UNC Experience

Similar to recent Ohio State Incident:

- March 2006 Former UNC-CH student, Mohammed Reza Taheri-azar, drove his SUV through the Pit on UNC-CH campus.
- September 2013 NCCU police officers engage armed suspect on campus.

University of North Carolina System: Overview

- 16 Universities
- One Constituent High School
- Over 220,000 students
- Over 45,000 faculty and staff
- Total population comparable to the City of Greensboro
- 2,965 buildings/84,934,100 square feet
- 6,985 'core campus' acres



UNC Campus Police Departments: Leadership

- UNC Police Departments are lead by a sworn Chief of Police
- UNC Chiefs of Police have 400+ years of cumulative law enforcement experience
- Command Staff Training includes:
 - FBI National Academy
 - LE Executive Program UNC School of Government
 - Administrative Officer Management Program for LE – NCSU
 - NC Justice Academy Management Development Program
 - High percentage Master's Degree (MS/MA/MPA)



UNC Campus Police Departments: Demographics

16 UNC Campus Police Departments:

- 519 Sworn Officer positions
 - All UNC officers are certified through the North Carolina Justice Academy, Basic Law Enforcement Training (BLET) program
- Many UNC officers have earned the North Carolina LE Advanced
 Training Certificate the State's highest professional training certificate


Combined UNC Campus Police Activity Log (Jan 2016 thru Nov 2016):

- 525,944 total calls for service
- *2,311 special events (Athletics, Concerts, Lectures, Plays, etc.)
- 1,515 Campus-focused training courses (drug/alcohol abuse prevention, R.A.D., Bystander Intervention, Orientation Training, Active Shooter, etc.)

^{*}Million-plus individuals on UNC System campuses annually. We are responsible for their safety.

UNC Campus Police Departments: Law Enforcement Authority

UNC police officers have the <u>same powers as</u> municipal and county police officers to conduct investigations and make arrests for felony and misdemeanor offenses.

Same duties as municipal officers:

- Operations (Patrol)
- Investigations
- Crime Prevention Programs/ Training
- Administrative Duties



UNC Campus Police Departments: Broader Campus Involvement

Primary mission is to protect people and property through traditional practices but campus LE are involved in a much broader scope than their municipal counterparts:

- Involved with the evaluation, planning, and operations of campus security systems
- Emergency Notification Systems
- Student Conduct Boards
- Threat Assessment Team members (students/faculty/staff)



UNC Campus Police Departments: Interaction with Federal Laws

In addition to State and Local statutes and regulations, campus police officers must be conversant with the following Federal Laws:

- The Jeanne Clery Campus Crime Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act)
- Title IX of the Education Amendments Act of 1972 (TITLE IX)
- Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (VAWA)



UNC Campus Police Departments: Collaboration

- Permanent seat on NC Criminal Justice Education & Training Standards Commission
- UNC LE has a full-time Investigator assigned to NC ISAAC/Fusion Center
- UNC campus LE Field Liaison Officer (FLO) program NC SBI
- FBI Collegiate Liaison program (Charlotte and Raleigh)
- Campus PD's host monthly/quarterly meetings with local municipal counterparts
- Monthly conference calls between UNC Chiefs and EM Directors
- Annual UNC Chiefs and EM Directors Conferences
- Joint After Action Reports/Briefs following significant incidents on UNC campuses or following national/international events



UNC Campus Emergency Management Coordinators

- Coordinate the development of all hazards-emergency operations plans, continuity plans, and recovery plans
- Coordinate with local, state, and federal partners to ensure adequate response to and recovery from campus incidents
- During emergencies
 - Establish campus Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to ensure overall incident support and campus response
 - Assist with establishing a Unified Command System



UNC Campus Student Counseling Centers

- Provide counseling and therapy to students
- Provide educational programs for students, faculty, and staff on recognizing signs of stress and/or behaviors that may help identify individuals who pose a threat to themselves or others

UNC Counseling Centers are seeing more students with serious or complex concerns:

 Anxiety and depression are two of the most common reasons students seek counseling



Threat Assessment

UNC campuses have in place:

- Campus Threat Assessment Teams
- Protocol for identifying and responding to individuals who pose a threat to themselves or others
- Educate faculty, staff, and students to recognize signs of violence, suicide, and mental illness



UNC Campus Emergency Response: Safety Task Force Initiatives

2004 Task Force evaluated overall safety of the University community:

- 1. Strengthened admissions practices to UNC campuses
- 2. Assessed policies and regulations

2007 Task Force focused on campus violence prevention in the wake of the Virginia Tech tragedy:

- 1. Ability to respond to violent crime and extreme events
- 2. Ability to recognize and respond to individuals deemed risk to themselves or others
- 3. Enhance security to campus buildings and grounds

2014 Task Force review of campus safety efforts:

- 1. Responding to offenses against persons (Title IX)
- 2. Security Reporting and Awareness (Clery Act)
- 3. Campus Public Safety



UNC Campus Emergency Response: Training Exercises

Jan 2015-Nov 2016, UNC campuses conducted:

- 59 Active Shooter exercises (table-top and full scale)
- 15 Mass Casualty exercises (hazardous material, severe weather, public health, etc.)

Training exercises include personnel from campus and outside resources (PD, Fire, EMS, EM, Volunteer agencies, etc.)



UNC Campus Emergency Response: Training Exercises

Four areas we constantly focus on:

- Communications (Internal & External)
 - Emergency notifications to campus community (text, email, siren, signs, website, etc.)
 - Follow-up messages to campus community (text, email, website, FB, twitter, etc.)
 - Communications between campus EOC and campus staff (facilities, residence halls, etc.)
 - Communications between campus EOC and external first responders/others (Unified Command)
 - Communications between campus and UNC-GA System Office
- Incident Management
 - Incident/Unified Command (on-scene operations)
 - EOC (working arm for IC & Leadership)
 - Campus Senior Leadership (Chancellor's group big picture decisions)
- Mass Casualty (response has to be coordinated & effective)
 - Unified Command and EOC
- Public Affairs (one voice in coordination with multiple agencies)
 - Joint Information Center



UNC Campus Emergency Response: Active Shooter Incident

- Each UNC campus has an active shooter response plan
- Each campus has multiple means to notify campus community of active shooter situation
- Rapid Deployment training is taught to all NC LE officers to include UNC police officers
- UNC Advanced LE Rapid Response Training (ALERRT) 16-hour rapid deployment training in addition to standard NC rapid deployment training



UNC Campus Emergency Response: Active Shooter Training

UNC System campuses utilize two video programs to instruct the campus community on how to respond during active shooter incident: 'Shots Fired' & Department of Homeland Security's 'Run Hide Fight'.

The campuses are taught to:

- 1. Evacuate location of danger, if it can be done safely
- 2. If you can't evacuate then seek shelter
 - Lock or barricade door
 - Close blinds
 - Lights off
 - Cell on Vibrate
 - If/when you can safely, call 911
- 3. Have a plan to take shooter down, if last resort



UNC Campus Emergency Response: Active Shooter Training

Training Audiences:

- Campus Community students, faculty, and staff
- New student orientation
- New employee orientation
- Residence Hall orientation
- Department meetings
- Online available on-demand
- Special group training when requested
