GENERAL PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Background

The North Carolina Legislative Tuition Grant (NCLTG) program provides financial assistance to North Carolina (NC) residents attending approved independent colleges and universities in North Carolina. Established by the 1975 NC General Assembly, the program pays a portion of the tuition charges of every undergraduate North Carolinian enrolled full time at one of the approved private institutions in the form of a capitation grant. An appropriation of \$60,485,605 was made by the General Assembly for the 2008-2009 academic year. This amount was sufficient to award the 35,735 NC resident students enrolled at eligible private institutions at the annual maximum approved grant of \$1,950. There was a total gross expenditure of \$59,442,303 in 2008-2009. See Table 1 for the specific amount disbursed and netted to each institution. The General Assembly has appropriated \$55,555,605 for the 2009-2010 academic year.

Administration

The North Carolina State Education Assistance Authority (NCSEAA) administers the program as the State agency designated by statute. *Rules Governing the NCLTG Program* (*NCLTG Rules*) adopted in August 1975¹ by the Board of Directors of the NCSEAA, govern the operation of the program. *The NCLTG Rules* establish the definitions, terms of participation,

eligibility, procedures, method of payment, refund policy, residence requirements,² and rules for program integrity.

To participate in the program, each eligible institution, as defined by statute,³ must enter into a Participation Agreement (NCSEAA Form NCLTG 1/75-87 – Revised January 1999). The Participation Agreement is executed jointly by the chief executive officer of the institution and NCSEAA and sets forth the responsibilities of each party in NCLTG administration.

The chief Executive officer at each institution designates a campus official, known as the NCLTG Authorized School Official, who locally administers the NCLTG program. This official serves as liaison between the institution and NCSEAA and is responsible for all matters relating to the administration of NCLTG awards on the respective campuses.

The 2007 Session Laws of the NC General Assembly expanded the eligibility of recipients. They continued to recognize the first time, full-time undergraduate degree seeker as an Eligible Student and students with bachelor's degrees returning to school to obtain a first time license in teaching or nursing as Licensure Students. The General Assembly expanded the credit hour eligibility to include part-time students enrolled with at least 6 credit hours with a prorated award amount.

NCLTG Award Eligibility and Determination

To qualify for a NCLTG award, an Eligible Student must:

- 1) be a resident of NC for the purposes of tuition payment under the terms and conditions of the *Residence Manual* of The University of North Carolina;
- 2) be enrolled full-time or part-time in an eligible program at a NC private college or university as defined in G.S.116-22(1);
- 3) be certified to NCSEAA by an approved institution as to eligibility and enrollment as defined in the rules of the program;
- 4) be an undergraduate student who is in the process of obtaining either a first associate or bachelor's degree, but who has not qualified for a bachelor's degree;
- 5) not be enrolled in a program of study the objective of which is the attainment of a degree in theology, divinity, or religious education or in any other program of study that is designed by the institution for career preparation in a religious vocation; and
- 6) have complied with the registration requirements of the Military Service Act.

To qualify for a NCLTG award, a Licensure Student must:

- 1) be a resident of NC for the purposes of tuition payment under the terms and conditions of the *Residence Manual* of The University of North Carolina;
- 2) be enrolled full time or part-time in an eligible program at a NC private college or university as defined in G.S.116-22(1);
- 3) be certified to NCSEAA by an approved institution as to eligibility and enrollment as defined in the regulations of the program;
- 4) have a bachelor's degree; and
- 5) have complied with the registration requirements of the Military Service Act.

Determination of eligibility for an award is made by the NCLTG authorized official of the institution where the student NCLTG application is filed. The decision of the campus official with respect to approval or disapproval of a request for an NCLTG award is final, subject only to any later finding by the State Auditor.

Grant Amounts and Conditions

The maximum full-time NCLTG award during the 2008-2009 academic year was \$1,950 per student (\$975 per term). The maximum part-time award was \$1,463 per student (\$732/731

per term). Johnson & Wales University has three terms and the maximum full-time award amounts were \$650 per term. Part-time award amounts were \$488/488/487 per term.

Funds to support the program are contingent each year upon appropriations made available by the North Carolina General Assembly. In the event that there are insufficient funds to provide the maximum award to each eligible student: (1) the Board of Governors is authorized, with the approval of the Office of State Budget and Management, to transfer monies from the State Contractual Scholarship Fund program to meet the needs of the NCLTG program; or (2) each eligible student may be provided with a pro-rata share of funds available for the academic year covered by the appropriation.

Establishment of New Off-Campus Degree Programs

The 1985 Session Laws of the NC General Assembly required an institution wanting to establish a new off-campus degree program on or after May 14, 1985 to seek agreement to offer such instruction from other NCLTG approved institutions in the same county or in counties adjacent to the county in which the off-campus program is located or will be located. Off-campus instruction is defined as instruction in a degree credit program offered by an approved institution at a site located in this State away from the main, permanent campus of the approved institution.

The 1987 Session Laws required an NCLTG approved institution to obtain prior approval before establishing any new off-campus degree program on or after May 15, 1987. The President of the institution planning a new off-campus site must certify on SEAA Form 9/04 that the institution has (1) notified and secured agreement to offer such instruction from other private institutions operating degree programs in the county in which the off-campus program is located or operating in counties adjacent to that county, or (2) determined, after investigation, that the degree program is neither available nor planned by a private institution in the county with the off-campus site or in the counties adjacent to that county. In the event of a dispute with respect to any certification obtained from an approved institution regarding the availability of or

plans for off-campus instruction, NCSEAA will rely upon the adjudication process established by the North Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities (NCICU) to resolve such questions.

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Each year, NCLTG's are awarded to eligible NC residents enrolled and certified at one of the approved independent or private colleges and universities located in the State. To be considered for an award, a student must annually complete a special application with the designated office at the institution where he/she is enrolled.

The actual award responsibility for NCLTG is vested in the NCLTG Authorized School Official at each eligible institution. (See pages 19-21, for a list of NCLTG officials in 2008-2009.) Administrative responsibilities of the institution include: apprising eligible students of the availability of NCLTG's; disseminating, receiving, and processing applications for the NCLTG; having full knowledge of *NCLTG Rules*; reviewing eligibility requirements such as residency and full-time student status; and verifying to the NCSEAA the eligibility of every applicant to receive an award. Determination of eligibility, required for each separate term of attendance during the school year is a two-step process. To make an award, the NCLTG official must:

- examine each applicant in terms of the eligibility requirements as specified in the NCLTG Rules and
- 2) verify the enrollment as of a certain date required each term for all applicants found to be otherwise eligible.

Each institution submits a request for payment to NCSEAA for and on behalf of its eligible students by term. In support of an institutional request, the NCLTG official provides NCSEAA with a copy of a Certification and Invoice Form, which attests to the authenticity of data submitted and to the consistency of institutional procedures used in the award process with the *Regulations* and an electronic spreadsheet which lists all eligible students by academic classification.

THE 2008-2009 PROGRAM

Establishing the Maximum Award

To determine whether the appropriation (\$60,485,605) was sufficient to accommodate the maximum amount of awards, the approved institutions provided NCSEAA with the enrollment data needed to calculate the total number (head count) of NC resident undergraduates enrolled full-time and part-time as of October 1, 2008. After a review of the October 1, 2008 enrollment was made, NCSEAA determined, based on normal attrition rates and receipt of refunds during the year that the appropriation was sufficient to provide full payment of the fall 2008 semester invoices. NCSEAA approved requests for payment of the grants at the maximum amount for the fall semester.

A similar review was made for the winter and spring semesters and the maximum grant of \$975 was approved.

<u>Disbursements to the Institutions</u>

The NCSEAA authorized NCLTG payments on the basis of institutional requests that were submitted to the NCSEAA according to instructions in the *NCLTG Rules*. The operating procedures by term were as follows:

1) First Term - Fall Semester

Within a 20-day period following October 1, 2008, all institutions submitted Certification and Invoice Forms plus a supporting electronic spreadsheet. After a review was made by NCSEAA, and if the documents proved to be accurate and consistent with the *NCLTG Rules*, approval for payment was granted. In the event an error or inconsistency was discovered, it was brought to the attention of the appropriate campus official. In such cases, resubmission of the appropriate form(s) was required.

After all forms had been verified and approved, NCSEAA electronically transmitted a requisition to the Accounting Division of General Administration, authorizing an electronic funds transfer (EFT) to each participating institution on behalf of its invoiced students. Each EFT was equal to

the product of the number of invoiced students times the grant amount established by term and by site^{4, 5} according to the institutional academic calendar. Upon receipt of funds from NCSEAA, each institution was required to deposit the amount of the grant in an account established in the name of each individual student listed on the invoice form. Students may use NCLTG funds to meet educational expenses.

2) Second Term - Spring Semester

Enrollment was certified as of the tenth (10th) classroom day for any term following the first term. Since institutional calendars differed, the invoicing and certification period for the second term extended from mid-January to mid-March.

For terms in which more than one Certification and Invoice Form was submitted, verification by NCSEAA included a cross-checking of rosters to eliminate the possibility of double payment being made to a student. Based on the appropriate forms, second term payments were made to participating institutions as soon as the forms were verified and funds were drawn by General Administration. See Table 2 for specific disbursements to institutions.

Institutional Refunds to the Authority

In the event an institution discovers at any time that a grant has been made to an ineligible student, the respective institution is required to refund the amount of the grant to the NCSEAA. Refunds are also due as a result of a student's withdrawal. The amount of the latter type of refund is governed by institutional tuition refund policy, consistent with the *NCLTG Rules*. The pro-rata refund policy was reviewed and clarified for NCLTG officers by NCSEAA in its memorandum of November 13, 1981.

As of June 30, 2009, the NCSEAA had received refunds for the 2008-2009 program totaling \$483,154 and past year refunds amounting to \$470,637.

The NCLTG authorized under G. S. 116-21.2 shall be reduced by twenty-five percent (25%) for any individual student who has completed 140 semester credit hours or the equivalent of 140 semester credit hours.

PRIVATE COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES WITH OFF-CAMPUS SITES

Fifteen NC private colleges and universities currently administer classes at off-campus sites. An off-campus site is defined as "a site located in North Carolina away from the main, permanent campus of the institution."

For 2008-2009 academic year, 5,808 students at off-campus sites received NCLTG awards totaling \$8,289,353. Students who received awards at off-campus sites constituted 16.25% of the 35,735 students awarded at all private institutions and 32.52% of the 17,857 students awarded at the 15 institutions with off-campus sites. These off-campus site students received 14.06% of the total net NCLTG funds (\$58,959,149) awarded at all of the private institutions for the academic year and 29.53% of all funds (\$28,067,384) awarded at the institutions with off-campus sites. See Table 3, Net Awards at Off-Campus Sites, for the specific amounts netted to each institution.

In evaluating the attached Table 3, a number of factors should be considered;

- (1) Military tuition assistance is available to most military personnel who enroll at off-campus sites at Campbell University, Mount Olive College and North Carolina Wesleyan College. Those students that qualify will receive an NCLTG award amount reduced by the military tuition assistance provided by the military.
- (2) Students who withdraw during a semester may qualify for a reduced NCLTG award for that semester depending upon the timing of the withdrawal.
- (3) Students may not attend both semesters within an academic year, thereby, reducing the yearly award per student at that site.

2008-2009 Program Summary

Tables 1 and 2 summarize the 2008-2009 program by institution and by term. Totals are shown both for the amounts disbursed and the number of students aided based on the initial allocation to the institutions and for the net totals resulting from institutional refunds.

The following is a recapitulation of NCLTG activity for 2008-2009 as of June 30, 2009:
