HISTORY OF EMERGENCY UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION (EUC08)

Congress has enacted legislation providing federally funded unemployment benefits for an additional number of weeks. This is the eighth time Congress has created a federal temporary program that has extended unemployment compensation during an economic slowdown: 1958, 1961, 1972, 1975, 1982, 1991, and 2002. EUC08 has been amended 11 times. The benefit amounts and duration vary. EUC08 benefits are no longer available in NC because NC enacted legislation in February 2013 that included a provision to reduce NC weekly benefit amounts. This change violated the "nonreduction" rule and therefore terminated the EUC08 agreement between NC and the Secretary of US DOL. 1
