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
Area Agencies on Aging (AAA)

- Responsible for developing a coordinated delivery system of Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) services and supports

- Funding over 10,000 waitlisted statewide for needed services
- Shortage of 10 long term care ombudsmen statewide
- Decreasing numbers of volunteers
- Technology and software to capture our impact
- Integrating our services with healthcare delivery
- Lack of awareness of the impact of our aging state





nc4a Legislative Priorities

- Increase the recurring state funding for the Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) by \$7 million.
- Establish a joint legislative committee to examine issues pertaining to the state's growing older adult population, including health care and financial security, and to make recommendations on how the state can better support North Carolinians to age with dignity.





nc4a Recommendations

- Increase funding for the Home and Community Care Block Grant by \$7M
- Increase funding for Long Term Care Ombudsman Program by \$800,000
- Increase funding for senior centers
- Support volunteerism
- Promote the aging network in delivery of healthcare





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
