BACKGROUND

In 1978 the University of North Carolina Board of Governors established a program of scholarships to increase the number of minority dentists and to improve opportunities in dental education for minority and disadvantaged youth who want to attend the School of Dentistry at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (the UNC Dental School). The recommendation to create the program was included in a report by the President of the University to the Board of Governors entitled, Supplemental Statement - II to the Revised North Carolina State Plan for the Further Elimination of Racial Duality, Phase II. In the Consent Decree, entered into the U.S. District Court in 1981, the Board of Governors further committed itself to the continuance of this program to benefit minorities and economically disadvantaged students.

The scholarships, named the Board of Governors Dental Scholarships (BGDS), were awarded initially in the fall of 1978. Selective descriptive data on the BGDS nominees and recipients from 1978 through the candidate selection for 2005-2006 is found in Table 1, pages 5-7.

Since the beginning of the program through June 30, 2005, 191 recipients of the Board of Governors Dental Scholarship¹ have been assisted at a total gross expenditure of \$7,864,751.28.²

PROGRAM HISTORY

Each year the President of the University of North Carolina appoints a special selection committee to select Board of Governors Dental Scholars. From 1978-1986, the number of annual awards was five. Beginning with the 1986-87 scholarship selection, the number of awards was increased to eight per year, or 32 recipients participating concurrently. The UNC Dental School submits nominees to the selection committee.

The North Carolina State Education Assistance Authority (NCSEAA), an affiliated agency specializing in student aid programs, administers the BGDS for the Student Services and Special Programs Division of General Administration. The NCSEAA, in cooperation with the UNC Dental School, has the responsibility for developing and implementing regulations, procedures, and forms necessary for administering the program. The Executive Director of the NCSEAA serves as ex-officio chairman (non-voting) of the President's Selection Committee and is the liaison official for the program with the Board of Governors.

BGDS Award Eligibility

To be eligible for a Board of Governors Dental Scholarship, a student must:

- be a resident of North Carolina for tuition purposes under the terms and conditions of the residence manual³ of the University of North Carolina.
- be accepted for admission by the School of Dentistry at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill,
- 3) be nominated as a scholarship candidate by the UNC School of Dentistry,
- 4) have financial need for meeting the expenses of a dental education,
- 5) have potential for providing dental service to people in the State of North Carolina, and
- 6) enroll on a full-time basis as a first-year dental student for the first term of the award.

BGDS Value and Renewal Options

From 1978 through the 1985-86 academic year, each scholarship provided a \$4,000 a year stipend. Beginning in the fall of 1986, the Board of Governors approved and the General Assembly funded an increase in the annual stipend to \$5,000 (or \$2,000/\$2,000/\$1,000 per term for first-year, second-year and third-year students and \$2,500 per term for fourth-year students). The award also pays tuition, mandatory fees, and approved costs for certain instruments and

supplies. A BGDS award is renewable for three additional years provided the student continues to meet the conditions governing the initial award and makes satisfactory progress toward the completion of the dental education program. A student may not receive an award after the fifth year from the beginning of his or her matriculation in the BGDS program. Renewal awards are contingent upon available funds from the General Assembly appropriation

THE 2004-2005 PROGRAM

During the 2004-2005 academic year, 30 Dental Scholars received financial assistance from the BGDS program, for a total of \$619,762.59. The North Carolina General Assembly appropriated \$517,760.00 to fund the BGDS program. As of June 30, 2005, \$7,069.01 was received in current year refunds for the BGDS program. A balance of \$82,000.00 was transferred from the Private Medical School Aid program and \$20,003.00 was transferred from the Board of Governors Medical Scholarship program, therefore, \$0.41 reverted to the General Fund on 6/30/2005. The General Assembly appropriated \$729,429.00 for the 2005-2006 fiscal year.

The UNC Dental School billed the NCSEAA on behalf of its students each term (fall, spring and summer) using a special invoice form. The invoice certified the eligibility of each scholar and lists the institutional charges required. Based upon the invoices, checks were drawn on a General Administration account and forwarded to the UNC Cashier's Office for crediting to the students' accounts.

Follow-Up Survey, Graduates of the Class of 2003

In June 2005, the NCSEAA wrote to the UNC Dental School requesting up-to-date information on the 2003 graduating class of Board of Governors Dental Scholars. The purpose of the survey was to determine if the BGDS graduates were establishing dental practices in North Carolina. The results of the survey are shown on Table 8 on page 14. Survey results indicate that six of the seven graduates had established a dental practice or are practicing dentistry in North Carolina and one student's location was not available.

SELECTION PROCEDURES FOR 2005-2006 BGDS RECIPIENTS

This section describes the selection procedure for nominating and selecting BGDS recipients for the 2005-2006 academic year.

Recipients were chosen by the President's Selection Committee on the basis of a review of the written materials provided by the UNC Dental School and on personal interviews conducted by the committee.

The steps taken toward naming the recipients were as follows:

- 1) The UNC Dental School was asked to nominate up to 15 candidates who:
 - a) had been accepted for admission,
 - b) possessed financial need
 - c) expressed as an ultimate objective a desire to practice dentistry in North Carolina, and
 - d) met other eligibility criteria of the program.
- 2) A committee composed of representative North Carolinians with interest and experience in dental education was appointed for a two-year term by the President in 2003.⁴ A list of the BGDS Committee is found on page 17.
- 3) Data on the 2005-2006 nominees gathered by officials at the UNC Dental School was prepared in standard format by the NCSEAA staff. (A list of the nominees is found in Table 9 on page 18.) The following materials on the candidates were sent to the Selection Committee prior to the meeting date:
 - a) biographical, educational, and personal information,
 - b) academic information and Dental Admission Test (DAT) scores,
 - c) a statement by each candidate on his/her dental practice objectives.
 - d) financial information on both the nominee and the parents of the nominee.
 - e) an estimated expense budget for the candidate prepared by the UNC Dental School Student Aid Office,
 - f) a summary of the UNC Dental School interview ratings and comments used in determining admissibility of the candidate to the UNC Dental School, and
 - g) recommendations from persons having knowledge of the nominee's academic and personal traits.

⁴ In February of 1981, a policy was established regarding the term of service for members of the BGDS Selection Committee. According to this policy, members of the Board of Governors Dental Scholarship Selection Committee rotate off in odd-numbered years.

- 4) The BGDS Selection Committee met on Monday, April 18, 2005, at 8:30 a.m. at the UNC General Administration Building in Chapel Hill. During the morning session, the committee as a whole interviewed at 15-minute intervals the candidates nominated by the UNC Dental School.
- 5) During the afternoon session, the committee considered the candidates on the basis of personal interviews conducted earlier in the day and on written materials forwarded to them prior to the meeting. During deliberations, committee members were provided with a rating sheet. The candidates were evaluated on relative financial need and potential for service to the people of North Carolina through dental practice.
- 6) At the conclusion of the committee's discussions, a vote was taken to approve the recipients and alternates selected by the committee. The voting committee members choose eight recipients and two alternates. The alternates were rank ordered for future consideration if a recipient declined.
- 7) On April 25, 2005, the University of North Carolina President notified the candidates by letter regarding their status in the selection process. Recipients were notified of the conditions and responsibilities for acceptance of the BGDS award. All recipients elected to accept the BGDS award. The recipients and alternates for 2005-2006 are listed on page 19. A profile of the nominees and recipients is found on page 20.
