
Mission


NC National Guard Vision

What We Do

Dual-Role Federal and State Missions

- Provide Ready Forces: Organize, man, equip, train and deploy globally in support of Federal missions as directed by the President and Secretary of Defense
- Support to Civil Authorities: Organize, man, equip, train and deploy statewide as directed by the Governor of North Carolina in support of State missions
- In Our Communities: Participate in local, state and national programs that add value to our communities

Emergency Management Assistance Compact

- 53 States and Territories signed
- Legal Agreement Between Governors
 - Provides Legal Protection for Assisting Guardsmen
 - Provides Reimbursement Method
- State Emergency Management Agencies are Lead Agency
- Allows Sharing of Guard and Civilian Assets



Dual Status Commander

- 2012 National Defense Authorization Act formalized the role of a dual status commander
- The President must authorize and the Governor must consent to a specified officer
- DSC has dual chains of command, through the President and the Governor
- Appointment of a NG DSC would be the usual and customary C2 arrangement
- DSC training is accomplished at NORTHCOM; MG Trogdon is DSC qualified
