

Presentation to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee for Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities and Substance Abuse Services January 19, 2011

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- Serves infants and toddlers, birth to 3 years of age, with or at established risk for developmental disabilities or delays
- Serves all 100 counties







- Entitlement under Part C of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act
- Anyone can refer an infant or toddler who is thought to have a developmental delay



 Pediatricians, families, and others refer to the Children's Developmental Services Agency (CDSA) for their county



- Once a child is referred, CDSA must conduct a developmental evaluation
- Eligibility is based on a significant delay or on an established health condition
- CDSA is required to provide service coordination for each child referred and/or enrolled



- Examples of services provided through El program include speechlanguage therapy, physical therapy, assistive technology
- Services are referred to community based providers
- If a qualified provider is not available, the CDSA must provide the service



- Services are provided at the child's home, or at the child's child care
- No residential services are provided or paid for under the Early Intervention program




- CDSAs coordinate with other programs serving the child; no duplication or overlap
- CDSAs develop a transition plan for the child as he or she is leaving the program, often to public school preschool disability program
- Services are monitored at local and state levels; multiple federal requirements



- Focused on early identification and early intervention for infants and toddlers with disabilities
- Key to better results for children and their families
