State/County Special Assistance Program

Purpose of Program

- Provides a cash payment to supplement a person's own income to pay the cost of room and board in certain licensed facilities or for persons who can live safely at home
- Licensed facilities include:
 - Adult care homes and family care homes licensed under G.S. 131D, and
 - Supervised living facilities licensed under G.S. 122C
 and NC Adm. Code 10A NCAC 27G .5600 A and C

Eligibility

Must:

- Be financially eligible based on:
 - income (income threshold: \$1,228/month for Basic SA in certain licensed facilities and \$1,561/month for Alzheimer's Special Care Units)
 - resource (assets) limit of \$2,000
 - SA In-Home (must first qualify for Medicaid)
- Be a U.S. citizen or qualified alien
- Meet State residency requirements

Eligibility

- Have physician documentation (FL-2) indicating need for adult care home level of care; and
- Be 65 years of age or older, or if between the ages of 18-64, must meet Social Security definition for disability or legally blind
- Eligibility is determined by county departments of social services

SA Rates

Established by the General Assembly

- Maximum Rate for Basic SA--\$1,182/month
- Maximum Rate for Special Care Alzheimer's Dementia Unit--\$1,515/month

Personal Needs Allowance--\$46/month

SA Budget

 Total SA expenditures for SFY 10-11: \$144,129,226

 Certified Budget for SFY 11-12: \$140,427,088

 Payments to recipients are 50% state and-50% county

SA Payment

- Payment is based on applicant/recipient's total countable monthly income
- SA Basic payment is:
 - SA Basic rate established by the General Assembly-currently \$1,182 plus \$46 personal needs allowance = \$1,228 total
 - Minus recipient's income from other sources
 - Example:
 - \$1,182+\$46 =\$1,228-\$700 (monthly income)=\$528 SA payment
 - Recipient retains \$46 out of SA payment
- SA In-Home payment up to 75% of the monthly payment person would have received if residing in adult care home

State/County Special Assistance In-Home Program

History and Background

- 1999 SA/IH began as a demonstration project by the General Assembly (G.A.)
 - 400 slots
 - SA/IH payment up to 50% of payment person would have received if residing in an adult care home
- 2003 G.A. increased slots to 800
- 2005 G.A. increased slots to 1,000; increased SA/IH payment from 50% to 75%
- 2007 G.A. codified Program into G.S. 108A-47.1
 - expanded from 1,000 slots to 15% of statewide SA caseload
- Payments are 50% state and 50% county


County Participation

Need for Services

 Comprehensive assessment completed by DSS case manager to determine needs

- Case management required:
 - Assist with identifying, coordinating, and monitoring needed services for persons to remain safely at home
 - Assure good stewardship of SA payment

How are SA/IH Payments Used?

- To assist recipients to remain independent and safe in their own homes
- Rent, utilities, food
- Other necessities: critical home repairs, clothing, household items, nutritional supplements, protective under-garments, respite care to relieve informal caregivers, assistance in the home
