REPEAL BOG MANDATORY REVIEW OF CERTAIN UNC HUMAN 8 **RESOURCES ACTIONS** 9 SECTION 1. G.S. 116-17.3 is repealed. 10 PART II. UNC LABORATORY SCHOOL MODIFICATIONS/FUNDS 11 12 SECTION 2.(a) G.S. 116-239.5(a) reads as rewritten: 13 The Board of Governors, upon recommendation by the President, shall designate at "(a) 14 least nine constituent institutions to submit proposals to establish at least nine laboratory schools in total to serve public school students in accordance with the provisions of this Article. The 15 Board of Governors shall select constituent institutions with high-quality educator preparation 16 17 programs as demonstrated by the annual performance measures reported by the constituent institutions in accordance with G.S. 115C-296.35. The Board of Governors' Subcommittee on 18 19 Laboratory Schools established under G.S. 116-239.7 shall review the proposals and approve at 20 least nine of the proposals to establish laboratory schools. The Subcommittee may select a constituent institution to operate more than one laboratory school. The Subcommittee shall 21 22 oversee the operations of those laboratory schools to meet the purposes set forth in this Article." SECTION 2.(b) G.S. 116-239.5 is amended by adding a new subsection to read: 23 24 "(e) In addition to all other immunities provided to them by applicable State law, the Subcommittee, chancellor, the constituent institution, an advisory board, and a laboratory school, 25 26 and their members, employees, and agents shall be entitled to the specific immunities provided for in Chapter 115C of the General Statutes applying to the State Board of Education, 27 Superintendent of Public Instruction, a local board of education, a local school administrative 28 29 unit, and their members and employees. Any such immunity to liability established by this 30 subsection shall not extend to gross negligence, wanton conduct, or intentional wrongdoing that would otherwise be actionable. Immunity established by this subsection shall be deemed to be 31 32 waived to the extent of indemnification under Article 31A and Article 31B of Chapter 143 of the 33 General Statutes and to the extent sovereign immunity is waived under the Tort Claims Act, as set forth in Article 31 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes." 34

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5 Approval of Laboratory Schools. - The Board of Governors, upon the (a1) 6 recommendation of the President, shall designate at least nine-constituent institutions to establish 7 and operate a total of at least nine laboratory schools. The chancellor of each constituent 8 institution shall adopt and submit to the Subcommittee a proposal to operate a one or more 9 laboratory school schools in a one or more local school administrative unit units that meets meet 10 the minimum threshold for the number of low-performing schools located in the a unit under G.S. 116-239.6(4). The proposal shall include the governance structure of the laboratory school. 11 12 The Subcommittee shall evaluate the proposals for approval or disapproval by considering the 13 design components and the strategic focus of the laboratory school and any other standards 14 developed by the Subcommittee to be applicable to all laboratory schools. The Subcommittee 15 shall also consider the location of each laboratory school so that, to the extent possible, there is 16 a geographically diverse distribution of the laboratory schools throughout the State and a 17 maximum of one laboratory school located in a qualifying local school administrative unit. State. 18 From the proposals submitted to the Subcommittee, the Subcommittee shall approve the 19 establishment of at least nine laboratory schools.

20 (a2) Waiver for Certain Local School Administrative Units. - Notwithstanding subsection 21 (a1) of this section, a chancellor may submit a proposal to the Subcommittee to locate a 22 laboratory school in a local school administrative unit that does not meet the minimum threshold 23 for the number of low-performing schools located in the unit under G.S. 116-239.6(4) if the 24 proposal demonstrates that the laboratory school shall primarily serve students who did not meet 25 expected growth in the prior school year in accordance with G.S. 116-239.9(c1). The 26 Subcommittee may waive the requirement for the number of low-performing schools in a local 27 school administrative unit for the location of a laboratory school, for up to a total of three-six 28 laboratory schools established under this Article, only if both of the following conditions are met 29 for the laboratory school:

- (1) The proposal has been submitted jointly by the chancellor and the local school administrative unit in which the laboratory school will be located.

Section 36.6 of S.L. 2018-5 reads as rewritten: 1 2 "SECTION 36.6.(a) There is created the UNC Board of Governors Planning Task Force. 3 The Task Force shall consist of four current Board members appointed by the Board of 4 Governors, one of whom shall be designated as chair. These appointments shall be made no later 5 than August 1, 2018. 6 "SECTION 36.6.(b) The Task Force shall conduct a systemwide analysis of the capital 7 needs of the campuses of each constituent institution in relation to the Science Technology 8 Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) subject area, taking into account the strengths, 9 weaknesses, opportunities, and needs of each constituent institution, and any regional similarities 10 and differences.
