• SFY 13-14 base allocation to serve 24,436 children

• \$12.4M Expansion in SFY 13-14 increased the total to 26,617 children



S.L. 2013-363: All NC Pre-K public school sites must be licensed by July 1, 2014

- Continued partnership with schools to achieve licensure
- SFY 13-14: 141 sites remained to be licensed at the beginning of the year.



Classroom Payment Pilot Study

- 7 Pre-K contractors: Davidson, Down East, Duplin, Orange, Pitt, Union, Wilkes
- Paid on a per classroom basis rather than per child in attendance
- Attendance still tracked per pilot classroom
- Legislative report recently submitted
- Comparing cost per child and attendance



Legislatively mandated standardized site selection

- NC Pre-K Advisory Committee and subgroups assisted in developing standardized process
- Piloted in SFY 12-13
- Required in SFY 14-15


DCDEE Operations

Increasing Access to High Quality Care


Percentage of Child Care Programs with 4-5 Star Ratings
