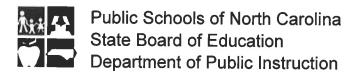

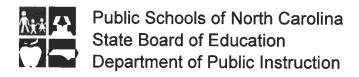

Learn and Earn Online : A National Model of Innovation in PreKindergarten-20 Education

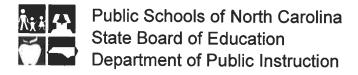
I. History: Thanks to the leadership of Governor Mike Easley and the North Carolina General Assembly, public school students can now earn dual credit for college and high school through Learn & Earn Online (LEO). The North Carolina Department of Public Instruction directed the North Carolina Virtual Public School (NCVPS) to coordinate the K-12 public school effort to support Learn and Earn Online. NCVPS is proud to support Learn and Earn Online as a part of the e-learning opportunities offered to North Carolina public school students. Since its inception in the fall of 2007, LEO has provided approximately 12,067 students with e-learning opportunities and college credit to prepare them to be future ready, globally competitive citizens.

II. What is Learn and Earn Online?

Learn and Earn Online is an extension of the face-to-face Learn and Earn program that allows students in public high schools throughout the state to earn college credit. Qualified students in participating public high schools can take a variety of e-learning college-credit courses at no cost to them or to their families. Students earn both high school and college credit for completed courses. Access to these courses may be provided during the regular school day with an on-site course facilitator who will assist students in the classroom or independently. Courses are offered through UNCG iSchool and community colleges. The Learn and Earn Online Web site provides additional information on the program and lists courses available to students from UNCG iSchool and the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS). III. What types of courses are offered?

- College courses in a variety of content areas.
- UNCG iSchool offers courses drawn primarily from the University's general education catalog. Course categories include human and behavioral sciences, fine arts, mathematical sciences, and global perspectives.
- NCCCS offers courses in Art, Biology, Economics, English, Chemistry, History, Math, Physics, Psychology, Technology, and other subjects.



IV. The Current Picture

Since the last report in December of 2008, Learn and Earn Online has continued to shatter the annual 30% per year national growth projections supported by Harvard University Research (Christensen, 2007); The International Association for K-12 Online Learning – www.inacol.org; and the Southern Regional Board of Education www.sreb.org. Enrollment trends since the program's inception are as follows: Fall 2007 (3,571); Spring 2008 (5,917); Summer 2008 (291); Fall 2008 (2,388); Total Enrollment: 12,067.

In addition to the growth of the program, students are earning a composite grade point average of 2.6 and boasting a course completion rate of over 91%. In addition to these metrics, student testimonials that detail over 30-50 hours of college credit while in high school; best practice sites and schools; and public information about the total program can be found at www.nclearnandearn.gov

The generosity of the legislature has provided a Learn and Earn online budget of \$6.5 million recurring. And due to the explosive growth and capacity of the program at present, an additional \$3.25 million is requested is based on a projection for growth for what LEO will need for 09-10 based on increases in enrollment in UNCGi courses in spring 08 and fall 08 and the fact that community college increases should become steeper once they work out what has been some systems issues in identifying LEO courses versus other distance education courses. In summary, \$3.25M keeps pace with expected demand for LEO courses, and allows for the nationally recognized program to continue to impact the needs of North Carolina students and citizens.

In September of 2008, Gov. Mike Easley announced that North Carolina's Learn and Earn high school reform initiative received the 2008 Innovations in American Government Award. The Ash Institute sponsors the annual awards competition for Democratic Governance and Innovation at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government.

"North Carolina is the first and only state in America to offer a free college education to every student. We are changing the delivery system of education so that college goes to the student if the student cannot go to the college. It is innovative, new and very successful," Easley said.

"This effort will assure that our state has the best workforce in the world and gives every child an opportunity to reach his or her full potential."



The program was selected from a pool of nearly 1,000 applicants to represent the best in Government innovation on the local, city, county, tribal, state and federal levels. As a part of the award, North Carolina will receive \$100,000 toward the replication and dissemination of the program. Established in 1985, the Innovations in American Government Awards Program are designed to improve government practices by honoring effective government initiatives and encouraging the dissemination of such best practices. - V. SECTION 3.3. The Department of Public Instruction may use up to four hundred thirty thousand dollars (\$430,000) in funds appropriated for Learn and Earn Online for 14 planning grants for Learn and Earn sites in the 2008- 2009 fiscal year.
- VI. SECTION 3.4. The Office of State Budget and Management may, after a request from the State Board of Education, provide from funds available in any agency in the budget up to one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the 2008- 2009 fiscal year to the Department of Public Instruction for efforts to inform eighth- and ninth-grade students about opportunities to gain access to college and to college coursework.

These efforts should include, but not be limited to, strategies to ensure that parents, administrators, teachers, and students are fully informed about the Learn and Earn Online program, the Learn and Earn program, the UNC needs-based financial aid program, community college and UNC Online opportunities, and the EARN Grant. The Department shall report no later than January 1, 2009, and June 30, 2009, to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the use of any funds provided under this section

Strategic Response to Section 3.3 and 3.4: In an effort to continue to expand the program's reach and additional planning grants for Learn and Earn for all North Carolina students, Governor Mike Easley invited all 115 school district superintendent's to Raleigh last August 20008 and informed them of his cooperative plan with the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction to utilize (3.3 and 3.4) funds to expand and redesign the program's website to include more engaging Web 2.0 tools; the development of a comprehensive marketing approach; and finally the solicitation of bi-directional feedback and strategic input



from the pre-kindergarten to graduate school (p-20) stakeholders in North Carolina via online tools and forums.

Video production, television spots, travel, planning funding, training opportunities, virtual tools, and collaborative bi-directional wikis (or filing sharing websites) were also utilized to maximize the impact of the funding on strategies that ensure understanding, strategic planning, communication, data mining, and monitoring among administrators, teachers, and students to fully realize the impact and implementation of the Learn and Earn Online program.

Website banners, flyers, newspaper advertisements, movie shorts, and billboards were also deployed in the past year to ensure eight and ninth grade students understood the full scope of Learn and Earn Online. Finally, regional conferences, text messaging hubs, and space holders were developed on www.google.com, and www.yahoo.com as an ongoing part of the communications approach to reach the 21st Century user of LEO.

The feedback from this effort continues to be planned, vetted, and strategically detailed by the LEO collaborative group into action steps on a bi-monthly basis. This group is represented by K-12 and the Department of Public Instruction through the North Carolina Virtual Public School's Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Bryan Setser and the Chief Operations Officer, Mr. John Brim. Also, represented on the LEO Collaborative Group are Dr. Beth Baldwin, Director of the UNG iSchool and Mr. Antonio Jordan, the Director of Learn and Earn High School Programs for the North Carolina Community College System. In addition, this group will be expanded in 2009-2010 to include a Chief Learn and Earn Online Officer to coordinate efforts across the p-20 state partners. Also, the new Learn and Earn Director, Dr. Fay Apgar will also be joining the LEO collaborative group.
