Overview

The report was prepared in accordance with requirements of G.S. 115C-157.
§ 115C-157. Responsibility of local boards of education.

- (a) Each local school administrative unit shall provide free appropriate career and technical education instruction, activities, and services in accordance with the provisions of this Part for all youth, with priority given to youth in grades eight through 12, who elect the instruction and shall have responsibility for administering the instruction, activities, and services in accordance with federal and State law and State Board of Education policies.
- (b) Each local school administrative unit shall offer as part of its career and technical education program at least two work-based learning opportunities that are related to career and technical education instruction. A work-based learning opportunity shall consist of on-the-job training through an internship, cooperative education, or an apprenticeship program meeting the requirements of Chapter 115D of the General Statutes.
- (c) Each local board of education is encouraged to implement a career awareness program for students in grade five to educate students on the career and technical education programs offered in the local school administrative unit. A local board of education that adopts a career awareness program for fifth grade students shall report on program activities and student outcomes from the prior school year to the State Board of Education by October 1 of each year. By November 15 of each year, the State Board shall submit a consolidated report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on program outcomes and any legislative recommendations based on local board of education reports. Survey Response:

The following LEAs completed the survey tool. Participation in the program is not required. We were pleased in the second year of program that 92 LEAs provided feedback, compared to 53 during the initial year (2017-2018). Eighty-four percent of the responding school districts across the state adopted a career awareness program for fifth grade students. The 76 LEAs that implemented a career awareness program are in bold text.

Part II: Student Outcomes

NCDPI CTE is pleased that the results of the 5th Grade Career Awareness survey indicated approximately 78,048 fifth grade students were exposed to career awareness related to the CTE programs offered in their respective LEAs for the 2018-19 school year.

The reported data from all of the LEAs that implemented a Career Awareness Program show 75% conducted Middle School Tours for ~25,287 fifth grade students. Career Events were offered in 42% of the participating LEAs for ~25,126 fifth grade students, where LEAs consistently provided a Career Fair opportunity that engaged businesses with students. Many students were provided career information by Guest Speakers. Over 43% of LEAs involved guest speakers in their program for ~12,033 fifth grade students. More than 30% of the LEAs provided field trips and business tours for ~8,740 students. These experiences provided first hand exposure to career opportunities in their communities. Also, 34% of LEAs provided ~6,172 students an opportunity to tour the High School. Eight percent of the school districts reported Job Shadowing opportunities for ~690 fifth grade students compared to zero for the 2017-18 school year. The feedback continues to indicate that job shadowing is not highly supported for this grade-level of student due to potential liability and safety risks.

NCDPI CTE is pleased that 84% of the LEAs collected supporting data on the programs. Many of these school districts engaged students in completing Career Inventories. These LEAs also provided Pre/Post Surveys for students, parents, school counselors, teachers, and business partners to determine the impact of the career awareness activities.

A session was conducted again at the annual CTE Summer Conference sharing best practices and data collected on Career Awareness Programs. Feedback on the Career Awareness Programs and survey tool were collected from the session participants. The feedback will be used for the 2019-2020 data collection.

The career awareness program is also being positively impacted by the CTE Grade Expansion Program Grant. The Education and Workforce Innovation Commission released the first RFP for the CTE Grade Expansion Grant Program in 2017-2018.

Fourteen LEAs were initially identified for this seven year grant. For the 2018-2019 school year, twenty-seven LEAs were identified for the grant and are listed below:

Part III: Legislative Recommendations

Due to the emphasis being placed on Work Based Learning at the state and federal levels, we anticipate this program will continue to grow and expand across the state. The implementation of The Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act (Perkins V) beginning with the 2020-21 school year will support the adoption and implementation of career awareness programs in Grade 5. The recommendation is to continue with the current legislation.
