drastically increase a student's readiness.

She spoke to the Committee about how they are focusing more towards the idea of being developmental because that assumes continued growth verses remediation which implies catching up. Each of their Colleges has a Resource Center where students can get peer tutoring as well as bridge the gap from K-12 and get involved in transition programs. There have been no set plans to change the remediation program dramatically but College and Universities are still continuing to look for ways to improve college readiness and are even suggesting tying it into social media.

Institutions are also currently seeking to communicate with teachers and the public school community in K-12 in order to look at handling readiness issues before they even get to the college level. Teacher education programs are difficult because each teacher has to try and meet individual needs of students when every student's background and learning curve is different. Changes in these programs have happened to improve readiness and teacher education; however it is hard to figure out what factors are actually working.

NCICU has several community projects currently in place in order to help student with college readiness and remediation. Some of these programs consist of camps and programs Colleges offer in the summer for students to get acquainted with a College and University atmosphere and educate students on college access and success, leadership programs and Saturday morning

academies. ELON is currently running a program that has been going for three years that has had a great amount of success. They take third grade student who cannot read and stage an intervention with the student and their families to help better prepare the child not only in the classroom, but at home as well. Dr. Williams concluded with the notion that there is a lot of room for improvement and Colleges and Universities are striving for all of their students to be college ready when they enroll.
