



Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) Update

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COVID-19 Response Key Accomplishments

Prevention

- Worked with stakeholders to develop over 120 guidance resources to help businesses and individuals conduct their activities safely
- Distributed over 65 million pieces of PPE across the state
- Launched a nationally-recognized public prevention campaign statewide
- Stood up a COVID-19 website visited over 25.3 million times in 8 months

Testing and Contact Tracing

- Supported the administration of over 7 million COVID-19 tests and stood up
 750 testing sites across the state
- Distributed over 500,000 BinaxNOW antigen tests to partners such as local health departments and K-12 schools
- Developed a statewide contact tracing system and hired
 1,560 contact tracers
- Launched the SlowCOVIDNC exposure notification app, downloaded by over 600,000 users in 2020

COVID-19 Response Key Accomplishments

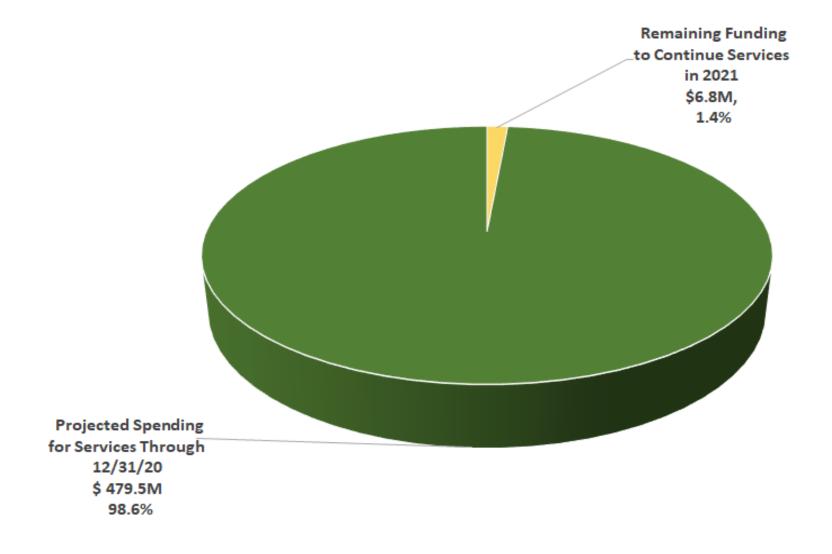
Support Services

- Employed over 400 community health workers to connect over 180,000
 North Carolinians to medical, behavioral and social supports
- Delivered over 26,000 services such as food, relief payments, or primary medical care to 5,500 households who needed to isolate or quarantine
- Provided Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) benefits to over 900,000 children at risk of hunger due to school closures

Child Care

- Provided emergency child care subsidies to nearly 17,000 children of essential workers and school-age subsidies to 7,700 children
- Stabilized 4,200 child care facilities with operational grants and PPE
- Supported 30,00 child care teachers and staff with retention bonuses

Service Title	Service Description	Projected Remaining Funds
Child Protective and Adult Protective Services	\$8.3M was allocated to local departments of social services to address additional, previously unbudgeted costs associated with pandemic-driven workforce shortfalls specifically regarding key areas of child protective service and adult protective services. This included temporary staffing and purchases to support infection control and tools to allow remote work and assistance. Several counties experienced supply chain issues regarding the needed purchases and other challenges affecting expenditures through 12/30/20. With the extension of time allowed for utilization of CRF funding, DHHS will continue this funding so that local DSSs that require more time will be able to complete planned services and/ or purchases.	\$1,600,000
Reinvestment Partners for Produce Prescription	\$2.5M, increased to \$3.5M in HB 1105 directed appropriation to Reinvestment Partners for their produce prescription program, which provides a monthly forty-dollar (\$40.00) per household benefit for each eligible FNS recipient enrolled by the recipient's health care provider for fresh produce. Combating food insecurity is a significant need. Therefore, expenditure of the balance will not be difficult with the extension of time which will minimize supply chain delays affecting this work. NC MedAssist	\$1.5M, increased to \$6.5M in HB 1105 directed appropriation to NC MedAssist, a nonprofit corporation, to offset increased costs for providing prescription assistance services during the COVID-19 pandemic to individuals who are indigent or uninsured. The organization has a submitted its proposal for expending remaining funds for these needed services with the additional time afforded in recent federal law.	\$5,000,000
