

# Report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee

Study of GS 20-11 Dropout Prevention /Driver License Legislation House Bill 769 Session Law 1997-507

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### Study of HB 769, SL 1997-507; GS 20-11

### Overview

In accordance with GS 20-11, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) studied the effectiveness of the Dropout Prevention/Driver License Legislation. DPI used data from the 2000-2001 Dropout Prevention Report and data from the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to examine correlated trends before and after the implementation of the legislation. A multiple choice survey and a short response questionnaire were also sent to each local education agency (LEA). The survey and questionnaire were designed to give LEAs the opportunity to provide input regarding the effectiveness of the legislation. Eighty responses were received.

When looking at the trend data for dropouts, it is difficult to make sound comparisons because of a change in dropout data collection.

- This legislation was implemented in 1998 and a policy in dropout data collection was also changed in 1998. Prior to 1998, a student who transferred to a community college was not considered a dropout; after 1998 this student was coded as a dropout.
- Even though direct comparisons are difficult to make because of the data collection changes, the state has seen a decrease (982 98/99 99-00 and 2220 99/00 00/01) in the total number of dropouts each consecutive year since the implementation of the law.
- It is important to note that the dropout data for the school year 2001-2002 will not be released until December 2002. At this point trends can only be gathered between two school years.

### Obstacles

- The DMV codes a suspension under this law as a High School Dropout Suspension. This suspension can be placed for dropping out of school or failing to make adequate progress; however, DMV does not disaggregate the data between the two different suspension reasons.
- The implementation date varied among school systems also making it difficult to make any accurate conclusions on the effect this law has had on decreasing dropouts.
- Not all school systems began implementing this legislation on 8/1/1998.
- Multiple programs have been initiated in school systems across
  the state for dropout prevention and many systems have
  noticed a change in the dropout rates. This decrease cannot be
  attributed to the success of any one particular program or law.

### **Findings**

- If a student has not made adequate progress, then he/she may not receive initial driving privileges; therefore there is nothing to suspend if the student drops out of school.
- Driving privileges are not a motivation for every student.
- There has been uneven implementation of the law among school districts.
- This legislation has resulted in increased paperwork, record keeping, mail correspondence and meeting time for schools.

### Dropout data include:

• The number of students in grades 7-12 that were reported as withdrawing from public school and no documentation is given for transferring to an approved institution.


### DMV suspensions include:


- The number of students who lost driving privileges because of failure to make academic progress at the end of a semester.
- The number of students who lost driving privileges because of dropping out of school.

### **Conclusions**

In conclusion, a decrease has been noted in the dropout rate for North Carolina over the last three years. However, it is difficult to ascertain how one particular law or program contributed to this decrease.

- One cannot credit the law with the decrease in dropouts because of the lack of conclusive evidence and inconsistent implementation.
- The questionnaire responses noted that many school districts found this legislation has created a sense of student awareness and responsibility for making progress toward graduation.
- A majority of the school districts reported that this law created an increased workload (heavy reporting, paper work, correspondence, and meetings) on staff that already have multiple responsibilities.

### **Questionnaire Responses from Local School Districts**

### Overview

School districts were given questionnaires that asked the following:

- What are the benefits of the Dropout Prevention/Driver License legislation?
- What challenges does the Dropout Prevention/Driver License legislation present?
- What suggestions can you offer to improve the implementation of the dropout prevention legislation?

Eighty responses were received, and there were several strong common responses that will be outlined below.

### **Benefits**

School personnel identified the following benefits of the legislation:

- Improved academic performance.
- Increased student awareness of the need to make academic progress and the repercussions of dropping out of school.
- Increased student and parent responsibility.
- Increased attendance.
- Many responded failing to see any benefit or the ability to attribute the reduction in dropouts to this law.

### Challenges

The following challenges were identified:


- Effective implementation of this law requires an exorbitant amount of time in record keeping, paperwork, mail correspondence, and meetings.
- The hardship/waiver process is burdensome on the school and creates a lot of pressure on the committee especially when trying to determine financial hardships.
- Many systems reported that monitoring and administering this legislation was another duty added to an employee who is already overworked.
- The process is long and can be complicated.
- Many responses concluded that the law was not being implemented consistently across the state.
- Many systems noted a lack of responsibility for home schools.
- Requires excessive attention of administrators, which reduces time spent on instructional responsibilities.
- Legislation creates unneeded frustration and anger towards the school system.


- Many students are not eligible for a permit; therefore, this law is not a motivator for these individuals.
- Students continue to drive even though the privilege is revoked.


### **Suggestions**


The following were suggestions for improvement:

- Fund staff to monitor effectively and implement the legislation.
- Restructure the appeals process fill in the gray areas.
- Provide better access to the system.
- Allow Student Resource Officers to work with implementation.
- Ensure that all school districts consistently and fairly implement the legislation.
- Increase accountability for private and home schools.
- GED should not be equal to a high school diploma.









### **General Statute 20-11**

# § 20-11. Issuance of limited learner's permit and provisional drivers license to person who is less than 18 years old.

- (a) Process. Safe driving requires instruction in driving and experience. To ensure that a person who is less than 18 years old has both instruction and experience before obtaining a drivers license, driving privileges are granted first on a limited basis and are then expanded in accordance with the following process:
  - (1) Level 1. Driving with a limited learner's permit.
  - (2) Level 2. Driving with a limited provisional license.
  - (3) Level 3. Driving with a full provisional license.

A permit or license issued under this section must have a color background or border that indicates the level of driving privileges granted by the permit or license.

- (b) Level 1. A person who is at least 15 years old but less than 18 years old may obtain a limited learner's permit if the person meets all of the following requirements:
  - (1) Passes a course of driver education prescribed in G.S. 20-88.1 or a course of driver instruction at a licensed commercial driver training school.
  - (2) Passes a written test administered by the Division.
  - (3) Has a driving eligibility certificate or a high school diploma or its equivalent.
- (c) Level 1 Restrictions. A limited learner's permit authorizes the permit holder to drive a specified type or class of motor vehicle only under the following conditions:
  - (1) The permit holder must be in possession of the permit.
  - (2) A supervising driver must be seated beside the permit holder in the front seat of the vehicle when it is in motion. No person other than the supervising driver can be in the front seat.
  - (3) For the first six months after issuance, the permit holder may drive only between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m.
  - (4) After the first six months after issuance, the permit holder may drive at any time.
  - (5) Every person occupying the vehicle being driven by the permit holder must have a safety belt properly fastened about his or her body, or be restrained by a child passenger restraint system as provided in G.S. 20-137.1(a), when the vehicle is in motion.
- (d) Level 2. A person who is at least 16 years old but less than 18 years old may obtain a limited provisional license if the person meets all of the following requirements:
  - (1) Has held a limited learner's permit issued by the Division for at least 12 months.
  - (2) Has not been convicted of a motor vehicle moving violation or seat belt infraction during the preceding six months.
  - (3) Passes a road test administered by the Division.
  - (4) Has a driving eligibility certificate or a high school diploma or its equivalent.
- (e) Level 2 Restrictions. A limited provisional license authorizes the license holder to drive a specified type or class of motor vehicle only under the following conditions:
  - (1) The license holder must be in possession of the license.
  - (2) The license holder may drive without supervision in any of the following circumstances:
    - a. From 5:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.
    - b. When driving to or from work.
    - c. When driving to or from an activity of a volunteer fire department, volunteer rescue squad, or volunteer emergency medical service, if the driver is a member of the organization.
  - (3) The license holder may drive with supervision at any time. When the license holder is driving with supervision, the supervising driver must be seated beside the license holder in the front seat of the vehicle when it is in motion. The supervising driver need not be the only other occupant of the front seat, but must be the person seated next to the license holder.

(4) Every person occupying the vehicle being driven by the license holder must have a safety belt properly fastened about his or her body, or be restrained by a child passenger restraint system as provided in G.S. 20-137.1(a), when the vehicle is in motion.

(f) Level 3. - A person who is at least 16 years old but less than 18 years old may obtain a full

provisional license if the person meets all of the following requirements:

(1) Has held a limited provisional license issued by the Division for at least six months.

(2) Has not been convicted of a motor vehicle moving violation or seat belt infraction during the preceding six months.

(3) Has a driving eligibility certificate or a high school diploma or its equivalent. A person who meets these requirements may obtain a full provisional license by mail.

(g) Level 3 Restrictions. – The restrictions on Level 1 and Level 2 drivers concerning time of driving,

supervision, and passenger limitations do not apply to a full provisional license.

(h) Exception for Persons 16 to 18 Who Have an Unrestricted Out-of-State License. – A person who is at least 16 years old but less than 18 years old, who was a resident of another state and has an unrestricted drivers license issued by that state, and who becomes a resident of this State may obtain one of the following upon the submission of a driving eligibility certificate or a high school diploma or its equivalent:

(1) A temporary permit, if the person has not completed a drivers education program that meets the requirements of the Superintendent of Public Instruction but is currently enrolled in a drivers education program that meets these requirements. A temporary permit is valid for the period specified in the permit and authorizes the holder of the permit to drive a specified type or class of motor vehicle when in possession of the permit, subject to any restrictions imposed by the Division concerning time of driving, supervision, and passenger limitations. The period must end within 10 days after the expected completion date of the drivers education program in which the applicant is enrolled.

(2) A full provisional license, if the person has completed a drivers education program that meets the requirements of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, has held the license issued by the other state for at least 12 months, and has not been convicted during the preceding six months of a motor vehicle moving violation, a seat belt infraction, or an offense committed in another jurisdiction that would be a motor vehicle moving violation or seat belt infraction if committed

in this State.

(3) A limited provisional license, if the person has completed a drivers education program that meets the requirements of the Superintendent of Public Instruction but either did not hold the license issued by the other state for at least 12 months or was convicted during the preceding six months of a motor vehicle moving violation, a seat belt infraction, or an offense committed in another jurisdiction that would be a motor vehicle moving violation or seat belt infraction if committed in this State.

(h1) Exception for Persons 16 to 18 Who Have an Out-of-State Restricted License. – A person who is at least 16 years old but less than 18 years old, who was a resident of another state and has a restricted drivers license issued by that state, and who becomes a resident of this State may obtain one of the

following:

(1) A limited provisional license, if the person has completed a drivers education program that meets the requirements of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, held the restricted license issued by the other state for at least 12 months, and whose parent or guardian certifies that the person has not been convicted during the preceding six months of a motor vehicle moving violation, a seat belt infraction, or an offense committed in another jurisdiction that would be a motor vehicle moving violation or seat belt infraction if committed in this State.

(2) A limited learners permit, if the person has completed a drivers education program that meets the requirements of the Superintendent of Public Instruction but either did not hold the restricted license issued by the other state for at least 12 months or was convicted during the preceding six months of a motor vehicle moving violation, a seat belt infraction, or an offense

committed in another jurisdiction that would be a motor vehicle moving violation or seat belt infraction if committed in this State. A person who qualifies for a limited learners permit under this subdivision and whose parent or guardian certifies that the person has not been convicted of a moving violation in the preceding six months shall be deemed to have held a limited learners permit in this State for each month the person held a restricted license in another state.

- (h2) Exception for Persons Age 15 Who Have an Out-of-State Unrestricted or Restricted License. A person who is age 15, who was a resident of another state, has an unrestricted or restricted drivers license issued by that state, and who becomes a resident of this State may obtain a limited learners permit if the person has completed a drivers education program that meets the requirements of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. A person who qualifies for a limited learners permit under this subsection and whose parent or guardian certifies that the person has not been convicted of a moving violation in the preceding six months shall be deemed to have held a limited learners permit in this State for each month the person held an unrestricted or restricted license in another state.
- (h3) Exception for Persons Less Than Age 18 Who Have a Federally Issued Unrestricted or Restricted License. A person who is less than age 18, who has an unrestricted or restricted drivers license issued by the federal government, and who becomes a resident of this State may obtain a limited provisional license or a provisional license if the person has completed a drivers education program substantially equivalent to the drivers education program that meets the requirements of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. A person who qualifies for a limited provisional license or a provisional license under this subsection and whose parent or guardian certifies that the person has not been convicted of a moving violation in the preceding six months shall be deemed to have held a limited provisional license or a provisional license in this State for each month the person held an unrestricted or restricted license issued by the federal government.
- (i) Application. An application for a permit or license authorized by this section must be signed by both the applicant and another person. That person must be:
  - (1) The applicant's parent or guardian;
  - (2) A person approved by the applicant's parent or guardian; or
  - (3) A person approved by the Division.
- (j) Duration and Fee. A limited learner's permit expires on the eighteenth birthday of the permit holder. A limited provisional license expires on the eighteenth birthday of the license holder. A full provisional license expires on the date set under G.S. 20-7(f). The fee for a limited learner's permit or a limited provisional license is ten dollars (\$10.00). The fee for a full provisional license is the amount set under G.S. 20-7(i).
- (k) Supervising Driver. A supervising driver shall be a parent or guardian of the permit holder or license holder or a responsible person approved by the parent or guardian or the Division. A supervising driver shall be a licensed driver who has been licensed for at least five years. At least one supervising driver shall sign the application for a permit or license.
- (l) Violations. It is unlawful for the holder of a limited learner's permit, a temporary permit, or a limited provisional license to drive a motor vehicle in violation of the restrictions that apply to the permit or license. Failure to comply with a restriction concerning the time of driving or the presence of a supervising driver in the vehicle constitutes operating a motor vehicle without a license. Failure to comply with any other restriction, including seating and passenger limitations, is an infraction punishable by a monetary penalty as provided in G.S. 20-176.
- (m) Insurance Status. The holder of a limited learner's permit is not considered a licensed driver for the purpose of determining the inexperienced operator premium surcharge under automobile insurance policies.
- (n) Driving Eligibility Certificate. A person who desires to obtain a permit or license issued under this section must have a high school diploma or its equivalent or must have a driving eligibility certificate. A driving eligibility certificate must meet the following conditions:
  - (1) The person who is required to sign the certificate under subdivision (4) of this subsection must show that he or she has determined that one of the following requirements is met:

a. The person is currently enrolled in school and is making progress toward obtaining a high school diploma or its equivalent.

b. A substantial hardship would be placed on the person or the person's family if the person

does not receive a certificate.

. The person cannot make progress toward obtaining a high school diploma or its equivalent.

- (1a) The person who is required to sign the certificate under subdivision (4) of this subsection also must show that one of the following requirements is met:
  - a. The person who seeks a permit or license issued under this section is not subject to subsection (n1) of this section.
  - b. The person who seeks a permit or license issued under this section is subject to subsection (n1) of this section and is eligible for the certificate under that subsection.

(2) It must be on a form approved by the Division.

(3) It must be dated within 30 days of the date the person applies for a permit or license issuable under this section.

(4) It must be signed by the applicable person named below:

- a. The principal, or the principal's designee, of the public school in which the person is enrolled.
- b. The administrator, or the administrator's designee, of the nonpublic school in which the person is enrolled.

c. The person who provides the academic instruction in the home school in which the person

is enrolled.

- c1. The person who provides the academic instruction in the home in accordance with an educational program found by a court, prior to July 1, 1998, to comply with the compulsory attendance law.
- d. The designee of the board of directors of the charter school in which the person is enrolled.
- e. The president, or the president's designee, of the community college in which the person is enrolled.

Notwithstanding any other law, the decision concerning whether a driving eligibility certificate was properly issued or improperly denied shall be appealed only as provided under the rules adopted in accordance with G.S. 115C-12(28), 115D-5(a3), or 115C-566, whichever is applicable, and may not be appealed under this Chapter.

(n1) Lose Control; Lose License.

(1) The following definitions apply in this subsection:

- a. Applicable State entity. The State Board of Education for public schools and charter schools, the State Board of Community Colleges for community colleges, or the Secretary of Administration for nonpublic schools and home schools.
- b. Certificate. A driving eligibility certificate that meets the conditions of subsection (n) of this section.

Disciplinary action. – An expulsion, a suspension for more than 10 consecutive days, or an assignment to an alternative educational setting for more than 10 consecutive days.

- d. Enumerated student conduct. One of the following behaviors that results in disciplinary action:
  - 1. The possession or sale of an alcoholic beverage or an illegal controlled substance on school property.
  - 2. The bringing, possession, or use on school property of a weapon or firearm that resulted in disciplinary action under G.S. 115C-391(d1) or that could have resulted in that disciplinary action if the conduct had occurred in a public school.
  - 3. The physical assault on a teacher or other school personnel on school property.
- e. School. A public school, charter school, community college, nonpublic school, or home school.

- f. School administrator. The person who is required to sign certificates under subdivision (4) of subsection (n) of this section.
- g. School property. The physical premises of the school, school buses or other vehicles under the school's control or contract and that are used to transport students, and schoolsponsored curricular or extracurricular activities that occur on or off the physical premises of the school.
- h. Student. A person who desires to obtain a permit or license issued under this section.
- (2) Any student who was subject to disciplinary action for enumerated student conduct that occurred either after the first day of July before the school year in which the student enrolled in the eighth grade or after the student's fourteenth birthday, whichever event occurred first, is subject to this subsection.
- (3) A student who is subject to this subsection is eligible for a certificate when the school administrator determines that the student has exhausted all administrative appeals connected to the disciplinary action and that one of the following conditions is met:
  - a. The enumerated student conduct occurred before the student reached the age of 15, and the student is now at least 16 years old.
  - b. The enumerated student conduct occurred after the student reached the age of 15, and it is at least one year after the date the student exhausted all administrative appeals connected to the disciplinary action.
  - c. The student needs the certificate in order to drive to and from school, a drug or alcohol treatment counseling program, as appropriate, or a mental health treatment program, and no other transportation is available.
- (4) A student whose permit or license is denied or revoked due to ineligibility for a certificate under this subsection may otherwise be eligible for a certificate if, after six months from the date of the ineligibility, the school administrator determines that one of the following conditions is met:
  - a. The student has returned to school or has been placed in an alternative educational setting, and has displayed exemplary student behavior, as defined by the applicable State entity.
  - b. The disciplinary action was for the possession or sale of an alcoholic beverage or an illegal controlled substance on school property, and the student subsequently attended and successfully completed, as defined by the applicable State entity, a drug or alcohol treatment counseling program, as appropriate. ### **Dropout Prevention Legislation and Guidelines Brief**

### HB769, SL1997-507

This law became effective August 1, 1998. It affects any resident under the age of 18. This includes those who are enrolled in public, private, charter, home, federal schools and community colleges. This law states that a student who is under the age of 18 must be enrolled in school and making adequate progress toward a diploma in order to receive and maintain driving privileges in North Carolina. If a student wants to apply for driving privileges (permit or license) they must have a Driver Eligibility Certificate (DEC). This is a printed document issued to the student only if he/she is making adequate progress and does not have a greater than 10 day suspension or assignment to an alternative school pending (for possessing a weapon, an illegal substance or assaulting a staff member – this relates to the Lose Control Lose Your License Legislation).

Adequate progress is determined when a student applies for the DEC by checking the most recent semester grades and then assessed at the end of each semester until he/she graduates or turns 18. Adequate progress in reference to this law is defined as passing at least 70% of the classes in which the student enrolled. That means in most cases a student cannot fail more than one class in a semester and maintain driving privileges in North Carolina. Schools operating on a traditional schedule measure adequate progress using semester grades at the end of the first semester and year end grades and at the end of the second semester. For schools on a block schedule, final grades are used to determine adequate progress at the end of each semester.

### **Inadequate Progress**

Each school is linked and has secured access to the State Automated Driver License System (SADLS) which enables the school or the district to enter the data necessary to revoke a student's driving privileges, if the student fails to make progress at the end of each semester or drops out of school. Some schools run the SADLS program at the school and enter their own suspensions and issue DECs to students at the school. Some school systems run the SADLS program through the central office and all schools in that district report their suspensions to central office personnel who then revoke driving privileges. The school or district will send a letter to the parents of the student explaining why the driving privileges are being revoked and offer the parent the opportunity to apply for a hardship (schools may give the parents

no less than 5 days and no more than 10 days to respond.). The DMV will also send a final notice to the home of the student, stating that within 10 days (the revocation start date is given within the letter—DMV policy with any license suspension is to post the suspension 10 days after the letter is generated and mailed) the student's driving privileges will be revoked and request the student to mail his/her license/permit to the DMV headquarters.

### **Hardships**

Hardships are granted only at the local level and should be granted only under extreme circumstances. The state guidelines identify four categories in which hardships may be granted, they are as follows, 1) medical considerations, 2) work related considerations, 3) exceptional children considerations, 4) other. Cases of hardship must reflect specific circumstances that are beyond the control of the student, his or her parents, or the school. Hardship forms are to be completed and given to the principal or the principal's designee and must have supporting documentation. A review panel is then convened by the principal and/or the principal's designee to review the hardship request. If it is determined that a hardship should be granted then the school issues a Driver Eligibility Certificate to the student. The student presents the DEC to the DMV and his/her driving privileges are reinstated. There is an appeal process. Each LEA determines the appeal process procedures for parents who have a grievance connected to this law.

All other students must wait until the end of the semester and if they are making adequate progress the school may issue another DEC which the student presents to the DMV and must pay a \$25.00 restoration fee and a \$10.00 duplication fee for reinstatement of his/her license. The only other way for a student to have his/her driving privileges reinstated is to turn 18 years of age, or receive a high school diploma or its equivalent.

If a student drops out of school his/her privileges are revoked within 30 days of the withdrawal and they fall under the same hardship rules.

### **Transfers**

If a student transfers to another school (public, private, charter or registered home school) and is making adequate progress then they are able to maintain driving privileges. If a student withdraws and the school is not notified of a transfer to an approved institution within 30 days, then the driving privilege is suspended.

If a student is leaving to attend a community college and is making adequate progress he/she is allowed to maintain driving privileges.

If the student is leaving to attend a community college and **not** making adequate progress then driving privilege is revoked. The community college requires students to attend school for 60 hours a month for 6 months to be eligible for driving privileges. Upon completion of the 6<sup>th</sup> month and if they are making adequate progress, the community college will issue a DEC.

Private and home schools adhere to the Division of Non Public Schools (DNPS) guidelines. The DNPS also issues DECs to these students.

If a student attends a boarding school out of state but is a permanent resident of North Carolina, then his/her boarding school must provide documentation of the student's enrollment and progress to the North Carolina school in which the student would normally attend and is responsible for issuing the DEC to the student.

If a student moves out a state and has a suspended license in North Carolina due to the Dropout Prevention/Driver License legislation, appropriate documentation proving that the child is a permanent resident of another state must be provided to the former North Carolina school and a DEC is issued which will allow the release of the suspension in North Carolina. The suspensions are held on a national computer system, which prevents students from obtaining a license in another state until the North Carolina suspension is released.


