State and Federal Aid Share the Concept of "Cost of Attendance" used in Determining "Financial Need"

- Tuition and fees
- Room and meals
- Books and supplies
- Transportation
- Personal expenses

Campuses establish average costs for different categories of students (dormitory, off-campus, with parents).

Budget can be modified for individuals with unique circumstances, such as dependent care or disability expenses.

Cost of attendance is used to determine the maximum amount in grants and loans for which a student may be eligible.

Cost of Attendance Items Vary

■ By Institution:

- Housing
 - ◆ Accommodates market differences
 - ♦ Housing costs on campuses vary by residence hall
- Meals
 - ♦ Based on 21 meals per week
 - Accommodates market differences
- Other costs
 - ◆ Campus costs for books and transportation vary

■ By Student:

- Students enrolled at the same institution have different room and board costs
 - With parent
 - ♦ On campus
 - ♦ Off-campus housing—traditional age and adult students

How do schools establish the allowable costs?

- Tuition and required fees are set by governing boards.
- **■** For other costs, a variety of methods are used:
 - Surveys of the student population on a campus
 - Assessing local housing costs using census or other data and comparing that with dormitory rental prices
 - Pricing "typical" set of books/supplies in student store
 - Reviewing national and regional average cost figures for comparable colleges
- Whatever figures a campus uses in each category will be subject to federal oversight for reasonableness.

UNC Cost of Attendance

- The 2012-13 average annual cost of attendance was \$18,821 per on-campus resident undergraduate UNC student.
- The range for the UNC campuses was between \$13,161 and \$24,024 per student.



UNC Cost of Attendance: Increase

■ Over the last 15 years, the cost of attendance has increased \$10,926 or 138% for the average resident undergraduate UNC student.



UNC Cost of Attendance: Analysis



■ Cost of attendance has increased an average of \$728 or 6% a year over the last 15 years.

UNC Cost of Attendance: Analysis



■ In the last five years, tuition and fee increases account for 34% of the total increase in cost of attendance.

Constitutional and Legislative Framework for Setting Tuition & Fees

- "The General Assembly shall provide that the benefits of the University of North Carolina and other public institutions of higher education, as far as practicable, be extended to the people of the State free of expense." – NC Constitution – Article IX, Section 9
- "The Board shall fix the tuition and fees, not inconsistent with actions of the General Assembly, at the institutions . . . in such amount or amounts as it may deem best, taking into consideration the nature of each institution and program of study and the cost of equipment and maintenance. . . . "

Tuition and Fees: Plan

- Since 2006, the Board of Governors has used four-year plans to set parameters for tuition and fee increases:
 - Helps ensure <u>affordability</u> for students
 - Provides <u>predictability</u> for students and campuses
 - Campuses retain tuition receipts for designated uses
 - Provides clear guidance to campuses on the tuition and fee expectations of BOG


Tuition and Fees: Tuition Control

- New Four-Year Plan reduced cap on tuition from 6.5% to 5%.
- Tuition set-aside for need-based financial aid will be capped at 15% of total tuition revenues.
 - If the tuition revenue set aside for aid exceeds the cap in the current year, the campus may not set aside additional tuition revenue for need-based aid.
 - Chancellors may increase funds through management flexibility authority, as long as the total set aside for aid does not exceed the cap.

Tuition and Fees: Tuition History

■ Due to the timing of the tuition setting process, resident tuition rates rise following recessions due to the change in mix of appropriation and tuition funding.
