Report of Awards Resulting from the Competitive Grants Process for Nonprofit Organizations Required by Session Law 2013-360

In accordance with the Plan reported to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services on February 1, 2014, a Request for Applications (RFA), "Competitive Grant Program for Statewide Health and Human Service Initiatives" was published on February 28, 2014. Applications were accepted through March 31, 2014.

The Department appreciates this opportunity to develop and implement a competitive program for grants to nonprofits dedicated to providing services on a statewide basis. We were impressed with the commitment of the applicants to serve the varied and complex needs of the people of North Carolina. While limited funds necessarily prevent us from awarding grants to many worthwhile programs, we are pleased that the resources made available by the Governor and the General Assembly allow us to fund the selected organizations in meeting many urgent health needs of the state.
