Emergency Preparedness in NC

- ► NC boasts strong law enforcement and public safety partnerships among local, state, and federal agencies:
 - ► Shared jurisdiction
 - ► Mutual-aid agreements
 - ▶ Pre-planning and exercises



Resource Availability

- ▶ Resource availability can vary greatly across the state:
 - ▶ Metro areas / large agencies
 - ▶ Unique challenges in rural areas and smaller agencies
 - NCSHP / NCSBI / Federal Partners
 - ▶ Grant funding opportunities



- ► Focus areas for law enforcement:
 - ► Active Shooter
 - ▶ Public Demonstrations / Disorder
 - ► Natural Disasters



- ► Active Shooter:
 - ▶ Rapid Deployment / Columbine effect
 - ▶ Consistent training state-wide
 - ▶ Need for equipment and training to support first responders
 - ►Ex. Boone Rescue Task Force (Police, Fire, and EMS)
 - ►Ex. Wilmington / New Hanover Multi-Agency High Threat Response Plan



- ► Active Shooter:
 - ► Working toward education and "target hardening"
 - ▶ Importance of "See something, say something"
 - ► Training community on "Run, Hide, Fight"
 - ➤ Cannot necessarily prevent these incidents, but can minimize impact



- ▶ Public Demonstration / Disruption:
 - ► Increased public divisiveness has impacted law enforcement and public safety
 - Impact of social media and professional demonstrators / disruptors
 - ▶Need for enhanced intelligence gathering
 - ▶SBI ISAAC / Raleigh Intelligence Center



- ▶ Public Demonstration / Disruption:
 - ▶ Police-related demonstrations
 - ►Ex. Charlotte incident
 - ▶ Non-police related demonstrations
 - Ex. Charlottesville incident
 - ► Threats against police
 - ▶ Recent incidents of "Swatting"



- ▶ Public Demonstration / Disruption:
 - ▶ Police "Field Force Operations"
 - ▶ Consistent training across agencies
 - ▶ Labor / equipment intensive operations
 - ► Ex. Newton PD Homeland Security grant
 - Ex. Wake Co / Watauga Co models



- Natural Disasters:
 - ► Concerns vary across the state by region
 - ▶ Pre-planning and operational exercises occur for hurricanes, flooding, and snow emergencies
 - ► Important to keep in mind that existing law enforcement responsibilities do not stop when natural disasters occur



- ▶ Natural Disasters:
 - Unique, often expensive resources may be required
 - ▶ Short and long-term responsibilities
 - ►Initial life-saving efforts
 - ► Sheltering often required for extended periods of time



- ► Ex. Hurricane Matthew Johnston Co impact 2016
 - ► Municipal Law Enforcement
 - ► Sheriff's Office
 - ▶ Johnston Co Emergency Management / EOC
 - ▶NC Emergency Management
 - ▶Fire / EMS Departments
 - North Carolina National Guard



- ► Ex. Wrightsville Beach Hurricane Plan
 - ▶ Comprehensive Response and Recovery Plan
 - ▶Involves PD, Town Departments, EM
 - ▶ Regional New Hanover EM Planning
 - ▶Use of ICS for event response
 - ► North Carolina Emergency Management Domestic Preparedness Region 3 collaboration



Other Considerations

- Small agencies make up the majority of municipal agencies in NC
- Shouldn't overlook families of first responders who are without their husband, wife, father, or mother
