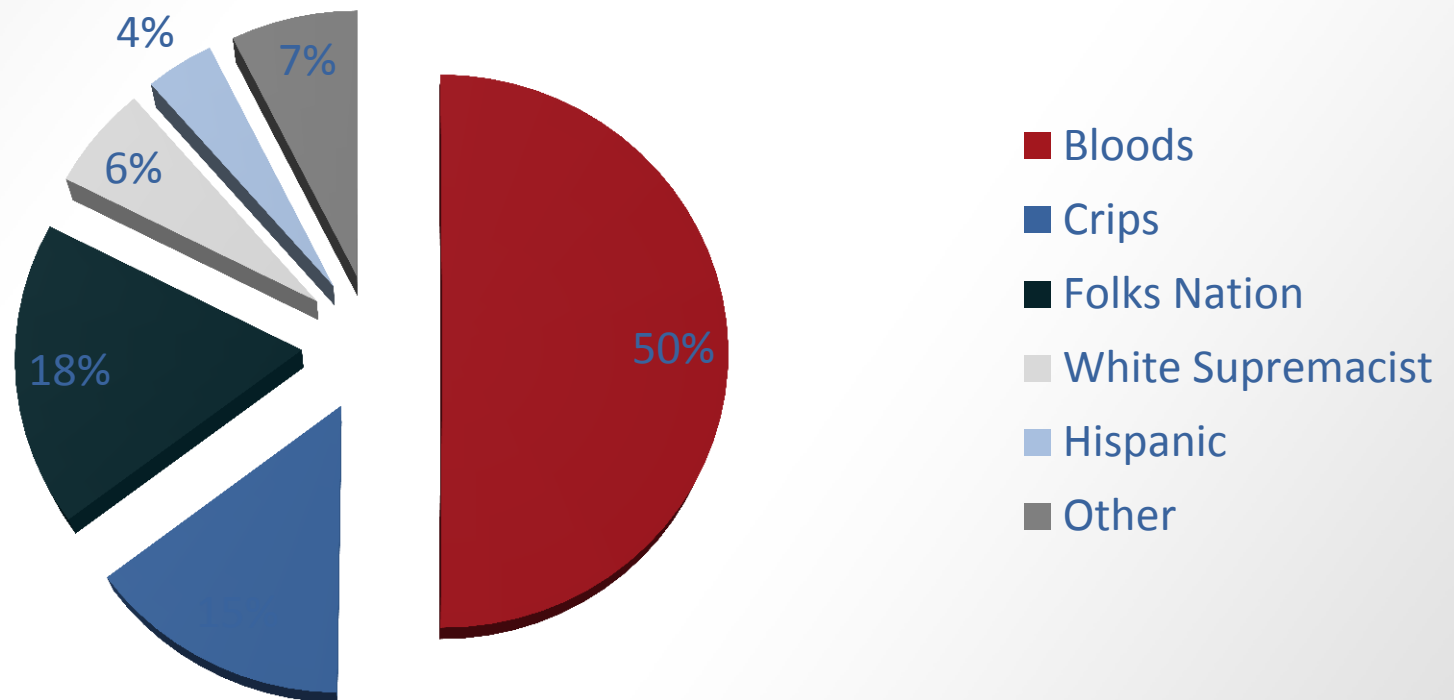
- ▶ Identify Security Risk Group Members and Supervise them in the Most Effective Manner to Reduce Violence and Ensure Public Safety

# Overview

- ▶ Currently 4842 Validated and Associate Gang Members in the Division of Prisons and 2604 on Community Corrections.
- ▶ Gang Members Make up Approximately 13% of the Prison Population and Less Than 3% of the Community Correction Population.

# Security Threat Group Management Unit (STGMU): Lieutenant

- ▶ The STGMU Lieutenant is a Foothills Correctional Institution staff member responsible for monitoring activities, maintaining records, and gathering/disseminating information concerning STGMU inmates. Included duties:
  - ▶ review and update inmate photographs
  - ▶ photograph and update all tattoos, markings, colors, etc. for identification and monitoring.
  - ▶ monitor all telephone privileges and calls
  - ▶ review all suspicious acts (fights, group acts, associations) whether Security Risk Group related or not, complete a monthly activity log





- ▶ randomly review video of STGMU yards, visitation, gym for any security threat group activity
- ▶ review any suspicious mail flagged by the mailroom; review outgoing mail (except legal mail) involving suspected SRG activity
- ▶ identify and select inmates throughout the state that meet the requirements to participate in the STGMU; assist with program intake and team assignments
- ▶ ensure the property of a SRG member is searched every seven (7) days
- ▶ review potential SRG material in possession of STGMU inmates
- ▶ secure and forward inmate confidential SRG file at time of transfer



# Security Threat Group Management Unit: Initiative

- ▶ Goals:
  - Decrease impact of SRG activity on NC prison operations
  - Provide inmates with the tools to encourage a lifestyle free of gang involvement.
  
- ▶ Target Population:
  - Male, Level 3 SRG, Regular Population, Close & Medium Custody
  
- ▶ Housed in Foothills Correctional Institution (Morganton, NC), operational in 2005
  
- ▶ 192 bed housing unit retrofitted for:
  - 160 beds STGMU regular population programming
  - 32 beds STGMU restrictive housing

# Security Threat Group Management: Unit Phase Program

- ▶ Three phases, 90 days each
- ▶ Quarterly admissions
  - Inmates approved through chain of command
  - Final approval through STGMU Hearing Committee provides due process
- ▶ Inmates housed in regular population status
  - Incentive wage, earn time jobs, custody reviews
  - Access to all routine services (medical, mental health, religious)
  - Disciplinary actions handled within unit
- ▶ Privileges increase through phases (e.g., phone calls, visitation), advancement based on active program participation & adherence to unit rules

# Security Threat Group Management: Unit Phase Program

- ▶ Each Phase is divided into multiple teams based on SRG affiliation.
  - Phase 1: maximum 8 members per team, same SRG affiliation
  - Phase 2: maximum 12 members per team, mixed SRG affiliations
  - Phase 3 Team: maximum 16 members per team typically no more than 12), mixed SRG affiliations.
  
- ▶ STGMU Team Structure Benefits
  1. Control
  2. Programing
  3. Security
  
- ▶ Custody and Programs staff work together ensuring unit schedules and set goals are maintained in accordance with policy

# Security Threat Group Management Unit: Programming

- ▶ Follows research-based best practices in correctional programming:
  - Cognitive-behavioral model intended to *change criminal thinking* and *improve deficient social & behavioral skills*
  - Inmate testing & program evaluation integral part of program design
  - Meaningful incentives (visits, custody promotion)
- ▶ Each Phase incorporates core Cognitive Behavioral Intervention program
  - GED, Career Readiness Certification available in Phases 2 and 3
  - Elective programming as available
- ▶ Individual Intensive Control programming

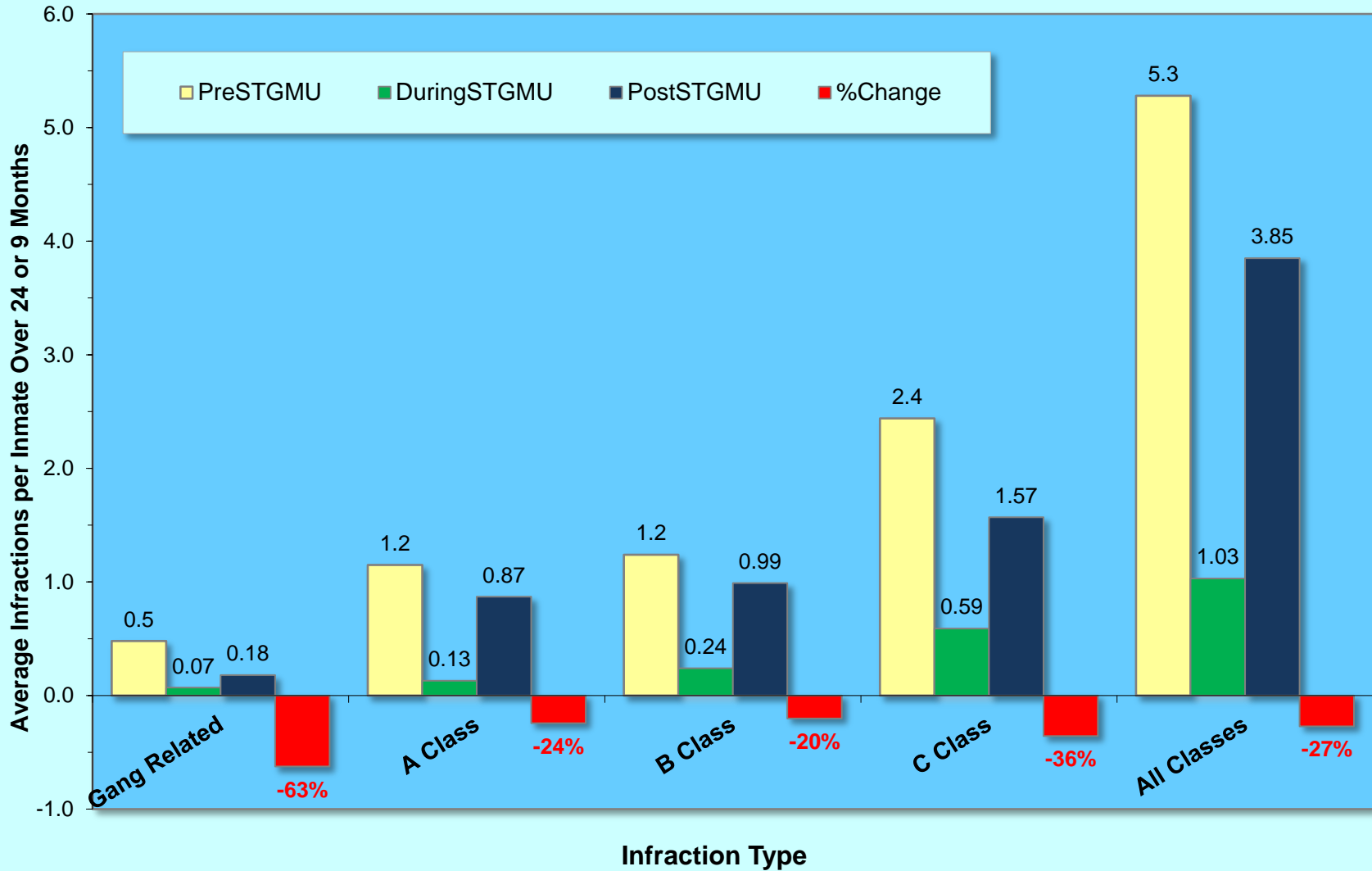




# Security Threat Group Management Unit: Statistics

- ▶ Since July 2005, STGMU has graduated **1050** inmates
- ▶ Fewer than 100 admitted inmates failed to graduate (28 of those were due to release from prison) = *6% failure rate*
- ▶ 14 of 15 Intensive Control Program inmates went on to graduate
- ▶ Following graduation:
  - SRG level is lowered to 2
  - Contact visits with immediate family restored
  - Minimum custody eligible
- ▶ Graduates transfer to designated facilities for Post Monitoring Program

## Disciplinary Infraction Rates 24 Months Before, During, and 24 Months After STGMU (N=324)



# Outcome Data – Two Points:

- ▶ Disciplinary infractions decrease dramatically *while assigned to STGMU*:
  - A-class down 70%, overall infractions down 48%
- ▶ Compared to pre-STGMU rates, disciplinary *infractions remain significantly lower 2 years later*:
  - Gang infractions down 63%
  - A-class infractions down 24%
  - B-class infractions down 20%
  - C-class infractions down 36%
  - Overall infractions down 27%
- ▶ Decreased infractions = fewer days in prison = \$ savings
