RE: Compliance report on the implementation of G.S. 17C-10.1, Certification of military service members and veterans with law enforcement training and experience.

Dear Members,

As required by North Carolina Session Law 2015-264 Section 37(b), the North Carolina Criminal Justice Standards Division is submitting this compliance report on the implementation of G.S. 17C-10.1 to the Co-Chairs of the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public Safety and Co-Chairs of the House Homeland Security, Military, and Veterans Affairs Committee.

The Criminal Justice Standards Division serves as staff for the North Carolina Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission ("the Commission") which establishes minimum employment, training and retention standards for the State's criminal justice officers. The Commission also plans for the effective implementation of innovations in the State's system of criminal justice employment, training and education.

The Criminal Justice Standards Division has published on its website information for military service members that lists the specific training and experience required for certification by the Commission. The Military Evaluation form (F-21) is also located on the website and must be completed by the applicant and submitted with all required documents to the Criminal Justice Standards Division. This same information has been submitted to the North Carolina Division of Veteran Affairs to be published on their website.

The Commission established a Special Committee to evaluate all Military Evaluation submissions and determine if the applicant meets the requirements of G. S. 17C-10.1 to receive credit for military training and experience. The Military Police Evaluation Committee is comprised of the following members:

Chief Ira Jones retired on November 20, 2015 and resigned his position on the Commission. Chief Hayworth replaced Chief Jones as Chairman and Commissioner Ricky Parks, Sergeant, Rocky Mount Police Department, was added to the committee.

The Military Police Evaluation Committee held its first meeting on July 27, 2015 and has met approximately every 30 days since. During this time the Criminal Justice Standards Division has received 64 applications. Six applicants did not meet the minimum standard time requirement (See Attachment No. 01) and were not reviewed by the Committee. 58 applications have been reviewed by the Committee (See Attachment 02) and have been sent the Military Basic Law Enforcement Training Limited-Enrollment Approval.

There have been four applicants that have received their limited-enrollment approval and completed their modified Basic Law Enforcement Training. Two of these applicants (See Attachment No. 01) have been hired by a law enforcement agency.
