ROBERT H. CUTTING (Bio attached)

I am the Father of two sons who grew up drinking water with a substance that the company calls "unregulated" and that now requires millions to study after it has been released into public water supply since 1980, by the firms' own admission.

I am also an attorney old enough to have been on the beaches at Santa Barbara in 1969, for the oil spill worked for Gov. Reagan in the first 3 years of CARB. I also served as aide to New Hanover County legislators Sen. Frank Block and Rep. Karen Gottovi. I was head of Santa Barbara County white collar crime unit, chair of the CDAA CPC and have spent hours reviewing the record in this case - including hours in the Fayetteville office.

Two related comments:

First, thanks to the members of the GA and ERC for taking the time to witness the real effects firsthand on tens of thousands of folks who, like myself, do not know whether GenX is the Fountain of Youth, or another Camp Lejeune. In this case, the past five years of budget cuts, re-organizations and repeal of health and safety laws designed to protect the public, though, reveals a larger reality: We are ALL used as guinea pigs for all the GenX's out there, and there are tens of thousands for which little data is available.

Using the human population as test subjects for the effects of pollutants has had spectacularly tragic results. Thousands have been affected by the dangers of asbestos, PCBs, dioxin, hormone disrupters and various pesticides. The people of Flint, Michigan are still without safe drinking water. Marines and their families at Camp Lejeune were provided tainted drinking water for decades. When the problem was finally discovered, it was covered up rather than corrected. The list goes on.

Think of it this way: each source of pollution to the water, air and soil allows the waste property of the source to enter either private property or public property – for free and without requiring detailed long or short-term studies of health or property effects such as air pollution on trees in NC NW. Because there is little data available, agencies must set "safe" levels as they go, as occurred with GenX. In Flint, a legal discharge was ingested by water treatment plant and caused the release of lead into the water.

Economists call this a subsidy and it is a clear market failure that gives these companies a competitive advantage. Here by the firms admission, approx. 3 tanker trucks per day would have eliminated this issue at the start, so that is one cost savings. The legal system has a difficult time recovering the costs to others such as those incurred by the GA and the CFPUA, not to mention those incurred by anyone who might be victims. Those are also cost savings enjoyed by the discharger.

Cape Fear River Watch estimates at least 800 materials in the river. So use GenX as a case study:

(1) More science is necessary, especially since NC relies on surface water for drinking water.

Air and soil also. FUNDING

- (2) Exercise Vigilance over existing facilities. Somehow the information as to the significant discharge of "byproduct" of the "same molecule" (according to company) never made it to the record in the GenX case. Elimination of enforcement has that effect: No cop, no stop. FUNDING
- (3) Lobby Congress to require more extensive testing so states not at disadvantage or competing in a "race to the bottom"
- (4) Charge for the Privilege: Immediately institute charges that reflect both the cost to the state and potential effects to third parties. Require insurance and bonding think A Civil Action where firms became insolvent or bankrupt
- (5) Protect property rights: Did anyone in this room consent to substances in public property (CFR) or private property (tap water)? This is repeated THOUSANDS OF TIMES OVER! Self described conservative Property Rights advocates such as Prof. Jonathan Adler argue that charging is not enough without the consent of property holders or condemnation if consent is not obtained.

As citizens even more than public servants, wouldn't you like to know what the chemistry in the environment can do to your kids, alone or in combination with other materials? Do you want your property and public properties to be used without your consent for low-cost waste disposal? Should more extensive research be required prior to the release of chemicals—and on those that have been released for decades? How do you know without research that there aren't localized effects or some long-term effects downstream? How can permits be issued with so little known about much of the chemistry of the discharge?

That is what the folks I know want to know – for themselves – and for their kids and grandkids.
